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

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THE SKY IN OCTOBER - THE **MONTH OF CHANGE**

October is a month of transition and change for both northern and southern hemispheres. After the September equinox, the different parts of the world are gradually changing seasons. In the Northern Hemisphere, first comes fall and then winter. Conversely, in the Southern Hemisphere first comes spring and then summer. Therefore, light is decreasing in some parts of the world while increasing in others



The Meteor Shower runs from October 2nd to November 17th. But the best night for watching it is the one between October 21st and 22nd at 00:02 UTC with 20 meteors per hour. At this time the Moon phase is 51.2%, so the conditions to enjoy it might not be the best because of the Moonlight. You can try to see them after the Moon sets though)

LUNAR ECLIPSE

On the night of 28/29th October there will be a partial lunar eclipse perfectly visible during Astronomy Night tour in Finca Astronomica so if you'd like to enjoy the spectacle with delicious dinner and drinks while listening to astronomers

explaining the mechanics of the eclipse, Finca Astronomica is a place to be.

It may not be a full BLOOD MOON but you will see the Moon taking on a red coat as the eclipse progresses.

THE SEVEN SISTERS AND THE BULL



In October one of the most beloved open cluster is visible with naked eye in the evening sky. The Pleyades, aka The Seven Sisters, will be right next

to the Taurus constellation. As legend has it, the seven sisters are there protected by the mighty bull from the enthusiastic hunter Orion. As it was done in the ancient times you can actually check your eye sight by watching the Pleyades.

THE GAS GIANTS

Throughout October two of the biggest planets of the Solar System will be visible on the evening sky: Jupiter and Saturn. When looked at via the telescope you can easily see the stripes on the surface of Jupiter as well as its four Galilean Moons: Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. Saturn will be perfectly visible with its magnificent rings and its biggest moon, Titan. It's an unforgettable sight so if you don't own a telescope, join the team in Finca Astronomica for one of their Astronomy Nights.

The October programme had not been finalised at the time of writing, but we have a couple of dates for the diary.





Birding in Murcia

I have recently been in the UK and at the beginning of September I joined three old friends for our annual boys alone birding trip. Each year we visit a different area in the UK for a three day trip to the local bird reserves. This year we decided to visit Suffolk. It is my UK home patch so I was tasked with organising the agenda. We met at Lakenheath RSPB reserve and afterwards booked into a hotel in Lowestoft for three nights. We had decided to go in early September as there are normally a few waders making their early autumn migration down the East coast. We thought it would be interesting if we could coincide with this wader migration.

Unfortunately, the message clearly didn't arrive in time for all the migrating waders to join us. It may have had something to do with the sunny weather stuck over this part of the country and the lack of helpful winds from the North. Needless to say everywhere was very quiet with little birding interest.

Anyway, we enjoyed lovely sunny weather and walks in some beautiful landscapes. There is always something to see on our rambles, but on this occasion it was more about dragonflies than birds.

We visited reserves at Lakenheath, Carlton Marshes, Minsmere and Hollesley marshes.

All of them are wetland reserves with plenty of habitat dragonflies. As there were lots of sun each day it was perfect for spotting dragonflies. They favour sunny days to come out, play and impress you with their appearance. We were enchanted watching them all: the smallish Common and Ruddy Darters, especially the red coloured males; the brownish coloured Brown Hawkers and the beautiful and abundant Migrant Hawkers. must have spent watching, especially the Migrant Hawkers, patrolling their waterside territories. At times they zip about so quickly and it is incredible their speed and manoeuvrability. Ι patiently waited for them to land, but they had different ideas and a lot of boundless energy. However, eventually one or two cooperate by stopping for a rest while I took a photograph, quite surprising really!



Migrant Hawkers breed in Southern Britain and also in Murcia. It is one of the later dragonflies and will fly well into

autumn. The males are quite striking and very attractive and the females are a duller brown and yellowish colour. It breeds in well vegetated wetland conditions. The larvae are unable to cope with very low temperatures and this limits the expansion of the species into more northern climes. Although it has recently reached southern Scotland, so it can't be too sensitive to cooler temperatures.

Besides the dragonflies, we were entertained watching a couple of **Chinese Water Deer** surreptitiously grazing amongst the long grass. It was quite difficult to see them as they occasionally moved behind large clumps of herbage and were obscured from view.

Chinese Water Deer are native to Korea and China and are a small, cute looking deer. They were first introduced to Britain in 1870 and there were collections at Woburn Abbey, London and Whipsnade zoos. The majority of Chinese Water Deer in the UK are escapees and their offspring from these herds. They have now spread to Cambridgeshire, Norfolk, Suffolk and North Essex.

Although birds were a bit scarce at times, we did manage to see 90 different species during our trip. Most were fairly common with just the occasional uncommon species. One very common bird entertained us briefly, a juvenile *Continued on page 25*

Moorhen. It was so focused on finding a tasty titbit that it swam closely by us in a small pool totally unaware of our presence. Either that or it was studiously ignoring us.

One of the striking looking birds we were seeing were Egyptian geese. They are native to Sub-Saharan Africa and the Nile Valley. It's a fair old distance from Suffolk! However, having a striking appearance they were introduced into UK wildfowl collections as far back as the seventeenth century. Yes, you've guessed it, the birds we were seeing are descendants of escaped birds that have naturalised in Suffolk. I think it is unlikely that you will see one in Murcia.

At Lakenheath we were seeing a lot of **Great White Egrets**, probably as many as eight together on the river bank. I don't think I've ever seen so many of these birds together in one place! A few years ago, I would have been very excited about this as they were quite a rarity. However, due to a very recent range expansion they are becoming quite commonplace in UK wetlands, particularly in the South. They are also reasonably commonplace in Murcia.

At both Lakenheath Fen and Minsmere we considered ourselves very lucky to be entertained by **Hobbies** hunting dragonflies. These small birds of prey look like Swifts on the wing, but are slightly larger. They are

extremely fast and agile, but they need to be to catch dragonflies, which are highly manoeuvrable. They are pretty little falcons and summer visitors in the UK, but only passage migrants in Murcia. They feed mainly on dragonflies and other flying insects and will also catch House Martins, Swallows or other small birds if an opportunity presents itself. Our trip had been fairly quiet with

an opportunity presents itself. Our trip had been fairly quiet with few species or actual birds seen, although we had visited four very good bird reserves. It was slightly disappointing and really very surprising. However, part of the reserve at Minsmere came to the rescue. We had walked around most of the reserve without too much excitement until we arrived at the sluice on the coastal side of the reserve. In one hour we probably had more avian highlights than we had experienced during the previous three days!




We had walked south from the sluice in a narrow valley with the dunes and sea on our left hand side and marshland on our right. It was an area of short grassland interspersed with small to medium sized shrubs. It must have looked like paradise for the tired and hungry small migrant birds that had decided to rest and



feed up there. Within a couple of hundred metres we came across a group of passage migrants that were of a similar size to a Robin. They were in fact, three separate species: Stonechat, Whinchat and Northern Wheatear. Quite a collection of good birds!

Male **Stonechats** are striking looking smallish birds with black heads and wings, a white collar and orange chests. They are quite unmistakeable and are easily spotted as they are in the habit of perching on higher *Continued on page 26*


They like to be seen and show how handsome they are. In the UK they are partial migrants and will over-winter in warmer coastal locations. In Murcia they are residents whose population increases in winter when they are joined by some birds from colder climes.

Whinchats are quite uncommon passage migrants in both the UK and Murcia. Some birds breed in more northern and westerly areas in the UK. However, they are not particularly abundant in these breeding areas. They breed in northern Europe and over-winter in Africa. They are closely related to their more common relative, the Stonechat. Our third member of this

gang of three is the **Northern** wheatear. The males are quite handsome and the females are also attractive, but with more subtle colouring of their plumage. They are both migrants and summer visitors to both the UK and Spain, but are quite uncommon as breeding birds in Murcia. They may possibly breed in the north of the region. They are insectivorous birds which means they have to migrate to warmer climes in winter. In fact, they make one of the longest journeys of any small bird, crossing ocean, ice and desert. They migrate from Sub-Saharan Africa in spring over a vast area of the Northern hemisphere, including Central Asia, Europe, Greenland, Alaska and parts of Canada. Impressive!


After our trio of birds flew South, we walked back to the sluice where there were a couple of other migrants that had been seen there, Whitethroats and Lesser Whitethroats. We were keen to see these small warblers before they took off on their long journeys to Africa. It proved to be quite easy to find these little skulkers as they were feeding on some gorgeous, fruity looking blackberries. I say feeding, but they were gorging themselves

these nicely ripe fruits. on They were clearly attempting to fatten up (take on energy) before making their long onward journeys to Sub-Saharan Africa. Our final birds of that marvellous afternoon's birdina were two small waders that are uncommon passage migrants in both Murcia and the UK. They are strongly migratory, breeding in the Siberian Arctic and over-wintering mainly in Africa, but also in South and Southeast Asia, Australia and New Zealand. They were a bit distant, but recognisable, with their distinctive down-curved bills, reminiscent of Curlews, their namesakes.

Camposol Explorers ***

Expat in Mazarron

My name is Shaun and I have run the Expat in Mazarron YouTube channel since arriving here in Spain in 2015. It's all about me living in Camposol, Spain, places of interest, property, going out walking and many more things about Spain. I've set up a group called **Camposol Explorers** which is about exploring once a month in the Murcia Region and beyond.

At the time of you reading this, **Camposol Explorers** will have been out on their first outing this year since my hip operation and it's great to be back out again exploring with the group.

Isla Plana

About a 25 minute drive from Camposol on the RM3 towards Pto de Mazarrón, following the signs along the coast to Isla Plana.

A lovely village with sandy beaches, cafés, restaurants and bars with plenty of free parking spaces. As you enter the village there is a sharp bend and you may notice a few cars are parked here - it's called Cueva del Agua. This is where the divers come to cave dive and is for "high technical level", divers with a lot of experience and using the correct equipment. You will notice at the entrance a couple of memorial plaques on the rock for those who died trying to explore the caves while diving.



Further on you will notice a small harbour on the right with its own small private cove with steep steps leading to it. It reminds me of the small coastal villages in Cornwall. You will notice small boats docked here protected from the sea.



As you arrive at the heart of the village there are many shops but limited parking, carry on a bit further and there are some traffic lights and just on the right is a parking area. There is a sandy beach and during the summer months toilets, beach bar and life guard hut. You can walk along the pathways with children's play areas and see all the fishing boats all moored up.



Whilst walking along the wooden decking you will notice roman ruins dotted about and then you see a long building which is the thermal baths. Known as the Marrana Bath it dates back to the 18th century. Inside has a communal bath, a room for the boiler, small rooms with individual bathtubs and a series of galleries that communicated with the springs, from where the water was raised with a

waterwheel. Unfortunately, it's not open to the public now.





A viewing platform which looks out towards Pto de Mazarrón and La Azohia is a great place to to watch the sun set over Pto de Mazarrón. Also, you will notice the small church, dedicated to the Patron Saint of Fishermen, Virgen del Carmen.



Next month, Camposol Explorers are out again and we are visiting a lake very near to Camposol.

The vessel is one of 3 (soon to be 4 - details below) operated by Cunard Line, owned by Carnival Cruises, USA, as is a number of other operating cruise lines, one including P&O. Current sisters being 'Queen Mary 2' and 'Queen Elizabeth', each having called previously.

Queen Victoria my salute

The building of 'Victoria' commenced in 2007 and has a passenger capacity of 2489 and a maximum crew of 900.

The remainder of cruises for

September is a ship departing Southampton on the 19th via Lisbon with an arrival to Cartagena scheduled for 25th and returning to Southampton on 1st October. On turnaround returns to the Mediterranean, but not including Cartagena, but to a number of other Ports including Lisbon, Portugal and Piraeus (Greece) arriving back in Southampton on 20th October.

A 4th Cunard operated vessel includes the new build named 'Queen Anne' with a 3000 passenger capacity, having been 'floated out' from the builders in May this year with a scheduled maiden voyage of May 3 2024.

'Celebration Beyond' entered service in April 2022 (shown on the photograph departing outward bound to Cartagena) passing 'Faro de Navidad' lighthouse and is 3 within the class, the others being 'Celebrity Edge', 'Celebrity Apex' and 'Celebrity Ascent'.



The current Master is Kate McCue. A current cruise typically operating includes Piraeus on 5th September, Naples on 7th, Civitavecchia (Rome) on 8th. The passenger maximum is 3950, crew of 1400, owner is Royal Caribbean Group and operator Celebrity Cruise Line.

Point of interest – the ship is departing Civitavecchia October 30th for a destination of Fort Lauderdale, USA, where it will be operating a Caribbean cruise throughout 2024.

Autumn can be a time fraught with anxiety for both owners and their dogs with the arrival of fireworks. If only we could tell our poor dogs that this is nothing to worry about, that it's all just loud noise, but sadly this isn't possible.

Difficult though it may be, there are a few things owners can do to try to alleviate their dogs' stress and fear. It is possible to get different firework sound effects from the internet which can be played at very low level for the dog while giving high-value treats and praise for being calm. Turn off the sound and stop the treats. Repeat this action with the sound at a low level until your dog looks at you expectantly when you turn it on. It's essential to ensure that he does not show any signs of anxiety throughout this desensitisation process. In subsequent sessions, gradually turn up the sound, vary the recordings to include different types of fireworks until he/ she starts to associate the noises with good things.

Other options are:

- (a) purchase pressure wraps like a dog anxiety vest or 'thunder shirt' which puts gentle pressure on the dog's body reducing anxiety. Condition him/her to the vest beforehand so he/she is comfortable wearing it.
- (b) Organise a long walk/hike/ playtime with his/her friends earlier in the day to tire him/her

out. Mentally and physically tired pups may be less likely to react to fireworks.

- (c) Ensure that meals/potty times are set well before the start of the fireworks so he/she can eat in peace, digest the meal and do potty without being terrified.
- (d) Owners could try to keep their dog distracted by providing a Kong feeder, stuffed with special treats to refocus their attention, or a frozen treat with something they like.
- (e) Close curtains, plug in a white noise machine, or turn on some calming music loud enough to drown out the fireworks.
- (f) If your dog likes to be in a crate, completely cover with a thick blanket and play music or sounds. (Do not close the crate door).
- (g) Consider supplements to support and calm your dog at this stressful time; try to find calming chews, a pheromone collar or diffuser to promote relaxation.
- (h) Despite advice that giving comfort will reinforce a dog's fear, as fireworks raise genuine terror for a dog sitting close to them, stroking and quietly reassuring them can help.

All shelters really hate to see former residents return and one such poor boy is **Nanuk** who was with us some years ago. Sadly he was returned with the story that his owner moved home, neighbours didn't like dogs, and complained about the smell of pee(!!).

Nanuk is a very handsome White Alsation, born 11.08.18, neutered, vaccinated, chipped, house-trained, is good with other dogs and loves people.


After the Summer we've been having, it feels very strange to be thinking about a **Christmas** show, but already

Lisa Entwistle is taking on a huge challenge and exciting adventure with a cycle ride from Banff in Canada to New Mexico. **The Great Divide.** We follow her adventure and in this 2nd part we read all about her trip from **Elkford** to **Whitefish** and a surprise visit from some Americans she met whilst riding the **Camino de Santiago** in Spain....

Day 3-5 Elkford to Eureka



Ride your ride, live your life.

Setting off from **Elkford** I started with saddle sores. I made the schoolgirl error of changing my saddle before I set off from the UK for a "better" one. Turns out expensive does not equal better. Passing by **Sparwood** mining town and eating a massive brunch with a pancake side, (normally I'd never manage all that), I knew I was in a lot of trouble with my bottom. I am so frustrated because my legs are in good shape for this, but the sores are holding me back.

After another 2000ft of climbing, mainly out of the saddle, on some rough mountain passes, we arrived in **Fernie.** I found a bike shop to replace my saddle and get replacement disc brakes. As common as mine are in the UK, the stock of misuma in the US is sparse. Mike the bike shop owner offered his back yard for us to camp in, saving us



travelling any further.

Leaving **Fernie** the next morning with my two amigos I had met en route, we headed for **Grassmere**, through some real Canadian Rockies wilderness, no shops or towns, just tracks and mountains with rivers and streams. The streams were a welcome relief for the saddle sores!

Another 2000+ft of climbing and into **Grassmere** we rolled, stopping at a beautiful lake to cowboy camp for the evening. The peace, quiet and tranquility was wonderful. I had my first go at hanging my food in a bear bag in the trees, 3rd time lucky!

Up early and heading for the USA boarder and **Eureka.** It seemed funny queuing up on a bike with the cars and trucks to have my passport and visa checked. First stop, I had to call at the pharmacy for some dressings for my backside and then made the decision to have the afternoon and possibly tomorrow morning off the bike to recover. I felt bad leaving the friends I had made so far along the way, but I knew I needed rest and trying

to keep up was not good for me or them. The same with life, this is my ride, I need to do it at my pace. Following someone else was never the plan and I want to enjoy the journey. I'm not on anyone's timescales but my own although I have loved the support and company of my new friends so far. Too often in life I have followed others and ended up not where I wanted to be. You only get one life, live it how you want to and enjoy the people you come across along the way. Hopefully I will catch up with my friends tomorrow en route, but one day at a time, with no pressure.

Day 6-8 "The real treasure is the friends we make along the way" (Stand By Me, 1985), Setting off from **Eureka** I headed into the



Akamina Kishinena National Park for a planned three days, totally off grid. I have a satellite link so that my nearest and dearest can track me, also in case I do run into some serious trouble with a bear at least someone knows where to come and collect my body from,

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leaving no trace (only kidding mum!).

The climbs were totally insane, indescribable and extremely tough in parts. No one ever tells you about the parts of this trail where the "paths" are just rocks and boulders uphill for 35+miles. However, the scenery was breathtaking and well worth it.

With my amigos, Chris and Jamie, we climbed and we climbed. As the midday sun hits my camel bag, my drinking water becomes the same temperature as warm tea, so stopping to filter clean fresh cold water from streams is a true delight.

We spent the night pitched at **Wurtz Cabin**, and set off to do the same thing the day after, reaching the town of **Whitefish**, a full day ahead of my planned schedule.

It is becoming apparent that the journey and the people you meet along the way is far more important than the destination, how far I get each day is a bonus. Each day brings its own surprises and hellish moments. After 7 days on the bike I decided to take a zero day. (A day with no miles). As I woke up, a myriad of emotions washed over me - 300+ miles, 17k+ foot of climbing and only a week into my marathon solo trip.

I had a video call with my mum who, as always, put my hat back on straight. So I pulled up my big girl pants and headed to the army supply store to get stocked up on dried food. I then had to change up my front plastic pannier bag straps for more secure hose clips. The old ones were slipping round into the wheel spokes on the descents with all of the bouncing.

In June, I cycled the **Camino de Santiago** and en route met Americans, Lauri Ann & Andy -today I was blown away when



they paid me a surprise visit, driving nearly 3 hours out of their way to meet me in **Whitefish** for a late lunch. I have been so lucky in my life to meet some wonderful people, friends who have been with me through thick and thin, new friends who surprise me with their support and kindness and my long suffering family, all there when I need them.

This journey so far has really proven to me that there are good people in this world, kindness is shared and all around us. Give it generously and without expecting anything in return. This year has been a hard year for me, but it has been a growth year. I have stopped fixating on what has gone wrong and started to appreciate the



journey, learning its lessons and loving the people it presents in my path.



Tomorrow I'll be heading into the **Flathead National Forest** for three or four days, again off grid and one of the longest sections without towns or re supply. The daily pre ride anxiety is already kicking in.



HISTORY SNIPPETS

The Aguilas Casino

The word 'casino' conjures up images of crowded smoke-filled rooms filled with giant roulette tables, roulette wheels, baccarat tables and other gambling paraphernalia.

In some respects, the modern Casino building, situated in the Murcian port town of Aguilas, on Plaza Robles Vives 2, conforms to these perceptions. Go through the impressive entrance way, ascend a flight of steps onto the first floor and then turn first right, and one enters into the Aguilas Casino café/bar area: A giant roulette wheel is suspended, upside down from the ceiling and an impressive, if substantial _ somewhat incongruous - model gorilla also attracts attention as it hangs down from the top of the room. In reality though, for much of its long history, the Aguilas Casino was far more than just a place where card games and some gambling took place.

The impressive looking white building rather resembles an English early nineteenth century Georgian mansion, but was, in fact, constructed between 1894-5 and it became a club/society where the more affluent denizens of Aguilas and its surrounding areas could meet for dances, literary discussions, and other convivial social occasions.

The organisation which ran the Aguilas **Casino** building was called the Society of Friends and existed long before the **Casino** development came into being. Way back in 1876, the Society already had 152 members and this number grew considerably once the **Casino** building was completed in 1895.



Aguilas **Casino** building was designed by the architect Emiliano de la Cruz and actually constructed by a company belonging to local builder Jose Perez Sanchez. Aguilas's new encompassed three Casino floors and in 1905 the Murcian artist Jose Sanchez supplied the edifice's greatest adornment ten large allegorical paintings which were intended to illustrate different aspects of life and culture in Spain at the beginning of the twentieth century. These spectacular creations remain in-situ to this day and can be viewed by all those who enter the Casino building for coffee, wine, or its many other activities.

During its early years, the Casino membership Aguilas was dominated by families who owned mining concessions in and around the Lorca area. In addition, British ex-patriots were very influential in running the **Casino** from the very start. These British Aguilas Casino members were mostly engineers working in the mines, on the construction of the Aguilas

railway, or at the Embarcadero El Hornillo docks, from where minerals from Lorca, Almeria and Granada were exported across the world. The enthusiastic British members of the Aguilas Casino participated in all its activities, but were somewhat isolated by their habit of taking tea and indulging in bridge parties at the Plaza Robles Vives building during baking hot afternoons, when more sensible Spaniards were at home taking their siestas.

The heyday of the Aguilas **Casino** was really the period between 1895 and the onset of the Spanish Civil War in 1936. Once the brutal civil war was underway, the **Casino** was seized by Popular Front Republicans who converted the building into a 'Casa del Pueblo' which was accessible to everyone in the vicinity of Aguilas and not just to a limited number of club members.

Once Franco had emerged victorious from the carnage of Continued on page 41

the civil war, the Aguilas **Casino** fell into an immediate decline.



The dictator banned **casinos** throughout Spain, though the Aguilas **Casino** building could still be used for social purposes and was renamed a 'Liceo'.

During the 1960s and 1970s, the building became somewhat dilapidated, though a modicum of restoration work was carried out by a group of local businessmen. By 1993, the incremental effects of all this restoration had come to full fruition and the Aguilas **Casino** building was restored to something of its former glory. All the onerous debts of the former Liceo had been cancelled – the slate was wiped clean – and the paying membership of the Aguilas **Casino** rose, not surprisingly, from 60 to 500.

Since 1993, the Aguilas **Casino** building has gone from strength to strength. It houses a range of activities from **Zumba classes to art exhibitions** (in 2022, for example, the **Casino** played host to an **exhibition** of the artistic works of Jose Miguel Munoz).

In addition to the café/bar already spoken of, the Casino also possesses library facilities and it plays a praiseworthy role in the maintenance of the traditional Aguilas carnival and pinata dances. Originally, only Casino members could attend these dances, but this privilege was later opened to all residents



of the town of Aguilas.

The impressive façade of the Aguilas **Casino** building has been a key architectural feature of the town since 1895 and is currently included within the register of historical assets of cultural interest in Spain as a whole. For anyone visiting the port of Aguilas, at least one visit to the **Casino** building should be a definite priority!



Body Parts

This week's lesson is about parts of the body – but before you get too excited, it's actually about verbs that are connected to parts of the body. I will explain. For example the word for 'arm' in Spanish is 'brazo'. There is a verb in Spanish connected to this which describes what you do with your 'brazos' from time to time – that is 'abrazar' which means to 'embrace'.

There are quite a few of these, so let's see what else we can come up with. The word for "eye" is 'ojo'. In English we sometimes say 'to cast an eye over', well in Spanish this is 'ojear'. This can be confused with 'hojear' which specifically means to browse through a book or magazine. Here is another one – the word for back, which is 'espalda'. Well 'to back' something in Spanish, in the sense of to support something, is 'respaldar'.

Before I go any further I would like to point outside something interesting about English here. We very often use exactly the same word for the verb as for the noun. For example we have

the noun: 'eye' and also the verb 'to eye' something. We say 'the back' and also 'to back'. We can say 'to arm' as well, but this has a completely different meaning. Confusing eh?

The 'forehead' in Spanish is 'la frente'. From this we have the verb 'enfrentar' which means 'to face' (there we are again in English - 'the face', 'to face') or 'to confront'. The preposition 'enfrente' comes from the same root. It means 'opposite' that is 'facing'. The word for 'knee' in Spanish is 'rodilla' and 'to kneel' is 'arrodillarse'. Notice this time in English we say 'to kneel' and not 'to knee' which also exists, but means something completely different and not something one would expect to do in church.

Going back to the eye for a moment, the word for 'eyelash' in Spanish is 'pestaña', whilst 'pestañear' means 'to blink'. There's some logic there, but it is not to be confused with 'párpado' which is 'eyelid' and 'parpadear' which is 'to blink' in the sense of 'to flicker'. This is the verb you use when you phone the technical people to tell them your Internet connection has gone off. It's

when you have that interesting conversation with them about the little lights on your modem or router or whatever it is. You kneel on the floor with your head under the desk, breathing in dust and saying "Ahora está parpadeando" (Now it's flickering). Don't tell me you haven't been there!

I imagine that many of you will have come across 'sangre' meaning 'blood', especially as our doctors are very keen on sending us off for 'un análisis de sangre'. Well, we have a verb from this as well which is 'sangrar'. In English we don't say 'to blood' though, we say 'to bleed'. Rather confusingly 'desangrar' also means 'to bleed', but that's when you lose all your blood, apparently.

I can't resist finishing off with some more English peculiarities. We 'toe' the line and 'foot' the bill. We can 'head' a ball and 'elbow' someone in the ribs. In fact we can also 'rib' somebody, 'finger' things and 'thumb' a lift. We might 'nose' around someone's house and didn't we use to 'neck' sometime in the past? There you have it - now you have some more things to think about before next month!

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
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MACA PROPERTIES (PART 2)

Skin protective properties

Maca also takes care of skin health. It is consumed and cultivated in high altitude areas in the Andean highlands of Peru, that is, in places where ultraviolet radiation is very high and there are no spaces to shelter from the sun.

The natives and visitors who consume this root during their trips through the mountains will be more careful of UV rays.

Maca increases the thickness of the epidermis (microscopically, of course) and serves to protect from the sun as if a factor 30 were used. Maca extract can be placed in sun creams or cosmetics to enhance the effects.

Maca and dosage

Doses of up to **3 grams per day** appear to be safe when taken for up to 4 months. The dosage used in studies generally ranges from 1.5 to 5 grams per day.

Maca is easy to incorporate into your diet. You can start with a teaspoon (about 5 grams) to get used to the taste (that not



everyone likes) – it has been characterized as earthy and dry. You can add a little powder to your coffee or tea. You can also add it to smoothies, oats, yogurt, milk, salads and recipes.

Maca can be added to almost any dish and you can also make recipes with the main ingredient being Maca.

Maca and side effects

There are no reports of major side effects after consuming **Maca** as a food. However, the locals in the highlands of Peru suggest boiling the **Maca** before eating it. The traditional method of boiling up to 20 grams of powder to make juice has not been associated with toxicity. The boiling process seems to increase some

metabolites but destroys other c o m p o u n d s -e.g. it is known that heating significantly reduces the content of vitamin C.

Mild side effects reported include

impaired menstrual cycle, stomach cramps, discomfort and insomnia.

If you have thyroid problems, you need to be careful with **Maca** because it contains substances that can affect the normal functioning of the gland. These compounds are more likely to affect you if you already have impaired thyroid function.

Maca contains a compound called MTCA and has the potential to cause DNA damage. Given this risk, a French health organization said consumers should be careful. This has been disputed by researchers who said that MTCA is inactivated during cooking. This substance is also present in other foods e.g. in oranges [12] and in fact in some it is in a higher concentration than in Maca.

The safety of taking **Maca** supplements during pregnancy and lactation has not been evaluated.

Get New Teeth In One Day

Among the tools used by dentists for the rehabilitation of patients with very deteriorated mouths; those who either have no remaining teeth, or they are about to become edentulous patients due to the very poor state of their mouths, there is an option among the great sources of conventional dental treatments, called **All-on-4**®.

It is important to emphasize that **All-on-4**®'s concept is another tool for the dentist in the treatment of his patients; that is to say, it is not ideal for every patient and it is the dentist who must consider if it is a suitable treatment or not.



There are large numbers of patients with very little bone, which makes the placement of implants a great challenge, because getting bone available to restore the entire upper or lower jaw with grafts could be prohibitive for many patients.

All-on-4®'s concept may meet the needs of patients whose jaws have very little bone and, in economic terms, they need a more accessible and immediate option to restore their aesthetics and function.




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There never seems to be a quiet time at the moment, every day is full on with answering emails, whatsapp and phone messages. Of course this can only be done when all the donkeys are settled.

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

Well, the one who controls the thermostat has turned us down a notch making the outdoors much more bearable and the A/C's switched off more than on. They have also sent the Madrid residents back to work and we can drive a coastal route in 'normal' time without worrying about holiday makers seemingly without brains! However, they are the life blood of the coastal regions and their six weeks here are the survival routes for many businesses.

I find it odd that the municipalities do not promote their facilities into September/October when the weather for northern Europeans is just perfect – but the first weekend of September the beaches get cleared of all facilities, the jet ski hire closes and the sea inflatables get taken away. We residents then get our towns back for the next 10 months!

TV News........... A story we have dealt with several times is the picture quality on IPTV (Internet based TV). This is dependent on several things including your internet supply

and the resolution the IPTV company is using - the greater the resolution the better the picture but the more expensive it is to transmit. Although the listing for a particular channel may say HD (i.e. BBC 1 HD) that only means the HD version of the channel is being transmitted but the picture quality may not be HD. Cheaper versions of IPTV systems may not transmit in high resolution formats and then picture quality will suffer. One client told us at subscription renewal he was not going to pay our prices as there were much cheaper options available. Then a week later we had a phone call from him asking us why his new picture quality was not good -"ask your new provider" we said, to which we got the reply "well he is not answering the phone!"

We know there are exceptions but generally you get what you pay for in quality and service. We at **Rainbow** are open for IPTV enquires and problems from 9am-9pm, 7 days a week. We may not instantly answer the phone but a message will get responded to as soon as possible.

Poor internet quality, not the speed, can affect viewing in many ways but that is a whole other story for another news letter just to say that fibre, whilst very good, is not perfect and can have various problems. So often we have been told "I have fibre and my internet is perfect" only for us to prove that statement wrong! We, as an IPTV service provider, have some problems at times and generally we always hold our hands up and say "yes this is our problem" but honestly, over 80% of the issues we deal with turn out to be internet related. Please always be aware that your TV service is dependent on two suppliers and both have to be A1.

We often get the statement my "Netflix, Amazon, Britbox etc is running absolutely fine so my internet must be perfect". Long complex technical story but those services, because of their security arrangements, are far less demanding on the internet than IPTV is. Our security arrangements have to be at the client's end of the system making the internet demand far higher than these other services. Please

bear in mind that any service comparisons relating to the internet are generally not valid.

We also find it rare for an internet service provider to admit to a problem – we often have to visit numerous times making various adjustments, including changing boxes and running the system on a 4G router to rule out any fault with the TV system. This also shows the engineers the TV service working on a 4G system

and not working on their internet – that usually proves the point and the ISP then start looking for the issue. We have a couple of 4G internet routers available for just this purpose.

Free demonstrations of IPTV are available with one weeks free no obligation trial – unsure about this new fangled technology – you do not need to be a geek to operate it – you don't even have to have a computer – give it a try – there is nothing to lose.

Recipes

Hispanic Day inspired recipes

Huevos rancheros:



Enjoy this Mexican-inspired vegetarian brunch of egg, tomato, avocado, kidney beans and cheese, on top of tortilla. It's spicy, filling and full of flavour

Ingredients:

2 tbsp olive oil

1 small onion, diced

2 garlic cloves, crushed

400g can red kidney beans,

drained and rinsed

1 tsp ground cumin

1/4 tsp chilli powder

½ tsp dried oregano

4 eaas

4 small flour tortillas, warmed

1 large tomato, diced

Handful pickled jalapeño

peppers, roughly chopped 30g cheddar, grated

1 avocado, peeled, de-stoned and diced

1 lime, half juiced, half cut into wedges, to serve

Chopped coriander, to serve

Method:

Heat 1 tbsp oil in a large pan. Add the onions with a pinch of salt, and cook until translucent, around 3-4 mins. Add the garlic and cook for a minute more.

Stir in the beans, cumin, chilli powder, oregano, some seasoning and 100ml water. Cook for 5-7 mins, stirring occasionally, or until the beans have softened, then remove from the heat, mash and set aside.

Heat the remaining oil in a large frying pan over a mediumhigh heat. Crack in the eggs, then reduce the heat to low and cook slowly until the whites are completely firm.

To assemble, spread the beans onto the tortillas, add the tomatoes and jalapeños and sprinkle with cheese. Top with some avocado, a squeeze of lime juice and a fried egg, then

scatter with coriander. Serve with the lime wedges on the side.

Chicken & bean enchiladas:



A family dinner that delivers four of your 5-a-day. Tender chicken, red pepper and black beans, wrapped in tortilla, baked in the oven with passata and cheese

Ingredients:

1 tbsp rapeseed oil

2 red onion, sliced

2 red peppers, deseeded and sliced

2 garlic cloves, crushed

2 tsp chipotle paste (add extra if you prefer more heat)

2 skinless chicken breasts, cut into thin strips

400g can black beans or kidney beans, rinsed and drained Small bunch coriander, chopped 500ml passata

1 tsp ketchup or sugar 6 medium tortillas 50g mature cheddar, grated

Green salad, to serve

Method:

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Heat the oil in a large frying pan and add the onions, peppers and half the garlic. Cook for 15 mins, stirring now and then until the veg has softened. Stir in the chipotle paste, then fry for *Continued on page 53*

1 min more. Add the chicken strips, turning them over in the mixture so they cook through, about 5-10 mins.

Stir in the beans, coriander and 150ml of the passata, then take the pan off the heat. Divide the mixture between the tortillas, then fold the sides in and roll them up. Mix the rest of the passata with the remaining crushed garlic and the ketchup. Pour half the passata sauce into a 22cm square baking dish, then place the enchiladas on top, side by side. Dot over the remaining sauce and sprinkle over the grated cheese, then bake for 25-30 mins until golden brown.

Black-eyed bean mole with salsa:

Try this healthy dish as a quick



and easy low-calorie lunch that counts as three of your 5-a-day. The beans are a great source of protein and fibre Ingredients:

For the salsa:

- 1 red onion, finely chopped
- 2 large tomatoes, chopped
- 2 tbsp fresh coriander

½ lime, zest and juice

For the mole:

2 tsp rapeseed oil

1 red onion, halved and sliced

1 garlic clove, finely grated

1 tsp ground coriander

1 tsp mild chilli powder

½ tsp ground cinnamon

400g can black-eyed beans in water, rinsed and drained

2 tsp cocoa

1 tsp vegetable stock

1 tbsp tomato purée

Method:

Tip all the salsa ingredients into a bowl and stir together.

For the mole, heat the oil in a non-stick pan, add the onion and garlic and fry stirring frequently until softened. Tip in the spices, stir then add the contents of the can of beans with the cocoa, stock and tomato purée. Cook, stirring frequently to make quite a thick sauce.

Spoon into shallow bowls, top with the salsa and serve.

Grilled salmon tacos with chipotle lime yogurt

Grilled healthy fish with chipotle spice served with cabbage salad, coriander and chilli in soft tortillas.

Ingredients:

1 tsp garlic salt

2 tbsp smoked paprika

Good pinch of sugar 500g salmon fillet

200ml fat-free yogurt

1 tbsp chipotle paste or hot chilli sauce

Juice 1 lime



To serve

8 small soft flour tortillas, warmed

1/4 small green cabbage, finely shredded

Small bunch coriander, picked into sprigs

Few pickled jalapeno chillies, sliced

Lime wedges, to serve Hot chilli sauce to serve, (optional)

Method:

Rub the garlic salt, paprika, sugar and some seasoning into the flesh of the salmon fillet. Heat grill to high.

Mix the yogurt, chipotle paste or hot sauce and lime juice together in a bowl with some seasoning and set aside. Place the salmon on a baking tray lined with foil and grill, skin-side down, for 7-8 mins until cooked through. Remove from the grill and carefully peel off and discard the skin.

Flake the salmon into large chunks and serve with the warmed tortillas, chipotle yogurt, shredded cabbage, coriander, jalapeños and lime wedges. Add a shake of hot sauce, if you like it spicy.

WARM - Walkers Around the Region of Murcia

You will be reading this in early October and we will finally have resumed our purpose which is walking.



I don't have any walks to write about but the moonlight walk will have taken place on 30th September at Fuente Caputa, near Mula. I'm planning to do it as I seem to have missed so many of the others. It is a walk I love in the daylight so better get my head torch ready.

Our **walking** season is only possible in the cooler months and we start in October with our final **walk** being on 27th April 2024. We are looking forward to at least four new locations Calabardina, Los Royos, El

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Mingrano and Monte de las Cenizas.

In his end of year report our President, Martin, talked about the importance of our walk leaders and over the years we have relied on a core group of people to lead our walks. Sadly our membership isn't getting any younger and we have some leaders who have either had to stop leading, take a break or lead only our shorter **SWARM** walks. The good news is this year we have six new leaders who have offered to take the step from being a walker to agreeing to lead walks. Welcome to Anita, Colette, John, Martin, Paul and Rob.

To help these new leaders we have a four stage guide written by Jess, our first President, and myself.

Stage 1 helps people understand



the process from the offer of a walk for the programme, to how to find a route and deciding if it fits into WARM or SWARM.

Stage 2 is about doing the recce. This is when leaders walk the route in advance and work out how to remember the route (I take photos with my mobile of key junctions), where people will park, where gathering and snack stops will be. We use a scoring system of 1-5 for Effort, Agility and Vertigo.

Stage 3 is actually writing the walk description to be emailed out to our mailing list. We try and give written instructions to the start, GPS and what3words. The leader sets the number limit ensuring the group is a size suitable for the route. A sometimes contentious area is whether to allow dogs or not.



Regional and National parks require dogs on leads at all times. Beaches forbid dogs unless there is a notice otherwise.

Stage 4 is the last bit, keeping a list of walkers and their contact details, checking everyone is insured. Finally, the day of the walk arrives. We recommend the leader and backmarker carry a whistle and first aid kits and have instructions about what to do in an incident. We expect leaders to do a brief introduction to the walk and highlight any specific issues. The walk is ready to go!

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

DID YOU KNOW?



Little Horn of Daniel chapter 7 and verse 8 (Part 3)

Did you know that throughout history Yehovah (Jehovah or God) and his people have always been a target for ridicule and persecution. Laws have been passed which are not always in line with the Scriptures. The latter part of Daniel chapter 7 and verse 8 says "....in this Little Horn were the eyes of a man, and a mouth speaking great things"

This Little Horn power is a man that speaks against Yehovah, the Most High and his followers, the saints. Referring back to Daniel chapter 7 and verse 25 which states "And he shall speak great words against the most High, and shall wear out the saints of the Most High, and think to change times and laws, and they shall be given into his hand until a time and times and the dividing of time".

This Little Horn is a man who rises from within Rome, after Rome was broken up into 10 divisions. This Little Horn power was influential, political and spiritual. This power was able to uproot 3 kingdoms (Heruli in 493AD, Vandals in 534AD and the Ostrogoths in 538AD). This **Little Horn** became more powerful than the other horns or kings and wanted to be the ruler of the world. This power believed they had all wisdom and understanding. This Little Horn had great influence over the kings and leaders of nations and the people. They desired allegience and compliance from all, and those who refused to comply would be persecuted through enforced laws. (this occured during the Dark ages). This power changed Gods law. But can God's law be changed?

No.

This **Little Horn** had power for a time, times and the dividing of time. (time is equal to 360 days or one year, times is equal to 720 days or two years, dividing of time is equal to 180 days or 6 months. Using Scriptural reckoning of time, there is 30 days in a month. To clarify, 30 days x 12 months = 360 days or one year). Genesis chapter 1 and verses 14 to 16 says "and God said, let there be lights in the firmament of the heaven to divide the day from the night, and let them be for signs, and for seasons, and for days and years. Let them be for lights in the firmament of the heaven to give light upon the earth, and it was so. And God made two great lights, the greater light to rule the day (Sun), and the lesser light to rule the night (Moon), he made the stars also. In scripture the month was determined from one new moon to another, which would take 30 days, hence 360 days in a year.

From the above you can see that the time, times and dividing of time equals 1260 days or 3-1/2 years. (three and a half years). The one day for a year principle can be seen in Numbers chapter 14 and verse 34 which states "....even 40 days, each day for a year...". Also Ezekiel chapter 4 and verse 6 says "....and thou shalt bear the iniquity of the house of Judah forty days, I have appointed thee each day for a year". Taking into account the one day for a year principle, it is clear that this Little Horn would have power for 1260 years.

In the book of Revelation chapter 13 it speaks of a beast which has some of the same characteristics listed in the book of Daniel chapter 7 (beast means kings or

kingdoms. Daniel chapter 7 and verse 17 gives a clear example "these great beasts, which are four kings, which shall arise out of the earth"). Revelation Chapter 13 and verse 1 states "And I stood upon the sand of the sea, and saw a beast rise up out of the sea, having seven heads and ten horns, and upon his horns ten crowns, and upon his heads the name of blasphemy" (Sea or waters represents people, multitudes, nations and tongues as noted in Revelation chapter 17 and verse 15).

Revelation chapter 17 and verses 3 to 5 explains "....I saw a woman sit upon a scarlet coloured beast, full of names of blasphemy, having seven heads and ten horns. And the woman was arrayed in purple and scarlet colour and decked with gold and precious stones and pearls, having a golden cup in her hand full of abominations...and upon her forehead was a name written, MYSTERY, BABYLON THE GREAT, THE MOTHER OF HARLOTS AND ABOMINATIONS OF THE EARTH. Revelation chapter 17 and verses 9 and 12 provides extra details "And here is the mind which hath wisdom. These seven heads are seven mountains on which the woman sitteth...and the horns which thou saweth are 10 kings...".

Revelation chapter 13 and verses 5 to 7 explains "And there was given unto him a mouth speaking great things and blasphemies, and power was given unto him to continue forty and two months. (or 1260 years) and he opened his mouth in blaspemy against God, to blaspheme his name and his tabernacle and them that dwell in heaven. And it was given unto him to make war with the saints, and to overcome them

and power was given him over all kindreds, and tongues and nations. If any man have an ear, let him hear". (42 months x 30 days equals 1260).

Revelation chapter 13 and verse 18 says "Here is wisdom. Let him that hath understanding count the number of the beast, for it is the number of a man, and his number is six hundred threescore and six (666). A score is equal to 20, threescore is 60.

According to 2nd Thessalonians chapter 2 and verses 3 and 4 it explains "Let no man deceive you by any means, for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first and that

man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition, who opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped, so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, showing himself that he is God".

Part(1) and Part(2) has provided much background knowledge concerning history and current events. This **Little Horn** power is real and very influential today. This power has captured the nations. There are many opinions as to who this power might be, but the scripture gives clues.

James chapter 1 and verse 5 states "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not, and it shall be given him".

The good news is that Yehovah (Jehovah or God) loves everyone and offers Salvation to all who will believe upon his son, Yeshua (Jesus). Through Yeshua's life, death and resurrection we obtain eternal life. 1st Thessalonians chapter 5 and verse 9 says "For God hath not appointed us to wrath, but to obtain salvation by our Lord Jesus Christ".

I hope you have learned more about the scriptures. Next time I will look at 'discovering truth and prayer'.

Deadline For Expats To Secure A Full UK State Pension Extended

Updated: Taxpavers now have until 5th April 2025 to fill gaps in their National Insurance record from April 2006 that may increase their State Pension – an extension of nearly 2 years - the government announced on 12th June. Extending the voluntary National Insurance contributions deadline until 2025 means that you now have more time to properly consider whether paying voluntary contributions is right for you and ensures that you don't miss out on the possibility of boosting your State Pension entitlements.

Expats who have missed filing national insurance years from 2006 to 2016 now have until 5th April 2025 secure a full UK State **Pension**. The previous deadline of July 2023 has been extended, with the government announcing they're granting expats more time to get their paperwork in order after numerous reports that critical government helplines have been unreachable in the run up to the deadline.

Helplines managed by HMRC and the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) have been inundated with calls in the run up to the filing deadline. Many callers have expressed frustration at being unable to get through to anyone, despite calling multiple times. Unfortunately, part of the top-up process is a call to these helplines to obtain vital information.

By extending the deadline the government is ensuring thousands of individuals who currently have gaps in their national insurance records from 2006 to 2016, who currently do not qualify for a full **State Pension**, have an extended period to acquire all the necessary information from the government helplines and make any voluntary

contributions to national insurance via HMRC.

Why Is It Important to Fill The Gaps?

Individuals accumulate qualifying years for their **State Pension** through various means, like employment or through claiming specific benefits. Years when an individual doesn't pay into national insurance by one of these means are considered gaps, which can lead to a shortfall that means they're not entitled to a full UK pension. They may choose to rectify this by making a voluntary contribution for missed years. Doing so can be a very profitable move, as some individuals will spend as little as £800 bridging any gaps in their records while seeing a return of £5,500 or more.

What Happens from April 5th?

From 6th April 2025 onwards it will no longer be possible to fill gaps in tax years that took place more than six years ago. While there are currently 'transitional arrangements' in place which were introduced during the roll out of the new **State Pension** system in 2016, they are about to be terminated. The aim of these arrangements was to give those under the age of 70 more time to accumulate 'qualifying' national insurance years so they could be eligible to obtain the full new State Pension.

What's Changed?

Those with gaps in their national insurance records from 2006 to 2016 will now have until 5th April 2025.

One of the necessary steps in filling any gaps is to contact the Pension Service (if you're already at **State Pension** age) or The Future Pension Centre if you're below the state pension age. Following this a second call is needed to HMRC to obtain a unique 18-digit reference number. It's impossible to verify which years in your records are

'incomplete' or make payment with your unique reference number without help from these official channels. Unfortunately, both helplines were experiencing such an overwhelming number of calls that thousands of individuals found themselves unable to get through, despite repeated attempts.

By extending the deadline those who haven't yet been able to get through have additional time to verify whether making an additional payment will enhance their State Pension or not and, if so, by how much.

The price for most qualifying years was about to increase by 10.1% as of 6^{th} April. This price hike will now take effect from 1^{st} August. Following this date, the weekly cost for almost all years will rise from £15.85 to £17.45. The exception years are 2021/22 and 2022/23, which will remain the same. As a result, the price of filling a full year in your national insurance record will increase to £907.40.

What Does It Mean For British Expats?

Those living overseas experience even more trouble getting in touch with the relevant helplines than Brits at home. As a general rule, expats often have more significant NI gaps in their records as – unless they made voluntary contributions – they won't have paid into national insurance since they were last residents in the UK.

Individuals living and working overseas may – under the right conditions – qualify to pay class 2 rather than class 3 contributions. This saves a substantial amount as Class 2 contributions are a significantly lower cost than the standard class 3 ones. Unfortunately, applying for class 2 adds an additional step to the process for which you need to receive approval/confirmation from HMRC to prove you qualify



before you can begin the payment process.

The extended deadline is even more vital for expats as a result of this extra hoop to jump through, added to the already extended difficulties of getting in touch with the relevant hotlines.

Don't Use The Extension As An Excuse To Delay

While the short-term pressure has been relieved by the extended deadline it's important to continue the process as quickly as possible. Deadlines have been extended as a result of high demand for hotlines and their capacity to meet that demand. It's likely many will still experience difficulty getting through, they simply have longer to successfully do so. The longer you leave it, the longer it will take for your case to be handled

and the more likely it is you will miss the deadline, even with the extension.

In today's financial climate it is essential you do everything you can to make sure your money is safe. Should you want a no obligation appointment, your only initial investment is a small amount of time.



A sign for the times to come...

For many of us who grew up in the 'olden days', the story of Jonah and the whale was a Sunday School staple. The plot is simple; God calls the prophet to speak to the nasty Ninevites, but our man heads off in the opposite direction. He boards a ship taking him, interestingly, to south-east Spain! However, Jonah never makes it here.

His presence aboard the ship sets in motion a series of events that are a profound paradox. The man of God rebels but the pagan sailors pray and, when a proverbial push comes to literal shove, our man is drowned and then swallowed up in the belly of a big fish. After three days and three nights though, a miracle occurs and said fish spits him out. Jonah finally gets the message and off to Nineveh he trots. The king and his people turn from their wicked ways and come good before God after all.

However, rather than celebrate, Jonah sulks. Surely, one of the most evil societies of all time do not deserve divine redemption, do they? And therein lies the rub! Far from being a sweet Sunday School story, the Book of Jonah is Holy Scripture red in tooth and claw. It challenges us on so many levels.

First of all, we can run from God, but we just can't hide. Then,



there is the grace of God which may well be amazing, but it doesn't come cheap.

Jesus compared Jonah's death and time in the belly of the fish as an image of His time in the tomb. The Bible is clear, that the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross over 2000 years ago had made it possible for even the nastiest of Ninevites to turn from their wicked ways.

Yes, the God of the Bible is the God of second chances: not only for a rebellious prophet but also, somewhat challengingly, for even the most pagan of peoples.

There are plenty of those still around today and this is good news for them. However, for us respectable folk who stay within the speed limit (mostly) and give generously to charity, then maybe the words of that great old hymn 'To God be the glory', comes and hits us straight between the eyes, "The vilest of offenders who truly believes, that moment from Jesus a pardon believes."

But, 'that moment' has to be genuine. One hundred and fifty years after Jonah, God once again visited Nineveh but this time in judgement. God's grace is amazing, but it didn't come cheap. And there is a world of difference between mere religious 'revival' and genuine spiritual transformation. He is a canny God and can see if we are sincere or not.

I don't know what you reckon, but it's worth a thought...

SPANISH EXPLAINED

TAX

ROAD

⊕ How it works

Spanish Road Tax or IVTM (Impuesto sobre Vehículos de Tracción Mecánica) is charged annually by your town hall, but in the Alicante region bills are issued and payments collected by the SUMA office. Payment of Road Tax doesn't affect your legal right to drive your vehicle on public roads, but do check out what can happen in the case of non-payment below!

§ - How much does it cost?

Road Tax varies between regions and town halls but is usually significantly cheaper than it is in the UK, with a current maximum of around 250€ for a passenger car.

- How is **Road Tax** calculated?

Each town hall sets the rate for **Road Tax** based on the fiscal horsepower of your vehicle. As you'd expect, electric, hybrid and smaller engined vehicles will generally pay less than large diesel vehicles.

- When are Road Tax bills issued?

Most town halls issue their **Toad Tax** bills in Spring and give an 8 week window to pay, typically

April to June. After this time you may be charged a penalty and may have to ask the town hall for a revised bill and payment form (Carta de Pago). The bill is issued to the person who owned the vehicle on 1st January that year.

Road Tax & SUMA?

In the Alicante province, local taxes (including road tax) are managed by the SUMA office. Elsewhere is Spain, **Toad Tax** is payable to your local town hall.

★ How to Pay

The easiest way to pay your **Road Tax** is by annual direct debit, but you can also pay by bank transfer by visiting your town hall in person, by phone and online if your town hall offers this service.

○ - Driving without Road Tax

For a Spanish registered vehicle, **Road Tax** doesn't affect your entitlement to drive your vehicle on public roads, but it's different for foreign registered vehicles which must be taxed if this is a requirement in the country of current registration. For UK vehicles a SORN declaration is the same as untaxed.

→ Selling your car

Don't forget that even if you sell your car you will still be liable for that year's road tax as you were the owner on 1 January.

A - Non Payment & Embargo

If you leave **Road Tax** outstanding for previous years then it's common for the town hall to register the debt which will place an embargo on the vehicle. They can also apply to embargo your bank account and take the money automatically including an additional 20% fee.

- Buying a car

If you're buying a car it's a good idea to ensure that the **Road Tax** is up to date as you obviously don't want to inherit a problem and if the town hall has registered any outstanding road tax as a debt then the vehicle won't be able to be transferred into your name until the debt is cleared.

This month we talk to the people behind **2025** about their activities and include a piece about one of our principal volunteers for the campaign to support Ukraine.

How did Camposol 2025 begin?

We come from the viewpoint constructive building relationship with the Town understanding Hall, with an that the Council is faced with huge demands for funding and resource. In fact, no different to councils in the UK. We put our points and suggestions forward in a positive, but realistic manner, effective hold conversations and try and understand what the Council can and can't do. In simple terms we are trying to build a positive image of Camposol rather than the negative one often portrayed by some of the residents and others. Camposol is known by many of our Spanish hosts as "The Ghetto". We would like to help to change that impression.

What do you think you can achieve?

The simple answer is, nothing on our own. We work with other groups and volunteers to try and make small but substantial improvements, such as the tidying of the bin areas, making the applications for funding for the dog park and exercise area and creation of the security brochure that is available from our Facebook page. We will continue to work with others on these types of projects.

Volunteer profile

Many of you will know Ann Walmsey, either socially because of her long-standing commitment to supporting local charities. She was recently invited the British Ambassador's residence in Madrid, along with others. She was asked by the Ambassador, what Camposol had done to support the people of Ukraine during the Russian invasion. When Camposol 2025 was asked by the town hall to set up the official collection point for Ukraine on Camposol shortly after the invasion, Ann was one of the people to volunteer to help, so she was in the perfect position to explain about the generosity

of the people of Camposol and the surrounding area in providing bedding, clothing and equipment, as well as food and medicines to support Ukraine. When we looked at other ways of raising funds and looked at running events, Ann was able to give us the benefit of her many years of experience, which enabled us to hold a series of events, raising over €3,000, which was used to purchase medical supplies and equipment from the farmacia on A sector and driven directly to the cities in Ukraine by local volunteers. When Ann explained all of this to the Ambassador he told her that the people of Camposol should be proud of what was achieved to support the people of Ukraine and asked her to pass on his congratulations. Therefore, to all the volunteers who joined in and helped on the collection centre, the collections outside Consum and the events that ran from May to August, as well as to the businesses and individuals that supported the activities, Thank you. You know who you are and finally, to the people who came to the events and parted with their money to support this cause, thank you as well.

Bolnuevo Dog Club

Just over a year ago on a Sunday morning a few friends and their dogs met on Playa Canina Las Moreras. This was the start of **Bolnuevo Dog Club.**



Initially intended to socialise a dog in foster, the now popular gathering has grown and grown in numbers. From a small group of 5-6 dogs we now have over 30 dogs attending on a regular basis. Many of these dogs are former residents of the local perrera (dog pound) and thanks to **Friends of Mazarrón Animals** and their new owners they can enjoy fun and freedom.



There is no membership fee or T-shirts, we simply ask that the dogs and their owners are social



and friendly. For new dogs we suggest that they watch from the sidelines as it can get quite lively at times with dogs chasing and running along the shoreline. For dogs that have not been off the lead we use a safe long line and the use of retractable leads are prohibited due to the risk of injury to both dogs and humans.

We welcome members of all nationalities and being so close to the campsite at **Bolnuevo** we have many visiting dogs from all over Europe. More recently we have had dogs travelling over an hour from the **Mojácar** area to join us due to the lack of a dog beach in their own area. We are blessed in the **Mazarrón** area having 5 dog beaches but it's generally agreed that **Bolnuevo** is the biggest and the best.

Each week people can make a donation to **Friends of Mazarrón Animals** by dropping a euro or two into one of their tins. Each month we announce the amount raised and to date **Bolnuevo Dog Club** has raised

over 800€.

Bolnuevo Dog Club meets every Sunday throughout the year. Winter start time is 9am and during the summer we begin at 8am.

NORMA'S TRAVELS

After **Buenos Aires** my encounter with the `ugly (look it up), I Americans' walked back through the park near my hotel where several families were living in makeshift shelters. I started thinking about where to travel next and the hot weather favoured going south to Northern Patagonia for some respite. I booked a flight to Trelew and an apartment to stay in, the area is where Welsh settlers went in the 1860s.

Before we left on the trip a fellow traveller had put me in touch with friends who were living in Buenos Aires and I arranged to have breakfast with them at the cafe at Museo Evita. Jim and Gay were originally from the UK, lived for many years in Australia and were well travelled .The garden of the restaurant was lovely, the desayuno saludable (healthy breakfast) was a great selection of fruit, granola, yoghurt and toast etc. We were chatting about our travels. They have a friend in Bolnuevo in Murcia so who knows, we might meet again?

The museum was a fascinating insight into Eva's life, amazing footage of some of her films when she was an actress and then her role as first lady. The displays of some of her clothes were stunning - she certainly had style. I needed more cash for my trip so got a taxi to Florida, the place where everyone changes money. It turned out to be quite safe, a guy said "cambio", we went into a wine shop in a covered arcade and 100€ became 39,000 ARS.

Next day my flight was at 5.30am and super efficient. I knew it was going to be a long day between a 7am arrival in **Trelew** and a 2pm check in so

I had a leisurely coffee in the airport and then got a taxi to a hotel for breakfast and free Wi-Fi. I walked into town for some information and a map from the tourist office, had a haircut for 3€ and found a place that would repair the broken zip on my travel bag. My taxi driver had recommended a cafe so I had a very nice sandwich and lemon cake. Eventually it was 2pm and time to go to my apartment.

On the plus side it was on 11th floor so it had good views, a balcony – ideal for my washing and it was relatively cheap. That's where it stops as it was pretty basic with ill fitting curtains, hardly any crockery, nothing to light the gas with and no storage space for clothes. Basically poor attention to detail and no batteries in the air conditioning control.

I unpacked everything, easy if you use a cube system and set off to get my bag fixed. The lady was lovely and said she would repair it in two days. Buoyed by a nice feel to the town I did some shopping and started to think about what to do.



Trelew's claim to fame is the Fossil and Palaeontology museum. The biggest ever dinosaur was found near there, but sadly the museum was being renovated to better display the find. I spotted Jylgo, a craft beer place so I tried 3 of the 16 beers and had two small plates, a

pumpkin 'pasty' and a lukewarm polenta dish. The latter dish was a big mistake, cue Delhi belly! I saw very little of **Trelew** and managed on Saturday to get on the local bus to my next stop **Puerto Madryn.**

What a contrast - a fabulous 10th floor apartment with stunning sea views. With a combination of lots of liquid, light food, loperamide and some antibiotics I bought over the counter in China, I was ready for action again. It was the premier whale watching spot May to December - out of season it was just a fun place for the weekend. Sunday I spent chilling, walking on the beach and enjoying the view.



Early Monday morning I headed off in search of dolphins. I went with a great company called hydrosport where Patricia welcomed everyone and Marissa was the guide with only 18 of us on a 72 seat boat. It was a bit overcast but the sea was calm and it was a lovely trip but sadly no dolphins although we did get a great display from the young sea lion pups. We were offered a free trip on

Wednesday. Marissa mentioned there were Orcas around all year on the **Peninsula Valdes** so I decided to go the next day on her recommendation. I had the option of a group for 19,000 ARS or a private for 45,000 ARS and given it was going to be 35°C the next day I opted for the private trip. I decided to risk real food and had a glass real ale and a veggie pizza in a great 'pub' with a friendly waitress.



Tuesday I spent an amazing day with my guide Daniel. He was about my age and a lovely, gentle and humble man . We stopped first at Isla de Pajeros, being the only ones there, so very tranquil. I asked him about flamingos, as I had seen them on the bus into Puerto Madryn. He said they were there sometimes, at which point a flamboyance flew over and landed on the estuary. What a magical moment. They were a stunning pink in flight. A flamboyance must be one of the greatest collective nouns.

It was a spot of pilgrimage for fans of the Antione Saint-Exupéry book 'Le Petit Prince', the island looks like a part of the story about a drawing. If you want to know more read the



book. It looks like a children's book but trust me it is deep.

We set off again and stopped at the information centre then the tiny town of **Puerto Piramides** where there was time for coffee and delicious vegan orange chocolate cake. Our route was then on ripio road, i.e. unmade gravely tracks lined with guanaco, a bit like vicuna or alpaca, but once you've seen one you don't need to see 75km of them.



There were two possible spots to look for orcas **Punta Negra** and **Caleta** and we opted for the latter as the high tide was earlier. Daniel had brought a flask so we could have tea and I had brought sandwiches. It was stunningly beautiful, with turquoise sea all day. We waited 90 minutes but no sign, and there hadn't been any at **Punta Negra** either.

If you have seen David

Attenborough's programme, this is where the orcas beach themselves to eat the seal pups. Apparently it is an incredibly rare event but it happened on the beach below us.

The trip was worth every penny especially as for large parts of the day there weren't many people around, only two small minibuses and private cars. I managed the whole day talking Spanish too, although Daniel knew the animal and bird names in English. We chatted about allsorts to do with life in **Argentina** and his large blended family, with ten grandchildren. Oh a day in la naturaleza, so good for the soul!

My wife has a song that fits into that category very well. What's wrong with the song? Well, it is often associated with funerals so perhaps you'll understand.


What is the song – it's a lovely duet sung by Andrea Bocelli and Sarah Brightman entitled "Time to say Goodbye".

Closest ever results on first SAMM Race Day

SAMM's autumn racing season got underway on September 10^{th} with a good turn out of competitors that allowed 6 boats to come to the line for the first race.



In a good ENE wind of 10 knots and a fairly flat sea, four boats got away well, unfortunately **Sirocco**, a Sailfish 18, struggled and started 5 minutes late and **Dos**, a Laser 2000, was delayed when their rudder downhaul failed and they had to return to the shore to replace it.

The fleet gradually spread out and the race became more of a procession except for a tussle between the single handed **Laser radial** and the **Omega** with two crew.

The 'about to finish' signal was

sounded after 52 minutes but the crew of **Sirocco** did not hear it and did not cross the line to finish, but retired.

When the handicaps were applied the result was the closest ever in the history of **SAMM** racing with first and second positions having to be calculated to two decimal places. The winner being the **Laser Radial** with an average lap time of 425.1 secs and second the **Omega** in 425.8 secs.

It was then noticed that the starboard end start/finish line buoy had almost sunk (later traced to the inflation valve not being completely closed) but all boats saw this and finished correctly, but by then the buoy had completely sunk. Disaster!

The management team rushed around to collect and inflate a replacement and attach a new anchor, while the support boat crew used their anchor to drag for the sunken buoy which they managed to recover and replace. This delayed the second race for 30 minutes but it at last started at 12.40pm.

It was a great start with four boats starting within 52 seconds and the last after 2 minutes.

This was a much closer race with the four leaders in a close battle throughout and lapping within a minute or two of each other. The final result was an apparent win for the **Laser 2000** with the 3rd, 4th and 5th places separated by only 3 seconds and only 16 seconds separating the four scoring places.

Unfortunately, the result was marred by a protest that the winner had sailed inside the beach swimming exclusion zone. This was upheld by the race officers and the Laser was designated Did Not Finish for not sailing the correct course.

History of Hispanic Day in Spain (Día de la Hispanidad)



History of Hispanic Day in Spain (Día de la Hispanidad)

Columbus' Christopher discovery of the Americas significantly changed the Continent and Europe, making Spain the first modern superpower and shaping the Americas' ethnic, cultural and political landscapes. Columbus' first voyage to the New World began on the evening of August 3, 1492. He left the harbour of Palos de la Frontera with three ships: Santa Maria, the Pinta, and the Niña, with Christopher Columbus travelling on the first ship.



On October 12, 1492, the crew on the Pinta sighted land and informed Columbus. Then. Columbus and his men landed on an island and were received by the indigenous Arawak people. He later named the island San Salvador, though it was called Guanahani by the locals. He also referred to the indigenous people as Los Indios, creating a generalized term that will be used to describe the indigenous people of North, Central, and South America.

Columbus later continued his voyage, exploring northeast of Cuba and the northern coast of Hispaniola. In December of that year, **Columbus** founded the settlement of La Navidad in present-day Haiti and left 39 men there, after permission from the local chief.

On March 15, 1493, **Columbus** arrived in Spain with native



prisoners. His discoveries were received with great celebration and quickly spread across Europe.

On September 24, 1493, **Columbus** set sail for the New World with 17 ships and about 1,500 men. During this voyage, he encountered the islands of Dominica, Maria-Galante, Montserrat, Antigua, the Virgin Islands and more.

In November 1493, he returned to Hispaniola and established a temporary settlement in La Isabela, present-day Dominican Republic.

The Spanish settlers soon introduced the encomienda system, where indigenous people provided labour for the Spaniards in return for food, shelter and protection. That, along with the introduction of European diseases and the exportation of enslaved locals led to a drastic reduction in the indigenous population.

Columbus set sail again on May 30, 1498, locating the regions of modern-day Central and South America. In 1499, **Columbus** was accused of tyranny and corruption. He and his brother were arrested, shipped to Spain, and spent six weeks in jail. The **Columbus** brothers were later absolved of all charges by King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella

and got sponsored for their fourth voyage to the New World.

On May 9, 1502, Columbus returned to the Americas with a fleet of 30 ships, but only one made it back to Spain. During this voyage, Columbus explored the coasts of Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica. However, he was impeded by a storm and shipwrecked in Jamaica, where they remained stranded for six months. In a desperate attempt to induce the natives to keep providing for him and his men, **Columbus** used the lunar eclipse of February 29, 1504, to scare them. He accurately predicted event using Abraham Zacuto's astronomical charts. On June 28, 1504, he and his men were rescued, and they arrived in Spain on November 7, 1504.

Spain's National Day today is a celebration of the country's heritage. The day is an homage to over 400 million people across continents united by a common language, history and culture. The quintessential Spanish lifestyle is fully displayed - concerts, street shows, dance, people in regional costumes and excellent food and wine. The National Day of Spain has faced many changes throughout the 20th Century, but many still regard it as one of the most important days in Spanish history.



We are also trained to assist with other less urgent issues until the arrival of the paramedics and can advise provide reassurance and comfort to both the casualty and other members of the household.






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
