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
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The Value of Local Financial Advice

This is the fourth article I have written on the value of choosing a **Financial Adviser** who is well-established in your local area; not just because this is a matter of great importance, but also because if you are forearmed, you can avoid the pitfalls and expensive mistakes that expats are encountering on a daily basis. In my previous article, I explained how some ill-informed advice from a UK based adviser sadly resulted in the client receiving a \in 70,000 tax bill due to the lack of knowledge of the Spanish tax system. I am going to share the uncomfortable and costly experiences that a new client of mine was recently confronted with.

Quite simply, the clients had a long-term relationship with their UK adviser. They held a large investment portfolio and over the years they have been transferring their investments over to ISAs to benefit from the tax advantages the ISA offered.

The clients had been in Spain since 2014 but kept most of their finances in the UK as they travelled back and forth between the two countries. Despite the clients becoming Spanish tax residents in 2019, the adviser continued to manage their investments with

the same strategy.

Through the clients' bank and the Common Reporting Standards requirements, the Spanish Authorities became aware of the recent transaction.

This resulted in serious consequences.

You are not allowed new ISA subscriptions if you are not UK resident

Tax is due on profits from ISAs in Spain. The clients had a full tax review from the Hacienda going back to 2016. (The Hacienda can only go back 5 years fortunately for this client)

One can only imagine the stress these clients were facing and frustratingly, this could have been easily avoided if they had found a Spainbased adviser when they became residents.

This is an ongoing investigation that ended up being very expensive for the clients.

Additionally, the financial adviser in the UK was completely ignorant to the products that were tax efficient in Spain and available to these clients. This is a common problem for advisers based in the UK. They wish to retain their long-standing clients with whom they have a trusted relationship and from whom

will continue to receive the trail commissions and annual fees, but quite often they can be obtuse to the financial harm their clients risk. Following Brexit, it is very unlikely that a UK based financial adviser will have all the passporting requirements needed to provide regulated advice in the EU anymore.

Arguably, a UK based adviser should never be responsible for giving financial advice to someone based in Spain, as they have no idea of the implications the advice could bring on a client.

I often work alongside UK based advisers to assist their clients in preventing catastrophic mistakes. Please be vigilant with your financial planning in Spain and contact us for a no-obligation review of your portfolio.

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
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Night Sky In May

Evening Sky in May perfectly reflects the spirit of Spring that surrounds us and welcomes us with new energy and keenness to explore and appreciate the world around us. As soon as the darkness comes, what greets us, is the cornucopia of shapes and patterns that during our history we came to recognize as constellations, both the zodiac and the general ones.



Each of those constellations hides a precious gem easily discoverable while stargazing and observing the night sky with a telescope! The most recognizable is the Big Dipper and with this constellation a way to find the North Star, knowledge of the direction of the World and the geographical position of the observer. That characteristic constellation has been a companion of all travellers throughout history.



When the roaring **Leo** climbs above the horizon, it helps us position the telescope to take a look at Leo Triplet, three galaxies so close to each other they can be captured together in a single picture. Zodiacal Cancer, Virgo and Libra will find their celestial reflections on the sky in May evening as well; with them, more secrets to explore the Universe and to take a peek at with the telescope.

A young population of stars sharing the same origin, known today as a Beehive Cluster, can be observed via the telescope and on a dark night even seen with the naked eye. It has been described by the ancient astronomer Ptolemy as a "Nebulous mass in the chest of Cancer". Within the constellation of a beloved ancient hero, Hercules, we can observe the remains of distant galaxies absorbed by our own within a Globular Cluster of Hercules.

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

The View From God's Eyes

DID YOU KNOW?



The Trinity (Part 2)

The Trinity is a central teaching within mainstream Christianity. Last month's issue outlined how this doctrine entered the Church. It was established that this teaching entered the Church by the beliefs of Plato, a Greek philosopher. He believed in the Triad deities of the ancient religions. He believed he could define God above all the deities of Greek mythology. His definition was:

- 1. The first God, who was the supreme being in the universe.
- 2. The second God, Plato described as the soul of the universe.
- 3. The third God, he defined as the spirit.

Philo of Alexandria, a Jewish philosopher between 15BC and 50AD, was also influenced by Greek philosophy. He believed God to be:-

- 1. Father, who created all things (named Demiurge).
- Mother, who was knowledge, the maker possessed.
- The beloved Son was the world (union of Demiurge and knowledge to produce man's world).

time progressed, more Greek defined philosophers further Plato's perception of God as three Substances; the Supreme God or the one from which came mind or thought and a Spirit or Soul. They felt that all were different divine substances or aspects of the same God. 'Towards the end of the 1st Century and during the 2nd Century, many learned men came over from Judaism and Paganism to Christianity. These brought with them into the Christian schools of Theology, their Platonic ideas and phraseology and they especially borrowed from the philosophical writings of Philo.' (Cyclopaedia of Biblical, Theological and Ecclesiastical literature, 1891, vol.10 'Trinity', page 553)

Arthur Weigall, who was a Trinitarian and an Egyptologist, stated "It must not be forgotten that Jesus Christ never mentioned such a phenomenon (the **Trinity**) and nowhere in the New Testament does the word **Trinity** appear. The idea was only adopted by the Church

three hundred years after the death of our Lord and the origin of the conception is entirely pagan..." (read the book by Arthur Weigall; Paganism in our Christianity, 1928, page 197-203)

The ancient world believed in the **Trinity** (Triune or Triad God). Some of these were Sumerian, Babylonian, Indian, Grecian, Egyptian, Phoenician, Roman, Germanic, Celts, Hindu and many others.

The Encyclopaedia of Religion vol. 15, 1987 admits, "Theologians today are in agreement that the Hebrew Bible does not contain a doctrine of the Trinity." Also it states "Theologians agree that the New Testament also does not contain an explicit doctrine of the Trinity." The Encyclopaedia Britannica 1976 observes, "Neither the word Trinity nor the explicit doctrine appears in the New Testament." The new Catholic Encyclopaedia states "The doctrine of the **Holy Trinity** is not taught in the Old Testament." Karl Barth, Protestant Theologian quoted in the New International Dictionary of New Theology 1976 that "The New Testament does not contain the developed doctrine of the **Trinity**. The Bible lacks the express declaration the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are of equal essence."

In Colossians chapter 2, verses 8 & 9, it clearly states "Beware lest any man spoils you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world and not after Christ. For in Him dwelleth all the fullness of the Godhead bodily." Also in 1st Corinthians chapter 14, verse 33 says "For God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all Churches of the saints." 1st Timothy, chapter 2, verse 5 explains "For there is one God and one mediator between God and men; the man Christ Jesus".

Deuteronomy chapter 6, verse 4 "Hear oh Israel, the Lord our God is one Lord." (This is repeated in Mark chapter 12, verses 28 & 29). Matthew chapter 3, verses 16 & 17 says "And Jesus, when He was baptised, went up straightway out of the water and lo the heavens opened unto Him and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and lighting upon Him. Lo a voice from heaven, saying, this is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."

Galatians chapter 4,

verse 6 states "And

because ye are sons,

God has sent forth

the Spirit of his Son

into your hearts,

verses 16 & 17 says

"That He would grant

you, according to the

riches of his glory, to be strengthened with

might by his Spirit

crying Abba Father." Ephesians chapter 3, in the inner man, that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith, that ye, being rooted and grounded in love."

John chapter 17, verse 3 says "And this is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent."

John chapter 14 and verses 16-18 states "And I will pray the Father and He will give you another comforter, that He may abide with you forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth Him not, neither knoweth Him: but you know Him, for He dwelleth with you and shall be in you. I will not leave you comfortless, I will come to you."

John chapter 14, verse 6 explains clearly "Jesus saith unto Him; I am the way, the truth and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me."

Acts chapter 2, verses 1-8 states "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. Suddenly there came a sound from Heaven as of a rushing mighty wind and it filled the house where they were sitting. There appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire and it sat upon each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak with other tongues, as the spirit gave them utterance. And there were dwelling at Jerusalem, devout men, out of every nation under Heaven. Now when this was noised abroad, the multitude came together and were confounded, because every man heard them speak in his own language. They were all amazed and marvelled, saying one to another, "Behold, are not all these that speak Galilean and how hear we every man in our own tongue, wherein we were born?"

Roman chapter 10, verse 17 states "So then faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God."

John chapter 17, verse 17 says "Sanctify them through thy truth, thy word is truth." Acts chapter 5, verse 29 states "Then Peter and the other apostles answered and said, "We ought to obey God rather than men." In Acts chapter 17, verses 10 & 11 we have wisdom "And the brethren immediately sent away Paul and Silas by night unto Berea: who coming thither went into the synagogue of the Jews. These were more noble than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness of mind and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so."

I hope you have learned more about the scriptures. Next time we will look at 'History in the book of Daniel' (the scriptures).

Spanish Fiestas in May



1st - 3rd May - Wine Horse Festival - Caravaca de la Cruz

This spectacular festival culminates in a horse parade where the horses are beautifully bedecked for the occasion, accompanied by thousands of people on a run up to the castle. The festival was awarded the UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity designation in 2020. Hundreds of locals participate during the festivities in honour of the Blessed and Vera Cruz de Caravaca. The horses and their elaborate silk mantles embroidered in fine gold thread are the central focus of the festival. The animals are paraded through the streets attired in all their finery and accompanied by their trainers.



The race takes place on 2nd May and each horse passes through the crowd with its runners. Further parades and activities for children are held on 3rd May. There are prizes for the best dressed horses.

The origin of the festival dates back to an ancient legend that tells how, in a moment of scarcity, some locals managed to cross the enemy defences with a horse laden with wine running at full pelt until they managed to besiege the castle. The first references of the festival date back to the 17th Century.

2nd & 3rd May - May Festivities in Los Realejos

These combine popular tradition and spectacular fireworks displays.

The streets and homes in the Cruz Santa district are bedecked with makeshift chapels containing crosses and altars, or 'enrames', where the locals apply all their skill to select the flowers to be used for the decorations in this celebration.



The two streets of El Sol and El Medio are the setting for the procession of La Cruz. Their inhabitants are also the creators of a whole array of fireworks to mark the historic rivalry between both streets. This curious event attracts thousands of visitors each year.

3rd - 14th May - Cordoba Courtyard Festival

Many houses in the centre of the city of Cordoba, in Andalusia, adorn their balconies and wrought iron grilles to participate in this competition. Every year judges select the most beautiful entrant.

The scent of jasmine and orange blossom and the colour of the flowers fill the streets during the popular **Wrought Iron Grilles and Balconies Competition**, which is held simultaneously with the well-known **Courtyard Contest**. These are days to be spent in the street, enjoying flamenco and delighting in the beauty of the courtyards, balconies and wrought iron grilles decorated in the traditional Andalusian style.

6th - 13th May - Jerez Horse Fair

This fair consists of joy, fun and purebred animals. The nobility of the horses seen during the event has made it internationally famous. It was originally a livestock market, but over the years it has evolved into today's festivities.

Horse-related activities take place during this festive week, such as international show-jumping competitions, dressage, horse rallies, selected livestock exhibitions and auctions. During the day, González de Hontoria Park fills with hundreds of riders and carriages that drive through the streets in a majestic spectacle well worth seeing.

Associations up their marquees adorning the avenues paths and with flowers and garlands with a different theme each year. Prizes are awarded to the best in show. Inside the marquees there is fino wine (sherry) and regional produce to sample.

People dance Sevillanas until the early hours of the morning with an incredible, enjoyable atmosphere that seems to transform the park into one big flamenco hall. There are also food and drinks stands and children's attractions. Bullfights, *Sevillana* dance competitions and fireworks are other festive activities that complete the programme of the fair.

6th & 7th May - Los Mayos - Alhama de Murcia

This festival serves to recreate old professions in Alhama de Murcia and satirise current situations.



Although its origin is unknown, the first written references to it date from the 1920's. The festival consists of placing life-sized dolls dressed with human features painted on their faces, dressed in old clothes on doorsteps of houses in order to create a scene. They are normally dressed in clothes from old professions, representing everyday situations, or satirising certain modern-day problems. These scenes can be seen from Saturday morning until Sunday afternoon.

20th - 27th May - Fair in Honour of Nuestra Señora de la Salud (Our Lady of Health) - Cordoba

The fiesta has a marked Andalusian flavour with 'casetas' (marquees with food, drink and music) erected at the city's fair ground. The thoroughfare and the surrounding streets fill with horse-drawn carriages, flamenco dress, *Sevillana* music and wine. The origins of the fair go back to the old livestock market which is now held on the outskirts of the city. During the period of the fair there are various bullfights that take place in the Los Califas Bullring.

24th - 28th May - Music Festival - Segura de la Sierra (in Jaén, Andalusia)

There is an impressive natural backdrop for this music festival with top-flight music amidst mountain landscapes. Visitors can enjoy a varied programme over several days that combines pieces from the great classics such as Mozart and Beethoven, alongside others by some of the best contemporary musicians. The concerts are held in special locations such as Segura Castle or the Mediaeval Chapel. Flamenco evenings, accordion recitals all take place with the backdrop of the Sierras de Cazorla, Segura y Las Villas Nature Reserve and the charming town of Segura de la Sierra with its narrow whitewashed streets and flowerfilled balconies.

How about a lovely little lad like **Pancho**?



It's never too late to learn.

This is something I find myself saying to people in one way or another almost every day. On a similar subject, I was reading in a Spanish magazine the other day about women over fifty who had turned their lives around. The stories were quite inspiring. Luckily for me and this article, they were also full of Past Tenses. Here are a few quotes from one lady called Menchu:

If your mind is occupied you don't stagnate. It is a marvelous way to reach your mature

This takes me back nicely to the first point of this article - nunca es tarde para aprender.



Writing this copy in mid-April, the heat seems to have been switched on early this year. Today is forecast for 30°C and an hour in the garden this morning has left me with a very red head! All is well at the **Rainbow** house – the garden has needed almost continual watering throughout the winter having had so little rain. Every morning we walk the dogs and part of that walk is through a rambla that has always had some pools of water – even in the height of summer. This year they are dry. I just hope the wildlife find somewhere to drink and the wild boars a new mud bath to roll in!

Back at home, now that we have four permanent dogs, we do not foster for

Rainbow's sponsored charity -Friends of Mazarrón Animals (FMA) - something we really miss. Could you foster? The charity will always find a home for any animal eventually, but the period from taking on the animal to that home is always so difficult. Yes they can, and do, use kennels, but apart from the cost, the environment is not ideal for rehabilitating an animal, although the kennels do an excellent job. Home life and continual human contact is needed and that is just where a foster home helps. We often hear "I could not foster because I could not let them go." - but you need to approach fostering with the knowledge that you are helping one along the rehabilitation road to get a permanent home, then you can help the next one! TV NEWS

The big news must be the continual decline of the UK TV satellite system in

southern Spain. More channels are going to frequencies we just cannot receive down here, even on the biggest dishes. None of the BBC channels are now available 24/7. You might be able to thumb around the regions and find working versions at various times of the day, but continual watching is not possible. Those of you with non-HD boxes should be picking up a temporary SD non-regional version of the BBC channels, but BBC have said these will only be temporary to give clients the chance to buy HD boxes. (This information is only applicable in the UK where the BBC notices are intended for!). ITV HD has not been available for some months to us Spanish watchers and many nonmainstream channels have disappeared.

UK satellite TV is really finished in southern Spain – the only option now is internet TV. That presents its own problems – an excellent internet supply is required and any easy-to-use, professionally maintained

system will have a subscription. There are ways to watch the main channel streaming services free of charge, but this will require a VPN service that will carry a subscription and live TV is not always available.

Rainbow Satellites (we probably need to rethink that name!) have a comprehensive internet TV system (IPTV). We offer a free in home-demonstration and the loan of a box for up to a week. This way you can fully test and appreciate the system before you commit to a purchase and it also tests that your internet is good enough for live TV which is very demanding. If after a week you do not want to proceed we will just take the equipment away – no hard sell! Contact us for a trial – you will need

stable internet of 10MBS plus. If you don't have that, we may be able to loan you a 4G router for the trial period.

If you subscribe to IPTV during May 2023 we will offer a 30€ discount on a one year subscription OR remove your satellite dish (excluding any concrete base) free of charge if you want to dispose of it ('easily' accessible dishes only). Ask for offer 'May23'.

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
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Preparing Your Vehicle For The Spanish ITV Import Test

If you are thinking about registering your vehicle on Spanish plates, what are the potential issues and what changes need to be made to the vehicle in advance of the import test?

Paperwork

In order to register a foreign vehicle onto Spanish plates you will always need to produce the original vehicle registration document, which you will surrender to the Spanish authorities in favour of your new Spanish documentation. For UK vehicles this is just the V5C logbook, but for some countries such as Holland, Germany, Belgium and Sweden there are two registration documents and both need to be provided for registration purposes.

You should also bear in mind that if the vehicle registration documents aren't in your name, you will have to pay additional taxes when registering the vehicle in Spain, in addition to normal import costs, unless you have an EU dealer invoice with an international VAT number on it.

Bear in mind that even if you have a UK dealer invoice, you will still pay the change of owner tax, following post Brexit changes.

Headlights

If you're importing a vehicle from continental Europe, the original headlights fitted to the vehicle will be okay for the import test, but if you have a UK registered vehicle, your existing headlights will almost certainly need to be realigned or be replaced.

Without doubt the cheapest option is to have the beam pattern on your headlights realigned, rather than having to purchase expensive replacement units.

Rear Lights

Most standard European left hand drive vehicles' rear lights should be okay for the import test, as long as they are original spec or homologated replacements.

If you have a UK registered vehicle then you will either have dual rear fog lights, a central rear fog light or a fog light on the right hand rear. Whilst dual rear fog lights or a factory fitted rear central rear fog light are acceptable for the Spanish import test, a single right hand rear fog light would have to be swapped across to the left hand side to comply with test requirements.

Do bear in mind that over 90% of rear lights can be adapted, rather than having to purchase expensive replacements.

Tvres

Tyres have to be the correct size, load and speed rating for your vehicle and there will usually be a manufacturer sticker on the door pillar or fuel filler cap indicating the permitted sizes. If your existing tyres are different from those indicated on the sticker, they may still be okay if they are within 3% variance, so do check with a tyre specialist or vehicle importer before replacing them.

Finally, the tyres on each axle must be identical, so both front tyres need to be the same and both rear tyres need to be the same.

Windows

Rear window tints are a great idea here in Spain, but if your vehicle already has aftermarket tints, these must be stamped and certified prior to the import test. Front window tints are not permitted in Spain, so will need to be removed if your vehicle has them.

Tow Bars

Most aftermarket tow bars have to be removed prior to the Spanish import test, so if your vehicle was fitted with a tow bar after it left the factory it will need to be removed. Be careful here, as some tow bars replace the vehicle's rear crash support beam and if this is the case you would also

require a replacement beam to be fitted. If you have any doubts, we recommend speaking to your local workshop.

If the tow bar was fitted at the factory it should be okay, as long as it is included in the vehicle's homologation.

Warning Lights

If your vehicle has the ABS, or engine management light illuminated, it will fail the import test, so we normally recommend a pre-import check whenever possible.

Speedometer

In order for your vehicle to be imported on to Spanish plates it must be able to show speed in km/h. This can be on the main clock, on a heads up display or on a digital readout.

Modifications

Aftermarket modifications are not generally permitted for import as the vehicle has to be in its original factory state that corresponds to the vehicle's homologation. If there are any modifications, your vehicle may have to pass an expensive lab test in addition to the normal import test.

Insurance

In order for your vehicle to be tested, it must have a permanent insurance policy in place and you may have to provide a copy at the ITV station.

Avoiding Pitfalls

The requirements above are far from an exhaustive list and there are many items that can delay or even prevent your vehicle from being matriculated on to Spanish plates. In the first instance we would definitely recommend speaking to a vehicle import specialist as this will likely not only save you a lot of hassle, but potentially a lot of money too. 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

WORLD NO TOBACCO DAY



Wednesday 31st May - World No Tobacco Day 2023:

We need food, not tobacco.

WHO and public health champions around the world will celebrate World No Tobacco Day (WNTD). The 2023 global campaign aims to raise awareness about alternative crop production and marketing opportunities for tobacco farmers and encourage them to grow sustainable, nutritious crops thereby contributing to the global food crisis.

The growing food crisis is driven by conflicts and wars, climatic shocks, and the economic and social impacts of COVID-19. Structural causes like the choice of crop also have an impact and a look into tobacco growing reveals how it contributes to increased food insecurity. Across the globe, around 3.5 million hectares of land are converted for tobacco growing each year. Growing tobacco also contributes to deforestation of 200,000 hectares a year. Tobacco growing requires heavy use of pesticides and fertilizers, which contribute to soil degradation. Land used for growing

tobacco then has a lower capacity for growing other crops, such as food, since tobacco depletes soil fertility.



Compared with other agricultural activities such as maize growing and even livestock grazing, tobacco farming has a far more destructive impact on ecosystems as tobacco farmlands are more prone to desertification.

Any profits to be gained from tobacco as a cash crop may not offset the damage done to sustainable food production in low/middle-income countries.

Supporting the creation of alternative livelihoods

The tobacco industry often touts itself as an advocate for the livelihood of tobacco farmers. This is far from the truth. The intensive handling of insecticides and toxic chemicals during the cultivation of tobacco contributes to many farmers and their families suffering from ill health. Unfair contractual arrangements with tobacco companies keep farmers impoverished and child labour is often woven into tobacco

cultivation which interferes with the right to education and is a violation of human rights.



Nine of the 10 largest tobacco cultivators are low/middle-income countries and 4 of these are defined as low-income fooddeficit countries. The 2023 campaign calls on governments and policy-makers to step up legislation, develop suitable policies and strategies and enable market conditions for tobacco farmers to shift to growing food crops that would provide them and their families with a better life. The WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control offers specific principles and policy options on the promotion of economically viable alternatives for tobacco workers, growers and individual sellers and on enhancing protection of the environment and the health of people. The implementation of these provisions should be strengthened in countries.





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

There are large numbers of patients with very little bone, which makes the placement of implants a great challenge, because getting bone available to restore the entire upper or lower jaw with grafts could be prohibitive for many patients.

KING CHARLES III'S CORONATION



What is a Coronation?

A **Coronation** is both the symbolic religious ceremony during which a sovereign is crowned and the physical act of placing a crown on a monarch's head. It formalises the monarch's role as the head of the Church of England and marks the transfer of their title and powers.

It is not essential for the monarch to be crowned to become King.

Edward VIII reigned without a **Coronation** and Charles automatically became King the moment Queen Elizabeth II died.



Coronations have remained much the same for more than 1,000 years, but the British ceremony is the only remaining event of its type in Europe.

King Charles III's Coronation will be shorter and smaller in scale than Queen Elizabeth II's 1953 coronation, with a wider range of religions represented. The coronation procession is also expected to be more modest.

King Charles III and Camilla, the Queen Consort, will travel to Westminster Abbey in the King's procession and return to Buckingham Palace in a larger coronation procession where they will be joined by other members of the Royal Family.





There are several stages to the Coronation service:

The recognition:

Whilst standing beside the 700-year-old Coronation Chair, King Charles will be presented to those gathered in the Abbey by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The congregation will shout "God Save the King!" and the trumpets will sound.

The oath:

King Charles III will swear to uphold the law and the Church of England.



The anointing:

King Charles III's ceremonial robe will be removed as he sits in the Coronation Chair. A gold cloth will be held over the chair to conceal the King from view. The Archbishop of Canterbury will then anoint the King's hands, breast and head with holy oil made according to a secret recipe, but known to contain ambergris, orange flowers, roses, jasmine and cinnamon. The oil created for Charles will not contain any ingredients derived from animals.

The investiture: The sovereign will be presented with items including the Royal Orb, representing religious and moral authority; the Sceptre, representing power; the Sovereign's Sceptre, (a rod of gold topped with a white enamelled dove), which is a symbol of justice and mercy. Finally, the Archbishop will place St Edward's Crown on the King's head.

The enthronement and homage:

The King will leave the Coronation Chair and move to the throne. Peers will kneel before the monarch to pay homage.

The Queen Consort will then be anointed in the same way and crowned.





Legend has it that the Castle of Caravaca was besieged by Muslim troops.

Food began to be scarce and they decided to go in search of food finding wine near Lorca. Upon arrival at the Sanctuary they found a large Muslim fence, avoiding the enemy defences by running up the wineskins loaded on a horse.

The first documentary references appear in the 17th Century. Since then they have evolved to the point where they are currently a 3 day contest full of strength, beauty and emotion: the bareback horse, the harnessing and the race. The spectacular aspect of the wine horses is their harnesses, dressed in pieces embroidered with silk, precious stones and gold and silver beads, made to measure for each horse.

The party begins on May 1st with the bareback contest when the equine morphology is rewarded in its pure state. May 2nd is the big day of the Wine Horse Festival. At noon, on the way up to the castle, the legendary Wine Horse Race takes place.

The participation of the young ones takes place on May 3rd. This constitutes one of the most emotional and friendly moments of this unique festival.




This will be the penultimate article this walking season. Next time there will be three **WARM** and one **SWARM** walk to write about before our break. Normally we

Our final walk was a repeat from earlier in the season from the abandoned village of Gilico on the road to Calasparra. Allen, Sue and Jane managed to combine a **WARM** and **SWARM** route and despite it only being the 12^{th of} April, the **WARM** walkers certainly felt the heat on the last 2-3 km.



The Independent 'Pirate' Republic of Murcia

The early 1870's were a time of massive political turbulence in Western Europe. Napoleon III had been toppled as Emperor of France and the revolutionary Paris Commune had taken control of the French capital. In Spain, as well, political turbulence was endemic. Isabel II, Queen of Spain, had been removed from the throne and the Cortes Generales had elected Amadeo I as Spain's first and only Italian born king. Amadeo's reign was short and turbulent, marked by violence and rebellions from the very start. On 11th February 1873, with a great sense of personal relief, Amadeo abdicated and returned to Italy.

The First Spanish Republic was then proclaimed, but no peace came to Spain. Revolts continued to plague the country and the region of Murcia broke away from Spain to form its own independent republic, sometimes referred to as the 'Canton of Murcia' in press and diplomatic reports of the period. Murcia wasn't the only region to rebel against the central control of Madrid at this time. Motivated by a range of local and national grievances, Valencia, Salamanca, Seville, Cadiz and Granada all rose in rebellion. However, the revolt in Murcia was, in many respects, the most serious uprising of all and led briefly to the region becoming an independent state, separate from Spain. According to the British John Bull newsletter of 17th January 1874, the creation of the independent Canton of Murcia "... will be regarded hereafter as one of the strangest episodes which even Spain has ever anticipated."

The Murcian rebellion against central control from Madrid was led by the city of Cartagena, which rose in revolt on 12 July 1873. Spanish congressman Antonio Galvez Arce, known by many in Murcia as Antonete, led the rebels and began by seizing the St Julian Castle and then occupied the rest of Cartagena's substantial fortifications. The city's Town Council was then deposed and Arce and the rebels went on to proclaim that Cartagena was part of the Independent

Canton of Murcia. Most of the Spanish fleet, docked in Cartagena's harbour, went over to the Murcian side, along with 2,000 regular troops from the Spanish army. Arce's independent Murcia then had an army and a navy which included warships such as the Almanza, the Mendez Nunez, Vigilante and the modern armour-plated frigate Vitoria, built on the banks of the river Thames in 1868.

What did Arce and his 'independent Murcia' followers believe in, apart from Murcians being in control of their own destiny? It's difficult to know really, because the whole independent Murcia Cantonal revolution lasted for just six months and was marked by war, violence and economic collapse. The whole independence movement proved to be rather strange in a number of ways:

A new currency, the **Murcian duro cantonal** was minted, but there was little opportunity to exchange money because trade collapsed, shops were empty and merchant shipping deserted the area.

Murcian independence was allegedly asserted by the flying of the red crescent Turkish flag, upside down, from Cartagena's battlements. With money running short, Murcia Canton leaders, like Contreras, boarded rebel frigates and then sailed off to Almeria and Alicante, which they threatened to bombard unless the two towns handed over money to the Murcian ships. The rebels were really acting like pirates 'demanding money with menaces' from their nearby Spanish coastal neighbours.

The Murcia Canton's two frigates, Almanza and Vitoria, were later seized by the German warship Friedrich Karl (commanded by Captain Werner) and the British H.M.S. Swiftsure as they attempted to bombard Malaga. The Spanish sailors were treated as pirates, disarmed and then returned to Cartagena. Captain Werner later negotiated a deal with the new Republic of Murcia which ensured the safety of all foreign nationals and their property. Werner's

political masters back in Berlin weren't too happy with the fact that their naval commander had been negotiating with a breakaway rebel republic and he was recalled to Germany. In the meantime, Murcia's two warships, seized off the coast of Malaga, became the responsibility of the British.

The loss of two of its ships was just one indication that the days of the Independent Republic of Murcia were soon to be at an end. On land, Arce led Murcian troops towards Albacete, where Madrid government troops were advancing under General Saledo. Not surprisingly perhaps, the superior resources of the national government won through and Saledo was yictorious. Revolts, riots and disturbances in other parts of Spain were also crushed by the Army of the Central Government and the Independent Canton of Murcia became increasingly isolated.

In early January 1874, central government troops, under General Lopez Dominguez, captured Fort Atalaya in Cartagena, which really marked the end of Murcia's cantonal experiment with independence from Spain. Many of the rebel leaders escaped aboard the warship Numancia. Arce, however, stayed and was sentenced to death for his part in Murcia's brief brush with total independence. The Murcian politician remained a popular figure in the region though and after some intense lobbying, the sentence was changed to exile rather than death. He later returned to Murcia and worked as a town councillor in Murcia City until his death in 1898.

The national Spanish republic, which fought so hard to eradicate Arce's **Independent Murcia**, also collapsed late in 1874 and in November of that year, Alphonso XII was proclaimed as the new King of Spain.

King's Coronation Menu

In honour of the **King's Coronation** on 6th May, I thought we would look at recipes for street parties or picnics that we can eat while watching the proceedings. We start with the dish made famous at the **Queen's Coronation** and of course was named accordingly. This dish is ideally served with cold meats and salads, as is the classic Woolton Pie which was a war time favourite when everyone was cooking with rationing. It's interesting to see that these recipes are still very relevant today with healthy eating and some lucky people will have been alive to watch both **Coronations**! Buen Apetito

Coronation Chicken

100g (4oz) mayonnaise (or $\frac{1}{2}$ mayo & $\frac{1}{2}$ crème fraiche)

75g (3oz) mango chutney

1 tsp curry powder

2 tsp lime zest

4 tbsp fresh lime juice

½ tsp salt

500g (1¼lb) skinless, boneless chicken breast fillets - cooked & diced



In a large bowl, whisk together the mayonnaise, chutney, curry powder, lime zest, lime juice and salt. Add chicken and toss with the dressing until well coated. Cover and refrigerate until serving.

(Use half mayonnaise, half crème fraiche for a lower fat version.)

Woolton Pie

1lb diced potatoes

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1lb cauliflower florets
1lb diced carrots
1lb diced swede
3 spring onions
1tsp vegetable extract
1tsp oatmeal
Water



Cook everything together with just enough water to cover, stirring often to prevent it sticking to the pan. Let the mixture cool. Spoon into a pie dish and cover with a crust of potatoes, or wholemeal pastry. Bake in oven temperature 180°C.

Aubergine Tortilla

700g aubergines Small bunch parsley 2 onions 2 tbsp olive oil Salt and pepper 6 eggs



Wash and dice aubergines. Finely chop parsley and peel and dice onions. Heat 1 tbsp oil in a large frying pan. Add onions and cook slowly for 5 minutes until transparent. Remove onions and add remaining oil and cook aubergine cubes for 5 minutes and season with salt and pepper. Beat the eggs for two minutes, add onions to the aubergines and stir gently. Pour the egg evenly over the vegetables. Cook the tortilla on a very low heat for 5 minutes or until underneath is golden brown. Place a plate the size of the frying pan over the mixture and turn over, sliding the tortilla back into the frying pan to cook the other side. Slide onto a plate and sprinkle with

parsley. Serve hot or cold.

Stuffed Artichokes

6 medium artichokes
3 tbsp lemon juice
Salt and pepper
2 medium onions
350g streaky bacon
75g butter
700g ripe tomatoes
2 slices of stale
bread made into
breadcrumbs
Rind and juice of two

oranges 90 tbsp 2 eggs Melted butter





Strip away discoloured artichoke leaves and cut base so the artichoke stands upright. Using scissors, snip off the leave tips and then soak artichoke in cold water and 1 tbsp of lemon juice for 30 minutes. Drain and place in large saucepan of boiling salted water with the remaining lemon juice. Cover and boil gently for 30-45 minutes. Artichokes will float, so turn them during cooking.

Fry onions and bacon in the butter. Add tomatoes (skinned and chopped) and cook. Add breadcrumbs, orange rind and juice, parsley, eggs and seasoning, beating well. Test artichokes by pulling on an outer leaf. If it comes out easily it is cooked. Drain and hold under cold water tap for a few minutes to set the green colour. Scrape out centre slightly and fill with stuffing. Bake in oven for 25 minutes on 190° or gas mark 5.

Carrot Fudge

4 Carrots

2 squares Gelatine

2 tsp Orange essence

Finely grate carrots and boil them in just enough water for 10 minutes. Add flavouring (orange squash with grated rind if you haven't got any orange essence). Add melted gelatine to mixture and cook quickly for a few minutes, stirring all the time. Spoon into a flat dish and allow to set, cut into cubes.



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

FAST is a dedicated team of volunteers trained and certified to deliver potentially life saving first aid in the period between



an ambulance being requested and the arrival of the emergency paramedic crew. **FAST** is available to all residents living on Camposol, either permanently or temporarily, or indeed visitors to the urbanization. Our services are provided completely free of charge and are available to everyone, regardless of nationality. Whilst the majority of our Responders are British, this does not mean that we only serve the British on Camposol.

If you require our assistance in the event of a medical emergency, please call 112 and then call FAST on 868 487 015

As all our Responders are resident on Camposol, they will be able to reach you sooner than the ambulance and will if necessary provide life saving first aid prior to the arrival of the paramedics. In any event, they can be present to monitor the patient (and reassure family members or friends) and gather the necessary information to hand over to the medical crew upon their arrival. In some circumstances this initial support can be critical for a successful outcome.

Since our return to active service following

the end of the pandemic we have been recruiting new Responders on a constant basis to try to ensure that we can provide 24/7 cover - and this process continues. We are planning to run a further initial responder course in May with additional courses throughout the year. If you are interested in joining our Responder Team, please contact us at recruitment@ FAST2016.org No experience is required as all training, certification, equipment and uniform will be provided, along with a more experienced partner - all we ask for is a genuine desire to help the people of Camposol and lots of enthusiasm! It's that time of the trimester where our horses, ponies and donkeys have a special visit from our barefoot farrier. All our horses have been barefoot for several years now, which means they have no shoes. Equines don't need shoes unless they are doing an activity which implies they wear off more hoof than they would naturally do. If you ask a horse to walk on the road, the pavement or concrete, they will erode more hoof than normal, therefore they need shoes to prevent any damage, (or because of orthopaedic purposes). If they live in paddocks and only exercise in the arena or a sandy surface, there is no need for shoes. It's actually healthier for them to be barefoot as it improves circulation. Nuria takes really good care of all of them and we



learn so much from her every day!

Good news about the donkeys that were looking for a new home! It's not easy to find a home for one, even more complicated to find a home for two, but luckily, they have been adopted together which was our

biggest concern. Donkeys create a very strong connection or bond with each other, so it's always important for their emotional welfare to keep them together.

We are very excited about the progress in the new ranch. Our new premises will be located in Los Muñoces - Alhama de Murcia, so very close to where we currently are. For some years now we have been trying to move the animals to a bigger site. It's been a very long process and we have found many bumps in the road, but now it all seems to be working out. We have marked with our architects the distribution of the different paddocks where the animals will live. It's very emotional for us to see the humongous space they will soon have to roam. We have worked so hard to get to this point, but there is still a lot to do. Building work is imminent and hopefully we will move in June.

We are still running all our activities in la Costera de Alhama where we have been

since 2004. We are still receiving school visits, doing our equine therapies with children with development issues and running our **Cavalli Club** on Saturday mornings.

If you would like to become a volunteer to help out with the animal's care, or if you have building/gardening experience and you would like to get involved with the construction of the new ranch, please get in touch with us. Our Volunteers are a very important part of what we do every day. Without their help we would only be able to do so much. All of us together can change the lives of many more animals. We can't start without mentioning the weather! Remember this time last year? We were under water whilst the UK was basking in wonderful sunshine! However, the Spanish think there is a 'tormenta' on its way! It is needed, as the local farmers are trying to grow crops to go towards making up for the deficit caused by the Russia/Ukraine war. Understandably this war is upsetting the economy and making life so difficult for us all. Costs are sky high and charities are struggling.

As you know MAMAS was solely for urgent requests, but over the years we have been hands-on in raising money for sterilising your pets. Sadly we became inundated with requests for cat sterilising, particularly from people caring for feral colonies. This absolutely did our accounts no good and when receiving several large requests for emergency surgery we were having to give less. We have now more or less had to revert to urgent cases only and turn cat requests away.

A Spanish lady pointed us in the direction of the Town Hall for money to sterilise feral colonies, but this money ran out very quickly. It just shows the size of the problem. We now have a meeting with a lady from the Town Hall, to find out exactly what we can do to help this situation.



Talking about emergencies, the much loved Coco, a handsome bodeguero, had an obstruction which turned into peritonitis. He spent a week in hospital after an operation to remove a metre of his intestine. Apparently it was 'touch and go' the whole week and the little guy had to fight. He lost so much weight that he was skin and bone and his owners were broken hearted. The whole procedure was very costly and the owner was struggling to pay the bill, but we were happy to help in such a deserving case to make sure that Coco survived. His owners called in recently to tell us he has made it and was on the road to recovery. Happy days!

A smashing lady has given us some great donations. We have been so busy sorting it all out, but it is not easy with only the manager and one volunteer. However, fingers crossed we might have a new volunteer to do a couple of hours. Every little helps (as the saying goes!). If you have a spare hour or two to help us, we would be very grateful. We are just taking away the autumn/winter clothes and replacing them with the spring/summer range (posh - that's us!). There are lots of secondhand items; beds, bedding, books, mirrors, pictures, rugs, curtains, nets, furniture and of course shoes and clothes. We look forward to seeing you soon. Mazarrón Town

Not far from Camposol is the lovely town of Mazarrón which for those who live on Camposol, is the nearest town. Mazarrón is rich in history, going well back before the Roman times. They say the word Mazarrón, came from the Moors who lived here at times, before the Christians took it back. When you enter the town of Mazarrón, you can't help but notice the huge mine that dominates the town and put Mazarrón on the map.

Mazarrón has its own Castle and Watch Tower. The Castle is closed at the moment. An old mine shaft collapsed in the Castle grounds and it needs to be repaired. The Watch Tower is in the heart of the town and there is a park and winding path that takes you to the top. There are some good views of Mazarrón and if you are brave, a metal ladder that takes you to the very top. Unfortunately the park is a bit run down, which is a shame.



The Saturday morning market is in the main carpark. It can get very busy and parking is a nightmare, so arrive early, to save walking too far. It is a great place for buying good fresh vegetables and practicing your Spanish on the stall holders. During the week, the carpark is still very busy, but once parked, you can walk to the main square where you will find the Post Office and Town Hall. The Town Hall is very

modern with big glass windows, but it is now an exhibition building and when open, you can get a map and information about Mazarrón. The map will show you some interesting places to visit.



Another interesting place to visit during the week is Mazarrón Museum, opposite the Police Station at the far end of town, if heading towards Puerto de Mazarrón. Entry to the museum is free and there is plenty to see. It gives you the history of the mines, Castle and a brief history of the town during the 19th Century.

Next month, Shaun will introduce you to another interesting place not far from Camposol.




Council Invests in Camposol

It is over a month since the new Dog Park opened behind the Business Centre and Farmacia on Sector A, near the children's play area. It is comprised of a large, fully fenced-off site, with a sand base, (wear sensible shoes as the sand does stain, but brushes off), plus seating for the owners. It has loads of equipment including: dog training apparatus including a tunnel, seesaw, a water fountain and litter bins. You enter via a double gated lobby area, making the site safe for both owner and dog. As a new dog owner with a rescue dog who we are still training, it is great that we are able to take her to the dog park and safely let her off the lead to run and play fetch.

Work has also started on the proposed fitness area adjacent to the Football Pitch on Sector D with the area cleared and ready for construction to begin.

Both projects came about last year when the Town Council asked for projects to be submitted for funding. The above projects where identified and individuals wrote and submitted the successful bids.



It is hoped that the Town Council runs the same funding process this year and in preparation for that we are asking residents to identify projects that could be submitted for funding; perhaps children's play areas on Camposol B, C and D.

2025 and Camposol Free Community Sports assisted the individuals who submitted the bids with gathering votes for the proposals. Clinics where held on Commercial Centres A and B to help residents with the computerised voting system and handing out leaflets providing information on the projects. Birding in Murcia

Galapagos

Have you ever read a novel called 'This Thing of Darkness' by Harry Thompson? It is based on the true story of the voyages of H.M.S. Beagle by Captain Fitzroy, Charles Darwin and its crew. They explored South America and mapped the regions of Patagonia, Tierra del Fuego and parts of Chile before finally arriving at the enchanted islands of the **Galapagos**. It is not only a great read, but it is an incredible story of adventure, bravery, endurance, philosophical arguments and of course scientific discovery. I strongly recommend trying to get hold of a copy, even if it is probably now out of print. I bought my copy second hand on the internet. I read the book just before my visit to the islands and I can still feel its influence. I think the story enchanted me along with the islands.

We started our weeks cruise in Puerto Ayuro on the main island of Santa Cruz before starting our tour of the Western isles of Floreana (including Post Office Bay), Isabella Island (the largest of the group), Fernandino Island, Santiago Island, North Seymour and then returned to Santa Cruz.



The wildlife was absolutely stunning and has incredibly little fear of humans. Photography proved quite difficult as everything was a little bit too close for my camera to focus. In fact, nearly every time I saw a Galapagos Flycatcher, it inevitably finished perching at the end of my camera lens. I've never had this problem before!

On Santa Cruz, the main island, we visited a restaurant with a large privately owned nature reserve called El Chato. The bird life was good, but it was really known for the large number of Giant Tortoises that visited the area at this time of the year. There were probably hundreds of these giants meandering very slowly around the grasslands, or wallowing in the small pools that they had created. They must have thought we were hyperactive, as their speed of movement compared with our fast pace was very noticeable. This slow pace of life clearly suited them as they were very long lived and the oldest recorded tortoise lived to over 200 years old!

The next island we visited was Floreana, which was known for its few inhabitants; two German families who lived there early last century and a lonely place called Post Office Bay. The German families were famous in the nineteen thirties and forties for their Robinson Crusoe-type existence, but unfortunately they fell out with each other. It often happens that neighbours don't get on, but the complete disappearance of one family and some later French settlers remains a mystery still to be solved. Did they leave voluntarily, or was it something more sinister? I don't think we will ever know!

Besides a beautiful beach with very laid back and friendly Sea Lions, Post Office Bay was known for an old barrel on a post that had been there for centuries. Evidently, it was put there by whalers for people to leave messages and letters. Tradition has it that the next visiting ship is obliged to collect any post addressed to any of their destinations and subsequently deliver it. We left some mail and collected several messages with UK addresses, which we will post on our return.

Our boat was called MY Passion, which had a small crew of about 9 or 10 people including our very knowledgeable wildlife guide and was home to our small group of 12 people for a complete week as we toured the Western Isles. Our daily ritual was a birding/wildlife walk at 5.30am or 6am, followed by breakfast and then snorkelling in the crystal clear waters until lunchtime. Afternoons were normally a siesta, followed by a lecture or more snorkelling or kayaking and then a final walk before sunset. We soon got used to boarding and disembarking from the fast zodiacs which ferried us to the islands.

On one of our Zodiac trips we were accompanied by a large school of Bottle-Nosed Dolphins who thought it was great fun racing our boats, but it wasn't really a serious contest as they were a lot faster than us. It was fascinating watching the adolescent males showing off their acrobatic skills by leaping out of the water.



all the fearless Sea Lions, Tortoises and Iguanas, with the only worry being stepping on a basking animal. The birds were also incredibly tame, but a little more mobile. It was so different from normal birding where things fly away as soon as they notice you. Quite often we were the object of their inquisitive eyes! This was particularly obvious with the seabirds and it was quite common to sit close to **Brown** Pelicans on the beach whilst the Blue Footed Boobies were flying past us to their nesting ledges. Boobies look similar to Gannets and are similar in shape, flight and fishing techniques. However, their bright blue feet are a sight for sore eyes. They look as if they have been paddling in a pot of blue paint. It certainly doesn't look natural.

Another seabird that was an absolute pleasure to watch swimming and coming to shore to its nesting cavities in the low cliffs was the endemic Galapagos Penguin that were often disturbing the very colourful Sally Lightfoot Crabs.

Whilst out at sea our boat was followed continuously by magnificent **Frigate** birds. I was wondering why until I saw our chef throwing the organic kitchen scraps overboard. As soon as this happened there was a mass of wheeling Frigate birds diving down to collect a tasty snack. It is obviously learned-behaviour as they normally act as pirates chasing innocent Terns and Boobies until they drop the food they were taking home for their chicks. I suppose it's one way of earning a living.



On our many walks inland on various islands there were quite a lot of Yellow Warblers and Mockingbirds flitting about in the shrubby undergrowth. I was particularly fond of the Yellow Warblers as they were constantly searching for small insects and are a hyperactive tiny bird. Once seen, they were very noticeable in their bright yellow plumage and their orange caps. This bird is considered a subspecies that is only found in these islands. I have to admit that I was taking lots of photos of them as they are amazingly photogenic. It's a good job that modern cameras are digital, as I would have spent a small fortune on film!

The **Galapagos Mockingbird** is an endemic species only found in the islands. When Charles Darwin was there, he noticed that the birds differed in size on different islands and were significantly different from the ones he had seen in South America. This led him to believe that the **Mockingbirds** on different islands were evolving to suit the environmental conditions through natural selection. It can be concluded that this fairly common omnivorous bird played a big role in Darwin's theories about evolution and natural selection; a little bird, but punching above its weight!

Every bird I was seeing on the islands had its own story to tell and they were all new to me. I would love to write about them all, but I would be in trouble with the Editor for being too long-winded, so I will finish by mentioning a couple of waders that I enjoyed seeing closely. Well, the first one isn't strictly speaking a wader, but it does have very long legs and feeds in deepish lagoons. It is a Galapagos Flamingo, which is believed to be closely related to the Chilean Flamingo. We were lucky to find a small family group in an inland lagoon. These Flamingos are a little bit smaller and a lot pinker compared to the Flamingos we see at San Pedro del Pinatar. I was quite surprised to learn that they are quite long lived and it is not unknown for birds to be 50 years old.



The next wader is a lifer for me (un bimbo), it is a **Semipalmated Plover**, so named for the partial webbing it has between its toes. If you look very carefully at the photo you can just see the webbing on its feet. It is a winter visitor in the islands and is really a North American wader, but a good tick all the same!

This just leaves me with my final offering, a bird that is relatively common in Europe; a **Whimbrel**. It is a winter visitor or partial migrant in the islands and has a huge world-wide distribution and will winter in places as far apart as Africa, South Asia and Australasia. It also breeds in Scotland, so it really is a world traveller!

Would I visit the islands again? I'm not sure. They are barren, the vegetation is scarce, there is little fresh water and there are lots of black lava flows. They are certainly not the sort of idyllic desert islands of our fantasies.

Am I glad that I visited? There is no doubt about it, I would probably go there again, because the islands and their role in Darwin's theory about the evolution of species will always have a place in my heart.



FRENCH OPEN TENNIS

Sunday 28th May - Sunday 11th June - The French Open Tennis Tournament (known also as the Tournoi de Roland-Garros)

This is one of the four Grand Slam Tennis events which has been held since 1891 for men and 1897 for women. Until 1925, entry was restricted to members of French clubs. The tournament became an Open Championship in 1968, although it was closed to contract professionals in 1972.



The event is named after the stadium it is played in, which is in turn named after

a World War I pilot named Roland Garros and was once played on grass.

The Men's Singles winner is awarded the Coupe des Mousquetaires (Musketeer's Cup). It is supposed to symbolize the victories of four famous French tennis players, who together make up the 'Four Musketeers': Jacques Brugnon, Jean Borotra, Henri Cochet and René Lacoste.



The Women's Singles winner is awarded the Coupe Suzanne Lenglen.

The 1953 French Pro Tennis

Tournament was played on indoor wood at the Palais des Sports and may not have been considered at the time as an official French Professional tournament.

In 1968, the **French Open** became the first Grand Slam tournament to go 'open', allowing both amateurs and professional players to compete and was won by Australian **Ken Rosewall** in May/June 1968, while the last **French Pro**, won by Australian **Rod Laver**, took place a few weeks later in July 1968.

It was announced in March 2007 that the event would provide equal prize money for both men and women in all rounds.

When Swiss Roger Federer won his first French Open title in 2009, he equalled Pete Sampras' record of 14 grand slam titles and became the sixth man to win all four majors. Rafael Nadal won the 2014 French Open, becoming the first man to win the same Grand Slam event nine times. His win in 2018 made it 11 French Open titles.

A Gentle Start a Week Late

The first day of the **SAMM Spring Race Season** was cancelled due to the very high wind forecast, but March 26th dawned bright and clear with a gentle south west breeze of 5 knots.

Six boats started at 11.15am; two Sailfish from the Balaton Group, two Gambas and a Laser 2000 from the Shoestring Group and John Downs' Laser Radial. The dinghies all got away well, but it was a bad start for both Sailfish. Vision got stuck in irons and Sirocco went round the wrong buoy so both were at the back of the fleet. It was then a gentle procession around the course. At 11.40am the wind dropped to 3 knots and backed to the south which caught out a few boats and enabled Vision, whose crew read the wind shift well, to close the gap on the leaders. Just as the 'about to finish' signal was made, the wind increased to 4.5 knots and backed further to the east, enabling Vision to cross the finish line 10 seconds ahead of the Gamba Uno.

The 2nd race started promptly at 12.29pm, again in a 5 knot breeze which held throughout the race. All boats got away smartly, with John Down first over and then the fleet started to spread out a little between the first and second marks as the faster boats pulled away from the slower ones. There was little excitement, but John had to do a 360 penalty at the second mark allowing the **Gamba Cuatro** to take the lead and there was some close racing between John and the **Laser 2000** throughout the race.

Disappointment and Drama

The forecast 20 plus knot winds overnight were supposed to drop to 14 knots by 11am on Sunday April 2nd, but they had not moderated by delayed times of 11.30am then 12pm. Two novice crews decided not to race in the conditions which forced the Race Officer to abandon the day. The high winds continued well into the afternoon so it was a sensible decision.

Wednesday, April 5th was the first **SAMM Mid-Week Race Day** - a new idea for 2023 requested by some members.

First Race - The wind was NW 9.5 knots but gusty. The start timing was hindered when the horn jammed, so a minute was added. Most boats started well with the **Omega, Sirocco** and **Laser Radial** in the lead pack. **Vision** had a problem with the rigging and did not start.

Julian, who sailed **Sirocco** single-handed, almost T-boned a dinghy at the first mark when it failed to heed his call of 'Starboard'. He had to heave to on lap 4 to fix the rudder down haul. The **Omega** capsized at the 1st mark on the 2nd lap, but quickly got going without losing much time



but had to return to the shore to replace lost battens, re-joining the race later. The drama continued with the capsizing of the Laser Radial during lap 4. It was righted once, but the rudder jammed and over she went again. The support boat attended, but the sailor, John, was in the water for about 7 minutes trying to right her and got very cold. The support boat crew wrapped him in a thermal blanket, took him ashore for a warm shower, then recovered the Laser. John said "I cannot praise enough the support boat crews' recovery of myself

Second Race - The wind had increased to 10 knots from N, turning more East halfway through, but was less gusty. The Omega and Laser Radial staved ashore so 4 boats raced as Vision had sorted the rigging problem. This race has much less drama. The Laser 2000 moved up the field, but was late doing so and, despite finishing 1st on the water, was 3rd after handicaps were applied. Realising John had been taken ashore by the support boat, he re-joined the race but missed a mark. The Race Officer thanked him for his honesty but had to mark him DNF. A good end to a dramatic day's racing.

Review of the 2022/23 Season

The 2022/23 season started in mid-September, later than usual because of the reduced size of the league due to the reconstruction of the Spanish football system. The first game was a trip to Aguilas, normally an enjoyable day out, but not so this time. The game had been moved to their third-choice ground at the last minute and we found there was no canteen and only one toilet which, to gain access to, you had to go outside the ground and walk round to the other side. The game ended in a 2-2 draw and the next two games were both drawn, before we gained our first victory, 4-0 at home to CD Lumbreras. The next game was also



win of the season; 4-1 at home to the eventual champions Balsicas.

Wins against Atletico Santa Cruz, Mar Menor and Aguilas in the return fixture, coupled with three more draws, saw us still unbeaten after 12 games on 18th December when we travelled to face SFC Minerva. Never a good hunting-ground for MFC, we suffered our first defeat. Minerva went ahead in the first minute and we thought we had rescued a point and maintained the unbeaten record when Chiky equalised in the 86th minute, only for Minerva to grab

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the winner in time added on.

Despite this setback, we entered the New Year with two wins, 3-2 at home to CD Algar and 1-0 away to CD Lumbreras. This left us in 2nd place, the promotion play-off position, four points ahead of 3rd place with just seven games of the season left. We were the top scorers in the league at that stage and with the best defensive record. What happened next is inexplicable; five successive defeats, leaving us thinking less about promotion and more about relegation. A 4-1 home win over already relegated Mar Menor in the penultimate game gave us a little breathing space, but we still needed a draw in our final game at home to Algezares UD to avoid the prospect of a relegation play-off. We managed this 0-0 and sent our neighbours Bala Azul into the relegation play-offs where they were beaten 1-0 on aggregate by Union Molinense CF.

For the second season running, the influx of cash by the owners and the introduction of so many foreign-born players did not succeed. Relegation from the Tercera was followed by near relegation from the Preferente. I cannot see there will be many of the foreign-born players remaining next season. Carlos Rivas has already announced that he has left **MFC**.

However, we must thank our President Diego for all his hard work and enthusiasm and hope that he is not too dispirited and will continue to work to achieve promotion back to the Tercera next season.

Other News

There is little activity at the Football Club during May and June until training resumes in July. However, representatives of the Spanish supporters Group, the Redboys, played a friendly game of walking football against members of Los Amigos de Mazarrón FC and the Camposol Walking Football Club and a great time was had by all at the Estadio Municipal, the home of MFC.
