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
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

#### **Spanish Number Plates**

We are often asked by our customers if they can choose their own registration number, or if private registration plates are available in Spain, so here's the answer along with an explanation of how Spanish registration numbers are allocated.

#### **Private Number Plates**

Unlike the UK and some other European countries, private number plates have never been issued in Spain and aside from state registration numbers and diplomatic plates, most vehicles follow the new registration format that was introduced in September 2000.

#### **Current Format**

The current number plate format for Spanish registered vehicles consists of four numbers followed by three letters (eg. 1234 ABC). Prior to this, regional letter codes were used. The letters B, C, D, F, G, H, J, K, L, M, N, P, R, S, T, V, W, X, Y and Z will all be used, whilst all vowels and the letter Q are excluded, so the current system allows for 80 million possible combinations. At the current rate of vehicle registrations this system should last until about 2040.

#### **How It Works**

The first four numbers of a Spanish number plate are a counter which runs from 0000 to 9999. The next 3 letters are a sequence which started with BBB and will finally end with ZZZ. As of 28th November 2022 we are up to MCM, so once there have been 10,000 registrations, the letter sequence will change to MCN. Consequently there is no exact method of determining the date a Spanish Vehicle was registered; just an approximation based on the last 3 letter sequence.

#### Previous Format

Before the latest matriculation system was introduced in the year 2000, Spanish registration numbers were based on the province in which the vehicle was registered. It followed the format ABC-1234-YZ, where the first section denoted the province and could be 1, 2 or 3 letters. The middle section was a numeric counter from 0000 to 9999 and the final section was an alphabetic counter that increased when all the numbers had been used in the second section.



Some notable province registration prefixes are: A - Alicante, AL - Almería, B - Barcelona, GR - Granada, M - Madrid, MA - Malaga, MU - Murcia and V - Valencia, although there were 72 different prefixes in total. The letter Q was never used for registration anywhere in a registration number.

#### mporting A Vehicle

A little known advantage of importing a foreign vehicle is that you will receive a brand new registration number that is allocated the day your vehicle is registered, meaning that your vehicle will appear to be brand new!

As the weather is now starting to heat up, it is imperative that you maintain your fluid intake and stay hydrated. If you are feeling thirsty, you may already be dehydrated. However, the sensation of thirst can be reduced in older people, particularly poststroke or those with dementia. Therefore, it is recommended that you should consume at least 8 drinks daily (ideally water). Limit alcohol and caffeinated drinks as they increase dehydration. The benefits of maintaining good hydration can improve concentration, balance, memory, energy and mood, in addition to aiding joint lubrication, eye health, digestion, flushing out waste toxins and maintaining skin health. An excellent way of encouraging fluid intake can be found in jellies, ice lollies, water melon, oranges and some vegetables.



With all the pain of my heart I have to communicate the loss of our dear mother and founder of Cavalli, Elizabeth Knowles Hampson, or Liz as her friends liked to call her. My mom had been battling ALS for 8 years, but she never gave up and taught us that when you believe in something, there is nothing that can stop you. She fought for animal rights, but also to make visible and professionalize the Horse-assisted therapy sector in the Region of Murcia. I, Verónica, pick up her legacy and will continue to fight for her and for our animals.



We are forced to move in a couple of weeks from what has been our home and that of our animals for the past 20 years. My colleague Reina and I have put all our savings into buying some land in Los Muñoces (near Condado de Alhama). We've got just enough money to fence the land, provide water supply, fix the roof of the cottage, but we still need a lot of help to build the paddocks and shelters, install the solar panels, build a barn and a hay shed, rehabilitate the inside of the cottage, provide shade for the animals and more. We have relaunched the crowdfunding campaign my mom Liz set up before Covid. With the almost 10,000€ we raised back then, we are building the perimeter fencing. You can know more about our story and why we have to move on: chuffed.org building

#### a haven for abandoned horses.

We also need help for the move, as we need to move all our animals safely to the new land: horses, ponies and donkeys, our dogs and cats, and our farm animals. Any help in gardening, small construction, plumbing, wood work will be more than welcome. We need to transport heavy material, furniture and many, many boxes.

#### It's not all bad news!

were We called in to rescue this gorgeous little girl. We've named her Poppy. She was dumped on the side of the road due to a malformation of her front hooves. After our vet checked her. we



discovered she must have suffered for 4-5 years from laminitis that hadn't been taken care of. It is a disease caused by an inadequate diet of carbohydrates that creates an inflammation in the tissue inside the hooves causing immense pain. To avoid the pain, horses shift their weight into an incorrect position, which in the long run causes a retraction of the tendons and hence the malformation. Right now she needs treatment from our farrier. We are crossing our fingers that this will help, but if not, she will need an operation. We would like to give Colin from Hugo's Home Farm a huge thank you for assisting in the recue. He was in charge of transporting Poppy safely

to Cavalli and he did an amazing job. We are so grateful!

These 2 miniature Moroccan donkeys are also looking for a new home. Doña Teresa is the mom and **Paquito** is the son who has already been castrated. If you can offer a loving home for both of them together please contact us.

It is great see the Council's ground' maintenance contractor, STV, begin the work on



Century, it was one of many watch towers built along the coast (Puerto de Mazarrón,

Bolnuevo, Aguilas) for protection from North African pirates. You can walk up to the tower where information boards telling the history and you get some amazing views looking down on the village of La

In the heart of the village, you have the local church and the jetty and if you are lucky, you might see the fishing boats unloading tuna into crates. This is also where the scuba diving schools catch their boats to go out exploring the coves along the coast. You will also notice information boards on the walls telling the history of the fisherman and the fish they catch. This is also where the big guns came in to be unloaded and then taken up to Bateria de Castillitos (The Guns of Cartagena). This area is well worth a visit, with so much to





## Birding in Murcia

We have just come back from a week's cultural and birding trip with a small guiding company called 'Birding the Strait'. We flew into Marrakesh and immediately headed south up into the High Atlas Mountains, via the Tizin Tichka pass at 11,000 feet and finally descended to 4,265 feet to the small village of Ait Ben-haddou, a Unesco world heritage site, with its medieval town and castle. Many Hollywood films have been made here including 'Lawrence of Arabia', 'Gladiator' and 'The Mummy'. As our trip was part culture, we spent a few hours having a guided tour around this interesting and historical site. The town seems to be constructed of Adobe, a mixture of soil, water, clay and straw. I guess there was also some animal dung in the mixture as well. I suppose it's similar to Argomasa the material the Moors used to build their medieval castles in Southern Spain. You would imagine that erosion over the years would have made these ancient buildings crumble, but the village stood witness to the longevity of these old construction methods.

Although this was part of our cultural itinerary, the unusual looking LBJ's that we were frequently seeing around the village awoke our birding instincts and gave us our first lifer of the trip. These small birds proved to be House Buntings (Emberiza Safari), quite a pretty looking bird that we were seeing frequently as we walked the narrow streets of the village. It is a resident of this sort of arid countryside that ranges from Morocco and south to Mali and east to Chad. In Morocco, it is traditionally treated as a sacred bird and has become very tame and cheekily enters inside houses, shops and mosques. It has expanded its range north since the 1960's and reached as far north as Tangier. I suspect it won't be long before it crosses the Straits of Gibraltar to Tarifa, in Southern Spain.



We were soon beginning to realise that we were going to do guite a bit of travelling each day, but Javi our guide, ensured that we stopped frequently at interesting sites. These sites were quite often good birding locations. On the road to Boumalne Dades we stopped at quite a pretty place

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that was known for a particularly colourful bird called a Mousier's Redstart. We soon went into twitching mode, as our group was intent on finding the bird before leaving. Fortunately, the showy male birds were quite happy to perch out in the open to flaunt their handsome appearance, so it didn't take too long to find one perched, where we could get good views of it.



White-crowned Wheatear


We were soon travelling again towards our destination of the Sahara Desert and as you can imagine the landscape became more arid and desert-like. This proved to be a great opportunity to accustom ourselves to a new bird species, a White-Crowned Wheatear (Oenanthe Leucopyga). It is a common bird of these habitats. It looks very similar to our Black Wheatear (*Oenanthe Melanura*), a permanent resident in parts of Murcia. However, as you would expect, the adults have a white crown, which is the only visual difference from our resident Wheatear.



As we travelled closer to the desert, the landscape became more arid and the vegetation became scarcer. It was perfect habitat for one of the birds we were seeking, a Desert Wheatear (Oenanthe Deserti). The males are the more attractive of the two genders and they look very similar to one of our summer visitors to Murcia, the **Black-Eared Wheatear** (Oenanthe Hispanica). The difference between the two species is quite subtle. The Desert

Wheatear has a black line of feathers from the ear to the wings. Yes, you've quessed it; our Black-Eared Wheatear has a gap in the black line.

We eventually arrived at the Sahara Desert at the village of Merzouga, the gateway to Erg Chebbi, a huge expanse of dunes. I must admit that the desert is beautiful and we were very impressed by the landscape, a habitat that we had never previously experienced. I was left stunned by its beauty and very intrigued about the type of birdlife we would find in such a place, totally lacking in water.

The birdlife was fantastic, much to my surprise. We went into the desert in 4 x 4 cars driven by local people who clearly knew the desert and where to find the local wildlife. The first area we visited was a lonely village where a few desert goatherds lived a very basic life with few amenities. However, there was a small group of **Desert Sparrows** (Passer Simplex) that were sharing their very basic lifestyle. They were quite attractive, especially the males who unfortunately were a bit camera shy. However, I did manage a reasonable photo of a female bird collecting nesting material.



I was wondering how anything could live in such a dry and desolate habitat. The few species that were able to live in this



environment have evolved to survive with very little water. Evidently, their kidneys require little or no water and they obtain moisture from eating the insects that they find. One such bird is a LBJ that is a bit smaller than a **Sparrow**. It is lacking in colour and is a drab nondescript little bird that blends effortlessly with its surroundings. It is quite sought after by birdwatchers, but it is extremely difficult to see. In fact, if it stayed still without moving I doubt we would ever see it. It is a **Desert** Lark (Ammomanes Deserti). We managed to find one in the vast expanse of desert, but its reputation of a reclusive and difficult bird to find didn't really enhance our joy in finding it. It looked pretty ordinary and boring!



Our next experience was totally different, as we went to a watering hole, where two species of **Sandgrouse** visited each day. It was an artificial pool that had been built by the local guides to attract birds. They earn quite a good living by taking paying birdwatchers to view the elusive **Sandgrouse** that visit daily. There were two species that came to drink, **Spotted** (*Pterocles Senegallus*) and **Crowned Sandgrouse** (*Pterocles Coronatus*). These birds fly to waterholes each day for a drink and will fly quite long distances, as water is very scarce in the desert. Their chicks aren't able to fly when they first hatch, so



the males will bathe and collect water in between their feathers. They subsequently fly to their thirsty chicks hidden in the desert, which then sate their thirst by drinking the water held in dad's feathers. The first sign of **Sandgrouse** approaching the water hole was when a flock of maybe twenty birds approached flying fast and low. They landed about 200 metres away and then walked slowly to the watering hole. They are shy birds and used this ploy to be more secretive.



Our final desert bird was very active. It was a **Hoopoe Lark** (Alaemon Alaudipes), named because its long down curved beak resembles that of a **Hoopoe**. They are very active in the mornings and then hunker down in any shade they can find until the evening. This **Lark** came to be one of our favourite desert birds as it was an authentic survivor and very active in the mornings.

After the desert, we returned, over two days, to the bustle of Marrakesh. From here we went to the snow line in the high Atlas Mountains at Oukaimeden. It was quite spectacular seeing the snow covered rocky mountains and very different to what we had experienced to date. We had gone there to see three very specific and rare birds; Alpine Chough (Pyrrocorax Graculus), Crimson-Winged Finch (Rhodopechys Alienus) and Horned Lark (Eremophila Alpestris).



As soon as we arrived, we were surrounded by **Choughs**, both **Red-Billed** and **Alpine**.

We regularly see **Red-Billed Choughs** flying down the valley behind our house in Murcia. However, **Alpine Choughs**, with their yellow beaks instead of red, are a rarity in Murcia. You would have to travel to the Pyrenees or the Alps to see them.



We were fully expecting to have a difficult search to find the **Crimson-Winged Finches**, but lo and behold, they were feeding at the side of the café we stopped at. This was certainly a bonus and made birding and looking for rarities a bit of a walk in the park. I can assure you it isn't always as easy.



It seemed like fate, that the **Horned Larks** we had come to see, were as elusive as ever. We searched everywhere, but without any luck. After several hours of searching we found a handful of these birds feeding on one of the snowdrifts further up the mountain range. I don't know what was so attractive on the snowdrifts as they normally feed on insects, but occasionally feed on seeds. I wouldn't expect to find either on these high snowdrifts!

The **Horned Lark** is recognised by most authorities as a separate sub-species, but scientists are now considering splitting the sub-species and in future it maybe be classified as the **Atlas Horned Lark**. It will then be considered a new species and can be ticked! Currently, it is considered a close relative of the **Shore Lark**, a species that is seen uncommonly on the shores of Eastern England. It seems very strange to me, as the habitats in both places seem diametrically opposed!

**Bedar** Community **Bolsters Asprodalba** Chrissie Cremore bv para **Asprodalba** (Asociacion Promocion de las Personas con Discapacidad Intelectual del Levante Almeriense) was created 40 years ago by a local psychologist Ignacio Martin-Baro who retired about 3 years ago. The day centre and residential homes in Vera cater for intellectually challenged people on a daily basis, with varying levels of mental and physical disabilities. The day centre attends to 80 adults who do not live on site and the residents' home has room to house 22 people who do not have family to look after them. Both buildings encourage arts and craft, gardening and computer lessons, plus offer facilities so that the participants can learn how to cook and look after themselves. The residential home also has a specially built swimming pool which allows wheelchair access.

Not far away there is the former mining town, dating back to the Muslim period; a pristine white village called Bedar which nestles in an east-facing valley in the foothills of the Sierra de Los Filabres. Little did Maria and Steve Crees know that when they permanently moved to their 'holiday home' how their efforts would contribute to Asprodalba's plans for their third building. Originally from London, Maria and Steve met whilst working for a housing association and 44 years later,



with 2 daughters and 3 grandchildren, know they made the right decision when they decided to settle in Bedar. Initially, whilst exploring Spain they were drawn to Mojácar, but once they discovered Bedar they knew that the 'building foundations' for their house was meant to be there. It is not until you visit this village that you appreciate what it has to offer; meandering through the narrow cobbled streets with the Mediterranean glistening on the horizon. Being sociable folk, they quickly became part of the community and enjoyed raising money with local 'Black Tie and Posh Frock' events for Stepping Stones Alzheimer Charity and a defibrillator.

COVID-19 further Although stopped functions; now that the 'seed has been sown', this year they decided to expand on this theme and recently organised and hosted the biggest gathering to date with 90 people dining and dancing at The Villa Cadima Restaurant. 

## DID YOU KNOW?



**History in The Book of Daniel** (Part 1)
Did you know that history is revealed in Scriptures?

Can the future be seen in Scriptures?
All Scripture has historical content and the book of **Daniel** will be the main reference point for this article. Last year, for May and June I wrote part (1) and (2) regarding **Daniel** chapter 2, which covered from Babylon to present day Europe under the

The book of **Daniel** can be found in the Old Testament. Another book which is closely related to **Daniel** is the book of Revelation, which is found at the end of the New Testament.

title 'Signs of the times we are living in'.

Daniel was a prophet and lived between 500 and 600 years before the Messiah (Yeshua/Jesus). A study of these prophetic books describe present day and future events. For the purpose of this article I am looking at Rome to present day.

The book of **Daniel** can be confusing to understand, but there is a way to make it easier to comprehend by reading chapters which relate to, or are comparable to each other. For example, read chapters 2 & 7, 3 & 6, 4 & 5. (Chapters 1-6 have historical content and chapters 7-12 have prophetical content) The book of **Daniel** should be studied alongside the Book of Revelation. **Daniel** chapter 2 shows at a glance the whole history of the earth until the 2<sup>nd</sup> Coming of Yeshua (Jesus). The books of **Daniel** and Revelation are for these last days.

Daniel chapter 2, verses 31-33 says "Thou O King, sawest and behold a great image. This great image, whose brightness was excellent, stood before thee and the form thereof was terrible. This image was of a head made of gold, breast and arms of silver, belly and thighs of brass, legs of iron, feet part of iron and part of miry clay".

King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon had a dream of a large image with a head of gold representing himself. Its chest and arms of silver represented the Medes and the Persians. Its thighs of bronze represented Alexander the Great of Greece.

It had legs of iron representing Rome.
The toes of iron and miry clay represent

#### modern day Europe.

No other nation took over Rome; it was just divided. The empire became partly strong like the iron and partly broken like the miry clay. As iron and miry clay cannot mix together, so the nations will try to mix together, but fail.

Europe mingles or mixes together, but they cannot cleave together. History shows that Kings and Queens of Europe have attempted through inter-marriages, alliances and political wars to unite the empire, but have failed.

Daniel chapter 7, verses 1, 3-7: "In the first year of Belshazzar, King of Babylon Daniel had a dream and visions.

And four great beasts came up from the sea, diverse one from another. The first was like a lion. Another beast, second, was like a bear. After this a third was like a leopard. A fourth beast was dreadful and terrible and exceedingly strong. It had iron teeth and was diverse from all the other beasts before it and it had 10 horns." (Belshazzar was the grandson of King Nebuchadnezzar)

Now for the interpretation of the visions: Daniel chapter 7, verses 17, 23, 24 explains: "These great beasts, which are four, are four kingdoms (kings), which shall arise out of the earth. The fourth beast shall be the fourth kingdom upon the earth... And the ten horns out of this kingdom are 10 kings that shall arise..."

(lion represented Babylon; bear represented Medo-Persians; leopard represented Greece; fourth kingdom Rome; 10 kings represent Europe)

Daniel chapter 8, verse 3 & 4 states "... behold, there stood before a *ram* which had two horns, but one was higher than the other and the higher came up last. I saw the ram pushing westward, northward and southward, so that no beasts might stand before him. He did according to his will and became great."

**Daniel** chapter 8, verse 20 clarifies the identity of the ram "The ram which thou sawest...are the kings of Medo-Persia."

Daniel chapter 8, verses 5 & 6 says "...a he goat came from the west on the face of the earth and touched not the ground and the goat had a notable horn between

his eyes. He came to the ram and ran unto him in the fury of his power."

Daniel chapter 8, verse 21 clarifies who the goat is "And the rough goat is the King of Greece and the great horn between his eyes is the first king." The first king was Alexander, the Great.

Does history line up with the scriptures? The Medo-Persians took over Babylon. Alexander the Great, of Greece took over the Medo-Persians. Rome took power from Greece through political intrigue, rather than through war.

"In the third century, R<mark>ome w</mark>as a prosperous and populous city state governed as a Republic that had not yet awakened to its later imperial ambitions. Formally a kingdom, Rome witnessed a popular uprising against its despotic final king, Tarquin the proud, that instituted a new form of government that allowed for some power to the plebians, or common people. (Along with special rights given to gentlemen of wealth and property.) The new government was run by two consuls, who were both in charge of ruling civilly as well as running the military." (Kevin Martin, MagellanTV, ancient history, war and military: The fall of Greece and the rise of Rome.)

### How did the Roman Empire decline and fall?

"The Roman Empire fell slowly as a result of challenges from within and without, changing over the course of hundreds of years until its form was unrecognisable. Because of the long process, different historians have placed an end-date at many different points on a continuum. Perhaps the fall of Rome is best understood as a compilation of various maladies that altered a large swath of human habitation over many hundreds of years. A combination of factors including Christianity, metal lead in the water supply, monetary trouble and military problems caused the fall of Rome. The Roman Empire did not fall so much as adapt to changing circumstances." (ThoughtCo: The fall of Rome: How, when and why did it happen?)

The issues which affected Rome's decline were high inflation, high taxes, feudalism, hoarding of bullion by Roman citizens, widespread looting from the Roman treasury, massive trade deficit, loss of revenue from other Roman territories, rich and poor divide, high deaths due to lead poisoning in the water system and loss of control over the military, who were therefore unable to guard its boarders and growth in Christianity. (See Edward Gibbon. The decline and fall of the Roman Empire, chapter 38 and chapter 71)

From the above (and other books) you can see that scripture reveals history and shows the future. "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by word of God." (Romans chapter 10, verse 17)

I hope you have learned more about the Scriptures. Next month I will continue with part 2.




If we have sinned against him by injurious words, then we must apologise to him and make our reconciliation with him.

### **Expressions with 'Tener'**

Something we find out at the beginning of our language lessons is that English and Spanish often have very different ways of saying the same thing. This sounds like an obvious statement, but some people take longer than others to realize it. In other words, we have to let go of the need for 'word for word' translation and just understand that 'that is how the Spanish say it', so that's what we have to learn.

A good example of this difference is the way the Spanish talk about 'having' something when we say 'being' something. For example, let's start with age:

We say 'I am 21 years old.' or 'He is 60 years old.'

In Spanish this is **Tengo 21 años** (literally, I have 21 years) and **Tiene 60 años** (he has 60 years).

Naturally the tense can change any way we want. For example:

El año que viene tendré 22 años. (Next year I will be 22).

Something you may not have considered, is what happens when we are talking about babies who are months, weeks or even days old. We replace the word **años** for other time periods like this:

¿Cuántos meses tiene tu nieto?

#### Solo tiene 6 semanas.

We might ask someone with a very young baby:

¿Cuánto tiempo tiene? Literally: 'How

much time has he/she got?', which really doesn't sound right in English at all.

Some other expressions of this sort are fairly well known. For example:

'to be hungry' is **tener hambre** (to have hunger).

On occasions we may hear, possibly just before lunch:

i**Qué hambre tengo!** (What hunger I have!)

The same thing applies to being thirsty: We have to say that we 'have thirst'. For example:

**Cuándo llegaron, todos tenían mucha sed.** (When they arrived they were all very thirsty.)

Similarly in Spanish we 'have cold (or coldness)' and 'have heat' when we experience different temperatures. What this leads to is one of those classic mistakes that non-Spaniards make from time to time:

**Tengo calor** means 'I am hot'. (i.e. the weather is hot and I am feeling the consequences).

If you translate literally from English and say **Estoy caliente**, you are saying 'I am feeling randy!'. Apart from the obvious implications of saying this to the wrong person at the wrong moment, my dictionary also informs me that this is a 'vulgar' expression – so you have been warned on two counts.

You probably know the word entiendo

(I understand), but if you understand something really well, or are convinced about something, you can also say **lo tengo claro** (literally 'I have it clear' or perhaps 'It is clear to me'). For example, someone might have just given you some complicated instructions and then checked that you know what to do. You can say **Si, lo tengo claro,** (Yes, it's all clear), or perhaps **No lo tengo claro de todo,** (it is not absolutely clear to me). That's a useful one when you want to disguise the fact that you haven't understood a thing!

Lastly, another expression which really doesn't have a good equivalent in English is **tener ganas**, (to have the 'desire' for something). Our nearest equivalent is to 'feel like something'. This is often used in the negative **No tengo ganas** (I don't feel like it). Whatever it is, is entirely open to your imagination.

Apple Cider Vinegar: Benefits, Side Effects, Uses, Dosage and More

You may have a friend who insists on taking Apple Cider Vinegar shots in the morning for fat burning, or you may have seen Apple Cider Vinegar drinks in the refrigerated section at the grocery store. With the exploding popularity of this seemingly basic pantry staple, you are probably wondering what the buzz is all about.

What Is Apple Cider Vinegar?
First, let's explore what Apple Cider Vinegar, or ACV, is.

ACV is a type of vinegar made from fermented apple juice. Like other cider and wine-based vinegars, it has between 5% and 6% acidity. You may notice that there are different types of ACV available at the store. For instance, you may be most familiar with distilled ACV, which looks clear in the bottle, but raw, unfiltered or unpasteurized ACV contains a cloudy substance that floats around in the mix. This is called the 'mother' and it is formed by natural enzymes during fermentation. There is no need to be wary of it: this stringy substance usually settles to the bottom of the bottle and it is completely safe to consume.

Regardless of the variety, you do not have to refrigerate  ${\color{red}\mathsf{ACV}}$  and it will last for a very long time. Vinegar, in general, has an almost indefinite shelf life. Even if vinegar's appearance changes (it may look cloudier, for instance), it is still okay to use.

As for nutrition facts, diluted ACV contains an

# What Are the Possible Health Benefits of **Apple Cider Vinegar?**

ACV has garnered superfood status and fans of the vinegar say that it can cure nearly everything that ails you — weight gain, digestive issues, skin woes and so on - as a powerful source of vitamins and minerals, or for weight loss or 'cleansing' support.

Few studies support these uses, so while you can add it to your diet without significantly upping your risk for weight gain, it's best to stay realistic about it. ACV's main health benefits may be due to the amount of antioxidant polyphenols (or plant chemicals) it contains, thanks to the fermentation process. It is also rich in probiotics, which may benefit the digestive system and gut microbiome.

#### **ACV and Weight Loss**

ACV contains very few calories, so it can fit into your diet if you are trying to lose or maintain weight, but you may also have heard that some people take a shot or tablespoon of ACV to stimulate fat burning. Taking ACV is unlikely to change your body composition or weight.

Registered dietitian Katherine Zeratsky points out that this thought doesn't have scientific support behind it and the only way to actually lose weight is through a generally healthy diet and by incorporating fitness into your routine. The advice is far less flashy than supplementing with something as trendy as

ACV, but it is exactly what really works.

# Cholesterol

ACV may be beneficial for high cholesterol in some groups. A June meta-analysis 2021 of nine studies noted that ACV might reduce blood cholesterol levels in participants with type 2 Diabetes who took 15ml of ACV daily for more than

Some research suggests that ACV may have benefits for people with type 2 Diabetes, though there is a lack of high-quality research on the topic.

The June 2021 meta-analysis found that 15ml of ACV, taken daily over a period of at least eight weeks, significantly lowered fasting blood glucose levels in participants with type 2 Diabetes. An earlier small study found that 20ml of ACV didn't decrease the body's glucose response following a carb-rich meal.

While some studies have suggested that ACV may help lower blood glucose, it is important to remember that results can vary and ACV is not a replacement for any medication you currently take. If you have type 2 Diabetes, you should work closely with your healthcare team on the best way to control the condition, rather than relying on ACV.

# **ACV and Ulcerative Colitis**

Taking diluted vinegar may help improve digestion, although there is a lack of research supporting its use in chronic autoimmune conditions like ulcerative colitis (UC). Giving mice UC diluted ACV for a month lowered levels of inflammation in their colon and increased the amount of healthy bacteria in their gut, per a preliminary study. However, this was a single animal study and researchers are far off from recommending it as a treatment.

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**Teeth Implants** What materials can be used for implants?



I recently had a patient, who had a vertical fracture in a premolar, so I recommended an extraction with an immediate implant of Titanium. When I mentioned Titanium, the patient became uneasy and said she was allergic to metals. Based on some information she had found on the Internet, she requested a Zirconium implant.

This has drawn my attention to dilemmas caused by misinterpretation of the readily available information found in different media. There is a difference between getting information from the Internet about a medical procedure and understanding the criteria necessary to opt for such treatment.

Many times, I tell my patients that dentistry is not mathematics. This means that there is no absolute accuracy in the treatments we choose for our patients, nor can we 100% guarantee that a treatment will be safe or not. We are always moving in a world of probabilities, in which the scientific evidence guides us. These studies are carried out to allow us to know the effectiveness or not and the safety or not of any medical or dental procedure. I fully understand the concern of my patient with the allergy to metals and naturally nobody wants to give a treatment that ends up failing because of a situation that can be avoided. However, to date, scientific evidence reports that **Titanium** is a biocompatible metal. (Hosoki M et al Allergic contact dermatitis caused by **Titanium** screws and dental implants. Prosthodondt Res. 2016 Jul; 60 (3): 213-9). This research shows that Titanium does not harm the organism and has a very low probability of producing an allergic reaction. In other words, the risk of an allergic reaction to **Titanium** is lower than with other metallic materials.



Even if a patient has a medical history of hypersensitivity or allergic reaction to metals or other materials, there are multiple scientific reports which support the safety of commercially pure Titanium Implants. To date scientific evidence, on the safety of a dental implant made from Zirconium compared to one of **titanium**, is not completely clear.



After an exhaustive study, my natural inclination is to recommend my patient has a **Titanium Implant** due to the low probability of allergic reaction and evidence of a good success rate. For now, with Zirconium, we have a low rate of allergic reaction but lack good documented evidence of success.

With this I am not saying that I never recommend Zirconium implants, but I do say that given the little scientific evidence we must be cautious and look carefully at the benefits of using one type of implant over another. This is the difference between obtaining information from an unreliable source, such as the Internet, and giving a well-researched professional recommendation.

**Sweet Potato and Onion Bake** 

2lbs medium sized sweet potatoes ½ tsp salt 1.4 lbs onions ½ tsp white pepper ¾ cup milk 1 tbsp grated cheddar cheese 2oz flour

1oz butter



Peel Sweet Potatoes, and slice thinly. Parboil the Sweet Potatoes. Slice Onions. Grease a baking dish with butter. Put the Potatoes and Onions in alternate layers into the dish. Sprinkle between

layers with a mixture of flour, salt and white pepper. Dot with butter and grated cheese and almost cover with milk. Bake in moderate oven.



# Lentil and Rice Crispy Onion

1 cup Rice

1 cup dried Lentils

½ cup olive oil

2 medium Onions, thinly sliced

1 tsp cumin or more to taste (I prefer more)

2 tsp salt Black pepper

Soak Lentils in water for 3 hours then drain. Soak rice in water for ½hr and then drain. Sauté Onions in a large skillet for about 15 minutes, or until very brown and crisp. Remove Onions onto a plate lined with paper towels to drain. Turn heat to medium-high and add Lentils and Rice to skillet- Sauté quickly in the browned-onion-flavoured oil, adding cumin, salt and pepper. Add 3 cups of water and bring to a boil. Cover very tightly and then cook on very low heat for about 20-25 minutes. To serve, fluff up Rice and Lentils and top with the crispy browned Onions.

#### **Potato and Onion Omelette**

5 eggs, beaten

1 large Potato

1 small-to-medium Onion (chopped)

4 tbsp oil

Salt & Pepper to taste

Peel the Potato and cut into pieces (approximately 2cm x 2cm x .5cm or smaller in size). In a frying pan, fry the chopped Onion and then the Potato in all the olive oil on a very low heat. Add the beaten egg and salt and pepper to taste. Cook very slowly on a low heat. When cooked, flip

the omelette over by gently transferring to a plate and then slide it back into the frying pan to cook the other side. Serve hot or cold.

#### **Chicken and Beetroot Roast**

500g new potatoes, cut into wedges 250g cooked beetroot, cut into half 250g carrots peeled & cut into 2cm chunks

1 onion, cut into large pieces
3 cloves garlic, cut into fine slices
2-3 twigs of thyme
175ml white wine
4tbsp extra virgin olive oil
4 chicken legs
salt & freshly ground black pepper



Preheat the oven to 200°C/gas 6.

In a large roasting tin, mix the potatoes, **Beetroot**, carrots, **Onion** and garlic. Drizzle over the olive oil and pour over the wine. Tuck the thyme between the vegetables. Season well with salt & pepper. Season the chicken legs all over with salt and pepper and lay them on top of the vegetables. Cover loosely with foil and bake in the oven for 15 minutes.

Remove the foil from the tin and return to the oven. Bake for a further 20-25 minutes or until the chicken is golden and crisp and the vegetables are cooked through.

#### **Beetroot Soup**

500g cooked **Beetroot** cut into chunks

1 large Onion, diced

1 garlic clove, crushed

2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil

1 tbsp balsamic vinegar

750ml vegetable stock

In large saucepan, sweat the **Onion** gently in the olive oil until it softens (around 10 minutes). Be careful not to burn the **Onions**. (You are not trying to caramelize them). When the onions are soft, add the crushed garlic to the pan and gently fry for a further minute and then add the **Beetroot**, stock and balsamic vinegar. Bring to the boil and simmer for a couple of minutes. Using a liquidiser or stick blender, blend the soup until really smooth.



# **Early Murcian Man: The Neanderthals of Torre Pacheco**

Sima de las Palomas (which roughly translates as 'pigeon chasm' or 'rockdove hole') is a cave which can be found at Torre Pacheco, in the Cabezo Gordo hills between Balsicas and San Javier. The cave itself lies 123 metres above sea level, under an overhanging rock which overlooks the Mar Menor saltwater lagoon. For tens of thousands of years, the cave and the area surrounding it, was inhabited by **Neanderthals** and other humans. Human remains, including Neanderthals, were originally found in the 'rock-dove hole' during the 1990's, although the cave/ hole had already been partially excavated by miners in the 19th Century.

In all, around 100 human fossils have been found by archaeologists at the Torre Pacheco cave and the remains mostly seem to be between 40,000-50,000 years old. The **Neanderthals** were an extinct species (or sub-species) of humans who lived on earth until roughly 40,000 years ago and then died out for reasons which aren't entirely clear. The Murcian remains therefore are from a period just before the Neanderthals became extinct. This makes the Sima de las Palomas finds quite unusual, because the majority of Neanderthal bones discovered elsewhere have usually been much older, dating from about 130,000 years ago. Indeed, the very oldest Neanderthal bones discovered are about 430,000 years old.

Archaeologists conducted a further excavation at the Sima de las Palomas site in 2006-7, in which they discovered the well-preserved remains of a young **Neanderthal** woman (about 85% of the skeleton was intact). Underneath the woman, the remains of a **Neanderthal**

child were also discovered. Researchers, probably correctly, surmise that the infant was the buried woman's child. The Neanderthal woman was referred to as 'Palomas 96' and the child as 'Palomas 97', although the adult female soon became known by the nickname 'Paloma'. The woman and child were both found with their elbows bent and their hands were placed in such a position that they were touching their foreheads. Researchers were able to deduce that both bodies had been positioned like this before rigor mortis set in, indicating that some sort of intentional burial procedure had taken place. The average **Neanderthal** man was about 5ft 5ins tall, compared to an average female height of 5ft. 'Paloma', however, was much shorter than this.

What sort of lives did these very early inhabitants of the Murcia region live? Classically, **Neanderthals** have been seen as being primitive, cave-dwelling, unintelligent brutes. In reality, the situation was almost certainly very different. Although the **Neanderthals** of **Sima de las Palomas** lived in a cave, they had already mastered the art of creating fire

and building cave hearths. Neanderthals were also prolific makers and users of stone tools. They could weave and make simple clothes and these ancient pre-historic human inhabitants of Murcia certainly fished in the Mediterranean. In addition, they could store, boil, roast and smoke food and they were enthusiastic eaters of plants. Some plants were also used for medicinal purposes in order to treat burns and other injuries. These Iberian cave dwellers needed sealants for waterproofing and a variety of other purposes and found tar, derived from birch bark, to be the ideal solution. Neanderthals in Torre Pacheco and elsewhere, were the apex predators of their time, at the absolute pinnacle of the food chain, but they still had to compete for food with other predators such as cave bears.

The **Neanderthal** lifestyle in the caves of Torre Pacheco was certainly busy, hard and stressful. As a consequence, this early sub-species of homo-sapiens didn't live long and probably something like 80% of all **Neanderthals** were dead before the age of 40.


What did these very early Murciandwelling **Neanderthals** look like? Perhaps surprisingly, the average **Neanderthal** male and female had a much larger braincase than the average modern human. Generally speaking, the **Neanderthals** of Sima de las Palomas had robust physiques and shorter limbs than modern humans. They also possessed enlarged noses, (compared to the average modern human), which were useful to warm inhaled air and had specialised body fat storage. At various stages in **Neanderthal** history, interaction and interbreeding with stillevolving more modern-looking humans definitely seems to have occurred. As a result, approximately 20% of distinctly Neanderthal gene variants survive in the world to this day. It would seem, therefore, that there might be just a touch of the Neanderthal in all of us!

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

# **Blue Flag Beaches 2023**

#### Unbeaten Beaches by Think Spain

Spain has never failed to be the country with the most blue flags since 1987 - quite an achievement, considering it competes against established beach tourism destinations that multiply in size and length of coast, such as Brazil and México and, in the case of Australia and the USA, countries larger in land-mass than the entire continent of Europe. Blue flags are also awarded to ports and yacht marinas.

15% of all blue-flagged beaches are in Spain - one in every 6.7 - with Greece and Turkey coming 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>.

with the longest coastlines will have the most blue-flagged beaches – but that's not necessarily the case. Whilst the southernmost mainland region of Andalucía has more coastal provinces than any other - Almería, Granada, Málaga, Cádiz and Huelva - its flag total for this year, 148, comes second to that of the Comunidad Valenciana, with 153. The latter, with three provinces, all bordering the Mediterranean, is habitually the region with the most blue flags and the southernmost of these provinces, **Alicante**, always holds the most in the Comunidad Valenciana. Alicante is the province with the most blue-flagged beaches in Spain - 69 this year including Playa El Postiguet.

rising every year - but they are also the beaches whose kite marks are most under threat. With the ongoing drought, rivers and lakes are at risk of drying up, or their levels falling well below average. If that happens, any beaches along their shores will lose their blue flags, however impeccable they may otherwise be. As rivers and lakes can dry up very quickly at any point in summer, landlocked beaches are inspected throughout the season, meaning their flags can be withdrawn there and then.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> highest totals are not where you might expect, though. Whilst the traditional Costas and islands are the Spanish beach destinations most often found in travel agents' windows and websites in northern Europe, the most blue-flagged beaches in the country after Alicante are in the province of Pontevedra, in the far north-western region of Galicia. Just north of Pontevedra, the Galicia province of A Coruña has the fourthhighest total of blue flags in Spain, with 37 - the province of Málaga, whose coast is known as the **Costa del Sol**, has just two more than A Coruña, with 39. The province with the highest percentage of its beaches bearing blue flags is at least a two-hour drive from the nearest sea - which happens to be abroad. Badajoz, in the land-locked western region of Extremadura, boasts eight blueflagged inland beaches out of a total of 12, despite its closest coastal beach being in Portugal.

# Climate Change Risk To Blue-Flagged

Non-coastal beaches are gaining in popularity, number and fame, with their blue flag total



Coastal beaches, when awarded blue flags, keep these until the following spring, when their local councils reapply if they wish to, but inland waterways may not retain their kite marks for that long. Climate change is a constant potential barrier to blue flags. Floods, storms and similar extreme weather phenomena are far more frequent nowadays and the damage to beaches is notable. Coastal erosion is aggravated by excessive building development, leading many towns, provinces and entire regions to pass laws blocking planning permission for areas within a given distance of the shore.

#### Protecting Seas Against Erosion And **Drought**

These factors - natural and man-made - are taking their toll on dunes and sea life, especially the Posidonia Oceanica Meadows at the bottom of the Mediterranean. This marine plant, otherwise known as Neptune Grass, acts as a vital oxygen supply for the sea water, eating up carbon dioxide and keeping fish alive.

# Spanish Fiestas in June

# Spanish Fiestas in June

June is one of the most popular months for fiestas in Spain, with many cities and towns celebrating their patron saints or historical events.



Corpus Christi in Toledo is celebrated with the procession of the Blessed Sacrament through the streets, accompanied by folk music and dance. This religious festival celebrates the presence of Christ in the Eucharist and is held 60 days after Easter Sunday. Many towns and cities such as Sitges, Ponteareas and San Cristóbal de la Laguna decorate their streets with carpets of flowers and natural tapestries for the occasion. Toledo hosts one of the most important and solemn processions, with a rich display of art and culture. Celebrations started on 29th May and will continue until 11th June.



La Patum de Berga is a traditional Catalan folk festival held from 19th to 23rd June. It depicts the conflict between good and evil and is symbolised by parades of enormous figures, fire-breathing dragons, devils and other mythical creatures. This festival has a history dating back to the Middle Ages, and has been recognised by UNESCO as a Masterpiece of Intangible Heritage.



Noche de San Juan, the night of Saint John the Baptist is celebrated on 23rd June all over Spain, especially in coastal areas. It marks the arrival of summer and the longest day of the year. People light bonfires on the beaches and jump over them three times for good luck and throw objects into the fire to burn away their troubles or make wishes for the new season. Some places have fireworks, concerts and parties until dawn.

This ancient pagan festival is now legendary for its all-night-long parties on the beach, dance and fun. The night is all about fire and water, where young and old congregate to build fires and enjoy the night. According to tradition to be cleansed and purified you must jump over the fire three times. In El Rocio, decorated horse and carts are beautifully and lovingly prepared in bright colours and flowers with the pilgrims dressing in traditional gypsyinspired flamenco dresses and the men in their short-cropped jackets (Andalucian

style) and unique wide-brimmed bolero hats.

The highlight of the festival is when the Virgen del Rocio (a large silver shrine) is taken from the Church in all her splendour.

Burgos celebrates the **Fiestas de San Pedro y San Pablo**, in honour of the city's patron saints from 24th June until Sunday 3rd July 3, which corresponds to the Day of the Absent Burgos. There will be nights of humour and theatre, free and paid concerts and children's activities.



The Hogueras de San Juan in Alicante is celebrated with huge sculptures made out of wood and paper which are set ablaze on the night of San Juan. From 25th to 29th June, this peculiar festival of fire sees fireworks launched from Playa del Postiguet at midnight. The popular Medieval Market and other cultural shows are held and people gather on the beach to dine, bathe and enjoy the fireworks.

La Batalla del Vino de Haro in the La Rioja region known for its wine production is celebrated on 29th June. Thousands of people congregate near the town and use buckets, bottles, water guns, or any other object to throw wine at one another. A feast and entertainment are held in the town square after the battle.





Two of the most spectacular planets in the solar system, Saturn and Jupiter, will be visible and observable through a telescope just before sunrise. Summer is the richest time for astronomical observations, so don't wait; get your family and friends together and follow the stars!



Just as the sun goes down and the last light disappears below the horizon, our eyes are drawn to the magnificent patterns of zodiacal Lyra, Scorpio and Sagittarius and right there with them are Aquila and Cygnus, spreading their wings broadly across the sky.

Aquila, Latin for eagle, is a bird who carried Zeus's/Jupiter's thunderbolts in Greek and Roman mythology. Within the constellation, we can easily spot Altair, its brightest star, which creates the top of the Summer Triangle.

The beautiful Swan, known as the Cygnus constellation, is the most recognizable one



The 21<sup>st</sup> June brings us the Summer Solstice and the longest day of the year (Wednesday), which is closely followed by St John's Eve (Noche de San Juan) on Friday the 23<sup>rd</sup>, a festivity greatly celebrated in Spain, mostly with a bonfire and definitely



On Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June **Astrology Tours** will be hosting a Noche de San Juan event. They have the glamping houses ready now, so it is possible to stay the night and then have the planets' observations in the morning.



From time to time when we are out and about looking for somewhere to fly, we say to ourselves "Now THIS is good" and that phrase certainly came to everyone when the **Spanish Drone Seekers Group** visited Calasparra to film in and around the Train Station and the Weir on the River Segura, not too far away from the Station.

In bright sunshine the group of 9 met at the Arrocería Y Brasas Titanium on the Santuario de la Esperanza road, for a fly day and social get together with lunch at this traditional bar – very popular with Spanish and English locals. 2 of the group had been staying for a few days at the local Camp Site exploring and enjoying the peace and quiet of the area. Whilst waiting for the rest of the group, the campers and I made an early visit to the bar for a morning coffee. Caffeine hit sorted we joined the rest of the group outside who had obviously arrived whilst we were chatting over our coffees!

The group of 9 consisted of 3 FPV (First Person View) Pilots, 3 Camera Drone Pilots & 3 Spottters. The spotters were there to abide by the guidance rules when flying. Their presence ensures the visual sight of the Drones, as FPV Drones are normally flown wearing goggles, whilst Camera Drone Pilots are looking down at a mobile screen. These Spotters ensure a safe flying environment and for any members of the public who happen to venture into the flying area.

3 cars set off for the 10 minute drive to the Station, but a Guardia Police Check Point at one of the roundabouts stopped the last car in the convoy. No illicit goods, people or other items were found (surprisingly) and they arrived 10 minutes later at the station for flying.

Everyone soon set up their Drones and were flying up, in and around the station. The train lines proved quite popular, especially at low level - only the brave - and a few of the Pilots ventured to the tunnel for a fly-through, or hesitated and stayed at the entrance. One FPV Drone managed a trip through the Tunnel - no GPS signal, but at the other end just stopped and hovered (a safety feature) waiting to be connected to the Controller. An ambitious and chancy flight which worked out well – see the video on You Tube. One of our lady pilots Baq Paq Jaq, made an amazing video of the day which can be found at https://www.youtube. com/watch?v=WtGaXMlzvTs&t=82s

It is a spectacular place with various buildings, sidings and trees to make some interesting flying, or just to walk around to imagine what the Station would have been like in its heyday. The tracks from Cieza to Albacete are due to be removed for a Via Verde, though I understand there is some resistance to this happening from Calasparra to Albacete. Work is nearly finished between Cieza and the road

bridge over the RM 714 to and from the A30, Calasparra/Caravaca de la Cruz road. After a few hours, with lots of filming completed, we packed up and moved down to the weir. Overnight the flood gates had been opened to let the water flow into the Rice fields. Water depth is controlled up to 7-8cm before the sowing in early May. The rice is all planted by hand and will be cultivated in October.



There was plenty of space for all the flyers to find their own space and do their filming. Some high-level flying took place with amazing videos of the rice fields from up to 200 feet and low level over the weir and along the river itself. The length of these particular rice fields is 2.5km and during late Summer, the Town Hall organise Walks and Mountain Bike Rides to the area on well graded paths around the outside of the fields and next to the River Segura.



It was a lovely sunny and warm day which someone who shall remain nameless decided to cool off – no not skinny dipping, but just the footwear came off dipping his

feet into the cooling water. The smile said it all! As a lunch of Paella was calling, we put away the Drones and ancillary equipment and headed back to the Titanium for an enormous Paella – not exactly to feed the 5,000, but enough to keep away any hunger until later in the day.

8<sup>th</sup> May we ventured to the Mazarrón Mines again where 6 flyers met up to re-explore this amazing landscape. As we have reported on this in previous issues with photos, we will pass on any reporting on this visit, but needless to say there a few photos of the day on the **Drone Seekers** Facebook Group page.

Thursday 11th May was a trip to the Embalse de la Cierva in Mula. Many road users on the RM15 to and from Murcia will have seen this amazing reservoir as they drive on a viaduct which passes alongside. The colours are spectacular when the sun shines on it, due to the mineral content of the water. 7 flyers met up, including Steve G who had flown in from the UK on a break to enjoy a bit of sunshine. Whilst it is always a bit risky flying over water, we all managed a fly over the Embalse to grab some great videos of the area. Loss of a Drone in water is not nice as a few of the group can verify! Having spent a few hours flying and chatting, it was time to go and experience BBQ Terry and his amazing Bacon, Egg & Mushroom Butties. Harvey's Rolls soon got filled and eaten with enough for seconds. Rick brought along some Parkin and Muffins as a treat. There is a short video taken of the day at: https://youtu.be/simZqHMDNso

## SAMM Sailing Association Mar Menor

CONTRACTOR DESCRIPTION OF STREET



First equipment failures on four of the five boats that registered for the SAMM Racing on April 16th and the 15 knot ENE wind failed to drop off to 10 knots as forecast, but fluctuated between 9-15 knots all day which was challenging. Luckily, at Los Narejos, it was coming partly from across the land so at least the 0.7 metre high waves did not materialise.

At the start of the first race, two of the boats competing did not hear the start signals because they had sailed too far from the line. Vision had an engine bolt, main halyard and another problem so did not start. Ginetta crossed after 5 minutes, closely followed by Uno, Cuatro and Sirocco. These four had a close battle, especially Uno and Ginetta, until Uno's jib tore and Cuatro's jib halyard snapped so she had to continue on reefed main alone. On the 3rd lap, Sirocco's upper rudder pintle screws sheared so she had to retire, so only three boats completed the race, all managing five laps in the hour.

During the interval **Ginetta**, who's crew confessed to narrowly avoiding T-boning the moored ferry before the start, changed helm, only for Julian to hit the jetty. Luckily it was a glancing blow so no major damage, except to Julian's reputation. This left three boats to start the second race. Ginetta across first, closely followed by Cuatro. Uno had gone ashore to fix the sail and shake out the reef in the mainsail so started 10 minutes late. Her crew sailed well and she completed 6 laps to finish only 3 minutes behind Ginetta. The Cuatro crew mistook the 'about to finish' signal for their finish horn so did not complete the race, so a disappointing finish to a

problem-filled day.

Can the car wait another week for a wash?

All is well in the **Rainbow** house except we lost one of our dogs to cancer last week. **Tasi** (the Tasmanian Devil) was with us from a puppy, but the dreaded cancer got her. Yes it is hard when you lose one of your pets.

#### TV News

Satellite signals are going into their summer low values, so on top of the changes outlined last month, TV watching by satellite is now very limited in Southern Spain. There is no magical answer - we are continually asked to come and adjust the dish to get the channels back, but it is simply not possible. It is not dish alignment or even dish size. Many channels are simply not available here anymore on satellite. If you are 'struggling' along with your satellite system, please be aware that the best LNB most have on their dishes is no longer made and just unavailable - the only one on the market to fit the prime focus dishes we use is really inferior in reception quality to the original old Invacom - the best ever made. Do not follow the Facebook advice

and dig around in the LNB hole to remove the insect and regain signal. One; you will not regain signal and two; you will almost certainly damage the receptor pins ruining the LNB, with no quality replacement available. If you have absolutely no satellite signal you have a problem, but our 35€ call-out fee can be money so well spent – it will remove the insect and nest without damaging the LNB.

Fed up with just the few satellite channels available now – and soon to be none!? IPTV - TV over the internet - is now the way to view UK TV in Southern Spain. You will need stable internet of 10MBS plus, (most is these days), but it really is the way to watch TV. It will be the only way within a few years. It is an industry really in its infancy and there have certainly been some disasters – still some around! Have you tried it and been disappointed? Give the **Rainbow** system a try and see what it is all about. We offer a free no-obligation demonstration and the loan of a box for up

to a week so that you can fully assess the system before you commit to a purchase. We have a full range of channels, catchup TV, a huge film and box set library along with radio. Give it a try and if you do take it up after the week we can offer a 12 month subscription for the price of 11 – ask for 'offerJune 23'.

We do get asked about the Elon Musk 'Starlink' internet service - literally thousands of low orbit satellites. It works and it is very good - minimum 100mbs. It works anywhere worldwide. However, the equipment is expensive - €450 self install (but it is quite easy) and the subscription in the region of 80€

per month. If you have fibre available in your street it is not for you, but if you are in the 'middle of nowhere', it really is an option. For a business it is not so expensive – for an individual – well it depends on how much you want decent internet. I expect it is not officially allowed (but who will know), but two or three houses in close proximity could share – more than enough band width.

That's it for June - another edition in July 2023.
