



Moon during day time



> November evenings is spectacular time to enjoy the sight of the closest celestial bodies as they are beautifully (and early) visible on the night sky. The Moon will be getting smaller and smaller until 8th November during which time it will only be visible very late night and in the morning sky. After it disappears, it will appear again on 16th November and will be beautifully visible every afternoon and evening. November full moon, Jakis tam moon, will grace the night sky on 27th.

RINGS AND STRIPES AND THE OTHER MOONS



Just after sunset on the eastern sky, two shiny dots appear. These are not stars though - it's Saturn, followed by Jupiter. When looked upon through a telescope both planets, now high in the sky, allow us to see spectacular details of their surface and surroundings. If you don't have a telescope, book your magical evening with Astronomy Tours, Finca Astronomica and see for yourself the magnificent rings of Saturn, stripes on the surface of Jupiter and 4 of Jupiter's best recognized moons!

WARM - Walkers Around the Region of Murcia



I am delighted to be able to write about our new 2023-24 season. Our programme this year got off to a great start. There is always a mixture of old favourite walks with a smattering of new routes.

Our first two walks were in the former group. The first one on 30th September, the night after the harvest moon, was an evening walk and picnic at **Fuente Caputa**, near Mula. This stunning walk features in our walking book and never fails to please. It was made all the more magical by the presence of the light from the moon. Our second walk started at the campsite in **Moratalla** and is always an interesting route.

These two walks start in very s i m i l a r terrain with a bit of scrambling over rocks



beside water. In **Fuente's** case along shallow streams until you emerge at a pool - during the heat of the summer it is a local bathing pool. In **Moratalla's** case it is through a narrow gorge by a flowing river.

After this the routes differ greatly -**Fuente Caputa** is a gentle meander with ever changing landscapes whereas **Moratalla** is a walk with some high gain, but that always gives you stunning views.

also a river crossing that either needs plastic bags for boots or removing them while you wade across. The picnic spot also has a pool for anyone wanting a swim.

Our leaders on these two occasions were seasoned regulars, Martin our President and Jessica led the moonlit walk and Steve and Fiona the camping walk. These four were, with Patricio, the founding members of **WARM** when it became an Association.

We are currently doing battle with the bureaucracy in Murcia to update our registration to the current committee members, but boy is it a long and complex process. By the time it is completed we will be ready for the next change when I retire in June 2024 after five years as Secretary.

Apart from walking, a small group of us have been working together to try and finish our second bilingual walking book. I think it is potentially the final edition considering the number of times we have uttered the words, "Never again". The text for the final walk should be inserted this week, a beautiful route that overlooks


Every year a group of 8 to 12 youngsters practise their dances and learn sentences in English

Light in the Darkness

"Darkness, the truest darkness, is not the absence of light. It is the conviction the light will never return". (Quote by Lois Lane in her newspaper article at the end of the film 'Justice League'.)

We will all go through times of darkness in life; to a point where we can't even see the light at the end of the tunnel. Darkness can be all consuming at times, but how we deal with that darkness is what counts because it determines how we come through it. At the time of writing the temperature is still in the high 20s and one wonders if it will rain again... No doubt it will pour down at some point in the foreseeable future when we'll all be missing the sunshine! The heat does make extra work for the gardening group volunteers as the plants need more looking after and with these temperatures, it's very hard work.



Despite the unseasonable weather, the end of year jobs still have to be done and the volunteers have been out trimming back the trees

that have started to overhang the road passing along the rambla. Calle Sierra de la Torrecillas takes a great deal of traffic as it is the main route of the two leading to the bridge connecting B and C sectors of Camposol. Egypt was a vital part of the Roman Empire, supplying the grain and bread which kept the masses from starving in the vast city of Rome. Spain was equally important in servicing the food needs of the Empire. Indeed, without Spain's olives, most Roman kitchens, and cooking, would have quickly ground to a halt. Similarly, Spain supplied most of Ancient Rome's garum - an immensely popular fish relish used on almost every kind of food. Garum fish paste relish was produced in both Cartagena and Pto de Mazarrón. Cartagena's garum enjoyed a particularly good reputation with the Romans, but many people throughout the Empire also enjoyed the products of Pto de Mazarrón's massive fish salting factory, situated on the right hand side of the bay, close to the port installations.



The remnants of this ancient factory - the Factoria Romana De Salazones - can still be viewed today, at the bottom of Calle Torres, in Pto de Mazarrón. The factory was at its height during the 4th and 5th centuries CE when the Roman Empire, as a whole, was on the point of collapse. Vestiges of the once massive industrial enterprise were discovered in 1976, when foundations were being laid for a new apartment block and the remains of the ancient factory have been designated as a Spanish Archaeological Site of Cultural Interest since June 1995.



Quadrangular tanks or basins were uncovered, in which tuna, mackerel, mullet, sardines, anchovies and bonito fish were left to ferment in salt for periods of between twenty days and three months. Adjacent storage warehouses were also unearthed, along with cutting and cleaning rooms and the factory's floors were waterproofed with quantities of lime, stone, and crushed ceramics.

Workers (slaves) in the Mazarrón factory removed fish scales and thorns, which were then used as animal feed. As the varieties of descaled fish subsequently fermented, thyme, oregano and fennel were added to create extra flavour. There were, however, different types of garum produced in the factory. It was a product which made use of the entire fish, including head, bones and entrails, and the most basic kind of garum produced at Mazarrón was hydrogarum, in which the fermented fish remains were mashed together with water. Oleogarum was a slightly more refined (and expensive) garum, which was mixed with olive oil, and peppers were used during the production of pimio garum. The pungent mass of fermenting fish was removed from the salt tanks in esparto or wicker baskets, which acted as strainers filtering out all the liquid elements. It was at this

point that the remaining solid fish material was mashed into a paste and further quantities of vinegar, oil and chilli could be added. The **garum** paste was then poured into long amphorae, sealed with lime plugs and removed to the local beach for embarkation on trading ships to all parts of the Roman world. The most highly regarded **garum** produced at the ancient Pto de Mazarrón factory and elsewhere, was the pure mackerel version.

However, the garum development process also created other products such as allec, which was the sediment left at the bottom of the garum vats. Allec could be used in cooking and 'muria', which was a type of brine, was another byproduct of the garum production process. The highest quality Mazarrón and Cartagena garum could be sold across the Latin speaking world as 'liquaminis flos optimus,' which translates as 'premium best fish sauce,' or 'liquaminis floris flos' which can be translated from the original Latin as 'absolutely the best fish sauce'.



Mazarrón and Cartagena garum made its way to shops across the Roman world, where it would

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often be unloaded into large dolias which were substantial storage vessels. These dolias were situated at the rear of many shops and when the **garum** was purchased, the shopkeeper would decant the product into smaller vessels ready for the customer to take away.

The scale of the profits involved in this **garum** business, for both shopkeepers and the manufacturers in Mazarrón, Cartagena and elsewhere were

massive. Profits were often immense because garum was a staple of ancient Roman cuisine. It was a condiment used with almost everything an equivalent to modern Far Eastern sauces, Worcesterhire sauce, mayonnaise, salad cream and vinegar all rolled into one! What did **garum** actually taste like? In truth, it's difficult to know. At its best, garum probably had some definite similarities to modern Worcestershire sauce and Far Eastern sauces such as nam-pla from Thailand. Classical

Roman historians do, however, seem to agree that **garum** had a particularly pungent aroma. The renowned British historian and classicist Mary Beard was probably right to conclude that, at its worst, **garum** was simply 'a truly stinking concoction of rotten, salted seafood'. It was nevertheless a concoction which generated considerable wealth in the ancient port of Mazarrón and all along the coast of Murcia.



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

My name is Shaun and I have ran the Expat in Mazarron YouTube channel since arriving here in Spain in 2015. It's all about me living in Spain, where I live (Camposol), places of interest, property, going out walking and many more things about Spain. I've set up a group called **Camposol Explorers** which is about going out exploring once a month in the Murcia Region and beyond.

This was my first outing this year after my hip operation and I was looking forward to going out again with the group. We had eleven members, some couldn't make it because of other arrangements. It was nice to take our dogs with us on this outing. I called it "The Three Viewpoints", in and around the "Badlands Barrancos de Gebas" and the lake.

Badlands Barrancos de Gebas About a 40 minute drive to our first location and on the way leading to the first view point we passed a convey of quad bikes. If you want to explore the **Badlands** and don't want to get your car dirty but explore more of the **Badlands** that a car won't be able to do, please check out 'The Espuna Adventure (Quad Espuna)". Also you can get a great deal with a meal at Hotel



What are the Badlands? Barrancos de Gebas, also known as "the Badlands", is a lunar like landscape on the outskirts of Sierra Espuña Regional Park in Murcia region. **Badlands** are a type of dry terrain where soft rocks and clay-rich soils have been extensively eroded by the elements of rain and wind over a long period of time. Barranco, not surprisingly, means gully or ravine and here there are hundreds of chalky white ravines. Barrancos de Gebas is one of 8 protected landscapes in Murcia and was declared as such in 1995.



On arriving at the first view point we left the cars and walked down to admire the view of the **Badlands** and the lake in the distance. We then had a group photograph and moved on to the next view point much closer to the lake. Some members didn't enjoy the track leading to it as there was some shear drops and found this quite scary. I assured them the next view point was okay. The second location was another view point with information board. The lake "Embalse de Algeciras" which is a reservoir, has a turquoise colour to it. We noticed that the water which is used for local farmers and is fed by a canal nearby was very sparse due to lack of rain this year. We had another group photograph before moving onto our third and last view point.


Before we set off I asked two of the group if they wanted to continue as the drive up to the last location has some shear drops either side and may be too much for them. One of the partners took them to the picnic area while the rest of us continued our drive. Once there we parked the cars and walked about 10 - 15 minutes. Discovering Truth and Prayer (Part 1)

Did you know that discovering truth and prayer is essential for many people in their everyday life? Can mankind really find truth in a world full of confusion and chaos? Many people define truth as whatever you believe as an individual. But what is truth anyway and how important is it today? What is the link between truth and prayer? Why is prayer crucial to the christian? Let us explore the Scripture further.

The word truth is mentioned 150 more than times in Scripture. According to John chapter 18 and verse 37 and 38 it says "Pilot therefore said unto him, art thou a king then? Jesus answered, thou sayest that I am a king. To this end I was born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth. Everyone that is of the truth heareth my voice. Pilot saith unto him, what is truth? And when he had said this, he went out again to the Jews, and saith unto them, I find in him no fault at all". Proverbs chapter 12 and verse 17 it states "He that speaketh truth sheweth forth righteousness, but a false witness deceit".


The age old question is asked over and over again "what is truth?" In John chapter 17 and verse 17 it gives the answer "Sanctify them through thy truth, THY WORD IS TRUTH". So this simply means that we should accept Yehovah's (Jehovah or God) written words in scripture, which reveals truth. But this is not easy. We need the quidance of the Holy Spirit, which is the gift from Yehovah to help us to seek and discover truth. John chapter 16 and verses 13 to 15 quotes

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"Howbeit when he, the spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth. He shall not speak of himself, but whatever he shall hear, that shall he speak. He will shew all things to come. He shall glorify me, for he shall receive of mine and shall shew it unto you. All things that the Father hath are mine, therefore said I, that he shall take of mine, and shew it unto you". This is clearly stating that whatever the Father (Yehovah or Jehovah or God) or the Son (Yeshua or Jesus) speaks, the Holy Spirit can only speak these same words to all who will believe.

According to Proverbs chapter 14 and verse 12 "There is a way that seemeth right to man, but the end thereof are the ways of death". Also in the book of Proverbs chapter 19 and verse 27 it explains "Cease, my son, to hear the instruction that causeth to err from the words of knowledge". In other words do not listen to the voices of those who disuade you from doing what the scriptures clearly teaches. Yeshua (Jesus) himself declared in John chapter 14 and verse 6 "Jesus said unto him, I am the way, the truth and the life. No man cometh unto the Father, but by me". In other words all truth leads us closer to Jesus who is the way, truth and life.

important to search It is scriptures to find truth, but how? Isaiah chapter 28 and verses 9 and 10 explains "Whom shall he teach knowledge? And whom shall he make to understand doctrine?.... For precept must be upon precept, precept upon precept, line upon line, line upon line, here a little and there a little". These verses mean that a doctrine or teaching should not be built using one text. There is a need to study ALL the scripture



Proverbs chapter 8 and verses 5 to 7 it says "O ye simple and ye fools, be ye of an understanding heart. Hear, for I will speak of excellent things, and the opening of my lips shall be right things. For my mouth shall speak truth, and wickedness is an abomination to my lips". In verse 13 of the same chapter it expresses the following "The fear of the LORD is to hate evil. Pride and arrogancy, and the evil way, and the froward mouth, I do hate". In obtaining truth found in Scriptures one must have an open mind. For in John chapter 8 and verse 32 it states "And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free". All who seek truth will have to change their way of thinking. Romans chapter 1 and verse 25 asks the question "Who changed the truth of God into a lie, and worshipped and served the creature more than the Creator, who is blessed forever. Amen".

The Scripture states that one must do righteousness and speak truth according to his Law. Psalms chapter 15 and verse 2 clarifies "He that walketh uprightly, and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart". But what is righteousness according to scripture? In Deuteronomy chapter 6 and verses 24 and 25 it explains "And the Lord commanded us to do all these statutes, to fear the LORD our God, for our good always, that he might preserve us alive, as it is at this day. And it shall be our righteousness, if we observe to do all these commandments before the LORD our God, as he hath commanded us". There are many other passages which say

chapter 22 and Revelation verse 14 reiterates once again "Blessed are they that do his commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and enter in through the gates into the city". But what is this city you may ask? Revelation chapter 21 and verses 1 to 4 gives the understanding "And I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away, and there was no more sea. And I John saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. I heard a great voice out of heaven saying, behold the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and be their God. And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes, and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain. For the former things are passed away". John wrote the book of Revelation and was a disciple of Yeshua (Jesus).

Birding in Murcia by Martin O'Hanlon

During the last few years I've been writing these articles and describing my birding trips and the birds I've particularly enjoyed seeing. So it seems a bit strange to now be writing about birds I haven't seen. Let me explain a bit more.

I recently spent a few hours driving very slowly over the plains of Cagitán, a Special Protection Area, commonly known as a ZEPA using the Spanish initials. It's an area close to home that I have visited many times over the years. I wouldn't say I know it like the back of my hand, but I know it and its wildlife pretty well after being a constant visitor over the last twenty years. I know all the regular haunts of the resident birds and can normally find most of them after a bit of searching, so it is a pretty familiar site. However, the passage migrants can be a bit of mystery as you never know what will turn up or where. On nearly every occasion I would expect to see between twenty or thirty bird species. However, on recent visits I have been lucky to see even ten different species. It makes me very thoughtful about what has happened to make such a dramatic difference to the biodiversity of the plains. I am aware that it has been very dry and hot during the summer and maybe the local environment has been too harsh for many species to survive and raise their families. It could have resulted in many birds moving to areas with better living conditions. I am also aware that in recent years the plains have been subject to changes in agricultural practices. I have been saddened to see the rapid decline of traditional cereal growing to be replaced by almond growing. Acres of previous cereal plains have been planted with almond trees.

They are grown intensively with no field margins. The land is mechanically cleaned by a form of harrowing on a frequent routine. This means that the fields are devoid of life, without any weeds or other wildflowers and probably resulting in very few seeds or insect life. The plains have taken on the appearance of deserts without any noticeable signs of life. The new sterile almond fields have now become commonplace in Cagitán.

very quiet as I saw only a couple of Crested Larks, two Collared **Doves** and a pair of **Magpies**. However, it was interesting that passage migrants were revisiting their old stopping places on their way to Africa. There were lots of **Swallows** passing through in twos and threes, but not bothering to stop. I also saw a couple of northern Wheatears on their journey south and a very attractive Yellow Wagtail stopping for a rest.



At the moment, with little scientific evidence, but my own observations, I am beginning to think that the apparent loss of biodiversity is a result of industrialised almond growing replacing traditional practice and climate change. I could of course be wrong, but the loss of biodiversity in recent years is not something I have imagined. Maybe, this apparent loss of biodiversity has meant that a lot of the resident bird species that I normally see aren't about for some reason. I am finding it increasingly difficult to see common resident species such Starlings, as Sparrows, Larks, Sardinian Warblers, Finches, Little Owls, Green Woodpeckers, Great Tits, Corn Buntings, Choughs, etc. All birds that I would almost guarantee seeing on previous trips across the plains. My latest meander across Cagitán was



It wasn't much for a few hours of observation, but it cheered me up. My observations about Cagitán coincided with scientific report by the RSPB that I read, about the current state of nature in the UK during the last fifty years. I know it's a different country, but it struck me the similarities with my observations in Murcia. It was guite depressing really that it showed that 19% of species have declined by 19% and that one in six species are now threatened with extinction (yes, it is 19% twice). The report highlights that changes to agriculture and climate change are the two biggest causes of this loss of biodiversity. I know the evidence in relation to Murcia is quite sketchy or non existent, but I can't help feeling that the declines I have experienced here during the last twenty years indicate a very similar story.

I also visited the Saladares del Guadalentín, one of my favourite

sites. I was wondering if this site would be lacking in bird species like the plains of Cagitán. However, it wasn't long before I came across one of the special birds to be seen here. There was a large bird of prey perched on one of the electric pylons, which turned out to be a juvenile Golden Eagle. It sat patiently looking over the landscape and allowed me to watch it quite closely before leisurely flying away after ten or fifteen minutes. It was completely unfazed about my proximity, obviously quite confident in its ability to evade me whenever it wanted. Golden Eagles are probably one of the most exciting and emblematic birds for most British people. I suppose its reputation as the largest avian apex predator in the United Kingdom, (it has a wingspan of two metres) coupled with its rarity, has given these magnificent birds such a reputation. Murcia must be one of the best places to see a **Golden Eagle** as it currently boasts a very high density of eagles and a breeding population of sixty eight pairs. It is one of our birds of prey that is currently still increasing its population. The Saladares del Guadalentín is a great place to see them,

especially outside the breeding




season, as young birds from Sierra Espuña come to hunt here.



I then carried on driving over the Saladares without seeing a huge amount of species, but plenty of **Swallows** and **Northern Wheatears** were about, presumably on their long journeys down to Africa. I was also seeing quite a few **Kestrels** and **Iberian Grey Shrikes**, both of which are residents and small birds of prey. I reckoned this was a positive sign as there must be quite a good population of smaller species for them to hunt. It appeared to be a healthy food chain. This in turn indicates a healthy biodiversity, so my next visit may be more rewarding. I will try to be optimistic and remain positive.







prize raffle, raised in the region of $3,200 \in$.



'The times they are a-changin'.


The Untouchables ran as a television series from 1959 to 1963 and starred Robert Stack as Elliot Ness. You may remember it, I do. The other day I came across

Jane Cronin's Step by Step Spanish

People Words

It's very easy for language teachers to get stuck in ruts. An example of this is with 'people' words. We always teach the words of jobs (profesor, abogado) and members of the family (hijo, abuelo). We might throw in a few extras like **vecino** or **compañero** and that's as far as it usually goes.

However, the language is full of other 'people' words which are more commonly used than one might think. We had better start with the words for **person** and people which have their own little quirks. People, en masse as it were, is in fact a feminine singular word in Spanish la gente. Therefore it behaves like all feminine singular words when placed in a sentence. This means that a lot of people is mucha gente (feminine mucha) and people think is la gente **piensa** (piensa in the singular). The word for **person** is **persona** and this is also feminine. This means that if we want to sav something like Pedro is a great person in Spanish it remains grammatically feminine, like this Pedro es una persona estupenda.

There are other feminine people words which obey this rule which seems very strange to English speakers. Another example is **la victima.** We might hear something like this on the news: el padre de la familia fue una de las victimas. The opposite of victima is a word that also appears from time to time in the news verdugo. This basically means tyrant or executioner but nowadays is often used to describe a person who victimizes or abuses another in a particularly dreadful way. Before we leave criminal matters, the general word for criminal in Spanish is **delincuente.** The Spanish word criminal refers specifically to someone who murders or physically harms another person, whilst the general word for crime is **delito**. Just thought you might like to know that.

There are many people words which link individuals to where live. We have already to seen **vecino** which as well as neighbour can also mean | "David local resident. Villa es vecino de Langreo en Asturias" for example. We also have citizen, ciudadano (literally a resident of a city or ciudad) and paisano (resident of a country). Paisano can also mean compatriot or fellow countryman. Sometimes a Spanish person will say to me 'Ayer estuve con un paisano tuyo' (I was with one of your fellow countryman yesterday). This is usually followed by: "Se llamaba John o Jim o algo así.

John or Jim or something like that. Do you know him?)

As you will have discovered from your **job** words, we sometimes change the endings of verbs and add **-dor" or -dora** to give us the person who does something, such as **limpiador** (cleaner). This works for non-job words too, for example **jugador** (player), **pensador** (thinker), **vendedor** (seller) **comprador** (buyer), **seguidor** (follower) or simply **trabajador** (worker).. In each case you can just add the letter 'a' at the end to turn the person into a female.

You might want to try out a few more of these, although they don't always work. Sometimes the **dor or dora** ending refers to a machine **ordenador** (computer, from the verb **ordenar**), **lavadora** (washing machine, from the verb **lavar**).

There are many more where these came from and also an interesting way in which the Spanish use adjectives to make people words. More of that next week, I'm sure you can't wait.

Year went to Jo Pearson, without whom the club president's work and the charity shop in Turre, in particular, would struggle. Jo also offers support to the hugely overworked club secretary.

For anyone wanting to join **Lions** as a volunteer, there are as many roles as there are people. From putting together puzzles for the shop in Turre to ensure that all of the pieces are there, to holding fundraising events, from moving furniture to cleaning the shop weekly, there are no shortages of ways to be involved. The Club has a great, welcoming atmosphere, and you'll be helping many people.

Where the funds go

Vera and District Lions donate on a regular basis to Asprodalba, an occupational centre for people with mental incapacity, a local children's home and numerous food banks. Hearty, comforting dishes using ingredients seasonal to November.

Carrot & parsnip soup



½ tbsp olive oil
2 onions, finely chopped
2 celery sticks, finely chopped
2 garlic cloves, crushed
½ small bunch thyme, leaves picked
3 large carrots, peeled and roughly chopped

2 large parsnips, peeled and roughly chopped 1 litre vegetable stock 100ml double cream 1/4 bunch parsley, finely chopped (optional)

Heat the oil in a large saucepan and fry the onion and celery for 10 mins, stirring occasionally until softened. If they start to catch, add a small splash of water.

Add the garlic, thyme and ¹/₂ tsp black pepper and cook for 2 mins. Add the carrots, parsnips and stock and bring to the boil. Reduce to a simmer and cook for 20 mins until the vegetables are soft, stirring occasionally.

Blend using a stick blender until smooth. Add the cream and blitz again until combined, then taste for seasoning. To serve, ladle into bowls and scatter over a little chopped parsley, if you like.

Creamy chard, squash & parmesan tart

400g butternut squash, peeled, deseeded and cut into 2-3cm slices 3 tbsp olive oil





1/2 bunch of thyme, leaves picked, plus a few sprigs to serve 1 tbsp butter 5 shallots, thinly sliced 2 tsp light brown soft sugar 1 tbsp sherry vinegar 400g chard, leaves chopped (reserve the stem to use in soups or stews) 40g parmesan or vegetarian alternative, grated 100g mascarpone 30g blanched hazelnuts, roughly chopped chicory salad, to serve For the pastry 180g unsalted butter 250g plain flour 1/2 tsp fine sea salt 1 egg, beaten with a splash of milk, for glazing

An hour before making the pastry, wrap the butter and chill in the freezer until firm. Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Tip the flour into a large bowl with the salt, stir, then unwrap the end of the chilled butter and coarsely grate into the seasoned flour. Stir everything together using a cutlery knife, then swiftly add 8-10 tbsp ice-cold water, a little at a time, stirring until it starts to clump together. Form into a disc with your hands, adding a little more water if the Continued on page 53

pastry feels dry. Wrap and chill for 1 hr. At this stage, the pastry will keep frozen for two months. Toss the squash with 1 tbsp oil, most of the thyme leaves and seasoning. Arrange on a baking sheet and roast for 15 mins. Heat the rest of the oil and the butter in a frying pan over a medium heat and cook the shallots with a pinch of salt for 15 mins until caramelised. Add the sugar and vinegar, and cook for 3 mins more. Season, then leave to cool slightly.

Steam the chard leaves in a steamer basket for 3 mins. Tip into a tea towel and squeeze out the excess water. Roughly chop, then mix with two-thirds of the hard cheese and the mascarpone. Season.

Put a baking sheet in the oven to heat up. Roll the pastry out between two sheets of baking parchment to a 40 x 30cm rectangle. Transfer to a baking tray on its parchment, then peel off the top layer. Spoon over the shallots, leaving a 3cm border. Top with the chard mixture, the rest of the cheese and the squash. Fold the pastry border slightly over the edge of the filling, then brush with the egg wash. Chill for 1 hr. Slide the tray onto the hot baking sheet and bake for 35-40 mins. Scatter over the remaining thyme and the hazelnuts. Serve with a chicory salad.

Mulled pomegranate juice

11 pomegranate juice 1 sprig rosemary

1 tsp sumac 1 cinnamon stick 1/2 tsp coriander seeds ¹/₂ orange, sliced ¹/₄ tsp orange blossom water Pour the pomegranate juice into a large saucepan. Add the sumac, cinnamon rosemary, stick, coriander seeds, and orange. Bring to a simmer then pour through a sieve into a jug. Stir in the orange blossom water

Drain in a colander and let them steam-dry for a few mins. Heat oven to 190C/170C fan/ gas 5.


Sprinkle 1 tbsp flour and 1 tbsp honey over the parsnips and toss to coat.

Put the parsnips in a roasting tin with 2 tbsp sunflower oil, 2 tbsp butter and seasoning.

Roast for 40 mins, turning halfway, until golden.

Camposol 2025 What do you want it to be?

This month we cover the recent meeting with the Mayor, Gines Campillo. For a more detailed coverage please see the 2025 FaceBook site.

Present at the meeting were The Mayor, Ginés Campillo and Deputy Mayor and Councillor for Town Planning (Urbanismo) and Infrastructure, Gaspar Miras. The Councillor for Camposol, Silvana Buxton, joined the meeting a short time later.

The Mayor opened the floor for questions and was asked if he would provide an update on what the council is currently working on for Camposol

1.The repairs and resurfacing of Avda Los Covachos are going ahead and work should begin in 6 to 8 months, once the draft specification of works complete, is which should take around 4 months and the construction contract issued for tender and awarded the work can begin. Work on other projects on Avda los Covachos are to be coordinated, the order of work was given as 1st asphalting, 2nd pavements, 3rd street lighting, 4th road signage and marking. 2. The next round table meeting for the diversion of the Rambla Los Aznares has been de delayed, initially due to the run up to the elections on May 28th and latterly because the new officials at regional level were not appointed (until September 14th and 25th) and CHS at (National Government level) need time to acclimatise. The next meeting is now due to be held on October 11^{th.}

3.Replacement lighting has commenced on sector C and will continue in the coming months to other sectors. The council is exploring the best options and is seeking to use some of the €2.9m from Justo and Manoli settlement for this work. 4.Plan Parcial - The current plans for the modification of the plan parcial to reflect Camposol as it is now rather than what it was supposed to look like when the original plan parcial was lodged with the authorities, are currently being examined by the Regional Authority. (Side Note -The 4 year project to complete the new plan parcial will provide a factual plan of the urbanisation so future major project planning in both public and private areas can proceed, an official suspension has been in place since April 2016). A question was later asked about how the improvements for Camposol will be funded and the delineation was clearly stated. Private roads and areas are the responsibility of the owners within each poligono and public roads and areas the responsibility of the council.

There were then a number of questions from the audience. The following is a summary.

The white lines near Consum need replacing as they are difficult to see. The response was that the road markings would be completed when the road repairs are done.

There are no signs for sectors C and D until those sectors are reached, making it difficult for those unfamiliar with Camposol to find their way around.

Car parking in the Consum car park should be made entirely for disabled drivers as they need it and healthy people can park away and walk. The Camposol Business Association is currently in negotiation with the council over parking at the commercial centre, but the car park outside Consum is owned by Grupo

MASA who would need to be consulted.

The garden waste hin at the top end of Calle Esparraguerra has not been emptied for weeks and weeks. The response was that the waste removal companies have a schedule they work to and much of the problem is caused by unauthorised dumping by contractors employed by residents, who charge for disposal and then dump the waste in the public areas. Residents were encouraged to report any fly tipping to the police for action to be taken and to take photos of offending vehicles so they can be identified.

One attendee complained that the water on D15 is reduced every evening, meaning that he cannot take a shower on return from work. The Councillor for Urbanismo took note to look into this.

There were complaints about the new recycling centre on *C* sector adjacent to the golf course roundabout. It was explained that the council are only going to be using space required to take the rubbish and recycling containers off the road and looking at opening the centre with a hut and personnel to try to prevent people fly tipping in that area.

A question was put to the Mayor that as the council has taken the role of the developer they have taken responsibility for the completion of Camposol. It was pointed out that the council has NOT taken the role of the developer.

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




We can see too how much the Devil fears those who pray, since there is no m o m e n t of the day when he

As always we are constantly looking at different ways to raise money for the animals in our care and in this article we would like to raise awareness of our dogs with Leishmania and ask for your support.

Although Leishmaniasis cannot be cured, it can be managed with cheap medication and most dogs will live a full and happy life with Leish. The disease often goes into remission when a dog is placed in a stable home environment and, with reduced stress and good nutrition, many rescued dogs will be asymptomatic for the rest of their lives meaning they no longer need medication.

A dog catching Leishmaniasis in Spain is not uncommon as there are many stray and abandoned dogs with the disease. These dogs are not to blame; and in some cases one should blame the recklessness of the owners who fail to provide the correct protection for their dogs and allow them to breed and wander, which only exacerbates the situation.







These dogs have the right to a loving permanent home like any other dog.

The dogs currently under our care with Leishmania are, Miss Molly, Gabi, Fenix, Aixa, and Bizzy Lizzie. Because of their condition and the ignorance surrounding Leishmania these dogs may find it harder to find homes, the result of which means in some cases increased kennel fees and increased cost in medication for the charity. Thus we are asking for sponsorship for our leish positive dogs.

A regular monthly donation until adoption to support their medication or sometimes kennel fees would help the charity a lot, or a one off donation if that is preferable. You can see all the profiles of our Leish positive dogs by visiting our Facebook page and opening our adoption album. They are also pictured with this article. Please contact us if you would like to be involved with donating to this particular cause.



By now, hopefully readers will know that many dogs are handed in to shelters or abandoned through no fault of theirs: illness/ death of the previous owner, the birth of a new child, poor training, or the old favourite (true or not): change of circumstance. But we in dog-rescue-land know that the vast majority of these dogs can bring a very special brand of love into any home.

However, adopters - especially new ones - must understand the changes that a rescue dog has to undergo to settle into its new life. It's been dumped or abandoned, lived in noisy, unfamiliar surroundings with stranger-dogs, then (hopefully) whisked away to a brand new home. It is important to give the dogs time to shake the shelter dust off their coats, get their paws under the table, and realise that they're home.

PAPS have had some bad experiences with adopters who







say their new dog "doesn't show them affection/isn't loving" or ask us to take them back after just a few days which is disappointing in the extreme. In none of the cases have the people given the poor dog a chance to settle and show their true selves. Depending on the dog, it may take 3 days for the dog to decompress, 3 weeks to learn the new routine and 3 months or more to realise that they're now home, and loved. They should be allowed this time to settle, don't rush or smother them in too much love (at the beginning), and try to understand how the dog may feel.

SPANISH MOTORWAYS by CAR REGISTRATIONS SPAIN

Travelling on the motorways (autopistas) in Spain is an experience that showcases the country's modern infrastructure. Here we look at the difference between Autopistas & Autovias and how they have evolved.

AUTOPISTAS vs. AUTOVIAS - What's the Difference?

The distinction between 'A' and 'AP' roads is a significant one and is crucial for drivers to understand, especially when considering costs and the nature of the journey.

A Roads (Autovías):

These are dual carriageway roads, often designed for high-speed travel but may have intersections, roundabouts, and access points. They might have evolved from older roads and were upgraded to handle increased traffic.

A Roads are generally toll-free meaning that travellers can use them without incurring direct costs, though, like all infrastructure, they are funded indirectly through taxation.

While they can be found throughout Spain, **A Roads** are prevalent in regions where the construction of high-speed toll roads may not be economically viable.

AP Roads (Autopistas de Peaje):

AP Roads are also dual carriageways designed for high-speed travel but are of a higher standard compared to A Roads. They typically have controlled access points with gradeseparated junctions and fewer direct entries/exits.

As the 'Peaje' indicates, these are toll roads. Users are required to pay, based on the distance travelled. Toll booths are strategically located at entry and exit points.

AP Roads often connect major cities, ports and tourist areas and



are intended to provide a faster, more direct route for long-distance travellers. The tolls collected are used to maintain and upgrade the infrastructure.

Junction Numbering

Historically, most Spanish motorways employed a sequential numbering system, whereby junctions were numbered consecutively, starting from the beginning of the motorway. For instance, the first junction would be "Salida 1" (Exit 1), the second "Salida 2," and so on.

However, in more recent times, there's been a shift towards a kilometric system of numbering. Under this system, the junction number corresponds to the distance in kilometres from the motorway's starting point. So, a junction located 15 kilometres from the beginning of the motorway would be labelled "Salida 15." This method offers the advantage of immediately understanding how far along the motorway you are based on the junction number and also allows for new junctions to be added without renumbering the entire motorway.

Marker Boards

In addition to junction numbers, you'll likely notice a series of small, rectangular **marker boards** placed at regular intervals alongside the road. Here's what they denote: Distance Markers - These are the most common type of **marker boards.** Placed every kilometre, they display the motorway's code (e.g., A-7 or AP-68), followed by the distance in kilometres from the start of the motorway. The number increases / decreases as you travel further along the motorway. It's a great tool for drivers to gauge their location, especially if they're awaiting a specific exit.

Emergency Markers - Another type of **marker board** you might encounter is the emergency board. These have an added SOS sign and provide crucial information to emergency services. In case of an accident or breakdown, by quoting the nearest marker board's details, drivers can ensure a quicker response as the services can pinpoint their exact location.

Additional Information - Some **marker boards** might also display additional symbols or codes that denote features like tunnels, bridges, or other significant infrastructure points.

Using Spanish Motorways

Navigating Spanish motorways is straightforward once you grasp the system of junction numbering and the purpose of marker boards. The kilometric system, in particular is intuitive and practical, allowing drivers to ascertain their progress and proximity to desired exits. Meanwhile, the marker boards especially the emergency ones prioritise safety and efficiency. So, the next time you find yourself on a Spanish autopista, you'll be well-equipped to understand the nuances of the road. Safe travels!

NORMA'S TRAVELS

Still on the **Peninsula Valdes** I had a final failed attempt to see dolphins but loved my last day in the Peninsula. My flight wasn't till 7.50pm so I enjoyed the sea views then finished off with a coffee and my kind waitress booked me a taxi and helped me over the road with my bags.

At the airport people in **Madryn** were so warm, genuine and friendly and even Marissa, my dolphin guide, came rushing over and gave me a hug.

The flight back to Buenos Aires Jorge Newberry was trouble free with my taxi pick up waiting and my new hotel Up Tribeca was very welcome for a quick shower and sleep. Back to the big city and the heat, noise and traffic and time to change money in a small flower stall. The rate had gone up a bit too. Once I had some money I felt comfortable, although I had been paying for most things by credit card. It's how the economy there works. If we had been there even 2 months previously it would have made a big difference as we would have needed loads of cash and lots of tourists were being robbed.

On my last visit I had seen the outside of the Recoleta **Cemetery** so this time I booked 2-hour walking tour with а Esteban through Airbnb. What a fascinating visit. He was so enthusiastic and his storytelling was great. It was originally the vegetable garden for the Spanish Recoletos Monks who lived nearby before being evicted and it subsequently became a public cemetery. However as Recoleta became more gentrified it became the cemetery for the great and the good. It is home to mausoleums of 60-70 wealthy Portenos (the people of B Aires). They were mostly built between 1880 and 1930 and were imported from Europe. The people aren't buried but are in double lined coffins. Of course, the most famous is the grave of Eva Peron who did not fit the normal criteria as someone gave her family a plot and some of the snobby aristocrats took their coffins off elsewhere when her body was brought to **Recoleta**. Fascinating stories and well worth it.

Friday morning and I was off early to walk to **Teatro Colon** with a quick breakfast stop. The opera house is stunning and I really enjoyed the guided visit, but wow, the heat when I came out! It is so ostentatious and was restored in the last 10 years. It almost made me wish I liked opera!! In complete contrast it is on the edge of Lavelle Park where several families are living.

My long-awaited trip to see **tango** was next on the itinerary as I had been disappointed by how little there was out in the open, but maybe it was too hot. Friends recommended a show in the basement of Cafe Tortino, one of the oldest and most famous French style cafes in BA. There

is always a queue to get into the cafe but you bypass that with a tango ticket. I chose it because it was at 5pm and there was cafe food available at very reasonable prices. There were very lavish evening shows with dinner but I didn't fancy eating alone. The basement was dark and moody and air conditioned and I shared a table with a Brazilian woman called Jordania, who was also travelling alone. Our common language was Spanish with the odd Portuguese and English words thrown in. Tango is about the music, the songs and of course the dancing and included a boleador (a gaucho dance) quite varied and some of it was in a very open stance and quite folky. Of course, there was some that was much more intimate unbelievable foot and with leg work. A great experience. At the last minute I decided to visit Palacio Barolo which was five minutes from my hotel. I had time to walk up to see the Congress building which looks pretty impressive. The tour was great and the guide particularly entertaining, the building was built in 4 years and was an office block. The offices are tiny and certainly not conducive to modern work. We went up to the 14th floor by lift but had to walk up a spiralling staircase to the 22nd where there were stunning views of the city. On our previous trip to Argentina I had been disappointed to have missed BA but to be honest I had mixed feelings about the place this time. Firstly, the heat made doing very much incredibly difficult, I would normally walk everywhere in cities to enjoy the architecture etc. Secondly, the whole money situation made a simple task more complicated. Thirdly,

and sadly, there are incredible numbers of people living on the streets. It left me feeling a bit deflated and definitely hoping Montevideo would be different. It was time to head to Uruguay and meet up with Chris at the end of his cruise. After breakfast I got a taxi to the terminal for the ferry. I had booked the Buquebus ferry to Colonia and then connecting bus to Montevideo and had read very mixed reviews, but it was all very organised, immigration leaving Argentina and entering Uruguay done at 2 windows, metres apart. I was helped by a great couple from Florida, who kept me right about when and where to go. Suitcases were checked in like a flight then collected at Colonia. I used my last pesos on the ferry for a sandwich and finally left with less than a euro. I collected my bag from the belt, the bus was feet away and just over 2 hours later arrived in Montevideo. The route was very green and it was so welcome after city life in Buenos Aires.



I had booked a hotel close to the bus terminal and it was literally over the road, a nice



We enjoyed a pretty lazy day, but met six others from the cruise for dinner at 8pm. It was fascinating to hear all about the Antarctic cruise and to have some company after two weeks on my own.

Next morning Alan set off for his trip back to the UK and we headed for **Colonia del Sacramento.**

Colonia is a small town with an old town being a UNESCO world heritage site. We were staying at the Mirador Hotel with an indoor and outdoor pool. The welcome was great, but the hotel a bit dated.

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

18th September saw 4 of us meet just outside Mula in North West Murcia at an historical location called **La Almoloya.**

It is an ancient settlement set upon a limestone hill 585m above sea level which overlooks a vast area around Mula. The people who settled there (the El Argar elites), took advantage of such a strategic position by establishing an important centre of political and economic power. There is some suggestion it was the first place in Europe to have an elected Parliament.

A r o u n d 3500 years ago, La Almoloya w a s abandoned after a deep



crisis and period of upheaval. After thousands of years in abandonment it has now been partly restored to show the habitation area of a lost civilisation. It is understood to be part of a group of settlements in the area linked to La Bastida in Totana.

Meeting in the car park near to the site, an uphill walk – not for the feint hearted - took us to the equally difficult footpath and manmade steps to a rope handle w h i c h helped to get us the top. No w o n d e r they built it there – the



living accommodation and buildings would have been very difficult to access for any marauding army.

Once at the top – breathing recovered – we could take in the amazing views. A full 360° viewing point and with such a high point, we were above the tree line which made it safe for **Drone Flying.**

Jackie & Harvey the Avata flyers, were soon Goggled up and flying around the ruins. The high pitch of the motors didn't wake anyone and as we were the only ones there – flying freedom was taking place. Rick took a little longer to set up (still learning) after finding his way to a large open area with posts in the middle of the space.

Research showed this area was the Meeting & Discussion Room for 64 people, with the posts being part of the central roof structure. A large stone built circular structure was the water storage area which in those days was called a "Cistern" but no chain or handle was found to get the water out! Great flying weather – a bit of wind but nothing to put off the Drones or the flyers. S e e i n g some of the footage and p h o t o's, it gave us a great viewpoint from above as to the layout of



the settlement and walkways between the buildings.

Terry had stayed with the car to sort out the food – he was Chef for the day with his amazing collection of camping equipment and sausage, tomato and onion butties were well on their way to being ready when we got back & as a treat, blueberry muffins and flapjacks were brought out later.



The Great Divide

Lisa Entwistle is taking on a huge challenge and exciting adventure with a cycle ride from Banff in Canada to New Mexico. **The Great Divide.** We follow her adventure and in this 3rd part we read all about her trip from **Whitefish**. 4 days of pain, exhaustion, exhilaration and forest fires.

Day 9-10 Whitefish to Seeley Lake

Wild forest fires and all the best plans! The original plan was to go off grid for three days, **Whitefish** to **Swan Lake**, then to **Holland Lake** then finally out of the mountains at **Seeley Lake.** However, the wild forest fires had other plans for us.

We set off from Whitefish and had a beautiful cycle to Swan Lake, climbing up through the Swan mountain range. Stopping at Big Fork on route for some brunch. The temperature reaching over 100 degrees by midday made the afternoon cycle pretty difficult and very sweaty. We eventually arrived at Swan Lake in time to enjoy the water in the late afternoon/ evening sunshine. So many families enjoying the lake was beautiful to see. Then I headed back to camp to make my dried backpackers dinner of mushroom risotto and eat it by the stream before falling into my tent as the sun set. Up early at 5am in the dark, putting down tents and packing bikes with head torches, wanting to head out before the heat of the day. Good job we did, it turned out that wild fires south of us in Holland Lake were spreading fast and causing evacuations. We had to come off the GDMBR route and our plan to stop in **Holland Lake** wasn't possible. The only option was to head to the highway and try to cycle south fast, to out run the



fires. A trail angel Dale, who we met at a local store offered to give us a lift in his truck south, ensuring that we would be south of the fires before they closed off the main route 83.

Arriving in **Seeley Lake** we found a campsite and a laundromat where of course you can also take a shower! Ahead of the fires and ahead of schedule, today could have been very different. The universe certainly looked out for us today. A welcome beer in the local 'town' then back to the camp site to reflect on the last couple of days and plan tomorrow (or try to).

Day 11-12 Seeley Lake to Ovando and Lincoln

What is it really like to ride these roads? In a word, difficult, beyond belief in parts. I would consider myself to be a reasonable cyclist, not the worst and by no means the best, pretty average. I can happily keep up with a club ride and often ride 80-100km on a morning hilly ride. None of that prepared me for the terrain here. It is spectacular but 50km on these roads with all my kit takes on average 6 hours for someone like me.

Many people I have met en route have had the same experience, overestimating their daily mileage. Each day I set off early, usually at 7am to avoid the main heat of the day. Riding on dirt gravel roads that are washboard all over with no smooth surface in site. After 20km my legs are screaming and the climbs have usually begun. Today the climb was not too long, just a short 12km on really tough, rough rocky roads. Parts made the Paris Roubaix route seem nice, at least that had some tarmac! My fingers were becoming numb from the vibrations, cars passing whilst kicking up dust, making it hard to breath.



Stopping at a stream to refill my camel bag with filtered water was light relief. After 7km of climbing and being on gravel roads for 28km and 5 hours, my right knee started to give me pain. My whole body telling me to stop. My mind telling me to keep going, remembering how much work has gone in to getting me here. I push on. Enjoy it, I keep telling myself. But my body is telling me different. No one tells you how hard these climbs are. Much like tough days in life, they too shall pass. I reach the summit and start the descent. Then my brain has to kick in, one mistake on this downhill on these roads and I will be thrown off with broken bones. Out of the saddle and I started the descent, my legs screaming, my hands now numb, my brain arguing with my mind. Finally, we reach the campsite and tonight it's next to a bar. Sitting with my friends having a beer, meeting other cyclists makes the day all worthwhile.
