Night Sky In August - Stargazer's as Month in

August is full of amazing events and spectacular observations, especially this year! The very first day of the month will greet us with a spectacular sight of a **Supermoon**, only to give way to dark nights for the peak of the biggest **Meteor Shower** of the year in the middle of the month and come back with a rare **Blue Moon** at its end.



Supermoon

This is a full moon or a new moon that nearly coincides with **Perigee**—the closest that the Moon comes to the Earth in its elliptical orbit—resulting in a larger-thanusual apparent size of the Moon as viewed from Earth, as well as its higher brilliance. This phenomenon allows us a spectacular sight of our natural satellite and the most spectacular telescope observations of its surface.

Don't miss this amazing sight. If you would like to celebrate the occasion with music, a delicious dinner and bonfire, join the




astronomers in Finca Astronomica for a special Supermoon Party!

The Biggest M e t e o r Shower Of The Year The Perseid,



known in Spain as Lagrimas de San Lorenzo, has been active since 17^{th} July and will continue to grace the night sky with shooting stars until 24^{th} August. The peak of this spectacular Meteor Shower will take place on the 11^{th} - 13^{th} August and we are expecting up to 100 meteors per hour!



What Is A Meteor Shower?

The **Perseid Meteor** shower is caused by the Earth slamming into the debris left behind by comet 109P/Swift-Tuttle and



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it gets its name as the meteors seem to originate from the constellation of Perseus. During dark nights in August remember to look up and have a wish (or in this case wishes) ready for when you see a shooting star.)

In August, **Finca Astronomica** is hosting events every night so if you would like to spend the night away from the city lights and enjoy the night sky sitting by a bonfire, don't hesitate to book your stay now!

During the **Meteor Shower, Finca Astronomica** is hosting events every night, not only peak nights, so why not book a tour and stay the night? **Once In a Blue Moon...**

We all use the phrase occasionally, but did you know it has an astronomical origin? All full moons have their names, so we have a Wolf Moon in January, Strawberry Moon in June and Harvest Moon in September. A **Blue Moon** appears in our sky when it is a second **Full Moon** in the same month. As a **Full Moon** appears every 28 days, it's a rare occurrence that we have two in the period of just one month. On average, a Blue Moon occurs once every 33 months, or Full Moons, 41 times per century, or about seven times every 19 years, hence the all-known expression Once In a Blue Moon. Such a rare occasions calls for a party! A Once In a Blue Moon Party will take place in Finca Astronomica. Book now to secure availability.



Wonders Of The Milky Way

As summer time gives us the magnificent sight of the centre of our own galaxy, the **Milky Way**, there is a variety of very distant objects to observe with optical and robotic telescopes. Don't miss the opportunity to see the **Lagoon Nebula**, a nursery for baby stars; the **Ring Nebula**, a remnant of a dying star, the **Ptolemy Cluster** and many other breath-taking objects!

DID YOU KNOW?

Little Horn of Daniel (Part 1) Did you know there is a Little Horn mentioned in the book of Daniel chapter 7, verse 8? Who is this Little Horn? What does this Little Horn represent? Where does this Little Horn come from and how can it be identified? Let's see what the Scriptures have to say about this Little Horn.

Daniel chapter 7, verse 8 says "I considered the horns, and, behold, there came up among them **another Little Horn**, before whom there were three of the first horns plucked up by the roots and behold, in this horn were eyes like the eyes of a man, and a mouth speaking great things".

In articles written about **History in the book of Daniel** for June (part 1) and July (part 2), they showed the various kingdoms which arose after Babylon, through to Medo-Persians, to Greece and to Rome. As concluded in these articles (*the fourth beast or kingdom was Rome*) Rome was never taken over by another kingdom, but was divided from within.

Daniel chapter 7, verses 19-22 says "Then I would know the truth of the *fourth beast*, which was diverse from all the others, exceedingly dreadful, whose teeth were of iron and his nails of brass, which devoured, brake in pieces and stamped the residue with his feet. Of the 10 horns that were in his head and of the **other which came up** and before whom three fell, even of that horn that had eyes and a mouth that spake very great things, whose look was more stout than his fellows. I beheld and the same horn made war with the saints and prevailed against them, until the ancient of days came and judgement was given to the saints of the most High and the time came that the saints possessed the kingdom."

Daniel chapter 7, verse 23 explains the above verses "Thus he said, *the fourth beast shall be the fourth kingdom upon earth,* which shall be diverse from all kingdoms and shall devour the whole earth and shall tread it down and break it in pieces." We now know that the fourth kingdom was Rome in this passage.

Daniel chapter 7, verses 24 & 25 states "And the ten horns out of this kingdom are 10 kings that shall arise, and **another shall** rise after them and he shall be diverse from the first and he shall subdue three kings. He shall speak great words against the most High and shall wear out the saints of the most High and think to change times and laws and they shall be given into his hand until a time and times and the dividing of time.

Daniel chapter 8, verses 9-12 says "And out of one of them came forth a little horn, which waxed exceeding great, toward the south and toward the east and toward the pleasant land. It waxed great, even to the host of heaven and it cast down some of the host and of the stars to the ground and stamped upon them. Yea, he magnified himself even to the prince of the host and by him the daily sacrifice was taken away and the place of his sanctuary was cast down. A host was given him against the daily sacrifice by reason of transgression and it cast down the truth to the ground and it practiced and prospered."

Daniel chapter 12, verses 1-4 "At that time shall Michael stand up, the great prince which standeth for the children of thy people. There shall be a time of trouble, such as never was since there was a nation even to that time thy people shall be delivered, everyone that shall be found written in the book. Many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life and some to shame and everlasting contempt. They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever. Thou, oh Daniel, shut up the words and seal the book, even to the time of the end. Many shall run to and fro and knowledge shall be increased." (Michael in Hebrew means 'who is like God') Daniel asked for understanding and received a response in Daniel chapter 12, verses 8 & 9 I heard, but I understood not, then said I, "O my Lord, what shall be the end of these things?" He said, "Go thy way Daniel. For the words are closed up and sealed until the time of the end."

From the above quotations many have differing opinions as to who is this **Little Horn** of **Daniel** chapter 7, verse 8, but all must be tested by the Scriptures. Many believe that the above relates to a ruler named Antiochus IV Epiphanes of the Seleucid Empire, the Greek Kingdom. (Epiphanes means 'god manifest'). Antiochus the Great Tel: 602 466 534

was his father and he fought against the Roman republic, but finally, he agreed to a treaty with the Romans.

When Antiochus IV Epiphanes, his son, took over rulership, he conquered Judah. He desired that the Jews assimilate, so he forced through by law that they should stop circumcision, work on the Sabbath day, place Greek idols (Jupiter Olympus in the Holy Place) in the temple in Jerusalem, made them sacrifice animals to Zeus and placed a gymnasium in the temple yard so people would fight naked. This was also known as the abomination of desolation. These **man made laws** went against Yehovah's (Jehovah's) law. This caused an uprising and revolt which was organised by Judah Maccabee against Antiochus IV, which was successful. Antiochus IV died not long after. The details of this revolt can be found in the book of Maccabees and other historical sources.

In 2nd Thessalonians chapter 2, verses 3 & 4 states "Let no man deceive you by any means, for that day shall not come, except there comes a falling away first and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition. He opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped, so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, showing himself that he is God".

Daniel was shown some 500 years before Yeshua (Jesus) what would happen in the end times, but this **Little Horn** has some identifying characteristics. The book of Revelation deals with the end times and reveals more about this **Little Horn**. (Revelation means 'to reveal'.) The books of **Daniel** and Revelation are closely related and need to be studied together.

Every individual must make a decision for themselves. Salvation has come to all. Romans chapter 5, verse 15 says "....and the gift of grace, which is by one man, Jesus Christ (Yeshua), hath abounded unto many."

I hope you have learned more about the Scriptures. Next month I will continue with Part 2.

Puerto de Mazarrón

About а 20 minute drive from Camposol, down the RM3 Mazarrón to Town is Puerto de Mazarrón. There are plenty of places to park and your

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first place to visit is the Tourist Information Office, right in the centre of the Port. There are plenty of signs to help you find the office. Once inside, ask for a free map of the Port and ask about places to visit and explore. They will ring the places on the map for you

to find.

the facilities, Port you will find a small Museum that was а large salting

factory, built by the Romans during the 4th-5th Centuries AD. This occupied a large area on the right bank of the Port. The current Museum preserves part of the structures of this important building. The characteristic elements common to all the factories were the salting pools or tanks in which the fish were macerated with salt and different products were made, such as the so-called Garum,

the most famous of fish sauces.

Phoenician Boat Interpretation Centre

On the right hand side as vou drive into Puerto de Mazarrón from Bolnuevo, there is a small Museum telling the story about the two Phoenician boats that

were found whilst building the new harbor. These boats are the oldest ever found in the Mediterranean. You will also notice if driving from Mazarrón Town into the Port, the two Phoenician boats (sculptures) on the



very sandy and you can walk out into the sea quite a distance before you need to swim. During the summer months, there is loads going on including Jet Ski events: You can hire jet skis.

There are boat trips to see the dolphins or explore along the coast.

You can go fishing on boats - in a group, or just hire a boat yourself.

There are outdoor movie events on the beach during the summer months.

There is plenty for the kids including bouncy castles in the sea for the older kids.

For those wanting to keep trim - Yoga and keep fit classes on the beach. There are also special dog beaches for you and your dog.

How is this summer weather appealing to you? At the time of writing this article we have been seeing temperatures up in the high thirties. For holiday makers this is probably why they booked to come to Spain, but for many of the people living here they are finding it quite hot.

Of course, we will never please all of the people all of the time and in reality we aren't in immediate charge of the weather anyway. One person's heaven is quite different from another's and to some extent we have to take the rough with the smooth.

If you had the choice of weather what would your heaven be like? This sort of conversation can turn and the listener suddenly remarks, "Well I won't get to heaven anyway; not with my track record."

Perhaps if we think about it, would any of us get into heaven no matter what our track record is?

The Bible does say in Paul's letter to the Romans "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Whoops!! Where does that leave each and every one of us?

As Christians, one of the things we have to learn quite quickly is not to take one passage of scripture on its own, but to seek and find the full meaning of what is being said. Right from the beginning of time, God has had a rescue plan to bring all His people into His family no matter what their track record has been.

We don't often think of Christmas as we struggle to walk in the blazing heat, but it was at Christmas that God sent his only Son into this world to start a life that was God's salvation plan. Before Jesus came into this world He knew the Father's plan. The Gospel of John records Jesus' life from the start of His ministry to the very end.

Jesus' ministry had not been occurring very long when He met a man called Nicodemus. Jesus had a long conversation with Nicodemus as He explained to Nicodemus what he must do to be saved – that is to set things right with God. As the discussion pursued, Jesus said the immortal words which you can read in the Gospel of John Chapter 3, verse 16; "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." FAST is YOUR Emergency First Responder Team on Camposol. In the event of an emergency please call 112 (using the 112 Region de Murcia App if you have it) and then call FAST on 868 487 015. As our Responders are all based on Camposol, we should be with you sooner than the ambulance and, if necessary, can commence lifesaving treatment (for example, maintaining an airway, CPR including the use of our automatic defibrillator, stopping catastrophic bleeding etc), before the ambulance crew arrive. We are also trained to assist with other less urgent issues until the arrival of the paramedics and can advise and provide reassurance and comfort to both the casualty and other members of the household.

Responders

It is always a challenge through the summer months when our Volunteer Responders are away on holiday themselves, or have visiting friends or relatives to maintain a 24/7 response. For this reason we have maintained our vigorous recruitment and training schedules and are proud to introduce our six newly qualified Responders who joined the team following a training course last month. These Responders will all be working initially alongside more experienced Responders, or with our Vice President/mentor whilst they get to learn the more procedural aspects of

the service.

Although we will not be running another training course until after the summer we are always happy to hear from anyone potentially interested in joining the team either as a Responder or Support Volunteer. (recruitment@fast2016.org)







Whilst our other team undertook the refurbishment of the verges along the top end of Los Covachos. A number of our Volunteers remembered creating the





Oh my dizzy days! We know it's going to be hot, but when it's actually here, it's different а story!

At the moment my van is poorly in the garage with

oil all over the engine. Not sure as yet what the problem is, but I'm like a bear with a sore head - not a happy bunny at all! My van is key to getting work done; vets, sanctuary, stables, feed, hospital, shops! My van does so much work. We're just always extremely busy. I hope to hear in a few days it's fully repaired. I'm not even going to think of the bill!

The dogs are managing fine with the heat. We have the aircons on and they have their cool mats, fresh cool clean water; guite a lovely life they have. They sleep all day and play at night!

People ask me all the time how are the donkeys surviving the heat.

WELL, I'm pretty sure all were born here in Spain - all but one, Junior the Italian stallion (not) I know he came from Italy!! Our donkeys have the option for shelter, but most prefer to take a siesta in the sunshine. I know very odd! Up at the Sanctuary, with 30.000sq mtrs of land, our donkeys are free to roam; free to live a more natural life. It's also quite high up on the mountain side, so there's always a breeze which is great for keeping cool.

Why do donkeys have large ears????? Large ears help them stay nice and cool. The



clean water, which they wouldn't get in the desert! As you can imagine, we go through gallons and gallons of water every day. No-one ever thinks about WATER ... water is like food. We all need it to survive. Our water bill is approximately €450 every 2 months! This is for 113 donkeys. It makes you think doesn't it!

We've been lucky so far with the fly situation. We haven't had many. I'm sure there all waiting for the heat to die down then they will descend on us ... our fly masks are at the ready!!

Our shops are very quiet at the moment. I know it's too hot to shop, but we do need our loyal supporters to come in a buy a little/donate. The donkeys need to eat and drink regardless of the weather!



When urgent medical help is required, FAST can bridge the gap between calling/ waiting for an ambulance to be able to get to you quicker, to administer vital assistance. Like any charity, **FAST** relies

Birding in Murcia

It has been a while since I visited the Saladares del Guadalentín, so a trip to Camposol to deliver some bird books to Best Wishes (the shop) was the perfect opportunity that I needed.

Some English friends, who were also birders, were staying a few nights with us after returning from a long motor-home visit to Morocco. They were on their way back to the UK and a day's birding in the Saladares would prove to be the perfect antidote to their need for some rest and relaxation. The Saladares del Guadalentín also happens to be one of my favourite birding sites, although it can be a bit mixed; sometimes you see lots of interesting species and other times you feel like you are looking for a 'needle in a haystack'. With fingers crossed, I went with them to look for 'needles in haystacks'.

As we drove slowly across the plains, it seemed very quiet and we hardly saw anything until eventually, our first feathered friend honoured us with an appearance. It was a Woodchat Shrike (Lanius Senator), a colourful and very noticeable summer visitor. They are a little bit bigger than a Sparrow and the male bird in front of us was quite striking in his black and white plumage and a very attractive chestnut cap; once seen, never forgotten. They are summer visitors and very small birds of prey that are 'sit-andwait' hunters. They settle on top of a visible perch surveying the surrounding area, waiting for a large juicy insect to appear. They then swoop down to capture their prey, which they sometimes eat immediately and sometimes save for later. If they are not too hungry, they will leave their prey hung up on a thorn, hence the nickname of 'Butcherbird'. It is a gruesome practice, but a very practical habit.





Greater Short-Toed Lark

We continued our safari across the steppes, but there wasn't much about, except for some small LBJs that were quietly feeding on the barish ground at the edges of the low vegetation. They were smallish birds, about the size of a Sparrow and quite insignificant. I suspect only birdwatchers would notice their presence. They were in fact, Greater Short-Toed Larks (Calandrella Brachydactlya) and the only migratory Lark of the eight species that live in Spain. They are summer visitors that over-winter in Africa in the Sahel and breed over here, all across Spain. They particularly like areas of sandy wasteland and arable fields. At the moment these areas are relatively common habitat in Murcia, but they can often be overlooked. The birds are difficult to see as they blend into the background and are quite pale underneath and streaked brownish above. However, if the light is good and seen at the right angle, they have a rufous-tinged crown/crest. I was very pleased to see them on this occasion as it was the first time for a few years, after Covid and Brexit stays in the UK.



We continued on our way only to be interrupted by more LBJs; in fact, a whole flock of them, all Sparrows. However, as birding was proving to be a bit quiet and boring, I thought I would waste a bit of time checking them all in my binoculars. I was pleasantly surprised, as what I thought was a flock of House Sparrows (*Passer Domesticus*), turned out to be quite a mixed flock and included **Tree**

(Passer Montanus), Spanish (Passer Hispaniolensis) and Rock Sparrows (Petronia Petronia). I also managed to find a couple of Corn Buntings (Emberiza *Calandra*) intermingled and disguising themselves as Sparrows! This was quite a find! It is not often that you can see all four species of **Sparrows** in the same location. Rock Sparrows can be common in the right habitat and are more often seen in the north-west of the Region; Tree Sparrows are quite rare and even rarer is the **Spanish Sparrow**. However, there are small populations of all these species here in the Saladares.



I was beginning to think it was going to be one of those quiet days, but nearly straightaway I came across a striking male **Black Eared Wheatear** (*Oenanthe Hispanica*). These birds are summer visitors. The males are guite striking and conspicuous, whereas the females are similar looking, but an awful lot duller and are able to blend in better with the local landscape. It is a useful trait if you are the main one bringing up a family.

A little bit further on I was driving towards a small field of broccoli; quite a common crop here at this time of year. Two largish birds suddenly flew down about twenty metres in front of me and were then joined by another two. I had clocked where they landed and soon had the binoculars focused on the spot, but I couldn't see anything. This ability to remain invisible was a pretty good clue towards identification. Thankfully, they started to walk across the ground and I was able to watch them for quite a while. They were Black-Bellied Sandgrouse (Pterocles Orientalis), very uncommon and elusive birds on the Saladares.





Whilst watching the **Sandgrouse**, four **Little Bustards** (*Tetrax Tetrax*) walked out of the broccoli field right in front of me. This was obviously my lucky day as they hadn't spotted me. There was an adult male in full breeding plumage, accompanying and guarding his harem of three dullish brown females. The males have an elaborate display and dance competition between themselves to attract the females, who then choose the most impressive male as their future partner. He must have been a good dancer to have three females in tow!



I wasn't sure where to look next with all this activity in front of me, but two cryptic plumaged **Stone Curlews** (Burhinus Oedicnemus) appeared on the scene for a couple of minutes and then flew off into the distance. It was like waiting an hour for



a bus and then three turn up in the space of a couple of minutes!

After this gold rush, things settled down a lot and I was left looking for the familiar birds of the area, but nevertheless no less interesting. The first one that came into view was very predictable as I was driving past one of the newly constructed Pigeon lofts that the Lesser Kestrels (Falco Naumanni) had adopted as their regular nesting places. As usual, there were a couple of adult birds perching near the building, whilst their housemates went hunting for large insects in the adjoining fields. Lesser Kestrels are summer visitors to Murcia and are one of our rarer breeding raptors. On a worldwide scale it is classified as fairly common, but on a local scale it is somewhat of a rarity. They are small Falcons, slightly smaller, but not noticeably so, than our common Kestrel. They winter in Africa and Pakistan. They are colonial breeders and generally nest in Murcia in the roofs of old abandoned buildings and sometimes dovecotes on the plains and steppes of the region. I estimate that there are less than ten breeding colonies with no fewer than 60 pairs. They are pretty little Falcons and

one of Murcia's special avian delights. Driving a bit further along I came across a **Hoopoe** (*Upopa Epops*), intent on finding an insect to sate his or her appetite and it was so engrossed by its search that it took little notice of the strange bloke in the car intent on getting a photo.



My final bird of the day was a very common LBJ of the Saladares, but probably one that aptly represents this birding hotspot. It was a ubiquitous Crested Lark (Galerida Cristata). They are almost identical to a similar species of Lark called a Thekla Lark (Galerida Theklae). It is very difficult to tell these two species apart, as their differences are so subtle. There are a few identification features, but I choose to look at the beak. The Crested Lark has a slimmer and longer beak. It is also said that Crested Larks always perch on the ground, whereas Theklas prefer to perch at the top of a small bush or tree. However, I am not too keen on this latter method, as I have seen Crested Larks perched atop of a tree! The habitat is also an identification indicator, as Theklas prefer higher, stony areas, whereas Crested Larks are often seen on flatter cultivated areas. However, I prefer a photo clearly showing the beak. You can just call them a Crested/Thekla Lark and not get too wound up about it!

Pantomime and Sea Horses ADAPT-style Many readers will remember the ADAPT association for English speakers based in San Pedro del Pinatar which was active from 2007 to 2021. ADAPT members were involved in many projects aimed at integration into the local community as well as other social activities. Sadly ADAPT ceased to function through lack of new membership and support, but two of its strongest groups have remained in existence and continue to help each other; the ADAPT Theatre Group (ATG) and the ADAPT Metal Detecting Group.

ATG is now planning its 12th pantomime to be performed in San Pedro in late November, early December (dates to be confirmed) with the grand title of Ali Baba and the Four and a Half Thieves. ADAPT pantos have the unique characteristic of being performed in both English and Spanish, so the title is also - Ali Baba y Los Cuatro Ladrones y Medio. Right from our first pantomime, with its unusual take on Cinderella, (who had to speak Spanish to marry the prince!), we have performed in both languages in order to attract local audiences and share this strange tradition of ours and raise funds for local charities. We also work with children at a local primary school as our dance group and, whenever



these valiant warriors spend time in the Mar Menor area, detecting lead that has been left by fishermen or washed up from elsewhere contributing to the contamination of the lagoon. The lead they pick up is donated to the Hippocampus association which sells it to raise money for the conservation project **Save the Sea Horse**. This detection work has proved invaluable to the project: in the 11 months up to June 2023, they have collected 511 pieces of lead, totalling 19.1kilos of this contaminating material.

ADAPT Metal Detecting has been featured on the Channel 5 programme Bargain-loving

Brits in the Sun, (Season 9 episode 23) and they are currently filming another episode to be broadcast next year.

The combined integration work of **ATG** and **ADAPT Metal Detecting** means that, in addition to other benefits, a substantial donation can be made every year to **AFEMAR** (a non-profit charitable organisation that works with people with mental health problems in the Mar Menor area), purchasing basic school materials for needy families in San Pedro at the start of every school year. 

The Lord's Prayer...Houston, do we cent have a problem?

OK, so I know I am 'Old School'. I am 'Analogue Man!'

When the disciples of Jesus asked Him how they should pray, He told them to begin with "Our Father in heaven..."



NORMA'S TRAVELS

Week 2 -Whale Search

When I last wrote we were in Quellon at the chaotic guest house. We didn't get much sleep and the next morning from 7.30am the rest of the guests were up, as they were workmen going back to Puerto Montt. The kitchen table was covered in food and the sink was full of their dishes. We made a quick coffee and left with no sign of our host Sonia!

Our ferry was delayed and we messaged Vanessa. None of the cafés were open, so we had empanadas for breakfast. Eventually we left 2½ hours late, but the ferry was only partly full so we could spread out. As we were approaching the island of **Raul Marin** I chatted to a lady who was Vanessa's mum, Nancy. We were picked up and taken to our cabana, which was rustic but very comfortable, with a small log burner in the centre of the living area. Nancy insisted on putting the fire on. I did a bit of shopping for breakfast.

We had dinner in the restaurant, La Paleta, which had no mobile signal, but slow Wi-Fi in the restaurant - not quite as remote as we thought. Vanessa talked to us about the layout of Raul Marin and about trips on a boat. Nancy had told me that last year there were loads of blue whales, but this year hardly any. We would have to travel further but bad weather was forecast. The same family have a shop, the cabanas and hostel and the restaurant. I had congrio, a delicious white fish and Chris had a stew with fish and seaweed. After a few beers we were ready for an early night. We were delighted with our hosts; so different from the 'sharks' in Quellon.

We decided to eat in the cabin most nights and shopped in all three of the local shops. During the heavy rain I made some soup. Saturday started rainy again, but once it stopped we went out and walked up to the ferry dock where a German campervan was parked and talked to the owners, Lutz and Karin. They had shipped the van from Hamburg to Buenos Aires and had driven all the way down to Tierra del Fuego and were now on the way back up. We walked along the beach and round the headland - about 6-7km. It was beautiful, peaceful and good for the soul. As we got back to 'town' the ferry was arriving 5 hours late!



At 5.30pm we left on a boat trip, with Lutz and Karin and our host Vanessa. We headed out towards the sea, but it was too rough, so we opted for a trip to the fjords instead. It was breathtakingly beautiful and of course we were the only ones out. We moored near the island's water source for coffee. Our guide Arlen was really knowledgeable about the area. The water is pumped from a 'laguna' into the town. Repairs are costly and time consuming. We spotted all three species of Cormorants (Yeco or Black, Imperial and Lille Red-Legged), Chilean Skuas and were treated to displays by two pods of **Dolphins** (Austral and the more timid Chilean). On the way back Arlen pulled up his crab pot to reveal seven crabs; two to eat, two too small and three female - five were thrown back. It was a delight to meet Arlen on his last trip of the season. He was going back to his job as a teacher, having spent the summer with his wife and three children in Raul Marin

On Sunday, I got up and got the fire started first time - firelighters are not allowed! We decided to do another walk through a wood - about 3-4km, although the map was very basic. The bosque was an amazing temperate rainforest with thousands of different species of trees and plant life. The birds were in full song and we heard, but couldn't see, a Woodpecker. The local orange-barked trees are amazing. They are coppiced to use for building, but in the bosque they grow much thicker; ideal for tree hugging, which Chris didn't try! From the map we had to walk to the 3rd lookout where the track would split. It didn't, so we just kept going until lookout 5 where the track ended and we had to 'Bush Whack'. We saw an area of fenced-in land and decided it would join up with the track back to town. After following the fence for 2km, wading through the trees and bushes, I climbed a fence to a high point to work out where we were. Eventually we found the path - we had walked for nearly four hours! In one day I got my 'Bush Whack' and fire starter badge!

Vanessa said a **Whale** searching trip to Tic Toc (a real name and long before the app!) was on for Monday. She gave us two cooked crab claws from Arlen's catch and I bought two pieces of delicious homemade cake.

On Monday, we left at 8am with Ben and Carol from Seattle and Toby and Misha from Germany, for a longer trip. It was choppy at first on the open sea, but once in Tic Toc Bay it was calm, but sadly not a **Whale** in sight. Luis, our skipper, said there wasn't enough krill. We did see **Sea Lions** (Austral fur seals), a few lonely **Penguins**, plenty of **Cormorants**, **Caranca Kelp Geese** and pairs of **Ducks**, Quetru no volandor (Magellan flightless steamer-ducks). The highlight was three **Chunchungos** (marine **Otters** and much smaller than UK **Otters**); one playing in the water and the two males fighting on the shore.

On our last night, we ate in the restaurant. I had a local speciality - Puyes, (tiny boneless fish that you eat whole). They were cooked with garlic and chilli and the taste was amazing. Chris had pork, (a huge chunk) and it clearly was not reared in a factory. The menu was very simple and as local as possible.

The road only came to the island in 2009. They previously relied on their own produce and goods from the ferry, which in winter could often be cancelled. I asked Luis what he did in the 'off season'. Apart from the usual fishing, maintenance etc. he had a holiday. Last year he had 5 days on a Colombian island and he travelled 4 days to have a 5 day break!

Vanessa said that anyone pregnant had to go and live in Coyhaique (350km and 9hr drive away) for a month before their due date for a normal pregnancy and two months for any complications. Home births on the island are banned due to the risk to mother and baby. For school after year 7, the children live in La Junta during the week; only 75km, but 3 hours away, or families move there until their children finish school.

Nancy and Vanessa were a delight to stay with; such gentle souls, keen to preserve the environment and share the beauty of their surroundings. Vanessa spoke English which she learned in Queenstown, New Zealand and Dublin. Her priority was the quality of experience of her guests rather than profit.





Donation to the San Agustin's Children's Home, Vera

Living Water Church, Mojácar, has partnered with the Vera & District Lion's Club by donating €1,500 to the San Agustin's Children's Home building project in Vera.

The Vera & District Lion's Club have taken on a very large project, as major renovations are required at the home. It is estimated that the initial project will require around \in 20,000 to complete. Constructed in 1872 and originally a hospital to attend to the sick and the injured who worked in the mines, the building needs considerable attention. One part of the building is managed by the Vera Ayuntamiento via grants and the other part is owned (in a trust) by the family of one of the nuns. The latter part is a 'listed building'; so there is a limit to what can be done to the building.

The **Lion's Club** has already rebuilt the kitchen and refurbished and refurnished the children's bedrooms. Unfortunately there is still much work to be done to the

building, as no refurbishment works have previously been done, including to the walls and rooves.

The **San Agustin's Children's Home** currently houses 11 children between the ages of 8-14 years. The **Children's Home** is run by two nuns who go to great lengths to ensure that the children see this as a loving, caring home. The Ayuntamiento provides funding for food for the children, but all other funding for clothing, personal hygiene, etc. has to be accumulated via donations. Much of this is provided for by the **Vera & District Lion's Club**, including ensuring the children have wrapped Christmas presents under the Christmas tree in December.



CANARY ISLANDS

Canary Islands: Top value-for-money destination with an extended summer Home to idyllic beaches, volcanoes, caves and some of the best weather in the country, the **Canary Islands** is also the best value-for-money destination in Spain, according to recent research.

Best of all, while the Mediterranean, Balearic Islands and south coast are now sliding towards a mild autumn - great weather for being outside, but not so much for topping up your tan or swimming in the sea – summer in the **Canaries** carries on longer. Its climate is closer to that of central or southern Morocco, given that the region is geographically closer to the African continent – only 100km by sea from its coast – than to mainland Spain. This has long made the **Canaries** a popular autumn or spring destination for sun-seekers. Even in winter it is pleasant enough to enjoy its outdoor attractions without needing extra layers.

Lanzarote is the most economical destination in the region, according to the portal Vacaciones-España.es – hiring a car for a week comes in cheapest at €126, although outside high season you can probably get even better deals since motor rental firms have to pay for storage in winter if their vehicles are not let out, so they are only concerned with covering their costs. A two-course meal for two comes in at about €12 per head and theme parks and other attractions suitable for children and adults can cost as little as €18 for a family unit.

Gran Canaria and the **Costa Blanca**, the coast of the Mediterranean province of Alicante, are the second and third cheapest holiday hotspots in Spain, although as regular visitors to the country know, 'cheap' does not mean 'bargain basement'; food, entertainment and accommodation are of a similar quality nationwide.

Travelling Around

Transport in Lanzarote offers the best value for money, with the cost of a one-way airport bus averaging €1.40 pp – the maximum you would ever have to pay anywhere in Spain would by the typical €18.80 from Almería airport to the coast. Lanzarote – along with the Balearic island of Ibiza – have the cheapest taxi fares from airport to the main coastal resort areas, largely because of the short distance (under 15km) and the lower price of petrol on Spain's

islands. Taxi fares are normally set by town or city councils or regional governments,



meaning travellers can get a price for their destination before setting off. For car hire, **Gran Canaria** is even cheaper than **Lanzarote**, at an average of €100 a week and **Fuerteventura** is third-cheapest

at an average of €130 for a week.

The Canary Islands only come in the most expensive when it comes to family theme parks - joining the Costa Blanca. Water parks in Tenerife would set you back an average of €128 for a family unit and Aqualandia and Mundomar in Benidorm. Alicante province around €112. If theme parks are top of your list for holiday fun, you may be better off heading to the Granada Province coast, known as the Costa Tropical, the coast of the Province of Cádiz, known as the Costa de la Luz, or that of Málaga, the costa del Sol, where a family unit can get in for around €70. Grown-ups seeking watery fun without kids in tow are recommended to head to Ibiza, or to the coast of the province of Murcia – the Costa Cálida – where an adult ticket costs just under €20.

Price aside, many of these huge leisure complexes are worth the visit. PortAventura on the **Costa Daurada**, (Tarragona Province), continues to be the most expensive in Spain at \in 57 per head, although your ticket also lets you into Ferrari World and the water park Caribe Aquàtic on the same day, so in practice, less than \notin 20 pp for each centre provided you squash them all into 24 hours.

What else is there to do in the Canary Islands?

As Lanzarote is the cheapest holiday destination in Spain overall – unless you>re heading for a theme park – you have the perfect excuse to take a tour around some of the Canary Islands' most breath-taking sights:

The Timanfaya National Park; an eerie, volcanic landscape that makes you feel as though you are on the moon, is home to

the only known geysers in Europe outside of Iceland.

The Los Verdes Caves with their underground pools and fascinating volcanic rock formations are an absolute must.

Playa Blanca, which literally translates as 'White Beach', is made from golden sand imported from the Sahara Desert and is close enough for you to wander around the lively and varied street market in Teguise.

Gran Canaria is home to the provincial and regional capital, Las Palmas de Gran Canaria – a massive city which is worth exploring for its architecture, lively dining scene and brilliant shopping – as well as some of the betterknown holiday beach destinations of Playa del Inglés and Puerto Rico, the most upbeat and bustling, and the calmer Puerto de Mogán and San Agustín.

Incredible natural scenery is easy to find – The Nublo Rock has a splendid and unusual stone formation and viewing point and the 'mini-desert' and dunes on the shores of Maspalomas.

Fuerteventura, the second-largest of the **Canary Islands**, is popular because its beaches are mostly white sand rather than volcanic and because of its remote bays guarded by majestic cliffs. The desert-like Tindaya Mountain, with its 'Wild West' appearance, ancient cave carvings, rambling routes and bird sanctuary and Lobos Island, an uninhabited nature reserve and habitat for rare birds and the paradisical La Concha Beach should be top of your list on a visit there.

Tenerife, the biggest island in the region, needs little introduction; the Teide National Park, a volcano where you can walk into the crater and which is Spain's highest mountain at 3,718 metres (as high as the Andes), is in fact still active, but not expected to erupt for centuries. You can reach the summit by cable car, although if you are an experienced hiker, you could head for the Pico Viejo ('old peak'), or go rambling in the Cinchado Rock area. Even non-ramblers should visit the latter; an iconic rock formation that resembles a series of towers and falls within the wider Teide National Park area.

From **Tenerife**, you can take a ferry to the tiny island of **La Gomera** for the day; a rural, green enclave where natives still communicate using their ancient 'whistling' language.

Everything you need to know about transferring your private pension to QROPs

When considering a move abroad, one important financial decision for prospective expatriates is how to handle their pension fund. Accumulated retirement savings hold significant value and safeguarding one's pension and ensuring a comfortable retirement overseas are crucial.

One potential solution is a **Qualifying Recognised Overseas Pension Scheme (QROPS)**, now known as **Recognised Overseas Pension Scheme (ROPS)** since 2015. A **QROPS** transfer can be a viable option for individuals looking to transfer their British pension fund to another country. However, this is only possible in certain jurisdictions that have schemes listed in the **HMRC QROPS** list, which undergoes regular revisions.

What is a QROPS or ROPS?

A **QROPS/ROPS** refers to a pension scheme that meets HMRC rules, allowing British nationals to relocate and transfer their pensions abroad. However, inclusion on the list is subject to meeting specific terms associated with UK pensions, such as access restrictions before the age of 55.

A **QROPS** that is on the list has simply told HMRC that they meet the rules – inclusion on the list does not mean that it has been 'approved'.

QROPS options are available in various countries, including the EU-approved fund, The Pension Scheme of the European Union, as well as schemes in Australia, New Zealand, and Canada. However, many overseas locations, including the USA, do not have any options on HMRC's list.

It is advisable to seek advice before opting for a **QROPS** transfer (especially if you are moving to a country that has no HMRC listed schemes), exploring alternatives, or are uncertain about the most financially secure option.

The Pros and Cons of QROPS

There are pros and cons to **QROPS** transfers. A downside is that HMRC's list is subject to change, is regularly updated and have excluded several countries popular among expats. For instance, countries like Cyprus, Portugal, France and Spain do not have any schemes on the list. This issue is not limited to smaller or less globalised countries. Opting for another EU or EEA-based scheme allows UK citizens to relocate and transfer their pensions without penalties. However, an Overseas Transfer Charge (OTC) of 25% may apply to some international pension transfers – see below.

Once pension funds have been successfully transferred, they are protected from exposure to UK taxes and future legislative changes. This is particularly beneficial, despite recent favourable reforms to the Lifetime Allowance (LTA).

Financial Advice

The Main Benefits of QROPS Transfers QROPS transfers offer many advantages such as flexibility, greater access to drawdown pension income, estate planning options, mitigating currency risk and diversification opportunities. Perhaps the most significant advantage – until the Spring of this year – was freedom from the Lifetime Allowance (LTA) – see below.

In order to be eligible for a **QROPS**, you must not have purchased an annuity, or taken benefits from a final salary pension scheme. Benefits from Unfunded Public Sector Schemes (Police, Teachers, NHS) cannot be transferred to a **QROPS** or any other scheme.

The Five Year Rule

This refers to the duration of time a person has been non-UK resident for tax purposes. It is measured in tax years rather than calendar years.

The significance of the five-year rule lies in its impact on the availability of **QROPS** benefits. During the initial five years, retirement benefits must align with those offered in the UK. This includes a pension commencement lump sum, commonly known as tax-free cash, of a maximum of 25%, as well as tax at the beneficiary's marginal rate, if the policy holder dies after the age of 75.

Once an individual has been a non-UK tax resident for five complete tax years, their pension, if transferred or already transferred to a **QROPS**, will follow the rules of the chosen jurisdiction. Individuals who have completed the five full tax years can access up to 30% of their pension as a lump sum, free from UK income tax and UK taxes on death after retirement. They can also enjoy various other benefits provided by **ROPS**.

As life expectancy increases, more people are spending a significant portion of their lives in retirement, sometimes a quarter or even a third. This makes retiring overseas an enticing prospect for many individuals, resembling a once-in-a-lifetime holiday.

Transferring your UK pension fund to a **ROPS** allows you to benefit from both worlds. You can enjoy tax relief while saving for retirement in the UK and later pay reduced or no tax (depending on your country of residence and the jurisdiction of your chosen **QROPS**), while gaining greater flexibility when it's time to access your retirement benefits overseas.

Accessing Your Pension

When it comes to accessing your pension, transferring to a ROPS doesn't automatically exempt you from UK tax regulations. QROPS providers are required to report any unauthorised withdrawals from your pension to HMRC for a period of 10 years after the transfer is completed. An example of an unauthorised payment would be taking benefits from your ROPS before the age of 55. In this event, you would be subject to an unauthorised payment charge of up to

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55%. Since April 6th 2017, you must have been a non-UK resident for 10 consecutive tax years before you can access a **QROPS** pension, (previously, the requirement was five consecutive tax years). However, even if you meet the 10-year rule, you may still be subject to UK tax rules if you withdraw from a **ROPS** within five years of switching from a UK-based pension.

The amount of tax you pay when receiving income from a **QROPS** depends on the tax regulations of your country of residence and whether that country has a double-taxation agreement (DTA) with the jurisdiction where the **QROPS** is based. A DTA typically allows you to avoid paying tax on your pension benefits in both countries.



If you are classified as a UK resident when accessing benefits from a **QROPS**, the income is generally subject to UK income tax. Again, it's worth noting that should an unauthorised payment be made, you will be subject to a charge of up to 55%.

What if You Already Have a QROPS?

If you are based in Spain and already have a **QROPS**, yet have never had any issues with the Spanish tax office, you are probably wondering why.

It is most likely that you simply declared the **QROPS** withdrawals as income from a pension and your local tax office has no idea it is a **QROPS**, or has not caught up with what it is or what the central tax office thinks of them.

It Could, Potentially, Go Unnoticed Indefinitely.

There are other issues, such as the fact that a transfer to a **QROPS** would be subject to an Overseas Transfer Charge of 25% if the **QROPS** is established in a non-EU country and you do not live in the same country.

It is not clear if this will eventually be extended to the EU, given Brexit. The tax treatment is not 'black and white' because there is no specific law blocking the use of **QROPS** in Spain. There are also many new issues that have arisen since Brexit and different autonomous regions in Spain (and even in the same region) can treat pension withdrawals differently.

However, as you can see, there are considerable risks involved. It is important

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

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that you understand what they are before taking them.

Given the potential Spanish issues with QROPS, they cannot be recommended for those looking to move to Spain, or already residing in Spain. Before transferring your private UK pension into QROPs, it's important to ensure the country you are based in does not have similar issues to those experienced in Spain.

The Lifetime Allowance

Prior to the Spring Budget, there was no limit on the size of pension fund you could accumulate. However, there was a cap of £1.073m which is often referred to as the 'tax-privileged amount'. Any excess over this amount is subject to 25% tax which is deducted by the scheme before the fund can be transferred into a QROPS. If you decide to take the excess as a lump sum, the tax is 55%, which is not great news if vou are a basic-rate taxpaver. However, in a surprise move, the Government abolished the tax in this year's Budget whilst retaining the LTA itself, stating that the LTA will be abolished next April.

As things stand, this is a distinct improvement for members with large transfer values because, at the moment, they can transfer into a QROPS without triggering any tax charge. However, the Labour Party has said that if it is elected it will reintroduce the LTA, so there may be a limited window of opportunity to transfer without any tax charge.

The Overseas Transfer Charge (OTC)

Any transfers to a **QROPS** are also subject to an Overseas Tax Charge (OTC) of 25% of the value of the fund unless certain exemptions apply.

The two main exemptions are where:

The **QROPS** is established in an EEA country and the member is resident in another EEA country.

The member is resident in the same country as the one in which the QROPS is



established.

Alternative Options

Self-Invested Personal Pensions (SIPPs) are a primary alternative to QROPS. **SIPPs** offer flexibility and a wider range of investment choices, both internationally and within the UK. Expatriates can benefit from tax relief on pension contributions as UK taxpayers, or for the first five years as overseas residents, depending on their circumstances.

One vital difference between a QROPS and a **SIPP** is that the latter is a UK registered pension. This means that when you transfer your benefits into a SIPP, your benefits remain subject to UK pension legislation. This is not the case when you transfer to a **QROPS**.

Choosing between QROPS and SIPPs depends on various factors, including tax, LTA and OTC implications, access to benefits and investment preferences. It is recommended to seek professional advice from experienced advisers to make wellinformed decisions regarding pension transfers.

Get Bespoke Advice on Your Pension Many schemes have been delisted by HMRC, without any legislative changes,

due to being non-compliance with OROPS/ **ROPS** rules. Before making a commitment to transfer your pension to an overseas scheme, it is essential to seek advice from a qualified pension advisor. 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The verb 'estrenar'

Here are some other definitions gathered from here and there:

- 'to launch'
- 'to release'
- 'to premier'
- `to make one's debut'

This latter definition translates the reflexive form estrenarse.

The only sane way of understanding the use of this word is to see it in context. One of its most obvious associations is with show business. Here are some examples:

Antonio Banderas, el actor y director malagueño, estrena un drama musical. Antonio Banderas, the actor and director from

Malaga, is releasing a new musical drama.

Almodóvar estrenó `l a Pedro Mala Educación' en Hollywood.

Pedro Almodóvar premiered `La Mala Educación' in Hollywood.

From this basic meaning we can expand the use of estrenar to express all sorts of everyday meanings

Estreno estos zapatos hoy.

I'm wearing these shoes for the first time today.

Esta blusa está sin estrenar.

I haven't worn this blouse yet.

Already you can see that direct translations of this word are impossible and we have to find a phrase that provides the same meaning in English, depending on the exact context.

At some time you may have been looking at advertisements in the newspaper, or in an estate agents window and come across this phrase:

Se vende piso a estrenar.

It means that a brand new flat, or at least a flat that hasn't been lived in before, is for sale. The literal meaning is: "One sells a flat to be used for the first time." – now translate that into Spanish!

Here is an interesting sentence I've just come across:

Este año todavía no me he ido de fiesta. Estov sin estrenar.

This year I haven't been to a party yet.

I am **sin estrenar** – without being shown off for the first time?!

As you can see, words start to fail and we are into the territory of things that can be said so neatly in one language and just don't exist in another.

When we are talking about old and new clothing, there is rather a nice 'sort-of' opposite to the word estrenar, which is estar visto (literally: 'to be seen').

If you don't want to wear something that you have worn lots of times already, you can say: No quiero ponerme ese vestido, está **muy visto**. (I don't want to put that dress on, it's very 'seen').

In English we sometimes say that something is 'old hat', but that doesn't sound quite right when talking about a dress. No wonder we all end up speaking Spanglish. It's by far the easiest solution!

HISTORY SNIPPETS

Up Periscopes! The Naval Life and Works of **Isaac Peral**.

Many might have thought that the world's first functioning submarine would have been developed by Britain's Royal Navy, the Americans, the French, or the Germans. In reality, it was a Spanish naval officer, Isaac Peral, from Murcia, who invented the world's first fully functional, electrically powered torpedo submarine.



by Mauel Ussel de Guimbada was determined to forge a distinguished naval

career for himself and at the tender age of 14, he entered the San Fernando Naval Military College. The young Peral proved to be an enthusiastic, dedicated scholar, who earned the nickname of **'Profound Isaac'** from his peers at the college. When he was 15, Peral became a midshipman in the Spanish Navy and so launched himself on a long and distinguished naval career, in which he saw action in the Third Carlist war, and the Ten Years War in Cuba. Besides being a frontline officer in the Spanish Navy, Peral found time to write a treatise on hurricanes and he also participated in the geographical survey of the Simanales Channel in the Philippines.

Peral's private life blossomed when he met and married Maria del Carmen Cencio in Cadiz, during 1876 and the two of them went on to have a substantial family of 9 children.

Not everything went well for Peral in the years after his marriage. During 1881, 2nd Lieutenant Peral was serving in the Philippines as part of a Spanish hydraulics team and during a period of leave, Isaac took the innocuous step of visiting a local Philippino hairdresser for a haircut. Here, he received a small cut on the temple which obstinately refused to heal. The wound



subsequently degenerated and developed а tumour on his head. Isaac Peral's health began to decline and the Spanish Navy considered that he was no

longer fit for sea-going duties. Instead, Peral was offered and accepted, a shore-based post as a professor at the Escuela de Ampliacion de Estudias de la Armada Naval School at Cadiz. Isaac used this new post to his own advantage by developing his revolutionary ideas on battery powered submarines, which could fire torpedoes whilst underwater.

In 1885, Peral revealed to his Spanish naval superiors the fact that he had made some quite staggering breakthroughs in submarine navigation. However, the response of the naval ministry - one of studied indifference and downright hostility on occasions - wasn't quite what Peral had anticipated. His research and experiments were dogged by lack of funding and nothing might have been heard of the revolutionary Peral Submarine had it not been for the enthusiastic support and backing of the Spanish Queen Regent, Maria Cristina. The backing of the Queen Regent meant that Peral's research could go ahead. Initial tests were successful and the prototype Peral Submarine was launched on 8th September 1888. The underwater vessel was 22 metres long, 2.76 metres deep and 2.87 metres wide. It displaced 77 tons on the surface, and 85 tons when submerged. Propulsion for the vessel was provided by two 30 HP electric motors and power was supplied by a 613-cell battery. Peral's new submarine was also equipped with a torpedo tube, 3 torpedoes, a periscope, and an advanced depth apparatus' which allowed the commander to slip below the ocean to a depth planned well beforehand.

Official testing of Peral's new wonder craft continued throughout 1889 and 1890 and the submarine met and exceeded all the targets set for it. However, Peral was never allowed to test his underwater craft in a submerged By Adrian & Dawn Leyland Bridge dalbridge21@outlook.com

journey across the Straits of Gibraltar, from Algeciras to which Ceuta, was what the Cadiz naval professor desired more

than anything else. The new Spanish submarine certainly seemed destined for great things, but it was never supported fully by the authorities in Spain, for reasons that have never been adequately explained. Ultimately, Peral resigned from the Spanish Navy in disgust at the treatment meted out to his new submarine design. He left the navy on 5th November 1891 and returned to private life.

Peral subsequently founded a number of successful businesses concerned with the use and development of electricity, such as the Manzanares Thermoelectric Company, which he founded in partnership with the Marguis of Salinas. A promising career in business seemed just around the corner for Isaac Peral, but ill health intervened to scupper his plans. On 4th May 1895, the inventor of the Peral Submarine travelled to Berlin for an operation on a brain tumour. Initially, his recovery seemed to be going well, but Peral contracted meningitis, and died on 22nd May 1895. His remains were only returned to his native Murcia 16 years later, in 1911.

Submarine Peral's Isaac remained unsurpassed in the world until 1895, when the Irishman John Holland's designs for a submarine, with a mixed combustion/electric propulsion system, (which overcame the limited range of the battery power envisaged by Peral), were taken up by the US Navy. Peral's legacy lived on in Spain, however, where his submarine was preserved in the Naval Museum of Cartagena. Streets have been named after Isaac Peral in towns and cities across Spain and four modern Spanish naval submarines have also been named after the innovative, if ultimately somewhat frustrated, Murcian submarine technologist. 

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Best Hot Weather Recipes Ramen Noodle Salad

Dressing ¹/₄ cup neutral salad oil (canola, peanut, sesame (not toasted), light olive oil, or avocado oil) ¹/₄ cup rice vinegar 2 tbsp honey 2 tsp soy sauce 1 tsp ground ginger ¹/₄ tsp garlic powder (or fresh crushed garlic) 1 tsp toasted sesame oil

Salad 6 cups shredded cabbage 1 carrot 4 green onions 37g package instant ramen noodles ¼ cup sliced almonds 2 cups shredded rotisserie chicken

Make the dressing first. Whisk together the salad oil, rice vinegar, honey, soy sauce, ginger, garlic powder and toasted sesame oil. Set the dressing aside.

Shred the cabbage as finely as possible. Shred the carrot and slice the green onions. Crush the instant ramen noodles (discard the seasoning packet or save it for another use).

Place the cabbage, carrot, green onion, almonds, crushed ramen noodles, and shredded chicken in a large bowl. Pour the prepared dressing over the top. Toss the salad until everything is evenly combined and coated in dressing. Serve immediately or refrigerate until ready to eat.

Tortellini Salad



1 summer squash 1 courgette ¹/₂ tsp salt 1 pint cherry tomatoes ¹/₂ red onion 2 cups fresh baby spinach ¹/₂ cup sliced black olives ³/₄ cup Italian dressing ¹/₂ cup chopped Italian parsley ¹/₄ cup Parmesan cheese 11b cheese tortellini First, cook the tortellini according to the package directions, then drain well and cool in a very large bowl in the fridge.

While the tortellini is cooking, slice the summer squash and the courgette into 14" rounds and then quarter the rounds. Add them to a large bowl and sprinkle with salt and mix.

Slice the cherry tomatoes in half. Slice the red onion in ¼" half-moons and soak it in cold water to dull its sharp flavour. Chop the parsley and if the baby spinach leaves are large, chop them as well.

Once the tortellini has cooled, top it with the cherry tomatoes, red onion, courgette, squash, baby spinach and sliced black olives. Drizzle with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of Italian dressing.

Next, top the salad with chopped Italian parsley and Parmesan cheese. Then drizzle with the final 1/4 cup of Italian dressing. Finally, mix, and serve!

Tomato Mozarella Pasta Salad

230g bowtie pasta Salt for pasta water 3 cups fresh spinach 1 pint grape tomatoes 230g mozzarella

Parmesan Balsamic Vinaigrette

1/3 cup olive oil
3 tbsp balsamic vinegar
2 tbsp mayonnaise
2 tbsp grated Parmesan
½ tbsp Dijon mustard
1 clove garlic, minced
½ tsp dried basil
¼ tsp salt
Freshly cracked pepper

Fill a pot with water and add two large pinches of salt. Cover the pot and bring it to a boil over high heat. Once boiling, add the pasta and continue to boil until the pasta is tender. Drain the pasta in a colander and give it a brief rinse with cool water. Let it drain well while you prepare the rest of the salad.

Parmesan Balsamic Vinaigrette

Combine all the dressing ingredients in a jar or blender until the ingredients are well combined. Set the dressing aside until needed.

Roughly chop the spinach and slice the grape tomatoes in half. Dice the mozzarella into $\frac{1}{2}$ " cubes. Put spinach, tomatoes and mozzarella in a large bowl. Once the pasta is well drained and mostly cool, add it to the bowl with the mozzarella and vegetables. Make sure the pasta is no longer hot, so it doesn't wilt the spinach or melt the cheese.

Toss the ingredients to combine. If serving the salad later, store it like this without dressing. If serving immediately, add half of the dressing and toss to coat. Add more dressing as desired.

Mediterranean Tuna Salad Vinaigrette



¼ cup olive oil
2 tbsp red wine vinegar
1 tbsp lemon juice
1 tsp dried oregano
½ tsp salt
¼ tsp freshly cracked black pepper
Salad

1 English cucumber 1 pint grape tomatoes ½ red onion Fresh parsley, chopped (about ½ cup) 32g can cannellini beans 32g can chunk light tuna 57g feta cheese

Make the vinaigrette first, so the flavours have a little time to blend. In a bowl or jar, combine the olive oil, red wine vinegar, lemon juice, oregano, salt and pepper. Whisk the ingredients together, or close the jar and shake until combined. Set the vinaigrette aside.

If you want to soften the flavour of the red onion a bit, slice it, then soak the slices in iced water for about five minutes before dicing. Finely dice the red onion, cut the cucumber into quarter rounds, slice the tomatoes in half and roughly chop the parsley. Combine the cucumber, tomato, onion, and parsley in a bowl. Pour the vinaigrette over top, then stir until the vegetables are coated.

Rinse and drain the beans, and drain the tuna. Add the beans, tuna and feta to the salad, then gently stir to combine. These three are added last and only gently stirred to make sure the tuna remains in larger flakes instead of falling apart into tiny pieces. Serve immediately, or refrigerate up to four days. Give it a quick stir after refrigerating and before serving to redistribute the dressing.

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





ITV Test - Registering A Foreign Vehicle in Spain



With the laid-back Mediterranean life of wav here in Spain mav vou be forgiven for thinking that the ITV import test is a relaxed, cursory event. Here we let you know what to expect when your vehicle is tested.

Homologation

The vehicle's Homologation is the blueprint under which the car was manufactured and is the first item to be checked. The check is usually carried out by the ITV station technical director, (sometimes in advance of the test itself). It may be necessary to take the paperwork several days or even weeks before the test.

Starting The Test

If the technical director is satisfied that the vehicle documentation and technical paperwork is correct, the vehicle can then be tested. Some ITV stations will test the vehicle the same day, whilst for others there can be delays of several weeks.

Weights & Dimensions

During the test, the vehicle and each individual axle, will be weighed to ensure that the vehicle matches the declared masses on the vehicles Homologation. The vehicle's dimensions will also be carefully noted (to the millimetre) to ensure that the vehicle is the correct one on the paperwork.

Tvres

Tyres are thoroughly inspected for bulges, rips, tears and illegal wear, but the tyre size is also noted to ensure that it matches the correct size, load and speed rating for the vehicle, or is within the 3% tolerance allowed. The technician will also check that the tyres do not protrude past the line of the wheel arch.

Bodywork Condition

The vehicle's bodywork is checked to ensure there are no loose pieces, excessive rust, perforations, or modifications that are not permitted, such as unauthorised tow bars that were not factory fitted.

Safetv Items

All seat belts are checked to ensure that they are in good working order.

The operation of both electric and manual windows are tested.

Window tints are checked to ensure compliance.

Each of the vehicle's doors will be opened and closed to ensure correct operation.



management light which must not be on when the vehicle is running and the ABS warning light which must illuminate when the vehicle is started and extinguish within a few seconds when the system has selfchecked.

Exhaust Emissions

As part of the test, the vehicle will have a probe inserted into the exhaust and a controlled test is carried out on the vehicle emissions to ensure they are within acceptable limits and conform with the vehicle's homologation.

Lights

Vehicle headlights will be checked to ensure that the beam pattern complies with Spanish/EU regulations and that they aren't unduly cloudy. Suspension & Steering

As you would expect, steering and suspension items are all thoroughly checked on a machine that designed is to move the wheels in a way that will easily expose any issues. The vehicle will usually be driven over

a pit where the technicians can carefully inspect the underneath of the vehicle, lower engine and suspension.

Diagnostics

Towards the end of the ITV import test, the technician will connect a handheld diagnostic reader to the vehicle's onboard diagnostic port to check for any errors that may not have been apparent during the test itself.

Pass/Fail

If your vehicle passes the import test, you will be given a pass certificate that you must keep in your vehicle and the ITV station will also prepare a 'Ficha Técnica' for you, although you may need to collect this at a later date, once it has been signed off. If on the other hand your vehicle fails, you will normally be given 60 days to sort the failure items out and retesting is either free or around 20€.



La Vuelta will start on Saturday 26th August in Barcelona and end on Sunday 17th September in Madrid. During its 21 stages, it will have 11 starts and 8 unpublished goals and it will visit 9 autonomous communities and three countries: Spain, Andorra and France. The cyclists will face ten mountain finishes, two time trials, seven mountain stages, six mediummountain stages, four flats and two flats with a hill finish.



Barcelona will host a **Team Time Trial** with a very urban layout in the first stage. The second day will start from Mataró and will end again in Barcelona at the gates of the Lluís Company's Olympic Stadium.

After the first two finishes in Barcelona, the peloton will head to Andorra from Súria to experience the first mountainous day of the race. The race will continue with the first unprecedented high end with the climb to Arinsal and the cyclists will sleep on Andorran soil before heading south

from Andorra La Vella to Tarragona to end the Catalan and Andorran journey of the first days of the race.

The Valencian Community will host the next phase of La Vuelta. The cyclists will travel through the province of Castellón on journey through the mountains а between Morella and Burriana. La Vall d'Uixó in Castellón will be the starting point of the next stage on the way to Teruel, with the final ascent to the Javalambre Astrophysical Observatory as the highlight of the day. The first day of the race on the flat line will be the 7th stage, with a fast finish in Oliva. The peloton will say goodbye to the Valencian Community with a stage finish on the Costa Blanca to finish on a peak already known to cyclists,



Xorret de Catí. The Region of Murcia will put the cyclists to the test with a day beginning on the Cartagena coast before heading inland to end in Caravaca de la Cruz on Sunday 3rd September.

The second week of competition will begin in the province of Valladolid, which will host a **25km Individual Time Trial.** Afterwards, the peloton will continue advancing towards the west of Castilla **y León** to visit the Laguna Negra de Vinuesa. Zaragoza will give the sprinters the last chance before heading to the Pyrenees to experience two tough mountain stages.

Firstly Aubisque and Tourmalet, followed by Issarbe, Larrau and Larra-Belagua on the second day, will decide two tough stages of the race. Pamplona and Lekunberri will be the scene of the day prior to the second and last day of rest.

The demand will not drop in the last week of the race and, after the unprecedented finish in Bejes, **La Vuelta** will arrive at L'Angliru. The Principality of Asturias will once again be the judge of the race, with a new hilltop finish at Cruz de Linares. The sprinters will be tested on the way to İscar before Madrid. The penultimate online stage at the Guadarrama Basin will be a test for the cyclists with 10 third category climbs that will decide the final winner before the traditional final stage in Madrid.

Spanish Fiestas in August

4th - 6th August - VIII Me Vuelves 'Lorca' Festival @ Laroles, Nevada

The Festival, as its name suggests, pays homage to the poet **Federico García Lorca** and his desire to bring theatre to the rural towns of Spain. It has become an unmissable event, attracting visitors from all over the world. It is much more than just a performing arts festival. In 2013 work began restoring an old threshing floor to transform it into a beautiful open-air theatre. The festival combines culture and social action and its programme focuses on **Federico García Lorca** and includes theatre, music and workshops with performances by national and international artistes.

6th August - Canoe Festival @ the Sella River, Asturias

This sporting event has been held since 1930. It is full of music and colour and has become one of the most important dates on the international canoeing calendar. Every year, on the first Saturday in August, canoeists from all over the world come to Asturias to take part in the Sella River Race. In order to participate you must have a valid competition license. More than one thousand canoes battle it out to be first home over the 20km course, which runs from the village of Arriondas to the finish line in Ribadesella. On the shore, thousands of spectators enjoy themselves, shouting and encouraging the participants.

First thing in the morning, the river train sets out from Oviedo and Ribadesella packed with people to see the start at 11am, while the canoeists get ready on the river. Colourful crowds of people in fancy dress make their way through the streets of Arriondas to watch the race, either on foot or on all kinds of strange vehicles. At 12pm, the traditional verses to mark the start are read out and the competition starts with a stampede of canoes towards the river and the excited shouts of the spectators. On the way, the river train and the unusual motor cavalcade accompany the competitors. At the finish line, the party transfers to the Campos de Ova, where trophies are awarded in each category. There is then a huge picnic with food, cider, song & dance. The night continues in Ribadesella until the early hours, with its bars and open-air parties.

8th - 20th August - The Segura International Folklore Festival @ Ceiza, NW Murcia

This festival is organized by the Cieza Choir and Dance Group and is held annually. It shows a great display of joy, respect, tolerance and solidarity, where people of different races, religions, ideas and backgrounds coexist, in the midst of a great festive atmosphere, with a common language: folklore.

Every year in August, Cieza becomes the world capital of popular culture, with a craft market, parades of the different participating groups and different activities, as well as musical shows by different companies.

10th - 27th August - Horse Races On The Beach @ Sanlúcar de Barrameda, Cadiz

This exciting, beautiful sporting spectacle is one of Europe's oldest equestrian contests. Since 1845, during the evening's low tide in the month of August, the beaches of Sanlúcar de Barrameda have been used for horse races. Popular tradition has it that the origins of these celebrations go back to the informal competitions that took place between fishmongers, to see who could get to market first.

The event comprises two 3-day cycles. On each day, beneath a spectacular sunset, riders compete for various prizes in a lively atmosphere. Attendance is free of charge and at the finish line there are official betting stands to make the races even more exciting. Extra fun is provided by the children who organise their own bets from original, colourful stands they set up all along the beach. The festivities in Sanlúcar in honour of the local patron saint are held during the same period, and feature parades of carts and carpet of flowers in the streets in the centre of town.

19th August - The Nalón Boat Parade @ Pola de Laviana, Asturias

This carnival is one of the biggest summer events in Asturias. Held on the water it is full of humour and creativity and has been held since 1968. It was declared a Festival of National Interest for Tourism in 2021.

The festival centres on the descent of the River Nalón by boat and is notable for the number of participants. The boats are like carnival floats and are marvels of originality on the stony, white-water river. The celebrations last all day and all night on the 3rd Saturday in August. Cultural activities, activities for children and concerts are organised in the morning. The boats arrive at the starting point, ready to set out on the procession in the early afternoon. The descent is the heart of the festival, with often more than 4,000 crew on the boats. After the descent, the boats are put on display and the fun continues at the fairground with music, entertainment and the prize-giving ceremony.

19th August - Asturcón Horse Festival @ Sardeda, Piloña, Asturias

This is a celebration of the Asturcón horse. The festival was started in 1980 when these horses were facing extinction. The festivities begin in the morning with an open-air mass, continuing throughout the day with a dance competition, brass bands, bagpipe bands and a communal meal laid on by a local social club. Then there is a display of riding and dressage, which includes marking all Asturcón colts born that year.

19th - 27th August - Natural Cider Festival @ Gijón, Asturias

Cider is the region's favourite drink and one of the high points of the festival is when thousands of people gather on the beach and 30,000 litres of cider and 10,000 glasses decorated with the festival logo are distributed. There are lots of activities for visitors to take part in, such as a cider pouring competition (pouring cider in the traditional way is a lot harder than you might think!) in the Town Hall square and a cider and apple market.

15th - 20th August - August Fair in Xátiva, Valencia

Xátiva has been celebrating this traditional fiesta since 1250, at the time of King Jaime I. Xátiva celebrates the oldest fiestas in the Region of Valencia. Besides the sale of livestock and typical produce, the **August Fair** has a full programme of activities: concerts, theatre representations, contests, sporting competitions, regional folklore, fireworks, 'tiro y arrastre' (competition where animals have to drag loads), young bull-running, bullfights etc.



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


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
