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

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

### **Fitness Campus**

Camposol 2025, Camposol Business Association (CBA) and Camposol Free Community Sports (CFCS) recently met with the Town Hall's new sports councillor, to discuss the exercise area on Calle Nogales.

There are some snagging issues that she agreed to follow up on with the installers. In addition, there were discussions about the need to complete the surface of the area and the potential to install lighting to allow the facilities to be used for a longer period, especially in the hot weather. They also spoke about the potential to install markings and equipment for other sports in the area of the football pitch, such as basketball, badminton and pickle ball to allow a greater range of sports facilities to be available.

This area is designated for sports facilities and already contains the football pitch and fitness area. Both are being well utilised with the Camposol Walking Football Club and **Camposol Free Community Sport** organising walking football sessions. Plus there is great use by families and children during the evenings and weekends. The fitness area is already attracting a lot of use, which will grow when cooler weather returns.

Comment

There have been a number of recent social media posts asking why Camposol 2025 does not pursue the "big issues" on Camposol, or even come together with other organisations to present a unified voice to the Council. As explained previously believe that our should be on issues that we can influence, hence our success in assisting with the applications for the funding of the Fitness Area and Dog Park as well as improvements to the bin areas in cooperation with **D** Community and Gardening group. We also assisted home owners with the solar light installation programme and created the security brochure which can be found in the files section of our Facebook page.

good working We have relationships with D Community and Gardening Group, Camposol **Business** Association, Camposol Free Community Sports and others. We strongly believe that Camposol's best interests are served by working with and seeking permission for our proposals from the Town hall. We also work closely with Silvana Buxton our local Councillor, seeking her advice and keeping her informed about what we would like to do to improve facilities on Camposol. To that end, we already work with others who have the same outlook and if there is something we want to ask the Town Hall we identify

the relevant councillor, contact them and meet up to discuss the matter at hand. We do not, as some have suggested, have "the ear of the council". As with others we work with, we just call or mail them to ask for meetings.

Are we avoiding the big issues? No we are not. We support the work of the CBA and have attended meetings with the Council with them. Ultimately, and the Council has said this on a number of occasions, they prefer to deal with a single organisation. No single association appears to have a strong mandate to represent all parties on Camposol in cooperating with the council and those with a confrontational approach have sadly burned bridges rather than building them, which we believe is the only way forward.

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




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### CHARITY

#### SKY IN SEPTEMBER

As the holiday season comes to an end, the evenings are still comfortably warm and the stars are there calling us for another sort of journey. So let us turn our heads up and marvel upon the spectacle of the most marvellous stories written in the sky.

#### THE STORY IN THE SKY

When the last light of day disappears behind the horizon, one of the most beloved stories from ancient Greece will be beautifully displayed for us to follow the adventures of a proud mother, jealous mermaids, pure and innocent beauty and a brave hero who saves the day and finds true love. The story of Andromeda and Perseus will forever be written in the sky and September is when we can see the heroes with our own eyes.

#### PLANETS OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM

Two jewels of the Solar System will be perfectly visible in the evening sky so look east to see Saturn and Jupiter. Take out your telescope or visit **Finca Astronomica** to see the beautiful details of those gas giants. You will easily see the spectacular rings of Saturn along with its moon. Jupiter, the crown of the Solar System, will grace us with an astonishing view of its surface: the two stripes and

the great red spot will be visible through the telescope along with its four Galilean moons: Io, Europa, Ganymede, and Callisto.

#### A LIFE OF A STAR




Eagle Nebula with Pillars of Creation inside, a birthplace of new stars. picture by Charles Westphal, Astronomy Tours

life of the star as it gets older, all the way to the inevitable end in the form of the most breathtaking Supernova observable: the Ring Nebula.



THE LAST SUPERMOON

The end of September will give us another opportunity for a night full of astronomical marvels, with the last Supermoon of 2023 on September 29th. Celebrate the unique view in your backyard or join Finca Astronomica team for the last Supermoon Party of 2023 to see the amazingly big Moon via the telescope, take its picture and share with friends and family. And while at it see for yourself how the surface of the Moon actually looks in a 3D reconstruction allowing you to follow in the footsteps of Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin while finding the exact spot of the First Moon landing in history!

### **Birding in Murcia**

Last month I wrote about the common birds you are likely to bump into in your daily lives here. So this month, I thought I would continue broadly with the same theme, but with a bit of a twist. I will again write about common birds, but in specific habitats. Therefore, they may be quite uncommon on a regional scale, but are locally common in the right habitat.

The habitat is very important and each birding site will have different characteristics and therefore the birdlife will change as the habitat does. It all depends on the food that is available.

This month I will share with you my thoughts on the well known and scenic area of the salt-pans of San Pedro del Pinatar. It is a beautiful and unique landscape for birders and tourists alike. It is very popular with locals and tourists who wish to walk and take some gentle exercise alongside the Mediterranean, the Mar Menor or the salt-pans.

It is a Regional Park of 856 hectares, so pretty big by any standards. Its status and legal protection is enhanced by also being classified as a Natura 2000 site, a special Protection area (ZEPA), a site of Community Importance, a special Protected Area of Mediterranean Importance and a RAMSAR wetland site. A very impressive array of awards!

If you enjoy fresh air and walking, there is a very interesting 11 km circular walk from the visitor centre that takes you towards the coast between the salt-pans, then along the Mediterranean coast before returning along a paseo between the salt-pans and the Mar Menor. However, if you wish to be more relaxed there are several parking areas at many of the view points along the route.

As I will be talking about the common birds of the salt-pans they will invariably be birds that live and feed in wetland habitats. There isn't an abundance of wetlands in Murcia, which means many of the common birds here won't be seen inland and are therefore quite uncommon or rare elsewhere.

Many of the birds I will talk about have often been featured in previous articles, but hopefully you will by now be able to recognise many of them. Familiarity is the key to good identification.

The most emblematic bird of the salt-pans is undoubtably h t e Flamingo. Many people who aren't birders will visit this



area with the primary objective of seeing these special birds. There are six species of Flamingos in the world, but the birds here are **Greater Flamingos** (Phoenicopterus roseus), largest and most widespread of the **flamingo** species. Although they are resident birds, they don't breed here and the flocks that you see are generally made up of juvenile birds and non-breeding adults. If you want to see them breeding then you should visit the lakes near Torrevieja or the lagoon of Petróla in Albacete.

I love to see them in flight as they are more colourful and spectacular than when they are stood still in the water. If you ever look at the Murcia Birding Facebook page there is Spanish guy who posts a daily photo of a **Flamingo** in flight, yes that's right every day! It seems a bit obsessive for me, but he obviously has a passion for these birds.

My next common bird, the **Avocet** (Recurvirostra avosetta), is probably as equally emblematic as the **Flamingo**, but only



for us Brits. It is because it was extinct as a breeding bird in the UK for more than one hundred vears, since 1840. In 1947 it was decided to flood many parts of East Anglia to protect the country from potential invasion plans. This also had the happy coincidence of providing lots of good habitat for breeding **Avocets.** The birds quickly recognised these new wetlands and there are now about 2,000 pairs breeding in the UK. A real success story for conservation and it was a much heralded achievement in my childhood and vouth.

Fortunately, these resident and elegant black and white waders with their unique up-curved beaks are relatively common here. You should be able to see them quite easily as they feed in the saltpans. They are very visible and easy to identify from the other waders in the lagoons.

Probably, the only o the r bird that can be confused with an avocet is another



long-legged black and white wader, the **Black-winged Stilt** (Himantopus himantopus). However, they are quite different if you study them a bit more closely. It is an extraordinarily elegant wader with incredibly long slim red legs. The upper parts are green-

glossed black contrasting with the rest of the plumage, which is a clean white colour. The adult male has black on its head in breeding plumage.

In the UK it is classed as an uncommon migrant and occasional breeder. It is nowadays being seen more commonly in England, which is presumably a result of warming due to climate change. I do not think you need to be a genius to predict that it will soon be a species that is re-colonising the UK's wetlands. It will be a bird that will be welcomed with open arms by British birders as it will be an elegant addition to the list of British breeding birds.

Besides Avocets, Black-winged Stilts and Kentish Plovers, most of the common waders disappear up to the Arctic during the breeding season. However, it is a very short season as the Arctic is frozen until late spring, so the waders time their arrival after the ice melt. They tend to arrive at the breeding grounds in May and will start their migration south as soon as July.

Dunlins (Calidris alpina) are one of our more common waders at San Pedro. They are small birds, about the size of a starling, but fly huge distances north to south from breeding grounds to wintering and feeding areas. Some of them will fly south into Africa, but most of the birds seen here will stay at the salt-pans outside of the breeding season. It is a very common wader, but if you can identify it, it is a very good indicator species for size and plumage comparisons. This will help you identify other species.

It is very easy to spot in its summer plumage with its rufous cap and wings, a black patch on its chest and belly and a long down-curved beak. In winter plumage it is a nondescript bird with a dull coffee or light brown colour on its head and back. The beak and legs are still the same colour, black with a beak that is long and down-curved.

The smallest wader you will

probably see here is a Little Stint (Calidris minuta), about the size of a House **Sparrow** d n obviously smaller than **Dunlin.** In



the UK they are quite uncommon and usually seen far away, but here they will allow you to be quite close.

A larger wader than the previous two is a **Ruff** (Calidris pugnax). These birds can be quite confusing as the males are bigger than the females and their plumage can be quite variable. Birders often say that if you are struggling to identify it, it is probably a Ruff! Personally, I look to see if they have a small white ring around the base of the bill. The majority, with a few exceptions, show this ring. Larger wading birds are a lot easier to identify and there are two you can see here all year round, **Little Egret** (Egretta garzetta) and **Glossy Ibis** (Plegadis falcinellus).



The first one is very noticeable as it is all white with a long black stiletto beak, black legs and peculiar green feet!

The second bird, a **Glossy ibis**, is quite large and can look almost black depending on light conditions. Their plumage is actually purple brown, with a green gloss. It is an

incredibly beautiful bird if the light reflects well off its plumage. It is over half a metre in height with long legs and a large down-curved beak, quite unmistakeable.

One of the very common aquatic birds that over-winters here in their hundreds, if not thousands, is the **Black-necked grebe** (Podiceps nigricollis). In summer plumage they are very striking birds, but in winter they are grey-black above and a dirty grey below, quite a grubby looking bird. It is 28-34 cms long and stays principally on the water and often dives down when feeding on aquatic insects.

My final selection is a gull that is very uncommon in Northern Europe, a **Slender-billed Gull** (Chroicocephalus genie). They are here all year round and if you look carefully enough you are sure to find one. They have a delicate and elegant appearance and are similar size to the **Black-headed Gull**, but probably just a little bit bigger. It has a white head and reddish-legs and in summer has a feint pinkish blush on its plumage.

I hope you find time to visit San Pedro del Pinatar and see how many of these species you can spot.

### EDUCATION Jane Cronin's Step by Step Spanish

When people start learning Spanish they sometimes have the idea that all you have to do is translate individual words. Then they learn that the Spanish have a lot of different ways of saying things and that word for word translations just don't work. Then comes the realization that the whole structure of the language is completely different and that's where the real fun begins.

One of the ways English works is by putting lots of unchanging little words together into an endless variety of combinations. To express many of the ideas formed in this way into Spanish, one has to use an entirely different approach. For example, sometimes people ask me how to say 'get' in Spanish. hesitate then someone else will suggest the word 'consequir' which means 'get', in the sense of 'obtain', as in 'I'm going to get a job' (Voy a conseguir un trabajo). However, the real problem is that 'get' can mean a thousand other things, depending on the context.

For example, we have 'to get up' (levantarse), 'to get over' (recuperar, superar) 'to get out' (sacar, escaparse) 'to get on with' (llevarse co, seguir) 'to get through to' (comunicar, entenderse con).

Even within these few examples there are many shades of meaning in English. For example 'to get on with' can mean to have a relationship with someone (llevarse con) or to continue doing a task, as in 'get on with your work!'(seguir). 'To get over' can mean to recover from an illness or other setback (recuperar) or it can mean to find your way through a difficulty (superar). If you are already 'getting confused', you might wish to know the word to use is 'confundirse'.

As you are probably aware, I am merely scratching the surface of how to express 'get' in Spanish, and already endless alternatives have opened up before us. One particular way we use 'get' in English is with an adjective meaning to 'become more ....'

For example, we say 'to get fat' which means 'to become (more) fat'. The Spanish language has a completely different way of dealing with this idea. They take the word for 'fat' (gordo) and turn it into a verb 'engordar'.

In English we would often say 'I have put on weight', where the Spanish say 'he engordado'. 'To lose weight', or in other words 'to get thin or thinner' is formed by the word for 'thin' (delgado), giving us 'adelgazar' (to get thinner). 'This summer I want to lose a lot of weight' in Spanish is 'Este verano quiero adelgazar mucho'. Just look at any woman's magazine if you don't believe me.

We are all 'getting' older, and in Spanish we 'envejecer', from the word 'viejo'. Interestingly, we cannot literally get younger, but we can 'rejuvenecer', from the word 'joven'. All of a sudden the English uses a Latin based word to express this: 'to rejuvenate', although we still retain phrases like: 'You're not getting any younger, dear!' English is an interesting language.

Here are some more 'get' words that work in a similar way. Largo means long and alargar is to get longer or lengthen. Corto means short and to get shorter, or shorten, is acortar. To get more expensive is encarecer from the word caro (expensive), whilst to get cheaper is abaratar from barato (meaning cheap). To get softer is ablandar from blando (meaning soft), whilst the opposite is endurecer (to harden from duro meaning hard).

Not all adjectives work this way and as you can see the verbs vary in their formation too, but this might set you on the road to new discoveries, or you could always make a new one up and see what happens.



Francisco Salzillo: Murcia's Master Sculptor

Francisco Salzillo was born in Murcia City on 12 May 1707, and grew up to become one of the greatest Spanish (and European) baroque sculptors the eighteenth century. Francisco was the son of Nicolas Salzillo, an Italian sculptor, who'd moved to Murcia a few years before the birth of his son. Initially at least, young Francisco seemed destined for a career in the church - he was educated by the Jesuits and almost certainly entered the Dominican order as a novice. However, any thought of the priesthood ended when Francisco's father, Nicolas, died in 1727. Francisco took over his father's Murcia City workshop, used some of his seven siblings workshop assistants, and embarked on a career as a remarkably talented sculptor, whose fame spread throughout Spain and the rest of catholic Europe.

The ex-Dominican novice was very quick to establish control of the workshop he inherited. He was very much the man in control, though family members and other workshop apprentices

were involved in various aspects of sculpture production.

Francisco devoted himself entirely to producing works with religious theme (both processional and nonprocessional) and he nearly always used decorated, gilded polychrome wood in to fashion his creations. The Murcian sculptor's style was influenced significantly by the Italian baroque, and the works of Bernini, but Salzillo's pieces were subtly different and were of a transitional nature.

Traditionally, many baroque images were of a dramatic kind, but **Salzillo's** Murcian sculptures were more relaxed, naturalistic and idealised. Indeed, he created a school and a style of his own, the so-called Murcian School of Sculpture, which remains important to this day.

Being a Murcian was incredibly important to **Francisco Salzillo** and he never left the region during his entire life. In fact, there is only one documented record of **Salzillo** ever leaving the city of Murcia, when he travelled to nearby Cartagena,

on business, in 1755. The great eighteenth century Murcian and Spanish politician Floridablanca even invited Salzillo to stay in Madrid, so that his works became better known at the Spanish Court. Salzillo, however, still wouldn't leave Murcia and Floridablanca's turned down offer. This lack of mobility didn't seem to harm Salzillo's career to any significant extent:

The Murcian sculptor's works still became renowned across a wide area and he received commissions from churches and convents throughout Murcia, Alicante, Albacete and Almeria. In recognition of his increasing fame, in 1755, Francisco **Salzillo** was offered (and accepted) the post of Official Sculptor of the Murcia Council and inspector of painting and sculpture.

**Salzillo** certainly produced a vast amount of work. Way back in 1800, the historian and *Continued on page 28*

art critic Juan Agustin Cean Bermudez went on record to state that Francisco Salzillo created 1,792 works of art.



This figure is almost certainly considerable exaggeration, but nonetheless, Salzillo still produced a considerable polychrome of quantity sculptures which found homes in religious establishments and other locations across the Murcia region and throughout southeast Spain. A considerable number of his works were destroyed during the savage fighting of the Spanish Civil War, between 1936-9, but many of the Murcian sculptor's best pieces still remain dotted around Murcia and its neighbouring provinces.

Many of Salzillo's most famous sculptures are housed in the dedicated Salzillo Museum, located in the Plaza de San Agustin, in Murcia City. The idea of a museum devoted specifically to Salzillo's works was conceived over 80 years ago and even today the site remains one of the most visited heritage attractions in the Murcian region.

One of the major Salzillo attractions at the museum has always been the massive Belen nativity scene, created by Francisco and his workshop team from about 1780 onwards, which contains a total of 525 figures -166 humans and 364 animals. Other similar masterpieces are

also housed at the museum and at other locations in Murcia and throughout Spain and beyond. The legacy of the Murcian sculptor, who died 240 years ago, in 1783, remains a remarkably prolific and vibrant one.

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

### **NORMA'S TRAVELS**

Our much delayed ferry was fuller on the return, but we got some sleep and eventually arrived at 1am, although we had to wait to get off as an ambulance had to remove a woman who had been taken ill. The ferries run late, the staff are surly and know they are serving a captive audience with no competition.

At 1.30am we finally got to bed, but we were up and out at 8.45am for breakfast. We took two buses to Puerto Montt for an overnight stay before our taxi arrived at 5.15am the following morning to take us to the airport for our flight to Argentina. We were flying with LATAM, via Santiago, who were super efficient, friendly and on time.

Fortunately our bags were going right through meaning we didn't have to waste time checking in again. We transferred r 0 m domestic to international Santiago at arrived and Buenos in only Aires 10 minutes late at 3.15pm. We never have experienced



an arrival like it. No queue at immigration, really nice staff and our bags ready, all within 15 minutes. In fact it was so fast our taxi driver hadn't even arrived!

Our accommodation was a studio, on the 23<sup>rd</sup> floor in Puerto Madero, an area of docklands which has been remodelled. We arrived to a heatwave, 32°C and the aircon struggling to cool down a space with two window walls.

We were here in **Buenos Aires** for Chris to start his Antarctic

cruise and we had things to do. Number one to get the washing sorted - the nearest laundry was only about a 15 minute walk, but the heat and humidity made it feel three times that. It would be ready next day they informed us; next problem was getting money. Just a bit of background for those of you not knowledgeable about Argentina's economy. Inflation is off the scale (last year 95%), no one trusts the peso or the banks so people hoard US dollars under their mattresses. We took both US dollars and Euros to use for exchange. There are at least two exchange rates, official (about 210) to the dollar and blue (360). You get the first at an ATM, the second at a "cueva" or on the street. Since December 2022 you also get near the blue rate with a foreign credit card, but obviously cannot use that for taxis, coffee etc. We didn't want to use an ATM unless we really had to.

We went into a bar to get water and were able to pay in US dollars and get change in pesos, with а result of getting hydrated n



solvent. We managed to return to our apartment in time to have a shower and get dressed for dinner with Alan, Chris's friend from his youth. Apart from the fact we were unable to make it to **Buenos Aires** on our 2012/13 trip to Argentina it was the start point for Chris's Antarctic cruise. We had a very good meal with excellent steak in a restaurant recommended by Alan's hotel.

I had booked a PCR at our apartment for Chris, obligatory for his cruise. It was due between 8am and 10am, but arrived at 11am! I went out to pick up the washing,

get food for breakfast, found a place to exchange blue dollars and spotted a vegan place to eat. We wandered out for a coffee and cake and that was enough in the heat.

He set off to join his cruise group and I chilled and then enjoyed a delicious vegan meal. Fresh lemonade and ginger, 3 dips and a great bowl of salad, what a joy after the meatfest. Chris rang to say he had been briefed, allocated a group, given his instructions and was leaving at 5.45am in group 5 on the purple bus!! Not quite how we normally travel.

I know this is controversial and I know many people love cruises but they do not appeal to me and before you think "don't knock it until you have tried it" we did take a 5 day cruise on the Yangtze when we were in China.

Most people who know me well will say I am a bit of a free spirit and I don't like too much structure, but I am also a bit of a control freak. I am also not a good sailor although I love being close to the sea. I don't really do 'dressing up'so the idea of formal dinners and a dress code are alien! Chris had to request a special dispensation not to wear a Dinner Jacket for the gala dinner - carrying it in his bag for one night seemed crazy, plus of course he doesn't have one. I bought him a t shirt with a dinner jacket printed on it.

Chris headed off on his cruise and I was in **Buenos Aires** and the heat continued. It was time to soak up the atmosphere of the city. I spent the morning walking around, first to the magnificent Plaza de Mayo with the square where the Peron's made their speeches, then to a fabulous art nouveau style cafe before a walk down Defensa, enjoying the San Telmo Sunday market. I went to the food market where I saw a bit of street tango, but it was so busy. On any other occasion I would have done more but the heat and humidity were killers - I had walked 6km at half my normal speed.


Eventually got taxi to Up Viamonte hotel, my place for 3 nights. Ιt was in the central area of **Buenos** Aires, not far from Teatro



Colón. The room was huge, a bedroom, bathroom and living/kitchen area, a bit faded, but clean. However, it was a working area and not much seemed open at night. I found a little local cafe, full of locals so prices also local and a little supermarket next door where I could make purchases for my breakfast.

Due to the heat I had decided on a city tour in an air-conditioned mini bus for Monday. The tour guide

Lionel arrived on time, a group of 11 with me being the only none American, although 2 were originally Iranian and one Dutch. I enjoyed what I saw but not the experience.



Let me paint a picture for you. Two couples from New York constantly saying "gee that is just like something in some place in the US" and moaning about the guide from the start. His English was not perfect admittedly, but he tried hard. The icing on the cake was when the foursome wandered off into Recoleta cemetery (going inside was not on the tour). The guide tried twice to find them and rang his office and we set off without them. 10 minutes later he got a call to say they had rang the office complaining they had been left behind! They got on the bus and had the brass neck to say "Sorry you went without us".

When Lionel started talking about the importance of the Casa Rosado during the Peronist era one of them said "Jeez we have all seen the movie". They tipped the guide 20\$, nearly 20% and then said "lets get a Starbucks"!

### British Embassy Madrid

British Embassy urges UK licence holders to exchange their licence before 15<sup>th</sup> September cut-off.

On 15 March 2023, the UK and Spain reached an agreement on driving licence exchange, which enabled UK licence holders living in Spain to swap their UK licence for a Spanish one without needing to take a practical or theory test.

Т h e agreement a v e existing residents had who not yet exchanged their UK licences for Spanish а



one six months (until 15<sup>th</sup> September) to do so, during which time they could continue to drive on their UK licences. As for newly arrived residents, the agreement gave them six months from the date they acquired their residency documents to exchange their UK

licence. Licences can be exchanged after the six month period, but will no longer be considered valid for driving in Spain.

**Embassy** British has been urging UK licence holders to make the exchange by 15th September. On 29th March, the Ambassador hosted a 'Facebook Live' to address frequently questions, whilst the Embassy has advised that anyone struggling to get an appointment at their local Dirección General de Tráfico Office go to their neighbouring one instead.

Last week, the British Embassy announced a resolution had been found to an issue which some holders of expired UK licences (typically those over 70) had been experiencing when trying to exchange their licences. Those affected should follow the established process for exchange, requesting their check code via gov.uk.

His Majesty's Ambassador to Spain, Hugh Elliott said,



"It is very important that UK licence holders w h o lived in



Spain prior to 15<sup>th</sup> March 2023 and want to drive here exchange their licences on or before the 15<sup>th</sup> September. We want this message to reach as many UK licence holders as possible, so please spread the word and refer to our Facebook page and the Living In Spain Guide on **gov.uk** for more information."

UK licence holders who moved to Spain before 16th March 2023 and fail to make the exchange by 15th September will no longer be able to drive on their UK licence. If they wish to continue driving in Spain, they will need to go through the licence exchange process.

The process for completing the exchange is run by Spain's Dirección General de Tráfico (see their website for more information.)

Having successfully dismantled and packed my bike with all of my gear into a cardboard box, I set off to the airport to catch my flight to Calgary, Canada to attempt to cycle The Great Divide - 2800 miles over mountain tracks, unaided and solo. The Visa applications, training sessions, planned routes, tents, kit, food, knowledge, transport, excel spreadsheets.....the preparation has been immense. Tonight I am staying at Gatwick

In 24 hours I will be (hopefully) unpacking my bike and shopping for essentials in Banff, a bucket list place to visit for me. Next month read about my 3 days travelling from Elkford to Eureka, the reality of saddle sores and friends I made.

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
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

that not add to yet other 'crisis'; that of isolation, loneliness and issues of mental health?

# TV NEWSLETTER – SEPTEMBER 2023

Well September is here. Madrid will have gone home and whoever does control the thermostat should have turned it down a notch or two.

It was a prolonged hot humid summer – one in the world's natural cycle or global warming? Probably a bit of both. Dreadful fires all over the globe – it happens every year but this year they seemed to destroy many towns and villages rather than being in remote areas.



Closer to home the **Rainbow** house has survived the summer – A/C units worked hard, dogs slept all day and the hose pipe worked overtime, now tentatively waiting for electric and water bills. The **charity** we support – **Friends of Mazarron Animals** (FMA) – continues its fabulous work. We have asked before but please consider becoming a foster home for a dog or cat. **FMA** will always eventually find

any animal a permanent home but it is the time between taking them on and finding a home that is often a problem. Kennels are an option but these animals have often had difficult lives before coming to **FMA** and need a stable home environment – yes it is hard when they leave you but tremendously satisfying in the knowledge that you gave them a start – and you can then take on another foster to give that its start.

TV News - We all know that TV viewing is rapidly going down the internet route - it will not be long before that is the only way to view. Satellite and regular antenna transmissions will cease. Satellite is just too expensive and the mobile phone companies want the TV transmission frequencies - and they will get them. When they do the now new Fibre infrastructure will become redundant with wireless over the air mobile phone/data signals at very fast speeds becoming the new normal.



Internet TV does require excellent relatively fast internet but more important is stability with good fast reliable routes. Do you realise that sending an email to your next door neighbour the electronic signal will go something like from your sending device to your router to your internet service provider to, say, Madrid, to London via a satellite or two, across to New

York, under the Atlantic to get to Murcia, to your neighbours internet service provider, to their router and pop up on their device – all in micro seconds?

TV boxes go on/off line continuously and each time on line that route will be different but still must get from A to B. Each "stop" is a potential problem – routing is extremely important – more important than internet speed and unfortunately many ISP's buy in cheaper and cheaper routes to keep their prices low (and profits high). Movistar who will supply routes



to many others in Spain are one of the most expensive internet suppliers but without question the best internet "quality". Talking of Movistar, they have made a deal with Skylink to provide internet in rural areas of Spain – they already do this in some other countries. So those of you out in the campo with slow poor internet will soon have internet similar to fibre quality at a reasonable cost. The full details have yet to be announced.

Skylink is available to all now – very good fast internet but it is around 450€ to install and close to 100€ per month! I understand the Movistar deal will have some form of subsidy – so that everyone in Spain will soon have access to fast stable internet. More information will be here

over the months to come or I am sure will soon be available on the Movistar website.

One word of warning about Skylink – it is a worldwide internet system and seems to use a variety of international IP addresses. Many TV providers block certain IP addresses (technical and legal reasons) so TV on Skylink will probably need a VPN service – just another tenner a month!

Free demonstrations of IPTV are available with one weeks free trial – unsure about this new fangled technology – you do not need to be a geek – you don't even have to have a computer – give it a try – nothing to lose. That's it for September - another edition in October.


myself as the sun was rising, where it proceeded to berth alongside the cruise terminal as scheduled.

# DID YOU KNOW?



Little Horn of Daniel chapter 7 and verse 8 (Part 2)

Did you know there are clear identifying characteristics noted in the scripture concerning this **Little Horn** (king or power)? A reminder of Daniel chapter 7 and verse 8 "I considered the horns, and behold, there came up among them another little horn, before whom there were three of the first plucked up by the roots. Behold in this horn were eyes like the eyes of a man, and a mouth speaking great things".



The *Roman religion had many* gods and the first Roman Emperor to declare himself as a god was Caesar Augustus. (he was also known as Octavian). He is mentioned in Luke chapter 2 and verse 1 "And it came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed". (Caesar is a title and means ruler or dictator). Yeshua (Jesus) was born during this period when Joseph and Mary travelled to Bethlehem. Luke chapter 2 and verses 4 and 5 states "And Joseph also went up from Galilee,....unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, (because he was of the house and lineage of David), to be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child".

In last months article details were given concerning Antiochus IV Epiphanes who erected an alter to the Greek god Zeus in the temple in Jerusalem. He then

sacrificed the pig upon it. This was an abomination of desolation which led to the Jewish revolt by Judah Maccabee. The revolt was a success and the Jews cleansed and rededicated the temple.

Yeshua (Jesus) warned in Mathew Chapter 24 and verses 2 and 15 stating "And Jesus went out, and departed from the temple, and his disciples



came to him for to show him the buildings of the temple. And Jesus said unto them, see ye not all these things? Verily I say unto you, there shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down. When ye therefore shall see the abomination of desolation, spoken of by Daniel the prophet, stand in the holy place, whoso readeth, let him understand". This prophecy was fulfilled in AD70 when the temple and all Jerusalem was completely destroyed by the Roman army, under Emperor Titus (an Emperor is a monarch or sovereign ruler of an empire).

In Daniel chapter 7 and verses 23 to 25 it outlines "...the fourth beast shall be the fourth kingdom upon the earth, which will be diverse from all kingdoms, and shall devour the whole earth, and shall tread it down and break it in pieces. The 10 horns out of this kingdom are 10 kings that shall arise, another shall arise after them, and he shall be diverse from the first, and he shall subdue 3 kings. He shall speak great words against the

most High, and shall wear out



the saints of the most High, and think to change times and laws, and they shall be given into his hand until a time and times and the dividing if time". Daniel chapter 7 and verse 20 and 21 also states about this Little Horn power "....even of that horn that had eyes, and a mouth that spake very great things, whose look was more stout than his fellows. I beheld, and the same horn power made war with the saints, and prevailed against them, until the Ancient of days came, and judgement was given to the saints of the most High...". The above speaks of the fourth kingdom, which we now know is Rome. There were 10 Horns (or 10 kings) which came out of the kingdom of Rome. In lasts months article the 10 kings were listed as France, Germany, Switzerland, Portugal, England, Italy, Spain, Ostrogoths, Heruli and Vandals. But a Little Horn (king or power) arose from among these 10 kings and destroyed 3 of the 10. The 3 which were destroyed were the Ostrogoths, Heruli and the Vandals.

According to Daniel this Little Horn (king or power) became prominent at the decline of the Roman empire and came up after the 10 horns or kings. This Little Horn power will speak

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against the most High and wear out the saints. The most High is Yehovah (Jehovah). Psalms chapter 83 and verse 18 clarifies "That men may know that thou, whose name alone is Yehovah/Jehovah, art the most High over all the earth".

There is much confusion as to who saints are? You may be surprised to learn that the saints in the scriptures refer to the followers of Yehovah (Jehovah or God) and his son Yeshua (Jesus). Saint means consecrated to God, separated for sacred use, they dedicate themselves to the worship and service of the one true God. The New Testament alone uses the word saints about 67 times and in all cases it refers to all believers.

Here are a few examples. Revelation chapter 14 and verse 12 says "Here is the patience of the <u>saints</u>, here are they that keep the commandments of God, and have the testimony of Jesus". Colossians chapter 1 and verse 2 says "To the <u>saints</u> and faithful brethren in Christ which are at Colosse, grace unto you,

and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ". 1st Corinthians chapter 14 and verse 33 states "For God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all the churches of the <u>saints</u>". 1st Corinthians chapter 1 and verse 2 explains "Unto the church of God which is at Corinth, to them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be <u>saints</u>, with all that in every place call upon the name of Jesus Christ our Lord…".

What is clear is that this **Little Horn** power looked different from all the other horns (kings or powers). **This Little Horn** is a person who is speaking against Yehovah, the most High. There is also an attack upon his (Yehovah's) followers, the saints. This **Little Horn** power thinks to change Gods times and laws. But can Yehovah's (Jehovah) times and laws be changed by any person?

In the Torah, (Law or Instructions) which is the first 5 books of the scriptures Deuteronomy chapter 12 and verse 32 explains "What thing soever I command you, observe to do it. Thou shall not add thereto, nor diminish from



it". It is also interesting to note that in the last chapter of the last book in the scriptures the same sentiments are given. Revelation chapter 22 and verses 18 and 19 clarifies "For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, if any man shall add unto these things, God shall add to him the plagues that are written in this book. And if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life...".

I hope you have learned more about the scriptures. Next month I will continue with Part 3.



# Recipes

#### **Healthy September Recipes:**

September is the bridge between summer and autumn, and in this recipe collection we have included dishes for both seasons.

#### Roasted Chicken and Butternut Squash with Sumac Brown Butter



4 chicken leg quarters 3 kg 3¼ teaspoon kosher salt

4 teaspoon lemon zest

2 teaspoons black pepper

2 medium butternut squash, halved and cut into ½ inch slices

3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

3 thyme sprigs

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

1 teaspoon honey

1 teaspoon sumac (or coriander powder if sumac unavailable)

1 teaspoon aleppo pepper (or cayenne pepper if aleppo unavailable)

Fresh thyme leaves, for garnish

Place chicken on a rimmed baking sheet; sprinkle evenly with 2 teaspoons salt, 2 teaspoons lemon zest, and 1 teaspoon black pepper. Refrigerate, uncovered, 8 hours or overnight.

Let chicken come to room temperature (about 1 hour). Preheat oven to 230°C. Add butternut squash to baking sheet; drizzle chicken and butternut squash with olive oil. Sprinkle

squash with 1 teaspoon salt and remaining 1 teaspoon black pepper. Tuck thyme sprigs around chicken mixture. Bake in preheated oven until a thermometer inserted in thickest part of chicken registers 75°C and squash is tender, about 35 minutes. Transfer chicken and squash to a platter. Discard thyme sprigs; reserve pan juices.

Heat butter in a small saucepan over medium, stirring occasionally, until browned and fragrant, about 3 minutes. Scrape pan juices from baking sheet into saucepan. Whisk in honey, ½ teaspoon sumac, remaining 2 teaspoons lemon zest, and remaining ¼ teaspoon salt. Drizzle over chicken and butternut squash. Sprinkle with Aleppo pepper, thyme leaves, and remaining ½ teaspoon sumac.

# Sweet Potato Fritters with Lemon-Tahini Sauce



3/4 cup plain whole-milk Greek yogurt

2 tablespoons tahini

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

1 garlic clove, finely grated

½ teaspoon black pepper

21/2 teaspoons kosher salt

1 kg sweet potatoes, peeled and coarsely shredded on a box grater 1 kg turnips, peeled and coarsely shredded on a box grater

1½ tablespoons extra-virgin olive

2 medium leeks, thinly sliced

2 large eggs, beaten

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon ground cumin ½ teaspoon ground turmeric

½ teaspoon ground ginger Vegetable oil, for frying

Baby kale, for serving

Whisk together yogurt, tahini, lemon juice, garlic, pepper, and ½ teaspoon salt in a small bowl. Set aside.

Place a colander over a large bowl; add sweet potatoes, turnips, and remaining 2 teaspoons salt; toss to combine. Let mixture stand 10 minutes. Transfer mixture to a clean kitchen towel; gather up edges, and squeeze out excess liquid. Transfer sweet potato mixture to a medium bowl.

Heat olive oil in a large cast-iron skillet over medium. Add leeks and a pinch of salt and cook, stirring occasionally, until leeks are soft and starting to brown, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add cooked leeks, eggs, flour, cumin, turmeric and ginger to sweet potato mixture and stir until thoroughly combined.

Wipe out skillet, and add a 1/sinch layer of vegetable oil. Heat over medium until melted. Working in batches, spoon 2 tablespoons of batter for each fritter into skillet about 2 inches apart and flatten slightly with a spatula. Cook until golden and crisp, 2 to 3 minutes per side. Transfer fritters to paper towels to drain; sprinkle with salt to taste. Add more oil to skillet between batches as needed. Serve with lemon-tahini sauce and kale.

#### **Whole Baked Pumpkin Soup**

2 (3 to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  kg) whole orange pumpkins

1½ cups (12 ounces) dry white wine

2 teaspoons oil

1 cup raw pumpkin seeds

21/4 teaspoons fine sea salt

and when

14 tablespoons tablespoons unsalted butter
Water



Preheat oven to 230°C. Line a large rimmed baking sheet with aluminum foil. Place whole pumpkins on baking sheet. Bake in preheated oven until very tender, about 45 minutes.

Meanwhile, pour wine into a small saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium-high and boil, without stirring, until wine has reduced by about half, about 10 minutes. Keep warm; set aside.

Heat oil in a small skillet over medium-high. Add pumpkin seeds and cook, stirring often, until seeds are puffed, about 4 minutes. Transfer to a plate lined with paper towels, and sprinkle with ¼ teaspoon salt; set aside.

In the same skillet, melt 7 tablespoons butter over medium. Cook, stirring often, until butter browns, about 6 minutes. Set aside.

Remove skin and stems from pumpkins and cut pumpkins in

half. Scoop out and discard seeds. Working in 3 batches, combine hot pumpkin, 31/2 cups water, and remaining 7 tablespoons butter in a blender. Remove centre piece of blender lid to allow steam to escape. Place a clean towel over opening. Process until smooth, about 1 minute per batch adding depending more water preference to thin or thick soupl. Transfer mixture to a large bowl. Stir in reduced wine and remaining 2 teaspoons salt.

Sprinkle servings with sautéed pumpkin seeds and drizzle with brown butter.

#### **Pears in Moscatel**



1 (750 ml) bottle of Moscatel bottles sweet Mediterranean Muscat dessert wine 3 tablespoons honey 4 thyme sprigs 1 fresh or dried bay leaf 2 teaspoons fennel seeds Small pinch of saffron threads Pinch of fine sea salt 2 medium-size unripe to barely ripe pears (about 15 ounces)

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

1 to 2 cups boiling water Fromage blanc or crème fraîche, for serving

Combine wine, honey, thyme sprigs, bay leaf, fennel seeds, saffron and salt in a small (3- to 4-quart) casserole dish. Bring to a boil over medium-high. Reduce heat to medium-low and simmer, uncovered, stirring occasionally, 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, peel pears and cut in half lengthwise. Using a small spoon, remove seeds and core from each half, carving out neat half-spheres.

Brush pear halves all over with lemon juice.

Add pears to wine mixture in a single layer. Add 1 cup boiling water or more as needed to just submerge pear halves. Simmer, uncovered, over medium-low until tender, 30 to 35 minutes, turning pears every 8 to 10 minutes.

Using a slotted spoon, transfer pears to a plate and set aside.

Bring poaching liquid to a light boil over medium and boil, stirring occasionally, until sweet, syrupy and reduced to about ¾ cup, 15 to 20 minutes. Pour syrup through a fine wire-mesh strainer into a bowl; discard solids.

Spoon 2 to 3 tablespoons fromage blanc onto each of 4 shallow bowls or rimmed dessert plates. Nestle 1 pear half into fromage blanc, upright, if desired. Drizzle each pear half with 2 to 3 tablespoons syrup.

Serve warm or chilled.

WHAT DO YOUR TYRE CODES MEAN? CAR REGISTRATIONS SPAIN

It's a well known fact that in Spain your car tyres need to be identical on each axle, but do you know what all the writing and codes mean on your car tyres?

Here's a guide that explains everything and why it is important to know what's what.

**TYRE WIDTH** The 3 digit tyre width is the nominal measurement from sidewall to sidewall in millimetres, taken at the widest point of the tyre, but excludes writing and kerbing rib.

**HEIGHT RATIO** (also known as the Aspect Ratio). This tells you how tall your tyre is as a percentage of the width. So in the example we give it is 55% of 205mm, or 112.75 mm.

**RADIAL** The type of construction of the tyre and the standard construction for most passenger vehicle tyres are Radial

WHEEL DIAMETER The diameter code signifies the wheel size (in inches) that the tyre is intended to be mounted on. In our example the tyre should be mounted on 16 inch diameter wheels.

LOAD RATING (Also known as the load index). The load rating tells us how much weight the tyre can bear. The load rating is a numerical code that can be cross referenced against a standardised table that will provide the safe load for the tyre at maximum inflation. In our example a load rating of 91 translates to 615kg.

#### Tyre Load Rating Guide

**SPEED RATING** The tyre speed rating is a letter code that can be used to look up the maximum speed that the tyre can safely withstand with a fully loaded vehicle. For the "V" rating in our example the tyre is rated for a maximum sustained speed of 149 mph.

TYRE SPEED RATING GUIDE DOT DOT in our example stands for Department of Transport and indicates that this is the authority that has approve the tyre. The DOT code is comprised of between 7 and 13 characters and will usually contain the factory code, tyre size, brand symbol and the tyre age.



**FACTORY CODE** This is sometimes referred to as the Plant Code and tells us the factory where the tyre was manufactured. These can usually be Googled.

**DATE OF MANUFACTURE** This is a four digit code telling us when the tyre was manufactured. The first two digits represent the week number and the second two digits are the year, so in our example the tyres were manufactured the second week of 2004.

**ECE REGULATION 30** All UK and European tyres must also be "E" marked which shows that

they conform to European Safety Standards. In our example "E4" signifies that the tyre was manufactured in Holland and complies with the regulation.

OTHER TYRE MARKINGS
In addition to the codes and markings we have already covered, you will also usually see the brand and commercial name of the tyre and information about the materials used in the construction of the tyre. Some other common markings are RF for Run Flat, M+S for Mud & Snow and for winter tyres a twin peaks symbol with snowflakes.

TREAD WEAR INDICATORS Finally we come to the tread wear indicators that show the minimum tread depth of the tyre which is 1.6mm in the UK and Europe, measured across the central three quarters, however do bear in mind that for safety the standard recommendation is a minimum of 3mm.

Pat, you must be pleased with the first half of 2023?

"Yes, the Committee and I are very pleased. Not that it has been easy as the economic impact on resident's income has really hit home. However, we have organized 3 successful events, continue to deliver a high-quality gardening service and generally support the D community".

I imagine residents see the D Group as purely operating the gardening teams?

Now as I write, she is settled in, feet done and honestly a fantastic little **pony**. Everyone she meets falls in love with 'Alice Bertie' - a story behind every name.

Huge thanks to Carolynn May for allowing us to do a raffle at her monthly music night at Mariano's raising much needed funds. We also received a donation from the funeral of David Hemmings and we would like to send our love and condolences to Di and the family.


Season tickets are now on sale at a cost of €50 for the 17 home

# Camposel Explorers \*\*\*

Expat in Mazarron

My name is Shaun and I have ran the Expat in Mazarron YouTube channel since arriving here in Spain in 2015. It's all about me living in Spain, where I live (Camposol), places of interest, property, going out walking and many more things about Spain. I've set up a group called **Camposol Explorers** which is about going out exploring once a month in the Murcia Region and beyond.



I am still recovering from my hip operation but getting better each day and already planning places to explore later this year, but in the meantime I will be posting some interesting locations, not far from Camposol that you can visit.

#### **Bolnuevo**

About a 20 minute drive from Camposol, down the RM3 to the coast that is signposted to **Bolnuevo.** When I first arrived here, whilst renting on Camposol, we went to **Bolnuevo** beach nearly every day until we bought our new home.

Some history about **Bolnuevo.** 

Historical records for the region of Mazarrón date back to the Phoenicians, who used the coastal area to dock and ship minerals and other produce. During the 16th century a sanctuary was built in **Bolnuevo** in memory of the locals who came under the constant attacks from pirates. There was also a defensive fortress, which was known as the Tower of Horses, or **Bolnuevo** Castle.

The main tourist attraction for

**Bolnuevo** is not the sandy beaches but the sand sculptures you see when you park your car, also known as the Gredas de **Bolnuevo.** The site has been christened the Enchanted City (Ciudad Encantada in Spanish) due to its resemblance to Cuenca's Enchanted City.



It appears that the origins of the Gredas de Bolnuevo date back to the Pliocene time, 5 million years ago. According to scientists, there was initially an inflow of water from the Atlantic, which made its way towards the Mediterranean, flooding coastal areas of the primitive Iberian Peninsula as it progressed. All the signs are that the sea later retreated, and this caused the submerged surface of the land to reappear above the water. And in this case, the atypical formations which we can see today near the beach also emerged. This is the reason why the Gredas de Bolnuevo have so many fossils and marine microfossils. Over the years, people used to climb over these strange shapes and have been damaged, so now they have a wooden fence around them.



**Bolnuevo** has a lot to offer, campsite, many bars and restaurants, walkways and cycleways, nudist beaches, bike hire, **safari tours** (2 man electric jeeps) that tour the coast line and not forgetting the sandy beaches that are manned during the summer months with life guards.



A highlight of the year is the **Sardine Festival**, celebrated on the Sunday following November 17th, when the figure of the Virgen de la Purism (patron saint of Mazarrón) returns to **Bolnuevo**. Cooking on the beach and handing out sardines is a huge tradition.



Next month, I will show you another interesting place not far from Camposol.

or finding that elusive parking space. Book your seats in advance.


