#### Staying Legal with Car Registrations Spain

Over the last few months there appears to have been an increased number of checks on foreign vehicles and in particular those from the UK, following on from the new data-sharing agreement between the Spanish and UK authorities that came into force on 16<sup>th</sup> March 2023.

#### **Vehicle Checks**

For a UK vehicle, the police have always had access to the public DVLA website where they can check basic vehicle information and also see if the vehicle is taxed, MOT'd and if it is marked as exported. This is the page that police officers use: https://vehicleenquiry.service.gov.uk/

#### **Extra Information**

In addition to this basic check, Spanish authorities now also have access to vehicle owner information and other relevant data to help investigate traffic offences related to road safety, such as speeding, use of a mobile phone whilst driving and not wearing a seat belt.

#### **Avoiding A Fine**

If you are driving a foreign vehicle in Spain, you should bear in mind that the vehicle must be legal in the country of current registration, so for a UK or European vehicle, this means that it must be taxed, have an up-to-date MOT and of course, be

insured. It is important to note that SORN is the same as untaxed and will result in a fine and possible vehicle confiscation here in Spain.



It is also important that you keep the original vehicle registration document in the vehicle, or a notarised copy, as this is also a legal requirement in Spain.

Another factor to consider is that if you are a resident in Spain, you may only drive a foreign registered vehicle for up to 6 months per year. However, if you are a resident, it is 30 days.

#### **Temporary Plates**

If you have a vehicle that is no longer

legal in Spain, it is usually possible to get temporary import plates (*placas verdes*) which allow you to insure and drive the vehicle for up to 60 days irrespective of the tax and MOT status of the vehicle in its current country of registration.

Temporary import plates are particularly useful if your vehicle has been impounded by the Spanish authorities and they also allow your vehicle to remain legal before and during the registration to Spanish plates.

#### **Registering Your Vehicle**

Registering your vehicle onto Spanish plates often costs a lot less than you may think and also avoids the risk of fines and possible vehicle confiscation if your vehicle is now illegal here. 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#### EDUCATION

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Expressions with 'soler'.

When people start learning Spanish, they often assume that every word in English has an exact equivalent in Spanish. Although this assumption is very quickly dispelled, it always takes us longer to remember words and phrases when we cannot translate them directly back into our own language. It is also a lot harder to explain their meaning. We are going to spend a few articles looking at individual words in Spanish that do not have a direct translation in English.

Our first example is the verb '**soler**'. As we do not have a direct equivalent in English, we have to use several words to explain what it means and the nearest equivalent is: 'to be in the habit of'.

Very often when translating the word in the Present Tense we substitute it for 'usually'. However, this can be confusing as '**soler**' is a verb and 'usually' is an adverb.

How do we use this wonderful word? In the Present Tense 'soler' is a rootchanging verb, so the six forms of the

'suelo, sueles, suele, solemos, soléis,

This is then followed by the infinitive of another verb. For example, we say things like:

**Suelo leer antes de dormer.** – I am in the habit of reading before sleeping, or in other words "I usually read before I go to

sleep.

**Solemos salir los sábados.** - We are in the habit of – that is, we usually – go out on Saturdays.

This use of **soler** plus the infinitive, is a very common way of expressing the idea of 'usually'. There is also an adverb that means 'usually', which is **normalmente**, which gives us an alternative. If I want to say "I usually watch TV in the evening", I can say **Normalmente veo la tele por la tarde** or **Suelo ver la tele por la tarde**. The difference between these two is minimal and hard to explain. To all intents and purposes they mean exactly the same thing.

Like all verbs, **soler** can be used in other tenses, although we have to use a bit of common sense to realize that it is more likely to occur in some tenses than in others.

Most common of all is the past continuous tense: **solía**. If I say: **Solía nadar todos los días.** - I am saying: "I was in the habit of swimming every day".

The most common way of expressing this idea in English is with the expression "used to" - "I used to swim every day".

There is another way of saying this is Spanish! As well as **Solía nadar todos los días**, we could say **Nadaba todos los días** (I swam, or I used to swim, every day).

What is the difference? In reality very little. We are in the realms of 'finer points'. The sentence with **solía** perhaps emphasizes more distance in time and contrast with the present, but really the difference is minimal and certainly both can be translated in the same way.

As you can see, I'm already running into difficulties explaining a word which does not have a direct equivalent in English. To sum up; there are two paths we can take when understanding expressions like **solía nadar** and **suelo leer** in English. We can either translate them literally and clumsily: ("I was in the habit of swimming"/"I am in the habit of reading."), or find the nearest equivalent in English, ("I used to swim"/"I usually read") on the understanding that the nearest equivalent in English may already have another alternative in Spanish (**nadaba/normalmente leo**).

Well, whoever said that learning Spanish was a straightforward affair? I have got a really nice word for next month which I will do my best not to complicate, although I'm afraid I can't promise. See you then.

Sylvia Gallimore Receives a British Empire Medal Following 50 Years of Charity, Community and Voluntary Work

Sylvia Gallimore, a British national now based in San Miguel De Salinas, Alicante, has been awarded a BEM (British Empire Medal) for 'Services to charity and community', as part of the 2023 King's Birthday Honours list, published on  $17^{\rm th}$  June.

His Majesty's Ambassador to Spain, Hugh Elliott said: "Sylvia has dedicated her life to helping others. Her significant contributions for over 50 years of community and voluntary work have improved the lives of countless individuals from her native Bristol to Southern Spain. She has worked tirelessly and given generously to numerous causes, including helping vulnerable young people, the visually impaired, homeless people and supporting animal welfare. This Honour represents a lifetime of service and is very much deserved."

Sylvia Gallimore said: "I cannot say how proud and honoured I am to receive the British Empire Medal from His Majesty. I was rather thrown into the world of the



poorly sighted when my son lost his sight in 1996. Since then, I have had the pleasure of meeting some wonderful visually impaired people and tried to enhance their lives as best I could. I could not have done this alone and believe there are others that deserve the BEM more than I do."

Sylvia first became involved in charity work through the Horfield Prison in Bristol, where she taught literacy skills to help improve inmates' future employment prospects. She did this alongside running a canteen for the Women's Royal Voluntary Service,

fundraising for a pre-school and running an animal rescue and rehousing project. In 1996, Sylvia shifted her focus to the visually impaired community in Bristol, fundraising for the Royal National Institute of Blind People and for Avon Sports and Leisure, to give young visually impaired Bristolians the opportunity to expand their horizons.

Sylvia played a crucial role in establishing the charity **Have Stick Will Travel**, founded in 2002 by her son Daniel Gallimore, who lost his sight at the age of 21. Together with Daniel, she has organised numerous fundraising initiatives to procure life-changing technology for visually impaired people to become more independent in their homes and supported several visually impaired sports teams.

More recently, since being based in San Miguel De Salinas, Sylvia has supported the **Help at Home** charity, which helps people with mobility or health issues attend medical appointments or run errands. She's also written a book called 'Sleeping Rough' to raise money for the homeless charity **Shelter**.

#### San Javier Jazz Festival - until 23rd July

This festival is considered one of the best Jazz Festivals in Spain due to its excellent programming and the participating artistes. #### NORMA'S TRAVELS

Week 1 South America: Chiloe Island, Chile by Norma Harris

Here we are again, on our travels. These articles will be a combination of things we did and sometimes reflections on a place or people. This was a return visit to **South America** as we spent 5 months there in 2012-13. We had two weeks in Chile then two weeks where Chris went off with his friend to Antarctica and I was in Argentina and then about 10 days together again in Uruquay.

We left Spain on 16<sup>th</sup> February for **South America** and the trip from our little village in Murcia involved a lift, a bus, a taxi, two trains, two flights, and another taxi before 36 hours later we were in Ancud in the north of the **Island of Chiloe**. Our initial focus was on Chile to try and see **Blue Whales** and as there was very little information pre-trip about where we might find them, we started with 4 nights in Ancud. **Chiloe** was the last part of Chile occupied by the conquistadors and the last part to join the republic. **Chiloans** consider themselves 'islanders' first and Chilean second.

Our journey had involved a disappointing visit to the AENA lounge in Madrid airport and a pretty poor flight from Madrid to Santiago de Chile with Iberia. Santiago airport was super-efficient; a long queue for immigration, but plenty of police and someone organising the queue. We got our bags to transfer to the domestic terminal for our flight to Chiloe Island. We were delayed 3 hours, but it was a great flight with Jetsmart and our taxi driver Abner was there to take us to Ancud. We were pretty tired when we got there, but swiftly dropped our bags and had a few beers and time to enjoy the fabulous setting sun from the hotel deck. After some hotel food we were ready for a long sleep.

Saturday: we had breakfast which was a great selection, including scrambled eggs from 'happy hens'. We went into town to have a wander round, found out there were no **Blue Whales**, so booked a trip to see the **Penguins**. We then spent several hours thinking about what next and found a second place to possibly see the Whales and eventually we decided to head to Port Raul Marin Balmaceda (PRMB), hoping to see Whales in the Coscovado bay. We contacted some people who offered wildlife trips and we booked a cabana for 3 nights. Getting there looked like a real challenge and to begin with we thought about a bus to Puerto Montt, that gets you off **Chiloe Island,** then hire a car and drive. We booked the bus and a hotel in Puerto Montt. The options from there were to drive east to Argentina and then back into Chile, or drive directly down into Chile using 3 ferries to cross all the 'wiggly bits' of coastline. You need to look at a map of Chile to see how complex the road system is. It's called the Austral Highway. This was looking problematic and expensive and eventually we found a ferry from Quellon (in the south of Chiloe) to PRMB. We booked extra nights in PRMB and stop-offs in Castro and Quellon and we went back to the bus station. We were delighted to be able to swap our tickets for free and booked for Castro and the second bonus was when the hotel in Puerto Montt just moved our booking free of charge!

Many people reading this might think "Why didn't you just book a trip with a company?", but we quite enjoy the flexibility and challenge of DIY. Also, it confronts the senses to 'travel local' and buses and ferries here are quick and cheap.

In town a café with amazing coffee and cake was a welcome stop. The owner was of German descent and liked Wagnerian style classical music!

On Saturday, as we left for dinner in town, there was a wedding on the deck with the bay in the background - all very beautiful and romantic! When we got back, we found out the disco was booked until 4am!! We had to close the window and resort to earplugs to get any sleep!

On Sunday, we went off to see the **Puñihuil Penguin Colony**. It was a very well organised, beautiful day and great to get out on the water. There are two types of **Penguins**; Magellan and Humboldt. It was a reminder for us of the strength of the South American sun. We both got burnt as we forgot the sun cream!



Chilean meals are huge and we soon realised we needed to share. Our evening meal was a **Chiloen** speciality Pichanga, the biggest plate you have seen; homemade chips, cheese, boiled egg, pickled vegetables, beef, sausage. Even sharing we didn't manage it all!



Monday it was back to town and we booked a second trip to Muelle de la Luz, a river trip down to the Pacific. The trip was stunning with a 30-minute minibus trip to get on our boat, then downstream through a sunken forest, caused by saltwater killing trees in the 1960 Chilean earthquake. It is still the worst ever earthquake; 9.2-9.4 on the Richter Scale. Every midday on **Chiloe** they use the tsunami siren to signal the time. Once we got to the Pacific it was amazing. The Muelle was a short wooden walkway above the cliffs; not for the faint hearted! Tuesday, we got the bus to Castro, a stop off en-route to the ferry. It's the capital of Chiloe and we had time to see the famous stilt house and the amazing wooden interior of the Church of San Francisco. We ate in a family run restaurant called Mary's; spotlessly clean, great friendly service and delicious light food - grilled salmon with tomato and avocado salad. I had forgotten how gorgeous avocados are in South America - always perfectly ripe. It was Pancake Day in the UK and there were even pancakes on the menu!

On Monday at the hotel Chris had had an issue with his credit card. He realised he had tried the wrong number! On Tuesday it wouldn't work to pay in the next hotel, as the bank had blocked it! Two calls and two trips to an ATM and it was re-activated. I knew my Skype account would come in useful! Calls on our mobiles would have been €2.50 a minute.

Next stop was Quellon, a port town. Ferries from here go in every direction. It is not attractive and has more than its fair share of botellerias and the subsequent drunks, but it is a necessary stop off. Accommodation is basic and not cheap. We stayed in a guest house with a shared bathroom for 50€ and no breakfast! It was not even a good night's sleep as people arrived off the boat at 2am. Our ferry was due to leave at 11am, but it was delayed about two hours. It was a 5-hour crossing, but we were expecting to be met at the other end by Vanessa, our host. The village we were headed to had no mobile signal and limited Wi-Fi and the power was off from midnight to 8am, but it looked beautiful, unspoilt and we had full 4 days to search for Blue Whales.

The Apostle of the Tree

The **Sierra Espuña** is one of the great natural treasures of Murcia and encompasses well over 17,000 hectares of spectacularly mountainous territory lying within the municipalities of Alhama de Murcia, Totana and Mula. Way back in 1931, the area was declared a 'Natural Site of National Interest' and in 1992, the **Sierra Espuña** received the protected status of being a recognised Regional Park. This Park has since become a protected area for birds, a place of community importance and the home for a prodigious array of flora, fauna and wildlife. In particular, the **Sierra Espuña** has become renowned for its trees and forests.




The tree species that predominates in the **Sierra Espuña** is the Aleppo Pine, but in the highest, most mountainous areas, Black and Red Pine is very common. Holm and Gall Oak trees, along with Montpellier Maples, can also be found in various locations across the Park.

The Snow Wells dotted around the **Sierra Espuña**, built at the end of the 16<sup>th</sup> Century, are of considerable historical interest. These wells were constructed in order to store winter snow, collected in the mountains. This snow was then distributed, in the form of ice, to hospitals, towns and cities throughout Murcia. These early 'refrigerator' type constructions were in use for a very long time and served a valuable, practical purpose until well into the 1920's.

The future looks bright for the area, but this has not always been the case: At the end of the 19th Century, the Sierra Espuña was in a state of complete collapse. Most of its trees and forests had disappeared and many areas were turning into deserts - a process of 'desertification' was, in fact, taking place. Urgent, visionary steps needed to be taken if the Sierra Espuña was to be rescued and the person who came forward to launch these visionary steps was Ricardo Cordoniu, a forestry engineer born in Cartagena in June 1846. In 1889, Cordoniu began the enormous task of reforestation of the entire Sierra Espuña and at the same time he laid plans for the restoration of the **Guardamar del Segura Pine Forest** 

**Ricardo Cordoniu** came from a family with immense political and economic influence in Murcia. On the maternal side, he was the grandson of **Manuel Starico Pescetto**, an important Murcian merchant and politician.

On the paternal side, his grandfather was a prominent senator and congressman called Manuel Codorniu y Ferreras. Ricardo was also the father-in-law of the politician Juan de la Cierva y Penafiel (whose son was the world famous aviator and autogyro inventor. Juan de la Cierva). Ricardo Cordoniu used his influential connections in Murcia in order to lobby for the benefits of tree planting and forest development in a way which was well over a century ahead of its time and has much in common with the 'green' agenda followed by many countries across the world in the 21st Century. Cordoniu's passionate defence of forests was well known - if not understood - by many Murcian residents in the late 19th Century, who referred to the 'Old Man of Cartagena' (as Cordoniu was sometimes known) as 'The Apostle Of The Tree'. Cordoniu was, however, far more than just a pioneering environmentalist and lover of nature and 'the great outdoors'. He was a notable polymath, with interests and skills in a wide variety of areas. He was, for example, a very prominent speaker of Esperanto, the artificial language devised in 1887 by the Warsaw based ophthalmologist L L Zamenhoff, in order to enhance international communication and understanding. Cordoniu founded the Murcian Esperanto Society in 1902 and became the very first president of the Spanish Society for Esperanto Propaganda (which became the first national Spanish Esperanto association).

The Esperanto language which **Ricardo Cordoniu** lobbied for in Murcia and throughout the rest of Spain, retains the structure of the chief European languages – including Spanish – and puts a strong emphasis on grammatical regularity and ease of pronunciation. The word 'Esperanto' itself can be translated into English as 'One Who Hopes,' and **Cordoniu** and other enthusiasts did indeed hope that the new language would become a universal second language for international communication,

but these hopes have never really come to fruition. At the time of the 'Apostle Of The Tree's' death in 1923, there were relatively few Esperanto speakers in Spain and in 2020 there were perhaps just 100,000 people across the world who could speak the language fluently. The highest concentration of Esperanto speakers is currently to be found in Europe, East Asia and South America. Nevertheless, the Esperanto language which Cordoniu so enthused about is far from dead. Classes can still be taken on the subject and Esperanto language books can still be purchased. To this extent, therefore, the linguistic work of Murcia's famous 'Apostle Of The Tree' was not entirely in vain.


The minutes of the last AGM were agreed and any matters a rising discussed. John then

Without all our volunteers, this mission would have been totally impossible, but it was all worth it. The horses are loving all the space to roam free.

We understand that this can be very difficult, but when you see the numerous updates we receive, showing the dog thriving in its new home, the tears and upset are all worth it. All applications to Foster are subject to a home check and we provide guidelines to help you with all Fostering procedures. We are a team of Volunteer Responders trained and ready to assist any resident of, or visitor to, Camposol (free of charge) in that period between an ambulance being called and the arrival of the emergency services. Our service is available to all nationalities – whilst we may not be able to communicate perfectly in all the languages spoken on Camposol, it is the case that for the most part what we see is enough to render efficient First Aid.

Whilst we have recruited and trained heavily since the disruption caused by the pandemic, we are still a very small team and with Responders taking their own holidays, or being unavailable as they have visiting friends and relatives, we are pushed to the limits to try and offer our preferred 24/7 service.

If you have ever considered becoming a Responder with **FAST**, **NOW IS THE TIME TO BE IN TOUCH WITH US!** 

We have an initial basic training course planned for  $10^{\text{th}}$ – $12^{\text{th}}$  July inclusive. Attendance on all three days (9.30am-4.30pm) is essential to gain the necessary qualification. The course will take place at the Social Centre. Camposol B and is

completely free for all attendees.

No previous medical/first aid background necessary.

Living in Camposol either full time or for extended periods.

Valid Spanish driving license (manual transmission).

Commitment to provide a quality service to the people of Camposol (shifts are chosen by you) and are 6, 12 or 24 hours in length covering day and night). Enthusiasm!

Free training delivered by fully accredited tutors/instructors with all certificates approved by Murcia Health Authority, EMS and European Resuscitation Council.

Car, uniform and all necessary equipment whilst on duty.

A huge amount of pride and personal satisfaction at being able to assist a member of the community in their time of need.

If you have heard that Responders have to sit by a phone all day waiting for it to

ring, or that they sit in cars all night on the roundabouts, or any other such strange off-putting rumours, please come and speak to us and let us put your mind at rest. Our Responders typically go about their usual business at home or within Camposol whilst 'on duty', but are ready to jump into action (along with their FAST qualified partner) should the need arise.

Our weekly training sessions on a Tuesday morning in the Social Centre, Camposol B are designed to reinforce and enhance the training with simulated scenarios of various accidents/incidents, alongside the more traditional style presentations and guest speakers. Whilst these are obviously important to keep the Responders' skills sharp, the sessions are a huge part of our team and friendship building - and tea/coffee drinking and cake eating is encouraged!










#### DID YOU KNOW?



,History In The Book Of Daniel (Part 2) Did you know that the Scriptures speak about Europe? Following from last month's article, clearly history can be seen in the Scriptures. Yehovah (Jehovah/God) revealed to Nebuchadnezzar, King of Babylon what would happen in the latter days. Last month's article reviewed the history of the kingdoms (from Babylon-Medo-Persia, Medo-Persia-Greece, Greece-Rome and Rome-Europe). This month I will continue to focus on the history of Rome through to present day (Europe) through Scripture.

Daniel chapter 2, verses 40-43 states "And the fourth kingdom shall be strong like iron, forasmuch as iron breaketh in pieces and subdueth all things and as iron breaketh all these, shall it break in pieces and bruise. And whereas thou sawest the feet and toes, part of clay and part of iron, the kingdom shall be divided, but there shall be in it of the strength of the iron, forasmuch as thou sawest the iron mixed with the clay... so the kingdom shall be partly strong and partly broken... They shall mingle themselves with the seeds of men, but they shall not cleave one to another, even as iron is not mixed with clay."

**Daniel** chapter 7, verse 7 states "After this I (**Daniel**) saw in the night visions and behold a *fourth beast*, dreadful and terrible and strong exceedingly and it had great iron teeth. It devoured and broke in pieces and stamped the residue with the feet of it. It was diverse from all the beasts (beasts represent kingdoms/kings) that were before it and it had 10 horns."

The fourth kingdom (or beast) was represented as iron, which was Rome. Daniel chapter 7, verse 23 explains "The fourth beast shall be the fourth kingdom upon the earth, which will be diverse from all kingdoms and shall devour the whole earth and shall tread it down and break it in pieces."

Rome subdued a vast area of the earth and prospered. As stated from last month, there was much political, military, economical, social and civil unrest which contributed to its downward decline. Which kingdom took over Rome? In fact no other kingdom took over Rome. The kingdom was just divided, hence we have Europe.

**Daniel** chapter 7, verse 8 adds the following; "I considered the *horns*, and behold, there came up among them another *little horn*, before whom there were three of the first

horns plucked up by the roots. Behold, in this horn were eyes like the eyes of a man and a mouth speaking great things." Horns represent kings for in Daniel chapter 7, verse 24 it states; "And the ten horns out of the kingdom are ten kings that shall arise and another shall arise after them and he shall be diverse from the first and he shall subdue three kings".

The question is, who are these 10 kings (or horns) which rose up within divided Rome?

The Ostrogoths, Heruli, Vandals, Franks (France), Alemanni (Germany), Burgundians (Switzerland), Sueli (Portugal), Anglo-Saxon (England), Lombards (Italy), Visigoths (Spain). The Ostrogoths, Heruli and Vandals were destroyed, but more about this at a later date. These 10 kings represent the toes of iron and clay, where some of the kings were stronger than others. More countries have joined the European Union now, of which some of these countries are stronger than others today. The iron and miry clay represents a coming together of the old Roman Empire, but according to the Scriptures, Europe will not be able to fully unite.

What does the Scripture say about the condition of the earth before the 2<sup>nd</sup> coming of Yeshua or Jesus? (see article written in December 2021 describing the Second Coming of Yeshua).

Luke chapter 21, verses 25, 26, 31, 33-35 says; "And there shall be signs in the sun and the moon and in the stars and upon the earth distress of nations, with perplexity, the sea and the waves roaring. Men's hearts failing them for fear and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth, for the powers of heaven shall be shaken. When you see these things come to pass, know that the kingdom of God is nigh at hand - heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away. Take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting and drunkenness and cares of this life and so that day come upon you unawares. For as a snare, shall it come on all them that dwell on the face of the whole Earth."

Mark chapter 13, verses 7 & 8 states "And when ye shall hear of wars and rumours of wars, be ye not troubled, for such things must needs be, but the end shall not be yet. For nation shall rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom and there shall be earthquakes in divers places and there

shall be famines and troubles. These are the beginning of sorrows."

2<sup>nd</sup> Timothy chapter 3, verses 1-4 and 16 outlines "This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affection, trucebreakers, false accusers, fierce, despisers of those that do good, traitors, heady, high-minded, lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God. All Scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness."

Daniel chapter 12, verse 4 says "But thou, O Daniel, shut up the words and seal the book, even to the time of the end. Many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased."

This is a quote from James S Stewart: "This immensely critical hour when millions of human hearts are besieged by fierce perplexities, when so many established landmarks of the spirit are gone, old securities wrecked, familiar ways and habits, plans and preconceptions banished never to return." (New York: Charles Scribners and Sons 1946, page 12)

In spite of all the confusion, pain, heartache, suffering and uncertainty, there is still hope for the future. **Every individual has freedom of choice to choose eternal life.**1st John chapter 5, verses 11 & 12 says "And this is the record; that God (Yehovah/ Jehovah) hath given to us eternal life and this life is in his Son (Yeshua/Jesus). He that hath the son hath life and he that hath not the son of God hath not life."

In Revelation chapter 22, verses 12 & 13 Yeshua (Jesus) says "And, behold, I come quickly and my reward is with me, to give every man according as his work shall be. I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end, the first and the last."

I hope you have learned more about the Scriptures. Next time I will look at the Little Horn in Daniel chapter 7, verse 8.

#### Fiestas in Spain During July

From the **Running of the Bulls** in Pamplona to the colourful **Feria de Julio** in Valencia, there is something for everyone to enjoy. July is also known for its traditional patron saint celebrations, where towns and cities come alive with music, dance and fireworks. Along with these traditional events, there are also modern music festivals which attract international musicians and thousands of visitors.

#### July 6<sup>th</sup> - 14<sup>th</sup> - San Fermín Pamplona



This famous festival takes place in Pamplona and features the **Running of the Bulls**, where brave participants run ahead of six bulls along a narrow route to the bullring. This exciting but risky event has come to represent the festival and draws lots of thrill-seekers. St Fermin, Pamplona's patron saint, is honoured during the festival. The festival is also known for its traditional clothing, with men wearing white shirts and pants, red bandanas and sashes and women wearing white dresses with red belts and scarves.



8<sup>th</sup> - 18<sup>th</sup> July - Cordoba Guitar Festival



This musical festival showcases the art and culture of the guitar in a city with a rich guitar-making tradition. It features performances by renowned guitarists from different genres such as flamenco, classical, jazz and rock. The festival has been held in Cordoba for the past 33 years, featuring a large selection of Flamenco artistes, ancient, modern and jazz musicians, dancers and groups. Shows take place all over the city including such historic and illustrious venues including the Grand Theatre, the Castle of the Christian Monarchs, Plaza Capuchinos, the Corredera Square, the Royal Stables, the Congress Palace, the Potro Inn and the Plaza de Tierra Andaluza.

#### 9<sup>th</sup> - 11<sup>th</sup> July - Asturias Cider Festival

This gastronomic festival celebrates cider production and consumption in Asturias, a region famous for its apple orchards and cider houses. It features cider tasting, contests, workshops, music and dancing in Nava. The region of Asturias in Northern Spain is renowned for its Cider. Visitors can enjoy folklore music, dance, bagpipes and live music during the small hours. There is also a contest to find the best pourers which is great fun to watch.

15<sup>th</sup> July - Santiago Apóstol Festival



This religious festival celebrates St James, the patron saint of Spain and Galicia. It takes place in Santiago de Compostela and other places related to the Camino de Santiago pilgrimage route. The festival includes a mass, a procession, folklore dance called 'La

Danza de la Espada' and a spectacular firework display over the cathedral.

21st July - Antequera Fair, Malaga

This traditional fair celebrates the culture and history of Antequera, a town in Malaga province with a rich heritage of monuments and legends.

# 22<sup>nd</sup> July - Stilt Dancers Festival, Anguiano

This folklore festival features dancers who perform on stilts in Anguiano, a village in La Rioja region. The dancers wear colourful costumes and bells and dance down a steep street to honour Mary Magdalene, the patron saint of the village.

25<sup>th</sup> July - Feast of Saint James, Santiago de Compostela Thousands of pilgrims who have walked the Camino de Santiago congregate in Santiago de Compostela where the Saint's tomb lies in the Cathedral.

25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> July - Moors and Christians Fiesta, Villajoyosa



Every year in the last week of July, the people of Villajoyosa hold their annual Fiesta, recreating an epic battle fought in 1538 in which Berber pirates attacked the coastal town. The festivities begin with processions around the streets. The Villajoyosa Moors Vs Christians Festival has been going on for over 250 years. Thousands of local residents participate in the re-enactment of a historic battle that took place in 1538. Visitors are also treated to parades, marching bands and huge firewood displays. This historical festival takes place in various towns and cities in Spain, especially in the Valencia region. It commemorates the battles between the Moors and the Christians during the Reconquista period. The Moors ruled great swathes of Spain for almost 800 years and left an indelible legacy on the country when it comes to culture and gastronomy. Stunning costumes, parades and mock battles are the centre-pieces of these festivals.

and to all those who assisted during the evening. "It is just wonderful, knowing that as a Lioness, have raised this incredible amount of money which will help many




the telescope, with unforgettable sights of its rings.

The summer triangle, responsible for the biggest revolution in the evolution of our civilization, will let us follow in the footsteps of our ancestors and learn how the development of our lifestyle came to

Zodiacal Scorpio, Libra, and Sagittarius will find their astrological representation in the night sky this month too, right among the constellations of Big Dipper, Lira, Swan, Eagle and Hercules. Those constellations will guide the way for deep space observations and astrophotography as their unique position in the night sky helps us locate the most distant and not so easy to find objects such as the galaxies in **Ursa Major**, star clusters and nebulas hiding within Scorpio and Hercules and spectacular Ring Nebula within the constellation of Lira. The middle of July will give us dark skies when such observations are the most pleasurable and the view is the most detailed!







#### **Tapas**

At the moment in our local village, we have the Ruta de la Tapa where you can get a dish of food and a beer for 3.50€! This is excellent value for a quick snack and a chance to try the different cuisine from each eatery. Thought to have started on a slice of bread designed to cover the glass to stop flies falling in, Tapas are very easy to make. The style is robust and appearance is not really important. The ingredients are inexpensive and often very traditional, reflecting the seasons. The idea of a little plate of food to tide you over until the next meal appeals to many people and the hardest part is not ordering too many tapas! A great idea if having friends round if you don't fancy a large meal. Buen Apetito

#### **Aioli**

6 garlic cloves ½tsp salt 2 large egg yolks 60ml extra virgin olive oil 100ml vegetable oil

Peel and finely chop the garlic and put in a mortar with the salt, using the pestle grind to a paste. Put the garlic in a food processor, add the egg yolks and mix well. Combine the oils, a little at a time, until the mixture is very thick. Serve immediately or refrigerate for up to 2 days. Serve with toasted bread stick and stewed tomato, or salad dishes.

#### **Spanish Meatballs**

250g pork sausage
400g lean mince meat
1tsp dried chilli flakes
1 garlic clove - chopped
1 medium onion - chopped
1-2tsp plain flour
2tbsp extra virgin olive oil
1 small red pepper - diced
1tsp paprika
700g tomato pulp
Salt and pepper

Squeeze the sausage meat out of its skin into a large bowl. Add the mince, chilli flakes, garlic, half the chopped onion and mix thoroughly, then season. Sprinkle flour over a board and heap a teaspoon of mixture and roll it in the flour until ball

shaped. Heat olive oil in frying pan and fry meatballs until brown all over. Place in an oven-proof dish.

#### Sauce

Fry remaining onion in the frying pan with the diced pepper and paprika for 2-3 minutes. Stir in the tomato pulp and cook for another 3 minutes and then season. Pour the sauce over the meatballs and cook in oven for 30 minutes on 190°.

#### Ham, Melon and Fig Tapa

12 cocktail sticks 12 slices of Serrano ham 12 small cubes of melon 3 figs

Wrap one slice of ham around each cube of melon and skewer a piece of fig on each and serve.

#### **Baby Gem Lettuce with Anchovies**

2 Baby Gem Lettuce 12 anchovies Extra virgin olive oil Freshly ground pepper



Remove and discard the outer leaves from the lettuce and chop the lettuce in half lengthways. Chop each half into three lengthways wedges. Place each wedge pointed side up on a serving plate and position one anchovy down its length. Drizzle generously with olive oil and season

with black pepper.

#### **Deep Fried Squid Rings**

600g fresh squid Vegetable oil 100g plain flour 2 eggs 100g breadcrumbs

Prepare the Squid by pulling out and discarding the head and the attached intestines from the tube-like body. Remove and discard the long thin cartilage. Cut off the wings from the body and pull the skin away and discard. Rinse the tubes under cold water and then pat dry. Cut the tubes into rings about 5mm thick. Put the flour, egg and breadcrumbs into three separate bowls and line them up in order. Dredge the Squid Rings in the flour, then dip them in the egg mixture and finally the breadcrumbs. Deep fry them in the vegetable oil for 1-11/2 minutes until golden, but do not overcook or Squid will go tough.

#### **Patatas Brava**

4tbsp extra virgin olive oil 6 medium potatoes - cubed 1 large onion - chopped 2 garlic cloves 2 red chillies ½tsp cumin 2tbsp red wine vinegar 400ml chopped tomatoes 1 tsp caster sugar

Cook the cubed potatoes in 3tbsp olive oil until golden. Transfer the potatoes and any remaining olive oil into a baking dish and cook in the oven 200° for 15 minutes.

#### Sauce

Heat the remaining olive oil in frying pan and sauté the onion. Add garlic, chillies and cumin and cook for a further 2 minutes. Add the remaining ingredients and simmer for a further 10-12 minutes.

Drain the potatoes from the oil and place in a large dish. Pour the sauce over the potatoes and serve.

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



# Birding in Murcia

We finally arrived back in Murcia on 22nd March after three and a half months of travelling. The first night we sat outside for a few hours on the front porch whilst our two pellet stoves warmed the place up. It was an absolute pleasure, as within ten minutes we had a Scops Owl and a Stone Curlew calling to us as if welcoming us back home. Both calls are very evocative and very easy to identify. They are both probably unique sounds, but the Scops Owl is a summer visitor, so to hear it in March was a bit of a surprise. They overwinter in Morocco and the Sahara and normally arrive back in early April, so our bird was very early returning and obviously had a good, quick flight back to Murcia. Stone Curlews are resident where we live, so no surprise there.

The following morning we went into town to find a breakfast bar and do the food shopping, as the cupboards at home were bare. Driving towards the plains of Cagitán we disturbed a quite large and striking bird, a Greater Spotted Cuckoo. They aren't uncommon, but are impressive birds to see. They are summer visitors and also one of the earliest migrants, arriving back from Africa as early as February. They are brood parasites that lay their eggs in the nests of Magpies. They rarely kill the young Magpies directly, but the young birds will often die of starvation

due to unfair competition from their bigger and greedier nest mate. It can be very entertaining watching these Cuckoos working together to distract a pair of Magpies away from their nest whilst the female Cuckoo sneaks in to lay an egg.



On the plains of Cagitán we saw a large raptor approaching and I automatically started going through my mental list of possible species. However, this one completely fooled me. It was a male Marsh Harrier. I have frequently seen Hen Harriers here in winter and Montagu's Harriers on migration, but rarely the much commoner Marsh Harrier. The habitat here normally isn't very attractive to these birds. The direction of travel didn't suggest a migrating bird and it looked as if it was in hunting mode. As it banked in front of us, its black wingtips stood out so much that it looked like it had dipped both of them in a pot of black paint. It is a fairly common raptor that winters in the south of Spain, but the majority spend winter in Africa. I suppose my bird was meandering back north to its breeding grounds, but it didn't look like it was in any hurry. I will keep an eye out in case it has decided to settle on Cagitán.

Later that afternoon I had to go to Calasparra and once again drove across the plains of Cagitán. On the way back I stopped at some old ruined farm buildings which I have been visiting for many years as a small colony of **Lesser Kestrels** nest there. Each year the buildings deteriorate and many of the roof beams have rotted

and collapsed. Unfortunately, much of the roof has also collapsed, but there was still enough left to allow these uncommon birds to find sufficient places to nest. Each year I expect to find the colony has moved onto pastures new because of the roof problems and at some time in the future my precious colony of Lesser Kestrels will have to find a new home to raise their families. Most of the owners are happy for the buildings to deteriorate and are replacing them with modern pre-cast concrete buildings that don't offer bird nesting sites. I suppose it is progress, but I hope that someone can do something to provide nesting places for this increasingly uncommon raptor. The old buildings are an interesting place to visit because besides the colony of Lesser Kestrels, a small group of Red-Billed Choughs have been nesting here for many years.

Occasionally a Little Owl has joined the party. It seems they all get on reasonably well and I have never seen any of them fall out seriously. They have clearly sorted out their pecking order! However, this year there were no Red-Billed Choughs, but just a group of their smaller cousins;





**Jackdaws**. I quite like **Jackdaws** as they are always cheerful and a bit cheeky, but I didn't want to see them displace my Choughs. Jackdaws are quite a bit smaller, so I didn't think they had done a forceful eviction, but probably found the buildings empty. So, why? I was beginning to think about habitat change, as the landscape was changing dramatically from cereal growing and goat herding to almond growing. Jackdaws have quite an omnivorous diet, whereas Choughs tend to be specialist feeders on ground-

based invertebrates, which they extract with their long down-curved beaks from grassland-type habitats. The loss of habitat seemed as good an explanation as any for the disappearance of the Choughs. As I left the site, a large raptor flew across the road; a female Marsh Harrier. I wondered if she knew about the male bird I had seen the day before. I had no way of letting her know, but there isn't much that escapes their penetrating eyes, so I assumed she did. It will be interesting to keep an eye out to see if these two birds pair up and nest nearby



On my return home I decided to meander over the plains; a journey of 5-6kms that I have done frequently in the past. I would normally see about 10-12 different

species on a normal visit and some of them uncommon and specialist steppe species. However, on this occasion I was going past thousands of recently planted almond trees without any gaps between the fields or any field margins. I started looking for any signs of life; even a piece of grass growing by one of the tree trunks. It was lifeless and it completely shocked and depressed me to see it. I am sure that the local farmers take great pride in the thousands of acres of newly planted almonds and the neatly cultivated ground without any weeds (plant life). However, it is totally sterile and desert-like; no plants, few insects, no animals or birds. In a 6km drive I saw a Carrion Crow and two Larks, (probably Crested). I'm not sure that the farmers realise that they need insects to pollinate the almonds! They seem to be doing a great job in killing off life in this area. The area is officially a ZEPA or Special Protection Area as it is called in English. The irony of designating the area as a ZEPA in accordance with the laws of the European Community, seems to be lost on our Regional politicians. According to European law the Regional Government has a responsibility to protect the habitat of this area. Instead, the habitat is being artificially and significantly altered by the planting of almond trees, thus changing

it from a Steppe landscape to one of industrial almond production. Although I am not sure, I suspect many of these farmers are receiving lucrative grants to plant almond trees; all paid for by the same European Commission. I believe that the EU policies in this respect are contradictory and are actually achieving the opposite outcomes that they are setting out to achieve. I remember, very recently, seeing hundreds of winter flocks of Calandra Larks in these fields. They were incredibly common. Now, I would consider myself lucky to even see one, as the habitat has changed so dramatically. I will leave you now with something completely different and a bit more cheerful. It is a true and recent story that my neighbour José told me. He was driving to work one early morning, when he came around the bend and saw a bit of a commotion in the road in front of him. There was a fox having a stand off with two Golden Eagles over some road kill. They were so absorbed in this face-off, that they didn't notice José waiting patiently close by in his car for everything to be resolved. An unforgettable experience and one I suspect that José will remember all his life.







July – well where did that half of the year go? Time really does just fly by.

Summer has hit with a bang – writing this in mid-June it is 33°C today – a week ago it was 22°C. I think garden watering will be a regular feature now until autumn! Apart from smaller pots that get watered every two days, I give a real good soaking to larger pots and ground plants once a week. I think the top surface 'bakes' the day after watering, acting as a 'seal' to the wet earth below – the ground looks absolutely parched, but if you dig down a few inches you soon find damp soil. Anyway that has been my watering regime for the last 25 years of my time in Spain!

Regular readers will know Rainbow support Friends of Mazarron Animals (FMA) – a local animal rescue charity. We run the 100 Club – 100 members who pay 2€ a week for a 'membership' number (10€ per month) – every Friday at 8pm we 'spin the wheel' online live and the winning number takes 100€ - so for a 10€ outlay you have a 100:1 chance of winning, (that's really good odds for most lotteries/raffles/etc) 500€ in a month with the other 500€ going to FMA - bit of fun on a Friday evening! We have 3 numbers available at the moment! Contact FMA or Rainbow if you are interested.

Before we get asked; if it is a four Friday month, we have two draws on the 4<sup>th</sup> Friday!

#### **TV NEWS**

The big news is the real demise of satellite TV due to our area going into the summer weaker signals that happen every year. They can be 20% lower than the peak winter signals. As we have reported before, reliable BBC has all gone, ITV HD and CH4 HD are very marginal along with many others and these cases apply to 1.9m prime focus dishes. Anything smaller

and reception will be even worse.



There is no magic answer to restore UK satellite TV. We used to say get a bigger dish, but that is now not a solution. The only way to receive all UK TV successfully in Southern Spain is via the Internet. There are many ways to do this including some free options if you are a computer geek! However, many of us are not. We want to turn the TV on, select the channel we want and watch it on our TV - not our laptop, tablet or phone. You really have to go to a managed IPTV system which will carry a subscription. We have several options that vary from FREESAT to ALL channels and more. The best way to appreciate the systems is to have a chat with us and then have a free no-obligation in-home demonstration and the loan of a box for

up to a week. You can then fully test the system to see if it is what you want before you buy. If you don't like it, we just come and take it away. You do not need to be a 'geek' - there is no need for any computer skills, nor do you need a computer or a smart TV. Any TV with an HDMI input will suffice (that's any TV purchased in the last 15 years) and the system is as easy to use as any TV system you have had in the past. Some of our clients have hesitated to try IPTV because they feel their computer skills are not good enough; absolutely false – can you operate your present TV system? Then you can operate IPTV.

Multiple TV's can be a problem, but we have several options for solutions – tell us your needs and we will offer solutions.

You will need good stable internet of 10MBS plus.



# How To Keep Your Dog Cool in the Hot Summer Months

# **Have Multiple Water Stations Around Your Home**

Like humans, dogs sweat and lose water, mainly through the glands in their paws. They can lose up to one litre of water per day and the more water they lose, the higher the chances of overheating. Have multiple water stations spread equally around your home during summer to safeguard your dog from overheating and dehydration.



#### **Stick To The Shade**

Heatstroke can easily be induced by prolonged exposure to direct sunlight, so if you are in outside areas, make sure there are shaded areas your dog can relax and recharge. Most dogs will naturally find shadier spots, but it is good to keep a close eye on your dog and watch for signs of heatstroke such as excessive panting, drooling, reddened gums, dullness or loss of consciousness. If your pet shows signs of heatstroke, immediately take them into the shade and pour some cool not cold water over them to bring down their body temperature.

#### **Avoid Car Trips With Your Pet**

There is no safe length of time to leave

And then I end up on the tarmac. In the heat and in the sun. With my tongue out of my mouth and my eyes fleahing in the sun. My pows are burning, my tongue is dry and my head is pounding in the heat that my body cannot get rid of....

Instead, let me stay at home where I can enjoy the sun, with a large bowl of cool water, somewhere in the shade. And best of all like in a cool ares with grass. Love Your dog.x

a dog alone in the car, particularly in the summer months. The temperature in your car will soar above the temperature outside. Dogs can develop heatstroke in just 15 minutes. Even with water and open windows, cars are not a safe space for dogs in the summer.

#### **Chill In A Pool**

If you don't have access to a river or beach, invest in a paddling pool for your pooch to splash about in. In a shady spot of the garden, fill a pool with chilled water, but don't make it too cold as this can cause your dog to go into body shock due to the drastic temperature change on a very hot day. The cool water will bring down the dog's body temperature and absorb water through their skin and paws making sure they are hydrated as well as cool.



# Don't Take Dogs For Long Walks On The Beach

Although it might seem like a good idea, long walks on the beach are a big no for your dog, but sunbathing while your dog goes for a swim is a great way to keep your pet cool. Not all dogs will like swimming in water, but encourage them to try it in a controlled and safe environment. Dogs have sensitive feet that can burn or get injured if the ground they are walking on is too hot, so if you are on the beach, make a conscious effort to limit the amount of time your dog walks on the sand which can get very hot.

#### **Give Cool Food To Your Dogs**

Keep your dog's food and treats in the fridge for chilled serving and feed them wet food. A cool dish of raw meat is the perfect summer supper for increased water intake. Bone broth lollies are also a great summer snack.

Pop some bone broth into ice cube or lolly moulds. Leave then in the freezer for a few hours and serve.

#### **Use Sunscreen On Your Dogs**

Dogs can get sunburnt, but canine sunscreen should be used for dogs. Body parts less covered in hair are at risk of sunburn in summer and lighter haired dogs are the most at risk. Sunburn on dogs isn't just painful, but like humans, it can also increase the risk of skin cancer.



# Keep Your BBQ Out Of The Way Of Animals

It is important to understand how you can make BBQ's as safe as possible for your pets as food sizzling on the BBQ is very tantalizing for them. A dog's sense of smell is so much better than ours and BBQ food is irresistible. Make sure you place your BBQ well out of the way, where animals can't get to it. Also beware of any kebab sticks, BBQ briquettes and firelighters lying around.

#### **Grooming Is Cooling**

Much of the battle against overheating can be fought at home before going out with your dog. Most dogs will start to shed their coat as summer begins, so regular brushing will get rid of any old hair that could make them even hotter. This is particularly important if your dog has a heavy coat, but it is important to know that dogs do not benefit from being completely shaved. Doing this can result in skin problems and sunburn as their skin isn't meant to be fully exposed to the elements.

The forecast said less than 3 knots of wind at 11am, so timings were changed to a later start on Sunday May 14<sup>th</sup>. Ten competitors in five boats entered.

1st Race - start was set for 12.15pm when the wind was supposed to be NW 5-6 knots, but was it? Oh no! It was W 3.5 knots at the gun, so a slow start with Cuatro and across Dos together after 1min 50 secs. These two had a close battle throughout the race. The others started at staggered intervals until **Vision** crossed at 6mins-10secs. Manoeuvering

**Uno** grounded on the reef. Her crew had to clamber out and stand on the reef to push her off, finally starting last. 6mins-15secs into the race the wind built to 5.5 knots, dropped off again, then went N, so all boats took over 21 minutes for the first lap. This really caught all boats out and the final lap was much slower. It was a real test of everybody's skill in reacting to the wind changes, which some managed better than others.

The wind was generally stronger and all boats were lapping in a consistent time, the fastest in just over 8mins and the slowest in 10mins 30secs, completing 6 or 7 laps.

**Best Sail For Ages!** John Down's experience of the **SAMM** racing on May 31st.

1st Race anti clockwise; wind SSW at 4.5 knots. First mark 90° to left of start gate so everyone trying to get to port side of gate; Ginetta on my starboard side and Tres coming in on my port between me and the port start buoy. We crossed together very tight! Tres took my wind and set off for the first buoy, but I caught him, overtook him on his windward side and he couldn't round the buoy until I had. It's called tactics.

The wind shifted to SSE and built to an average of 9 knots; perfect for my **Radial**. I was up on the plane several times between buoy 3 and the gate - no mistakes and flat out all the way. I saw a couple of port/starboard near misses between the two Sailfish boats.



The race officer had set 10 mins between the first and second races - perfect.

2<sup>nd</sup> Race clockwise due to the wind shift during 1st race. I sat back, hove to about 2 metres from start line which put me in good position to cross the line first and off to buoy one with the other 6 boats hard on my heels as they had all started within 37 secs of the gun. Wind stronger at up to 11 knots at times and waves really got up. Being slapped hard and drenched by waves, I led to first buoy and decided to sail on a little before turning towards buoy 2. I didn't go far enough and I was dropping below buoy. Other boats behind saw it and sailed on further in attempt to get a clear run to the buoy. I had to tack up to buoy so lost ground. On the 2nd lap at 1st buoy, Tres came in on starboard with me having just gone onto a port - 6 inches from full speed contact. Got caught out at gibe mark buoy 3 trying to switch my 'sailing by the lee' over to the other side and whilst sorting it out missed gate. Had to turn back to go through the gate which cost me time.

At buoy 1 most people sailed on. To make up ground I turned sharp up towards buoy 2 which looked like a good move until in the tack near buoy 2 got stuck in irons costing me yet more time! Continued to chase **Tres** and **Dos**, slowly catching up by lap 5. **Tres** capsized in front of me and I had to take avoiding action. Started to close gap on **Dos**. Did not hear 'about to finish' signal, but support boat told me. My hull was full of water when the bung took out. Need to investigate why.



#### Mazarrón Mines

About a 10 minute drive from Camposol, down the RM3 to Mazarrón Town, you will see the mines which dominate the town. As you take the north turning into Mazarrón you will see on the left a small carpark with an information board. Park there and make sure you have got some good walking boots to

#### Brief History Of The Mines:

They date back to Bronze the Age but the Romans were



the most successful, between the second century BC and the second century A.D. They say there were as many as 40,000 people involved in working in the mines from Mazarron to Cartagena and most of these were slaves. After the Roman times the mines were not worked much until the mid- 19th century. Mazarron town started to get bigger with more workers living in the town. It was a very dangerous job for the ordinary miner and children were employed from 9 - 12 years old. The worst accident was in 1893 when carbon monoxide caused the death of 28 people. Every year Mazarron town remembers this day by laying flowers around the roundabout with the statue of a miner.

Throughout history of the mines, they extracted iron, lead, silver, copper, zinc and alum. By the 1960's, the fall in price of materials and the constant flooding of the tunnels meant the mine was finally closed.

days, the mine still attracts lots of people from locals, people from far. а photographers, artists and even movie companies film here for it's Sci-fi urban.



landscape. The mine is so big, if you wanted to cover the whole mine area, it would take you two days. I love coming here and have taken many people to see this area. When it rains for a couple of days, red pools appear from the ground giving this Mars effect.
