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
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Past Simple - short text and comments

¿Qué hiciste ayer?

What did you do yesterday?

Well, it would be extraordinary if any of us had a day which allowed us to use all the verbs we've learnt in the Past Simple, but I will do my best.

Ayer me desperté a las siete como siempre. Era un día de trabajo y tuve que levantarme para llevar a mis hijos al instituto. No pude despertar a la menor enseguida porque dormía muy profundamente y no quiso levantarse. Mi otra hija se levantó con más facilidad y se fue a la cocina para desayunar. Yo me duché, me vestí v desayuné también y después fuimos en coche al instituto, llegando justo a tiempo.

Al volver a casa leí mi correo electrónico y los titulares de los periódicos en Internet. Hablé con dos o tres personas por teléfono y tomé un té con leche al estilo inglés. Después de varias otras tareas domesticas y profesionales, como poner la lavadora

y preparar fotocopias, cogí mis cosas y me fui a trabajar en Torrevieja.

Después del trabajo comí también en Torrevieja y me relajé un poco. Por la tarde hice las compras y al volver a casa guardé todo en la cocina. Mi hija me llamó para decirme donde estaba y luego me senté otra vez con el ordenador a trabajar. Más tarde salí para hacer algunos recados y después de cenar en casa vi mi programa favorito en la tele. Me acosté sobre las doce y me dormí enseguida.

Well I managed to get quite a few verbs in, but tried to keep it simple and fairly natural at the same time which is actually not very easy. If you read through the text carefully and look at the verbs in detail, as well as just getting the general meaning, you may notice one or two things of interest:

Firstly, in real life we tend to mix the two past tenses (remember we did the Past Continuous Tense before) and these two time concepts inter-relate. For example:

No <u>pude</u> despertar a la menor enseguida porque dormía

profundamente.

Here there is a prolonged activity of sleeping, interrupted by my single action to trying (and not being able) to wake her up - hence two different verb tenses are

Mi hija me llamó para decirme donde estaba.

She was in a place for some period of time and phoned me on one occasion to tell me.

Another thing which is part of natural speech and which I explained right at the beginning of these articles, is that we very often revert to using verbs in the Infinitive; that is in their base form without making any ending changes. This happens far more often than most Spanish courses will have you believe. In fact I have just counted twelve examples of Infinitive verbs in this text and I was actually making a conscious effort to avoid them and use past tenses.

I think there might be some more food for thought for you there. I will provide a translation and more comments next month. See you then.

Birding in Murcia

Ecuador

We have just arrived in **Ecuador** to what, I hope, will be our holiday of a lifetime. It is based on experiencing nature and we will visit the Andes, the Amazon and of course the Galapagos Islands. I remember as a kid reading wonderful stories of Charles Darwin, HMS Beagle and the natural history of these magical islands. It is something that excited me from an early age and I never did think that one day I would be able to visit this country and the Galapagos Islands

After a long and tiring journey we arrived in Quito, the capital of Ecuador, which at 9,350ft, is the second highest capital of the world. We stayed nearby that night to recover a little bit of lost sleep. The next day our nature guide picked us up for a leisurely drive to our lodge at Guango (8,500ft) via the high pass of Papallacta at 13,500ft. I have to say that any thoughts about being relatively fit soon disappeared as both of us struggled for breath after very little physical effort. Our first two guides, Edwin and Mauricio, inadvertently reminded us how difficult the pandemic was for people in less economically developed countries. Clearly tourism stopped abruptly when the pandemic hit town. They were both self-employed and their incomes dried up immediately. In Ecuador there was no state help and they were left without any means of support. They both moved out of the city and moved back to their home towns in the countryside where life was much cheaper.

Edwin lived for two months in his car, then contracted COVID and was at death's door. If he wanted to survive he would have to use private medical care as there was no public hospital available. Although his family were willing to pay the 60,000 dollars needed for his treatment, he refused the help as his family would have had to work at least one lifetime to re-pay the debt. Fortunately (Edwin described it as a miracle), an altruistic doctor took him under his wing and treated him for a fraction of the price. Over a year later, Edwin still has health problems, but he is alive and with a far smaller and more manageable debt.

Mauricio returned to his village in the jungle and lived a simple and frugal life in a cabin without running water and electricity. During the pandemic he built himself two large pools and started a fish farm. Due to his initiative he survived the pandemic and has returned to his nature guiding with body and mind intact.

It certainly made us think how difficult it was for many people around the world and how lucky we have been in the last few years.

At the eco-lodges we have stayed in there are terraces with feeders for

Hummingbirds. I understand that there are an incredible 152 different species in Ecuador and it is hard to comprehend this incredible diversity. It is amazing to sit quietly on a terrace watching the Hummingbirds coming and going at what seems like the speed of light. They are incredibly fast and very confident in their abilities to avoid the dangers of clumsy and slow-moving human beings. Consequently, they are quite happy and totally unconcerned if you approach within a foot of them. It has been an amazing experience!

We are currently like beginners, as the birds we are seeing, (and missing), are completely new to us, both in looks and songs. It has been a godsend to be accompanied by a professional bird-guide on all our excursions. Considering their knowledge and field craft, the amount they earn is relatively small and exceptionally good value. We have certainly seen far more birds and learnt so much more than we would have by ourselves. I would strongly recommend that you organise something similar if you are lucky enough to visit the area.

Each morning we set the alarm at 5.45am and went to the lodges for a wake-up coffee. We then went to the terraces where a light had been left on overnight to attract moths to a screen. I thought it was for moth lovers, but not so. It was for providing avian breakfasts! It was an unforgettable experience to watch these jungle birds coming to feast on the moths. Often they were birds that normally live and feed in the jungle canopy and are difficult to see. The birds seem to fall into two categories, either LBJ's (little brown jobs) or extremely bright and colourful. I knew it was going to be difficult to see any bird in the first category, but I was stunned to discover it was equally true of the bright and colourful ones. How do they manage to hide in full sight!?

The eco-lodges with their private nature reserves are a real help for visitors as

they have learned over the years how to manage the reserves sympathetically for nature, but still give their paying guests an opportunity to view the wildlife and walk the jungle trails. I'm sure that our trip has been enhanced by thoughtful management and viewing facilities.

Guango lodge is at 9,350ft above sea level and our next port of call, Cabañas San Isidro was at roughly 6,200ft above sea level. Our current location at Wild Sumaco is still lower at 3,600ft. The altitude is rather important, as the habitat and birdlife changes as you descend from the high Andes.

We had seen a few hundred different species of birds by now, which is too many to mention here, so I will just highlight a few that have caught my eye. The first one, is a quite large

and very colourful bird called a **Masked Trogon** (*Trogon Personates*). There are twelve different species of **Trogon** in the country and they are all very colourful. It is fairly common at San Isidro where it lives in the mid-altitude rain forests. It eats fruit and insects and excavates a nest hole in decaying trees. The male is very brightly coloured, whereas the female being true to her avian gender, is mainly brown and much less noticeable.

Rather common, but very photogenic birds are the **Green Jays** (Cyanocorax Luxuosos) that tend to travel around the jungle mobhanded.

They are very gregarious and quite bolshy when a juicy moth makes an appearance close by. At higher altitudes they are joined by gangs of **Turquoise Jays** (*Cyanolyca Turcos*) that, along with their close cousins, provide a stunning kaleidoscope of colour.

At Guango, we went down to the river in the bottom of the valley. I say river, but it was really a raging torrent with spectacular white water rapids. It was fascinating just to watch the water, but we really came to

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


find a rare duck called a Torrent Duck (Merganetta Armada). The name really says it all as it lives and feeds in the rapids of the river. It is quite a sight to see it swimming upriver! I can't imagine how the young ducklings survive the raging waters!

Another very striking and colourful bird that sometimes puts in an appearance at 'bird breakfast' is the bright red male Summer Tanager (Piranga Rubra). It is a North American bird that migrates south to spend the winter here. It tends to be quite solitary, but from time to time there was an aggressive youngster that would try and muscle in for a free meal, but it didn't take long for the alpha male to put him in his place.

A couple of LBJ's also caught my eye. The first being a Streak-Headed Wood-Creeper (Lepidocolaptes Souleyetii) that would start looking for food at the bottom of

a tree trunk and walk upwards looking for insects in the bark, moss lichens that covered the rain forest trees. Although being plain brown tο blend in with its



surroundings, I found this bird subtly attractive.

A bird that looked remarkably like our native **Song Thrush** would turn up sporadically and see what all the fuss was about. It looked slightly different from our Song Thrush and it turned out to be a Swainson's Thrush (Catharus Ustulatus). It is a North American species that breeds in higher altitude woodlands and is quite shy, so it was proving a popular sighting for our American friends. I was particularly pleased to see it, as it is a rare vagrant to the UK; a bird I have never previously

At Wild Sumaco, we were escorted by a laid-back young man called Byron, who was a professional bird-guide who still had to pass his English exam. He needed to pass his English to qualify as a professional English-speaking bird guide. However, he had passed his birding exams and his birding skills were spot on. Although, many people spoke English we communicated all the time in Spanish as it made life easier for our hosts.

It turned out that over the years Byron

had been feeding a very shy, forest floor dwelling LBJ called a Rufous Antpitta (Grallaria Rufula). It was the smallest of the plain antpittas to be found in Ecuador and was nicknamed 'Shakira' because of the way it moved its hips! I have to say it was very cute for a LBJ. The other strange thing is that it was extremely good at telling the time! If you turned up to its feeding place a minute early it wasn't there and if you were ten minutes late it was gone!

Byron also managed to find a lone Blue and Yellow Macaw (Are Ararauna) perched on a tree a huge distance w a y even and managed to take a photo

on my mobile phone using his telescope. I was very impressed!

Oops, nearly forgot the **Andean** Cock of the **Rock** (Rupicola Peruvians). How could I forget such colourful emblematic bird! I sort of

remember collecting cards of the birds of South America when mum bought Tetley's Tea (I think). The cards were free and you could write to Tetley's for a booklet to put them in. The **Cock of the Rock** was the only card that I can now remember, probably because it was so colourful. Now I've actually seen a real one in the jungle in Ecuador! Wow!

Next month I will tell you about our trip to Napo Wildlife Centre in the Amazon rain forest.

DID YOU KNOW?



Easter

Did you know that **Easter** is mentioned only once in the King James version of scriptures?

Why was it never mentioned in any other version?

Is **Easter** really a feast to be kept by Christians?

Where did **Easter** originate?

Why is **Easter** so popular all over the world and how did it enter the Church?

Let us take a closer look and examine the facts about **Easter**:

The origin of the word **Easter** is connected to the word 'east' which is the direction of the sunrise or new beginnings. It is linked to the changing of the season. The Latin and Greek word 'Pascha' (in scripture it is Passover) provides the root for 'Paques', the French word for **Easter**. The word **Easter** is the English name. Just like **Christmas**, Christians adopted pagan names and holidays for their festivals. **Easter** is a major holiday today, but none of the early apostles or Christians celebrated **Easter** in remembrance of Yeshua's (Jesus') resurrection.

Easter Bunnies came through pagan celebrations or beliefs and represents new birth and spring fertility. The ancient rabbit represented the moon. The moon was used to determine the date for **Easter**. The sweets for **Easter** became popular in America in the 18th or 19th Century by Germans.

Easter Eggs go back to ancient cultures. The eggs were painted, which meant joy and symbolised life. Hindu, Egypt, Persia, Phoenicia, all believed the world began with an enormous egg. The Chinese, Persians and Greeks gave gifts of eggs during this spring festival to celebrate new life. Christians adopted the tradition of the red painted egg, representing new life in celebration of Yeshua's (Jesus) resurrection and his blood.

Easter is another name for Astarte (or Ashtoreth in Hebrew), a title of the Chaldean goddess, the *Queen of Heaven*. Astarte is mentioned in several books in scripture. In Jeremiah chapter 7, verse 18 states "The children gather wood and the fathers kindle the fire and the women kneed their dough

to make cakes to the Queen of Heaven and to pour out drink offerings unto other gods, that they may provoke me to anger."

In Jeremiah chapter 44, verses 17-19 it says "But we shall surely do whatsoever thing goeth forth out of our mouth, to burn incense unto the Queen of Heaven and to pour out drink offerings unto her, as we have done, our fathers, our kings and our princes, in the cities of Judah and in the streets of Jerusalem: for then had we plenty of victuals and were well and saw no evil, but since we left off to burn incense to the Queen of Heaven and to pour out drink offerings unto her, we have wanted all things and have been consumed by the sword and by famine. When we burned incense to the Queen of Heaven and poured out drink offerings unto her, did we make her cakes to worship her...."

In 1st Kings chapter 11, verse 5 quotes "For Solomon went after Ashtoreth the goddess of the Zidonians and after Milcom the abomination of the Ammonites." 2nd Kings chapter 23, verse 13 states "And the high places that were before Jerusalem, which were on the right hand of the mount of corruption, which Solomon the King of Israel had built for Ashtoreth the abomination of the Zidonians and for Chemosh the abomination of the Moabites and for Milcom the abomination of the children of Ammon, did the king defile." Also in 1st Kings chapter 11, verse 33 explains "Because that they have forsaken me and have worshipped Ashtoreth the goddess of the Zidonians, Chemosh the god of the Moabites and Milcom the god of the children of Ammon and have not walked in my ways, to do that which is right in mine eyes and to keep my statutes and my judgements, as did David his father."

Emporer Constantine wanted to separate Christianity from Judaism. He did not want Easter to be celebrated on the Jewish Passover. The council of Nicea requested that the feast of the resurrection of Yeshua (Jesus) to be celebrated on a Sunday and not on the Passover. In 325 the council of Nicea decreed that Easter should be observed on the 1st Sunday following the first full moon after the Spring Equinox. Easter can fall between 22nd March and 25th April. The Orthodox Churches

celebrate **Easter** at a later date from the Roman Catholics and Protestants, hence the scriptural Passover was replaced with **Easter**.

Easter is mentioned once and that is in the King James version only, in the book of Acts chapter 12, verses 1-4. It states "Now about the time of Herod the King

stretched forth his hands to vex certain of the Church and he killed James the brother of John with the sword and because he saw it pleased the Jews, he proceeded further to take Peter also. (Then were the days of unleavened bread). When he had apprehended him, he put him in prison and delivered him to four quaternions of soldiers to keep him, intending after Easter to bring him forth to the people."

In another version it clearly states in Acts chapter 12, verses 1-4 "But at that time, King Herod was laying hands on the people who were in the Churches, to do evil to them and he murdered James the brother of John with the sword. When he saw this pleased the Judeans, he proceeded to seize also Peter and they were the days of Passover/Unleavened bread. He arrested him and cast him into prison and delivered him unto sixteen Soldiers to guard him so that after Passover he would deliver him to the people of Judea."

The Roman government viewed Christians as just another branch of Judaism (they shared the same scriptural feast days). Christians observed the scriptural feasts according to the teachings of Jesus and his apostles, but due to revolts against the Roman Empire, there was widespread **persecution** aimed at the Jews (Judeans). Many were banned from Jerusalem. As a result many Christians disassociated themselves from the faith which was once delivered to them. Scriptural teachings were exchanged for man-made decrees. For example, the weekly Sabbath day of rest in exchange for worship on Sunday, the pagan day of the sun. They also abandoned the Passover and adopted **Easter** instead. Christians adopted these changes to escape persecution.

To conclude, the **Easter** festival mixes Christian belief with pagan practices, which is forbidden in scripture. Revelation chapter 14, verse 6 says "And I saw another angel fly in the midst of heaven, having the everlasting gospel to preach unto them that dwell on the earth and to every nation, kindred, tongue and people, saying with a loud voice, "Fear God and give glory to him, for the hour of his judgement is come: and worship him that made heaven and earth and the sea and the fountains of waters." Deuteronomy chapter 11, verse 13 says "and it shall come to pass, if ye shall hearken diligently unto my commandments which I command you this day, to love the Lord your God and to serve him with all your heart and with all your soul."

I hope you have learned more about the scriptures. Next time I will look at the Trinity.

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

Unfortunately at the moment Shaun has had to cancel the outings as he is due a hip operation in the next couple of months and then he will have to recover. Once he is up again walking, the outings will start again later this year; hopefully by the summer. In the meantime, he will be posting some interesting locations, not far from Camposol that you can visit. We wish Shaun all the best and a speedy recovery.

El Cabezo del Plomo

This area is not far from Camposol; about a 15 minute drive or 43 minute bike ride, Google Sat-Nav 'Yacimiento arqueologico Cabezo del Plomo'.



There is no car park, but you can park your car on the side of the road leading up to the site. There is an information board at the bottom of the hill. The walk up is steep, but on a concrete road and whilst walking up you can stop and admire the views looking towards Puerto de Mazarrón. It was a fortified town on a plateau, on the Sierra de Moreras which dates back to the 4th Millennium to the mid-third Millennium BC. Plenty of information boards tell you about how these people lived here. You will notice a wall that has been restored to give you some idea how it looked, defending the town from invaders on the south west of the town. They have also built a replica hut to give you some idea what they would have looked like. Dotted around are the circular homes and markings where the homes would have been built with rock



You can see why they picked this location, as it is so high up with views looking towards Puerto de Mazarrón, along the Mediterranean coast towards Bolnuevo and behind towards Mazarrón Town.

We have a trained nurse at every meeting as well as skilled and compassionate volunteers. Forget Me Not 'Cares for the Carer' and knows how valuable our sessions are, freeing up quality time for the carer who is constantly

in demand I o o k i n g after their I o v e d o n e 's e v e r y n e e d . At our meetings we provide tea, coffee a n d biscuits and a free



lunch for clients. **Forget Me Not** is proud to always be there for the carer with help, advice or just a sympathetic ear.

During our twice-weekly sessions we have some music playing in the background. The power of music is pretty incredible to evoke memories and our client's are often able to recall the name of the song, the artiste and often the film it may have featured in. The lyrics may also be recognised, creating a singalong which can uplift the mood and enjoyment of the group.

We enjoy regular musical entertainment provided by our local professional artistes and community groups, including the Ukulele

band and the Singalong group. We all enjoy an eclectic mix of music which has shown to soothe, stimulate



and bring to mind long-forgotten memories. The power of music, especially singing, can unlock memories and recall of a certain time, event or moment in a person's life. This may prompt a conversation as the long-lost happy memory is recalled and shared. It

has been shown that even a person with no communication can still engage and enjoy music. Studies have shown that playing songs that were popular when the client was younger, (between the ages of 18 and 25) can bring back positive memories. This is generally a very carefree, joyous time of life when socialisation is a key component to many lifestyles. Recently, singer Tony Christie spoke of his positive approach to life following his dementia diagnosis, 79 year old Christie said that he first realised something was wrong when he struggled to complete a crossword, so his wife suggested getting checked over. This was two years ago and Christie has continued working, with a tour planned for this year. To quote Christie, he said "Music, I found out, is part of the cure for dementia, so every time I go on stage and work it is helping me.'

Town Hall Meeting - 8th February 2023

A packed Mariano's heard the Mayor update residents on the Council's current and future proposals for Camposol. In attendance were the Mayor, Gines Campillo (councillor) and the Council's lawyer supported by Silvana Buxton who led the meeting and acted as translator.

The good news is that residents' priorities were recognised, with only some outcomes and definitive timelines outlined. These included:

Confirmation that 12 police officers are completing their training and that once qualified, the council would hopefully be able to reinstate regular police patrols on Camposol. However, there was no commitment to establishing a permanent police presence.

Better news on street lighting with work commencing on the worst affected roads expected in March with the remainder of street lighting completed by the end of the year. Of course this does not include internal street lighting in Poligonos (sectors). This is the responsibility of residents and an explanation on the role of Community of Owners (COOs) was given by Silvana Buxton (more later).

A decision on the route for the Rambla will be discussed at the 'round table' meeting being held in March to progress the decision. Our understanding is that the preferred route will follow Calle Babinas and not impact on residential areas.

The council is committed to replace the current bridge linking Camposol B with sectors C and D with a new bridge, linking Avenida de Los Covachos from B directly with Avenida de Covachos on C and D

The Mayor gave the meeting absolute assurance that no villas on the Rambla, essentially the roads around Calle Piteras and Calle Nogales would not be demolished.

Creation of an entity

Those attending the meeting may not have recognised the importance of the Mayor's statement and lawyers' explanation on the Justo y Manoli Bond and the creation of a Cooperation Entity for the entire urbanisation of Camposol.

Firstly, the bond of €2.9 million awarded by the court to Mazarrón Council has to be spent towards the completion of the urbanisation. To this end the Council is proposing to undertake the role of Developer, using the funds in accordance with the order of the court. This will require the creation of a Cooperation Entity, with residents being informed of progress by notifications on a special page on the council website www.Mazarron.es
This should be considered as good news for Camposol as it shows a recognition by the Council of the importance of it and the need to complete some of the works necessary to improve the environment for residents.

This does not however negate the need for the creation of COO's; in fact it makes it even more important to do so. The creation of COO's will enable them to have direct access to the Entity and its decisions. At the moment the residents of Camposol are suffering from not being able to talk to and influence decision makers. Camposol needs its homeowners to have more say in what happens in the urbanisation through the voice of the COO's. Please see the 2025 FaceBook page and other social media sites for further information on the creation of COO's. Camposol 2025 focuses on identifying, coordinating and delivering change projects for the community. It is not another association. It is a team of volunteers who want Camposol to develop and flourish.

Are you new to Camposol?

Do you know what **FAST** is and what **FAST** Responders do?

It is apparent from talking to members of the public that we have some way to go before we can all say "Yes" to the latter two questions.



FAST is Camposol's First Aid Support Team. The team was set up over ten years ago when finding the location of properties on Camposol was a major problem for the emergency services since many of the roads were unmarked and un-mapped. Whilst this has changed significantly and our ambulances arrive (in the vast majority of cases) in good time, the period between the emergency call being made and ambulance arriving is now recognised as a potentially critical period. FAST exists to

bridge that gap.

All **FAST** Responders are qualified in first aid and certified by the European Resuscitation Council, EMS and Murcia Health and can administer cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and use an automatic defibrillator. They are also trained to recognise and assist in other lifesaving procedures such as stemming catastrophic bleeds and maintenance of an effective airway. Whilst we are not able to diagnose, we can offer reassurance and advice at a time when even the calmest person is reduced to panic.

To access FAST services you merely need to call us on 868 487 015 after you have called 112 (the emergency number in Spain). **FAST** services are completely free of charge and are available for everyone on Camposol regardless of language, country of origin, race, gender etc. The only current restriction we have on our service is that it can only be offered within the Camposol/El Saladillo area – you may just be visiting or shopping in the area. We are NOT just available for British people or those who speak English - we do have several non-British Responders who speak German, Dutch, Flemish, French, Spanish and Swedish. We would love to increase the number of non-British Responders (as well as recruiting additional Brits) to reflect the changing population within Camposol following Brexit. If you are interested in joining FAST as a Responder, please drop

FAST is a unique service in Spain and as such receives no government funding – we are funded entirely by donations and fund raising events organised by our fund raising team or by local businesses. 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




Special Events in Spain During March Las Fallas

Las Fallas in Valencia is visually one of the most spectacular fiestas in Spain. In mid-March, Valencia lights up its streets for an entire week of celebration and parties. With work officially suspended, the city inhabitants make giant papier-maché figures representing notable people as well as traditional figures. These are then displayed in the city during the week of celebration before being burned down one of the most amazing bonfires that bring Las Fallas to an enigmatic end.



Las Fallas was intended to honour San José the patron of the carpenters' guild, where this spectacular tradition arose from. It is an impressive display of huge figures, mostly comical, depicting personalities in Spain. They are made during the year only to be burnt on the last day of the fiesta. The festive week leading up to Las Fallas comes alive with fireworks displays, street performances, performances by local bands and much more. There are well over 100,000 Falleros and Falleras who ensure that these fiestas are an unforgettable experience each year in Valencia.

Jerez Flamenco Festival

For lovers of traditional flamenco and folk music, this is one fiesta not to miss. Jerez comes alive each March with the colour and sounds that only flamenco can do. Singing, dance and guitar music is present on every corner, plaza and street around Jerez giving the town a unique atmosphere.

The golden triangle of flamenco music is said to be located within the city walls of Jerez de la Frontera, Cadiz and the Triana district of Seville.



People arrive from all over the world to take part in the **Jerez Flamenco Festival** and enjoy the historic city, listening and taking part with the very best flamenco guitar players and dancers from all over Andalucia. There are numerous headline shows at the central Vilamarta Theatre and other venues such as the Plaza Romero Martinez and the Palacio de Villavicencio.

The Burial of the Sardine (El Entierro de la Sardina)

This is quite a strange festival in Andalucia that takes place after the carnivals of February have finished. Its true origins are not known, but the theory goes that in the 18th Century, King Carlos III was given some sardines that turned out to be rotten and he immediately ordered them to be buried. This unusual symbolic ritual has been played out ever since in many towns around Andalucia in southern Spain.



Locals dress up in black, some as priests and some as nuns, who carry the sardines through the town for everyone to see. The fish is then either buried or cooked over an open fire on wooden spits.

The festive calendar in Spain is strongly influenced by the Church. In Spain, **Father's Day** is celebrated in honour of Saint Joseph and is a National Holiday. The Saint of all men named José is also celebrated, in addition to those who make the same profession as the

Saint; that of a carpenter.

This holiday is considered of great importance because it recognizes the contribution of parents to the family. It is a way of honouring parents and recognizing their role in the upbringing and education of children. Traditionally, the family gathers for a meal and gifts are offered to the father.



The tradition in the cult of **San José** was slow to gain strength within the Christian world, despite being the chosen father of Jesus. The most probable reason is that originally Christians only worshiped the martyrs and this was not the case with **San José**. At the beginning of the $4^{\rm th}$ Century, the cult of **San José** began to appear among the Copts (Egyptians of Christian faith), appearing on July $20^{\rm th}$ of the Coptic calendar. In the western world the first references to his cult appear in the year 1129. There is a Church dedicated to his name in Bologna (Italy).



Spain Population Hits All-Time High

Recent Census data published by the National Institute of Statistics (INE), puts the number of people registered as resident in Spain on January 1st 2022 at 47,475,420, a historical high, 90,313 more inhabitants compared to the previous year (a 0.19% increase).

This figure represents a recovery from the decline recorded in 2020, a year marked by deaths due to the Covid-19 pandemic. However, the recovery is mainly due to a rise in the foreign population, which increased by 102,784 people to 5,542,932 people and now accounts for 11.7% of the total, a trend that has not been recorded since 2013.

The average age of the population registered in the census is 44.1 years. The average age of Spaniards is 45 years and that of foreigners overall is 37.1 years. The average age of residents from other EU countries is 39.6 years. The highest average ages among the predominant nationalities are found among citizens of the UK (54.1 years), Germany (50.0) and France (43). The lowest ones correspond to citizens of Honduras (30.4 years), Pakistan (31.1) and Morocco (32).

The regions with the highest number of foreigners are Andalusia (741,378), Aragon (164,762) and Asturias (45,630). Those with the lowest presence of non-Spanish nationals are La Rioja (41,755), Melilla (11,675) and Ceuta (4,910). Residents from other EU countries account for a total of 1,617,911 people out of the almost 5.5 million non-Spaniards. Of these, the most numerous are Romanians (623,097), followed by Italians (273,889) and Germans (115,099). Of the remaining foreigners registered, the following nationalities stand out as having a high representation: Moroccans (883,243), Colombians (314,679) and Britons (293,171). As a result of the war with Russia, the number of Ukrainian residents increased considerably in 2022 and they are now among the 20 predominant foreign nationalities in Spain (111,443).

With respect to the most populated regions, those with the most inhabitants registered on January 1st 2022 are Andalusia, Catalonia

and Madrid. Those at the bottom of the list are La Rioja, Cantabria and Navarra.

Of the 8,131 total municipalities in Spain, 4,991 have a population of less than one thousand inhabitants. More than 2,000 of those can be found in Castilla y León, around 630 in Castilla-La Mancha and 620 in Aragón. In terms of larger municipalities, there are 64 municipalities in Spain with more than 100,000 inhabitants: 13 in Andalusia, 11 in Catalonia and 10 in Madrid.

as well as its wide range of hotels and restaurants. It also mentions the election of the Paisaje de la Luz as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.


7. Rome

3. New York

The report highlights the work of its inhabitants during the pandemic and how they have been able to quickly restore their city to its former glory. In recent years, the city has also invested heavily in infrastructure and opened new hotels and museums.

From a Resident in a Murcian Prison to a Resident of Murcia

A resident of Murcia experiences deja vu when he hears his band on the radio. It's been over thirty years since he last heard the band he formed on the radio. At that time he was a resident of Murcia, or to be more precise, he was a resident in Murcia's Sangonera prison.

Allan came to Spain in 1984 for a break, but he ended up staying a lot longer thanks to the Spanish prison service. Living on Spain's Costa del Sol and still in his early twenties, he received a six-and-a-half-year sentence along with a 65 million peseta fine for drug trafficking, serving most of it in Murcia

Murcia prison ran a music workshop, one of the 'monitors' Juanjo, a prominent Spanish jazz guitarist, suggested Allan form a band and enter Murcia Joven, a 'Battle of the Bands' contest and so Berlin '90 was formed. Allan wrote a song and they recorded it on an old cassette recorder and sent it in.

The news that they had won a day at a recording studio from the competition was met with a mixture of laughter and sadness, some treating the news as a joke and others thinking it was a cruel trick of fate as they would never be able to claim their prize. What happened next surprised everyone!

The prison chiefs gave the band members 'day release' to record at the local studio. Allan smiled saying "It was funny, as the authorities had sent out loads of press releases taking advantage of the good publicity around the band, making it hard to refuse the studio visit. Soon, one of the songs they recorded Stormy Waters written by Allan was played on radio stations across

It was no surprise when the press labelled the band 'The Bad Boys Of Rock', quickly making national headlines. The Spanish media was fascinated with their story and offers flooded in for more interviews. It seemed like doors were opening for the band (literally) as they were released again for some interviews at a local radio station.

The high point came next:

A few weeks after arriving at the recording studios in armoured vans with a security escort, the band performed their music live at a venue in Murcia.

Two of the band were now in the 'open section' with Allan due to follow.

Shortly after the band's only performance, while Stormy Waters was still playing on radio stations across Spain, a cruel twist of fate forced the band to split up. Without warning, Allan was transferred to Madrid's notorious high security Carabanchel Prison, losing contact with everyone.

On completion of his sentence Allan, was given 48 hours to leave Spain and not return for ten years. Back in Scotland Allan

started his own sales & marketing company dealing with the UK's biggest companies. A few years ago, he returned to Spain as a free man obtaining residency and just Christmas, before Allan met presenter & journalist Ángel Sopena at Onda Regional's studios in Murcia.

It was more than three decades since Angel last interviewed Allan. The only difference was, this time they were both free men.

Angel's radio show, *Música de Contrabando*, celebrated its 30th anniversary in 2020, throughout that time playing the music of

Allan's band, *Berlin 90*.
Allan said "Angel was giving interviews for the programme's 30th anniversary and saying in every interview that one of the best memories he has from his career was the story of Berlin 90.

"This guy has met Bowie and The Stones, but the one thing that sticks out is the prison band he met thirty years ago."

Angel told Allan's story in a double page spread in La Opinion de Murcia. Syndicated in dozens of other titles across Spain, it is generating huge interest in Spain and the UK with Allan asked will he record new material and would he return to the prison to do a concert for the inmates; this time as a free



Bananas were a good price at the market this week so I bought a load. What better fruit to put in a blender for a milkshake or smoothie as part of your 5 a day! Not wanting them to go off too quickly, I decided to look up some recipes. As usual, I went for easy ones, but also some my grandchildren like, so very child friendly? Unfortunately, I am allergic to fresh Bananas, so have to avoid them, but I can still use powder flavouring without any effect for some reason. You can add Bananas to custard to make a quick dessert, or just peel one whole and decorate with chocolate and cream for ease, but why not try the Banana Loaf recipe below or the fritters? Buen Apetito

Banana Loaf

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 tsp baking powder

1/, tsp salt

1/2 cup soft butter

cup brown sugar

2 large eggs, beaten

1/3 cups mashed very overripe Bananas

Preheat oven to 175°C. Lightly grease a 9" x 5" loaf pan. In a large bowl, combine flour, baking powder and salt. In separate bowl, cream together butter and brown sugar. Stir in eggs and mashed Bananas until well blended. Stir Banana mixture into flour mixture; stir just to combine. Pour batter into prepared loaf pan. Bake in preheated oven for 60-65mins until a toothpick inserted into centre of loaf comes out clean. Let bread cool in pan for 10 minutes before turning out onto a wire rack.

Banana and Toffee Pancakes

Basic Recipe for Pancakes

1 eaa 300ml milk 100g all-purpose Pinch of salt Cooking oil or butter

Combine the flour and salt in a bowl and make a well in the middle. Add the egg. Whisk or stir well whilst adding the milk a little at a time. Mix until there are no lumps. The mixture can be stored in a fridge for up to 6 hours. Heat a small amount of oil in a suitable pan, ensuring it covers the entire pan. Pour some of the mixture into the pan and quickly move it around so it spreads evenly. Once one side is cooked, toss the pancake and cook the other side. To tell if the pancake is cooked, look for small bubbles forming on the side. Continue to make more pancakes with the rest of the batter while keeping them warm.

Filling

250g butter toffee

3 tbsp milk

6-8 ripe Bananas sliced (one per person)

Make the batter as above and then leave to stand for half an hour. Put the broken toffee and the milk in a heavy saucepan. Stir constantly over a low heat until the toffee has melted and the sauce is smooth. Fry the pancakes and stack up them and keep them warm while you cook the rest. Place slices of Banana down the middle of the pancake and pour over generous amounts of toffee sauce. Fold over each side of the pancake into the middle. Stack up or lay out on a plate and serve with more sauce.

Banana Muffins

1 cup sugar

1/3 cup margarine

2 eggs

4 Bananas

1/3 cup water

1 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 cup chocolate chips (optional)

Mix sugar, margarine, eggs, Bananas & water in bowl. Then add your flour, baking powder & salt in the same bowl & mix together. Mix in chocolate chips by hand if desired. Set oven at 175°C. Put muffin cases in a muffin tray, fill with the mixture and bake for 25 minutes

Banana Fritters

Oil (for deep frying, olive oil is typically used)

1 cup cornflour (harina de maiz)

1/ cup sugar

1 tblsp butter, melted

1 egg

1/4 tsp salt

2 tbsp white rum

2 tbsp milk

4 firm but ripe Bananas

1 tsp ground cinnamon

2 tbsp dark brown sugar

Heat oil to 190°C in a deep fryer. Mix cornflour and sugar in a bowl. Add butter, egg, salt, rum and milk, stirring until it forms a thick batter. Peel Bananas and cut into quarters. Mix cinnamon with brown sugar. Sprinkle half the cinnamon/brown sugar mixture on the Banana quarters. Roll Banana quarters in the batter and drop carefully into the hot oil, a few at a time. Fry for 2-3 minutes on each side, turning once until golden brown. Drain fried Bananas on paper towels and dust with remaining cinnamon/brown sugar mixture. Serve warm.

Stovetop Banana Pudding

2 eggs

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of milk

1 pinch salt

1 tbsp vanilla essence

34 cup of ALLflour

6 Bananas


1 pkt of cookies or biscuits (any) broken up

1 pinch ground nutmeg

I pinch cinnamon



Murcia, the Levante and El Cid

The substantial Chambers Dictionary defines 'Levante' as being "the eastern Mediterranean and its shores". Historically, however, the term 'Spanish Levante' was used to describe large areas of eastern Spain. Although references to the Spanish Levante have begun to die out, the phrase has still been used in comparatively recent times. For example, the British wine critic Jancis Robinson used the term 'Levante' as the collective name for two regions of Spain - the Valencia area and Murcia - in her 2006 book 'The Oxford Companion to Wine'. Throughout much of the last thousand years though, the Spanish Levante had a wider meaning and referred to areas such as coastal Catalonia, southern Aragon, the Balearics and eastern Castile La-Mancha, in addition to Murcia and the Valencia region. Nevertheless, Murcia and Valencia were at the real heart of the historical Levante.

The Levante (which simply translates as 'the east') has no modern geopolitical significance and it was never a term which was used much by its inhabitants. However, for those who lived in the west of the Iberian Peninsula, the Spanish Levante - with Murcia and Valencia at its core – was an area of great political significance. During the past 1,000 years of Spanish history, possibly the most charismatic and legendary figure to dominate the Levante was Rodrigo Diaz de Vivar, better known around the world as the great warrior *El Cid* (which translates from the Arabic as meaning the lord' or 'master').

Rodrigo Diaz de Vivar was born at Vivar, near Burgos, in 1043 and he went on to dominate Murcia and the Levante at the end of the 11th Century CE. The seat of his power was at the city of Valencia, where he ruled a pluralistic society of Muslims and Christians where adherents of both faiths could gain advancement. During his own lifetime, EI Cid was better known to both Christians and Muslims in the Levante as **Rodrigo** 'Campeador' (the battlefield master). **El** Cid was really only a name given to the great man after his death in 1099. Rodrigo Campeador/El Cid became a celebrated Spanish hero in medieval times, after he was immortalised in the epic poem El Cantar de mio Cid, which created the myth of the Vivar man as the ideal, just, chivalrous, honest, brave and pious knight.

In reality, *El* Cid was far from being perfect knight. He was certainly a courageous and skilled warrior and battlefield tactician, but he was also very motivated by personal power and wealth. He would fight for Christian and Muslim

rulers in Spain, for the right money and had an uneasy, fluctuating relationship with both sides. Officially, he ruled Valencia and dominated Murcia and the Levante, in the name of Alphonso VI, Christian King of Aragon, Castile and Galicia. In practice though, Rodrigo was totally independent, ruling Valencia as a private fiefdom. He did much as he liked and when the Almaravid Berbers invaded southeast Spain in 1086, Rodrigo, the Cid, largely stood aloof from the conflict. It was *Alphonso* who resisted the Berber

invasion а n d captured the castle of Aledo in Murcia, order in to drive wedge between western and eastern Moors the Iberian Peninsula. so, Even Alphonso VI needed the Cid's help, particularly after the king's Christian armies were crushed by the Berbers

at the battle of Sagrajas. Rodrigo responded

positively by coming to Alphonso's aid, in return for substantial amounts of land and money and the fame of the Cid was enhanced

The legend of Rodrigo Campeador/El Cid, mushroomed during the course of the next 900 years, and was perpetuated in glorious style by the 1961 Hollywood epic El Cid, starring an impressively martial Charlton Heston, ably supported by Sophia Loren at her finest. Moreover, this was a blockbuster which largely followed the themes set out in the original medieval El Cantar de Mio Cid.

Murcia and the Levante never saw the likes of an *El Cid* again and over the centuries the significance of the Levante disappeared almost completely. Even so, modern legacies of the ancient Levante can still be seen in Murcia and southeast Spain. The legacy can be seen in a range of disparate items, from street signs and football teams, to the brand names of particular lager beers. Levante UD, for example, is a football team based in Valencia. The significance of the Levante in Murcia also lives on in its beer. The Sociedad Anonima Damm is a Spanish brewery founded in Barcelona in 1876, by the Alsatian August Kuentzmann Damm and Joseph Damm. In 1963, the brewery began producing Estrella Levante pilsner lager in Espinardo, Murcia and this beer, with its long echoes of history and eastern promise, has been in production ever since.

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
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

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Six Arrested - Seven To Go

NCA launches renewed appeal to trace Most Wanted fugitives.

The National Crime Agency and partners have renewed an appeal to help trace some of the UK's most wanted fugitives. Twelve months ago the NCA launched its most recent appeal to find 13 men who had gone on the run – all believed to be hiding in Spain, or with strong links to the country. In that time, six wanted men had been traced, arrested and are at various stages of the extradition and judicial process. Today, the appeal – run in conjunction with independent charity Crimestoppers, Spanish law enforcement, and UK policing – is renewed.

The Wanted Men:

Heavily tattooed **Jack Mayle**, 31, on suspicion of supplying Class A drug MDMA

and other drugs. **Mayle** was suspected of running a drug line in south London and allegedly worked with a dark web drugs' supplier.

When he fled from Croydon he had a tattooed neck, a diamond tattoo under his left eye and 'Croydon' inked on the outside of his left forearm. On both hands he has tattoos on his fingers reading 'trap star'. His neck is tattooed with warriors and religious figures on horses. He has a full back tattoo. May have tried to alter his appearance.

He is known to carry weapons; is a regular gym goer and vegan..

Two men from Cardiff are wanted by South Wales Police for Class A drugs' offences allegedly organised on the encrypted communications platform EncroChat.

Muscularly built **Asim Naveed**, 31 Asian,

Muscularly built **Asim Naveed**, 31 Asian, 6ft 2in tall, with surgical scar along left

wrist, is accused of playing a leading role in a highly organised crime group (OCG) that trafficked 46 kilos of cocaine into Wales between February & June 2020, worth up to nearly £8m.

Calvin Parris, 33, black, 5ft 11in, medium build, with gold upper teeth, is accused of being a customer of **Naveed's** OCG and selling cocaine in Cardiff.

John James Jones, 32, white, around 6ft tall, stocky with dark hair, of Ormskirk, Lancashire, is wanted for wounding with intent. **Jones** allegedly stabbed two victims with a knife causing serious injuries. It is believed he fled the UK and there is information to show he stayed at a hotel in Madrid the night after the stabbings, but left rapidly the next morning.

Callum Michael Allan, 24, around



182cms tall with fine hair, blue eyes, slim build and a Tyneside accent is wanted for 12 alleged offences including: possession with intent to supply heroin and cocaine, possession of cannabis, assaulting an emergency worker, affray and dangerous driving. On 11th June 2019 police raided a house suspected to be used for drugs deals. **Allan** fled and assaulted two officers who restrained him. He was in possession of 113.29gm of heroin. He was charged and appeared at court in April 2020 where he was given unconditional bail but failed to return. Links to Alicante and Marbella.

Mark Francis Roberts, 29, white, 6ft 1in tall, of medium build, has a 7.6cm scar down his right leg. He has green eves with heavy eyebrows. He is right handed and has a potential scar on arm obtained during the attempted robbery. From Liverpool, Roberts is wanted for alleged grievous bodily harm and the attempted robbery of a man's £60,000 Richard Mille watch. The victim was attacked by two men with a blade at around 1.30am on 30th September 2016 after he parked his car on his home driveway. The victim refused to surrender his watch and was so badly injured he suffered life-threatening injuries and was treated in a critical care unit for puncture wounds, a collapsed lung and many lacerations. The victim heard one of the attackers say he'd cut himself in the attack and Roberts' blood was later identified at the scene.

Roberts has links to Scotland and Spain.

Alex Male, 30, white, around 6ft tall with stocky build, is alleged to be a regional distributor of drugs across the SW of England, buying and selling drugs and managing other distributors who operated under his instruction using EncroChat. He is accused of conspiracy to supply cocaine and ketamine, money laundering and conspiracy to acquire a firearm. Male has a full sleeve tattoo on his left arm with a family tree. 'Love' is tattooed on his left hand along with a swallow and he has three stars tattooed on his left wrist. He has a full tribal sleeve tattoo on his right arm going onto his chest with an angel on his back and 'live' tattooed on his right hand. Last known address is Garland Avenue, Weston-Super-Mare, but he has links to Spain, Portugal and Turkey.

The NCA's International Crime Bureau and International Liaison Officers work with foreign law enforcement on behalf of UK police forces to track and arrest criminals wherever they are in the world. It's usual for fugitives to continue to commit crime whilst on the run and these men will be known in criminal circles wherever they are and some will be trying to blend in to the large British communities for whom Spain is home.

Lord Ashcroft, founder of the charity Crimestoppers UK, said: "We are incredibly grateful to the public for supporting our joint campaign with the NCA. By passing on vital information, their actions have helped catch wanted individuals who pose a genuine danger to our communities. Driving A Foreign Vehicle In Spain

Basic Rules

As a general rule, a non-resident can drive a foreign registered vehicle in Spain for up to six months in a calendar year. However, for a Spanish resident, it's just 30 days from the date the vehicle first entered the country. In all cases the vehicle needs to be fully legal in the country of current registration. For example, if you have a UK vehicle then it must be taxed, have a current MOT and of course be insured.

Overstaying

If you drive your vehicle for longer than the above, Spanish authorities may consider that you are importing the vehicle and issue you with a notice to pay the import taxes and customs duties if applicable, as well as an associated fine.

Documentation

When driving in Spain, it is mandatory to carry your driving licence, original vehicle registration document (logbook), passport or ID card and for a foreign registered vehicle, proof of insurance. If your driving

licence is non- EU then you may also need an International Driving Permit (IDP).

Proof Of Entry

It is also essential when driving a foreign vehicle that you have adequate proof of when your vehicle entered Spain, in case you are stopped, as the onus will be on you to provide this. Normal proof could be a ferry ticket, Eurotunnel receipt, border crossing documentation (such as a stamped date in your passport), toll receipts that show the date and time of entry, or a transport company delivery note and invoice.

Confiscation

When stopped, if you cannot satisfy the

police or Guardia Civil that your car hasn't outstayed its welcome then they are within their rights to impound your vehicle. To retrieve your vehicle you will have to pay any fines issued, along with any tow truck and storage fees. You may also have to pay import taxes or customs duty if applicable. (You will also need to show a valid driver's licence and proof of insurance when you collect the vehicle.)

Help

If your vehicle has been impounded **Car Registrations**



The mining

operations ceased in 1969.

Writing this in mid-February, the skies are tipping the rain down and have been for a few days; much-needed water, but I doubt much effect on filling the reservoirs.

Regular readers will know we have four dogs. How are yours in the rain? Two of ours go out loving the rain and would happily stay out. The two others hate it! They rush out to do their business when they really have to, but straight back indoors. The two rain-lovers simply have to roll in a puddle whilst the other two won't even get their feet wet. So different, like us humans! I hate the beach and sand in everything. Others love it!

TV News

The big news is that the BBC is moving all the regional BBC 1's to High Definition. Whilst this is generally good news, it has implications for us down here in Southern Spain. This is a three month programme for the BBC and at the time of writing, is part way through, so not all of the following may be totally valid at the end of all the changes. However, to date the new HD

regional transmissions are on satellite frequencies we cannot get down here in Southern Spain. BBC 1 South was the first one to change and we can't see a glimpse of that frequency. Others have since followed. Now the problem is that the old SD (standard definition) versions are being deleted so that on satellite in Southern Spain BBC 1 South is not available. We will have to see the situation when the changes are complete, but it is possible no satellite BBC 1. The BBC have said they will leave a non-regional BBC 1 SD on the satellite system, (like HD is now - blank

during regional transmissions), but that this is only temporary to give viewers with old non-HD boxes time to upgrade their boxes to new HD versions.



This is fine for UK locations where the new frequencies are available (and where the system is intended to be viewed), but for Southern Spain it may mean no BBC 1 on satellite systems. At minimum we must accept that our local regional BBC 1 may not be available and we have to watch a region that is available. More information on this next month when the changes should all be complete. If you lose your local regional BBC 1, a box scan may return it, but you may have to watch another region which should be listed somewhere. If you use an official Freesat box, all the

BBC regional channels will be in the 900's as they will be on a SKY box. Universal boxes will have them randomly listed. Any problems then contact us. Remember this

is an ongoing BBC change and details may change.

I had a bit of supposedly 'inside' information from SKY, (not public but reliable), that SKY are planning to close all transmission systems except internet by August 2024. Their SKY Stream system is highly successful, therefore internet will be the only way. This information, together with the BBC plans above, really do make the move to Internet TV necessary, sooner rather than leaving it to last minute. Contact us for a free no-obligation demonstration of Internet TV and 7 day trial free of any charge. If taken up, there is a subscription charge, but that will be the case to watch UK TV in Southern Spain when regular transmissions are switched off.

That's it for this month. More information in the April edition.

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
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



Fines of up to 1,000€ for pedestrians in Spain

Fines of up to 1,000€ for pedestrians in Spain. Pedestrians must comply with the regulations of the Traffic and Road Safety

Crossing the street without using a Zebra Crossing

It is mandatory to use a Zebra Crossing whenever possible. If a pedestrian crosses outside a pedestrian crossing, the fine can

be up to €100.



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Walking motorways carriageways

Pedestrians are prohibited from walking on motorways or dual carriageways. It is only permitted in the case of an accident, a breakdown, physical discomfort of the occupants of a vehicle, or another emergency. A fine of €100 can be given for this offence.

Not wearing a reflective vest

It is forbidden to walk on motorways or



dual carriageways without wearing mandatory reflective vest except in the case of an accident, a breakdown, physical discomfort of the occupants of a vehicle, or another emergency. Not wearing one can lead to fines of up to €100. Not wearing the vest in the case of a breakdown can lead to a fine of up to €200.

Not walking on the left-hand side of the road outside built-up areas

Pedestrians should always walk on the left-hand side of any road outside of built-up areas. This allows them to see approaching vehicles straight ahead. This is particularly important when walking a dog. If a pedestrian walks on the right, vehicles would approach them from behind, which would make it difficult to see. With silent electric cars, this law has become even more important to observe. The fine can be up to €100.

Crossing the road when a traffic light is red

When a driver sees a red traffic light, it means they must stop and wait. This same rule applies to pedestrians. Pedestrians must wait on the pavement, without stepping on the curb until the pedestrian light changes to green. Crossing when the light is red can lead to a fine of €200.

Refusing to be tested for alcohol or drugs Drivers are obliged to stop for a breathalyser

or drug test and the same rule applies to pedestrians whenever they are involved in an accident or have committed an offence. Refusing to be tested for alcohol or drugs in these cases can lead to fines of up to €1,000.





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
